

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, September 22, 1916.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided.

PUBLIC HEARINGS.

On Areas of Assessment for Benefit in Condemnation Proceedings.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Hearing on the Proposed Area of Assessment in the Matter of Acquiring Title to Delaplaine Street, from 86th Street to Dyker Beach Park, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 1).

(On September 15, 1916 (Cal. No. 10), the hearing in this matter was continued to September 22, 1916.)

The Secretary presented affidavits of publication showing that the matter had

No one appearing in opposition to or in favor of the proposed area of assessment the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deems it for the public interest that the title, for the uses and to the extent thereof as herein mentioned, to the real property required for the opening and extending of Delaplaine Street, from 86th Street to Dyker Beach Park, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New

Resolved, That the title to be so acquired is hereby determined to be a title in fee in such premises.

Resolved, That the compensation to be made to the owners of the real property to be acquired shall be ascertained and determined by three Commissioners of Esti-

mate to be appointed by the Supreme Court;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of three Commissioners of Estimate and of one Commissioner of Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public for the same purpose, to the real property that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Delaplaine Street, from 86th Street to Dyker Beach Park, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the receipt by him of a rule map and damage map, certified as having been approved by this Board.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17, of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings. the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in the preparation of rule, damage and benefit maps, for the use thereof; and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 977 and section 1009 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby;

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings therein to acquire title to the real property required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment, as therein described, and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 22nd day of September, 1916; and

in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is

hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Bounded on the northeast by a line distant 100 feet northeasterly from and parallel with the northeasterly line of 86th Street; on the southeast by a line midway between Delaplaine Street and 12th Avenue, and by the prolongation of the said line; on the southwest by the northeasterly boundary line of Dyker Beach Park, and on the northwest by a line midway between Morrison Street and Delaplaine Street, and by the aminers. The report of the said Board is attached hereto and states in conclusion: prolongations of the said line.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative-The Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond-12.

The Secretary was then directed to call the attention of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to the desirability of rectifying the northerly boundary line of Dyker Beach Park and of here providing a marginal street, with the understanding that if this is done and any change is made in the area needed for Delaplaine Street such modification as may be necessary in jurisdiction will be effected through the Sinking Fund Commissioners.

Borough of Queens.

Hearing on the Proposed Area of Assessment in the Matter of Amending the Proceedings for Acquiring Title to Chicago Street, Toledo Street (Avenue), Parcell Street, Medina Place and to the Public Place Bounded by Chicago Street, Justice Street and Laconia Street, by Excluding the Section of Toledo Street Between South Railroad Avenue and Corona Avenue, Borough of

Queens (Cal. No. 2). (At the meeting of July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 12), the hearing was continued until September 15, 1916, and the Cord Meyer Company presented a check for \$341.37 to cover the costs and expenses incurred by the City in this proceeding so far as Toledo street north of Corona avenue is concerned, and a waiver of all claims against the City in connection therewith. At said meeting there was also presented a communication dated July 24, 1916, from the Consulting Engineer of the Borough of Queens, transmitting petition signed by residents of Elmhurst, requesting the Board to deny the petition for the elimination from the proceeding of that part of Toledo Street lying between Corona Avenue and South Railroad Avenue.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had

been duly advertised. Rev. E. M. McGuffey, Rev. H. B. Belcher, Malcolm F. Cody, H. J. Danser and Miss E. J. Walker appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment. R. W. Kellogg, representing Cord Meyer Company, and Charles G. Meyer appeared in favor.

The hearing was continued to October 20, 1916, and the matter was referred to the Local Board for consideration and report meanwhile.

Hearing on the Proposed Area of Assessment in the Matter of Acquiring Title to Riker Avenue, from Steinway Avenue to 12th Street, Borough of Queens

(Cal. No. 3). (On September 15, 1916 (Cal. No. 14), the hearing was continued until this

meeting.) The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board on July ment of the Department of Finance discloses that deponent filed claims for difference 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 371).

The hearing was continued two weeks (October 6, 1916), and the matter referred to the President of the Borough of Queens and the Chief Engineer for report on change of line of street so as to leave the railroad outside of the street system.

Miscellaneous Hearings.

Borough of The Bronx.

Hearing on the Proposed Initiation of Proceedings for the Construction of a Sewer in Eastchester Road, from Blondell Avenue to Seymour Avenue, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 4).

(On July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 19), the hearing was continued to September 15, 1916, and on the latter date (Cal. No. 20) it was continued to this meeting and referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

M. A. Magonigle appeared in opposition to the proposed improvement. No one

else appearing the hearing was closed. The following was offered:

Whereas, At the meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 27, 1916, September 15, 1916, and September 22, 1916, public hearings were held by the Board on the proposed initiation of proceedings for the construction of a sewer in Eastchester Road, from Blondell Avenue to Seymour Avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, as shown on a modified drainage plan adopted by the Board on April 14, 1916; and

Whereas, The cost of the proposed improvement, which is estimated to be \$113,700, is to be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, the assessed

valuation of which property is estimated at \$18,000.000; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the President of the Borough of The Bronx to prepare plans, specifications and an estimate of cost based on actual survey, and also to secure a determination of the boundary of the district of assessment; the entire expense of the work done subsequent to the date of this authorization to be charged against the Street Improvement Fund and later included in the assessment.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will consider the authorization of the construction of the said proposed improvement after the President of the Borough of The Bronx has submitted a statement showing that all of the above described work has been done, that he has secured the approvel of the form of contract by the Corporation Counsel, that he is prepared to place the improvement under contract as soon as he receives the consent of the Board, and that the assessment map will be completed on or before the date of payment on acceptance, this report being accompanied by a further statement showing the quantity of work to be performed under each item and the unit price thereof, the expense incurred for preliminary work, the allowance to be made for additional engineering and contingencies, the total probable cost, and the number of working days to be allowed the contractor for carrying out the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Committee on Salaries and Grades.

President, Borough of Brooklyn-Retirement of John T. Butler, Stationary Engineer (Cal. No. 5).

(On August 22, 1916 (Cal. No. 51), the request in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 19, 1916, from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting retirement of John T. Butler, Stationary Engineer; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

Gentlemen-At a meeting of your Board held August 22, 1916, there was submitted a communication from the President, Borough of Brooklyn, dated June 19, Whereas, At the aforesaid time a public hearing was given to all persons interested | 1916, recommending the retirement of John T. Butler, a Stationary Engineer in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, President, Borough of Brooklyn,

The President's communication was as follows:

"I enclose application for retirement of John T. Butler, 828 Washington Avenue, Brooklyn, Stationary Engineer in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices in this Department, on account of physical disability.

Applicant states he is 53 years of age. On September 12, 1916, Mr. Butler was examined by the Board of Medical Ex-

"Mr. Butler has been in the employ of the City of New York since June, 1886."

"In our opinion applicant is permanently incapacitated for duty and we therefore suggest that you recommend his retirement."

Mr. Butler's original appointment and subsequent changes in title and rate of compensation were as follows:

August 1, 1886-Appointed a Fireman, Department of City Works, Brooklyn, at \$720 per annum.

August 22, 1887-Title changed to Laborer, at \$1.75 per day.

February 12, 1889—Compensation changed to \$2 per day. March 14, 1892—Title changed to Fireman at \$780 per annum.

June 3, 1892—Title changed to Assistant Engineman, at \$1,000 per annum.

November 3, 1898—Compensation changed to \$1,200 per annum.

September 1, 1901—Compensation changed to \$1,277.50 per annum.

December 18, 1905-Transferred to Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Bor-

ough of Manhattan, as Stationary Engineer, at \$4 per day. February 9, 1908-Compensation changed to \$4.50 per day.

November 14, 1910-Transferred to Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Brooklyn.

In an affidavit, dated September 7, 1916, submitted herewith, Mr. Butler stated that he had never filed a claim nor brought suit against the City of New York for the payment of salary or wages or for any other claim, except that he started several actions against the City for wages claimed as due him for difference in pay under the prevailing rate of wages law, and recovered one thousand dollars (\$1,000)

some time in 1907. A search of the records in the Law Department discloses the following actions brought by deponent against the City for difference in wages claimed as due him

under the prevailing rate of wages law: October 26, 1899, \$3.594.18. General release given, March 7, 1914. January 27, 1908, \$149.31. General release given, March 7, 1914. July 8, 1905, \$53. Discontinued without costs, January 2, 1909. August 4, 1905, \$375. Discontinued without costs, January 2, 1909.

tion now exists in Richmond County. On account of the large area to be covered by the Sheriff and his deputies there was provided two automibiles to supplant two horses and vehicles. These are used in the transportation of prisoners, service of executions, etc. No provision was made however for a force to operate them and at present they are operated by the Sheriff, his Deputies and a Chauffeur, who is paid from the private purse of the Sheriff.

"The Sheriff's reason for the request for a Deputy Sheriff instead of a Chauffeur was for the purpose of placing the responsibility for the transportation

of prisoners upon a proper official.

The Bureau of Standards however recognizes the advisability of employing a Chauffeur instead of a Deputy Sheriff, as requested, but the Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated May 23, 1916, states that a Chauffeur not being one of the Assistants specifically provided for by the statute, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are without power to establish such position."

Recommendation-In view of the above report the Committee recommends that the request be denied at this time and further recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment seek such legislation as would enable them to provide the

Fire Department-Increasing Compensation of Moulder and Coremaker (Cal. No. 8).

(On August 22, 1916 (Cal. No. 41), the request in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated August 19, 1916, from the International Moulders Union of North America, requesting that the compensation of Moulders and Coremakers at present employed in the Fire Department Repair Shop be increased to at least \$4.50 per day; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

September 6, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On August 22, 1916, the CONFERENCE BOARD OF NEW YORK AND VICINITY, INTERNATIONAL MOULDERS' UNION OF NORTH AMERICA, requested increases in rates for Coremakers from \$3.50 to \$4.50 per diem, and for moulders from \$4 to \$4.50 per diem in the Fire Department Repair Shop. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The Moulders' Union submits a statement showing the rates paid to moulders and coremakers in 24 of the largest foundries in Greater New York, employing 696 men, as follows:

"'In four foundries, \$4 per diem to 85 men.
"'In 15 foundries, \$4 to \$4.25 per diem to 375 men.
"'In one foundry, \$4.05 to \$4.28 per diem to 60 men. "In two foundries, \$4 to \$4.50 per diem to 56 men.
"In one foundry, \$4 to \$5 per diem to 25 men.
"In one foundry, \$4 to \$5.25 per diem to 95 men.
"In one foundry, \$4 to \$5.25 per diem to 95 men.

"'In all the foundries a limited number receive the higher compensation stated above.'

"The representative of the Moulders' Union exhibited an agreement signed by a large number of employers in large foundries to pay a rate of \$4.25 to

moulders and coremakers on and after January 1, 1917. "It has not been the custom in fixing the Budget rates for an ensuing year for mechanics in City employ to anticipate the enforcement of a future rate of compensation in private employ. An element of uncertainty exists as to the acceptance of a demand for increased wages by employers of a majority of all the men in a trade in Greater New York. Further, the Union asks that the

City pay a rate of \$4.50, which is 25 cents per diem in excess of the rate proposed for private employers for the year 1917. "One moulder and one coremaker are in the employ of the City. The representative of the Moulders' Union states that coremakers are a part of the organization. Private employers state that coremakers have been paid \$4 per diem the same rate as moulders. The one coremaker in the Fire Department is paid

\$3.50 per diem. It is obviously fair that the compensation for the coremaker should be increased to \$4 per diem. The increased cost to the City would be \$138.50. "It is recommended that the request for increase in rate for moulder to \$4.50 per diem be denied, without prejudice to the Moulders' Union making applica-

tion to the Board in 1917 for the payment of the rate then prevailing for moulders in private employ in Greater New York. "It is further recommended that the rate for coremaker be increased from

\$3.50 to \$4 per diem." In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend that the City department in which coremakers are employed request in its Budget estimate for 1917 a rate of \$4 per diem for such employees, and that the request for increase in rate for moulder from \$4 to \$4.50 per diem be denied, and the adoption of the attached resolutions. "In private employ Chief Engineers have charge of steam and electrical plants in buildings, are responsible for the heating and lighting, and repairs, and in cases act as Janitors in charge. These men receive from \$2,000 to \$5,000 per annum, according to their responsibility.

"It will be seen that per diem and weekly rates are paid in manufacturing plants. It is stated that usually where weekly rates are paid the incumbent is

continuously responsible for the plant.

"Analysis of the rates paid by 44 employers to 241 Stationary Engineers and Chiefs in large buildings, hotels, hospitals, corporations and manufactories, shows that of 200 Engineers excluding Chiefs, 43 receive over \$27 a week of six days. "The latest figures obtainable from the State Department of Labor show the number of Engineers reported and the rates paid in Greater New York, as

"Deducting the 599 from the total of all Engineers of 4,453 shows that 13.5 per cent. receive over \$27 per week, the amount now paid in City departments to Stationary Engineers on the six-day basis. These Engineers receive \$31.50 for seven days' work.

"About 250 Engineers employed at \$75 to \$175 per month, as well as certain Chief Engineers in hotels and public institutions receive also maintenance.

"A statistical expert of the Department of Labor stated that scattered increases in wages for Stationary Engineers for increased efficiency were no doubt made since the above figures were collated, but would not materially increase the percentage of Engineers now receiving over \$27 per week in private employ.

Chapter 740, Laws of New York of 1913, provides: "'Section 8a. One day of rest in seven. (1) Every employer of labor engaged in carrying on any factory or mercantile establishment in this State shall allow every person except those specified in subdivision 2 employed in such

factory or mercantile establishment at least 24 consecutive hours of rest in every seven consecutive days.' * * 'Subdivision 2c provides: 'Employees whose duties include not more than three hours' work on

Sunday in (1) setting sponges in bakeries; (2) caring for live animals; (3)

maintaining fires; (4) necessary repairs to boilers or machinery.' "The six-day law applies only to factories and mercantile establishments, and permits service of three hours on the seventh day for necessary care of a steam plant in operation. In the plants affected by the State law the Engineers, by arrangement, alternate in their Sunday work, without extra compensation. In factories and mercantile establishments the six-day law is generally observed.

while in hotels, hospitals, etc., the seven-day rule is in force. "The Engineers' Union submits that because this Board has fixed a high standard of efficiency in the economic use of coal and made a saving of thousands of dollars, the Engineers should receive extra compensation on account of

the high cost of living. "This Bureau cannot assume the responsibility of suggesting an increase in wages for Stationary Engineers in City departments on account of the high cost of living or of the fact that owners of factories and mercantile establishments are required by State law to observe a six-day rule. The Engineers request \$5 per diem for six days, instead of \$4.50 per diem for seven days' work.

"This examination has disclosed that, figuring the compensation received by

those paid on a weekly or monthly rate on a per diem basis a large majority of Stationary Engineers in private employ are paid at a rate less than \$4.50 per diem, the present compensation for Engineers in City departments.

"The Engineers' Union requests a rate of \$6 per diem for Stationary Engineers in charge of plants. The Bureau of Standards has recommended rates for Supervising Engineers, without maintenance, as follows:

Supervising Engineman in charge of large plants or institutions not covering a shift, \$1,740 to \$2,100 per annum. "Supervising Enginemen covering one shift in smaller buildings and institutions, \$1,620 to \$1,920 per annum.

"Supervising Engineman in charge of large pumping station or small group

of pumping stations, \$1,620 to \$2,100 per annum. "Advance in rates above the minimum may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is recommended that City departments make application in Budget estimates for 1917 for a per annum rate for Supervising

Enginemen, according to the above classification. "A rate of \$33 per week, or \$5.50 per diem, is requested for Pile-Driver Engineers. The present rate in City employ is \$5 per diem.

"The Secretary of the Building Trades Employers' Association stated that Hoisting Engineers running steel derricks or pumps and Pile-Driver Engineers were paid the same rates by members of the Association. The rates paid are \$30 per week of 44 hours for straight time, or \$5.50 per diem, and \$6 per diem for broken time, when men may be employed for a few days.

"The Secretary of the General Contractors' Association, whose members are partly engaged in subway work, stated that the rate paid to Hoisting Engineers and Pile-Driver Engineers was the same, \$30 per week, for 48 hours, straight time, and \$6 per diem for broken time. By arrangement, if the men work four or five days in the week, they receive pay for a full week. In order to retain certain desirable men, they may be paid for all lost time during the year. Under the terms of a contract, when a job is sublet, the same rates must be paid.

"With the advance of concrete foundation construction, except where the unusual condition of the earth may require the driving of piles, pile-driving

is now largely confined to dock construction.

"The work of Pile-Driver Engineers in the Department of Docks is seasonal. The average number of days employed is about 200, and at the rate of \$5.50 per diem, the annual earnings would amount to about \$1,100, as against earnings of Stationary Engineers, at \$4.50 per diem, of \$1,408.50 for the year on a six days a week basis. On account of their seasonal work, and the other facts disclosed, the rate of \$5.50 per diem is fair for Pile-Driver Engineers. It is recommended that the City department in which Pile-Driver Engineers are employed make application in its Budget estimate for 1917 for a rate of \$5.50 per diem for Pile-Driver Engineers.

"It has been recommended in a previous report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from this Bureau that City Departments in which Steam Roller Engineers are employed, make application in their Budget estimates for 1917 for a rate of \$5.50 per diem for such employees, as is now requested."

In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend that the City Department in which Pile-Driver Engineers are employed, request in its Budget estimate for 1917, a rate of \$5.50 per diem for such employees; that City Departments similarly request per annum rates for supervising Enginemen, according to classification in the standard specifications; that the request for increase in rate for Stationary Engineers from \$4.50 to \$5 per diem be denied, and that the attached resolutions be adopted. Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity-Appropriation of Funds from Water Revenues and Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 12).

The Secretary presented a communication dated July 12, 1916, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requesting an appropriation of funds from Brooklyn Water Revenues to provide for purchase of additional equipment for the Ridgewood pumping station; and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof and modification of schedule: September 14, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-On July 12, 1916, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested an additional appropriation of \$850 from the 1916 Brooklyn Water Revenues to provide for the purchase of additional equipment for the Ridgewood pumping station.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which this request was referred on

July 14, 1916, reports thereon, as follows:

"The \$850 additional allowance requested is to provide for the purchase of a feed pump, including the necessary piping, valves and appurtenances, for the Heine boiler room at the Ridgewood pumping station, Borough of Brooklyn. There are two feed pumps now installed, but both are in need of repairs, and one pump is not sufficient to keep the plant running while the other pump is being repaired. It is, therefore, proposed to install a new pump at a cost of \$700 for the pump and \$150 for the necessary piping valves and appurtenances.

"The Commissioner's 1916 budget request for General Plant Equipment, Pumping, Brooklyn, was \$2,000. As the request covered only tools and small equipment, and it was believed that the introduction of the new Catskill water supply sometime prior to 1917 would reduce the normal equipment needs at this station, the 1916 budget allowance was reduced to \$1,000.

"As the Catskill supply cannot be delivered to Brooklyn until some months later than was anticipated, the entire \$1,000 allowed will probably be required for the purposes requested. An additional allowance of \$850 for the purchase of the necessary pump and appurtenances appears to be needed."

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions, one granting the request and the other modifying the schedules affected.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-On June 13, 1916, and August 11, 1916, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requested further revision of schedules and transfers of the sums of \$245.90 and \$17,496.83 within the appropriation made to his department for the year 1916. The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which these requests were referred on

June 16, 1916, and August 17, 1916, reports thereon as follows: The accounts to which it is proposed to transfer additional funds, the reason

for the transfers, the amounts requested and recommended, are as follows: "Code 2377, Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers, Carting and Stables, Manhattan, \$220.40. The appropriation was \$450. During the month of April it was necessary to hire 220 additional horses at a cost of \$440, to meet which expense there is a balance of \$219.60. The amount required is to be transferred from Code 2376, Hire of Horses, Vehicles or Motor Trucks with Drivers, The Bronx. The transfer is necessary.

"Code 2378, Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers, Carting and Stables, Brooklyn, \$25.50. This transfer has been found to be unnecessary. "Code 2347, Food Supplies (Meal Money), \$202.80. There is a balance of \$0.45 in the original appropriation of \$900. The account was practically exhausted

on July 1, 1916, due to the overtime work required of clerks.

The amount requested for the balance of the year will probably prove insuf-

"Code 2349, Fuel Supplies, \$2,036.65. The appropriation to this account was

\$9,033.38 which was the amount requested. "This request was based on the consumption for the previous year.

"The reasons given for the proposed transfer are 'the increased cost of fuel during the early part of the year, and also to allow sufficient funds for the remainder of the year.

"The following table shows a comparison between the 1916 Budget Allowance and Actual Expenditure for fuel as reflected upon the books of the department:

"It is evident from the above that the increase in the cost of fuel was anticipated in making the appropriation, as the average prices paid have been less 2 than those allowed. It is stated by the Department that there is sufficient coal on hand in the Borough of Brooklyn for the remainder of the year, and in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx to last until October 1, 1916. The account is nearly exhausted. This indicates that the consumption has exceeded the estimated requirements.

"It is recommended that the transfer be deferred, pending an investigation of the present stock of coal on hand and the reasons for the increased consump-

"Code 2350, Office Supplies, \$203.38. On August 3, 1916, there was less than 2, \$100 in this account, the appropriation to which was \$1,641.02. The request is based on an estimated monthly expenditure of \$60 for the last five months, for postage and miscellaneous office supplies. Of the appropriation, \$562 has been 2 spent for Contingencies, for which purpose \$600 was authorized. The transfer 2 appears necessary.

"Code 2352, General Plant Supplies, \$1,219.08. There is a balance of \$1,280.92 in the account, to which \$5,253.28 was appropriated. The request is based on an estimated monthly expenditure of \$500 for the last five months of the year.

"The appropriation has proved insufficient, one reason being the increase in the amount of disinfecting supplies used at the dumps on account of the epidemic of poliomyelitis. During July \$567 was expended for this purpose. The amount requested appears reasonable, and the transfer necessary.

'Code 2353, Office Equipment, \$200. The appropriation, \$4,211.63, is practically exhausted, probably due to increase in prices. The amount requested is based on a monthly expenditure of \$50 for sundries. The transfer is necessary.

"Code 2357, Motor Vehicles and Equipment, Borough Administration, Manhattan, \$104.26. The appropriation to this account was \$233.66. On August 3, 1916, the balance of \$28.74 was fully encumbered. The additional amount is required for automobile shoes and tubes for the balance of the year.

"Code 2360, Motor Vehicles and Equipment, Carting and Stables, \$1,200. On August 3, 1916, this account to which the appropriation was \$24,552, owing to low estimates on orders, was overdrawn to the extent of \$239.72. There is an order pending amounting to \$936 for sixteen solid tires for tractors. The transfer is necessary to liquidate these obligations.

Code 2362, Building Materials, \$3,426.49. The appropriation to this account was \$27,903.16. At the time of making the request there was a balance of \$12,573.51, since which time a contract and open market orders amounting to \$9,766.46 have been awarded, leaving at the present time an available balance of \$2,807.05. During June, July and August the average monthly expenditure was about \$1,300. The request is based on an estimated current expenditure of \$1,000 per month from August first. The transfer of \$2,200 will provide for the amount

considered necessary by the department, which appears reasonable. "Code 2364, General Plant Materials, \$3,483.43. The amount here requested is for the purchase of material for cart covers. The original appropriation to this account, \$49,978.73, has been decreased by the transfer of \$3,100 to \$46,878.73.

"On October 8, 1915, \$14,336.35 in special revenue bonds was authorized for the purpose of equipping with canvas covers all the carts of the department (698) not previously provided with the same. Of this amount, \$13,928.88 has been expended for materials to be employed in the construction of 864 cart covers; 166 more than were required at the time. For labor there has been expended \$327.20, leaving a balance of \$80.27 unexpended. An allowance of \$3,900 in the 1916 budget was sufficient to provide for renewals to at least 400 of the carts already equipped. There is at present a balance of over \$10,000 in the account. The transfer is unnecessary.

Code 2365—General Repairs, General Administration—\$100. There is a balance of \$24.95 in this account, the appropriation to which was \$60. Two orders for overhauling and painting the general superintendent's automobile, amounting to \$65, are awaiting the transfer. The balance of the amount requested (\$59.95) is the estimated amount required for the remainder of the year.

Code 2366. General Repairs, Maintenance of Buildings and Equipment, Manhattan, \$2,520.69. The appropriation to this account (\$2,596) has been increased by transfer to \$5,096. The expenditures and outstanding open market order liabilities to August 31, 1916, amount to \$5,962.35. The request is made to provide for the present deficit and an anticipated monthly expenditure of \$400 for the remainder of the year for work which cannot be done by departmental labor. The transfers of \$2,500 will accomplish this purpose.

'Code 2368, General Repairs, Maintenance of Buildings and Equipment, The Bronx, 273.38. The appropriation to this account (\$792) is practically exhausted. The department bases its estimate on a probable monthly expenditure of \$60 for the remainder of the year, for work which cannot be performed by departmental

labor. The transfer of \$220 will accomplish the desired result. 'Code 2369, General Repairs, Carting and Stables, Manhattan, \$207.75. There is a balance of \$84.25 in this account, the appropriation to which was \$1,050. Regular monthly charges to the account for resetting wagon tires, sewing saddle pads and other small items amount to about \$50. Other general repairs have resulted in a shortage of funds in the account. The department bases its request on a monthly expenditure of \$70 for the remainder of the year, which appears reasonable. The transfer of \$200 is required for this purpose.

'Code 2370, General Repairs, Carting and Stables, Brooklyn, \$1,505.05. It is proposed to add \$1,425 of the above amount for attaching by outside labor 300 cart covers, the material for which was purchased in 1915. The rest of the amount requested is required, together with the unexpended balance, to provide

for current work, which it is estimated will amount to \$60 per month. The request appears reasonable.

"Code 2371, General Repairs, Carting and Stables, The Bronx, \$478.40. It is proposed to add \$475 of the above amount for attaching by outside labor 100 cart covers, material for which was purchased in 1915.

"The rest of the amount requested is required, together with the unexpended balance, to provide for current work, which it is estimated will amount to \$25 per month. The request appears reasonable.

"Code 2381, Transportation, Carfare, General Administration, \$121.81. The appropriation to this account (\$200) is exhausted. The allowance has proved insufficient on account of the additional amount required to pay for the transportation of several floating gangs of mechanics, organized since the beginning of the year, to do all small repair work at stables and other department buildings and structures. The transfer is reasonable and necessary

"Code 2386, General Plant Service, Maintenance of Buildings and Equipment, \$214.66. The appropriation to this account was \$864, of which there had been expended, to August first, \$578.66; an average of \$82.66 per month. The present fixed monthly expenditures amount to \$96.18. The request of the department, based on a current monthly expenditure of \$100 for the balance of the year, is reasonable and the transfer necessary.

"The Commissioner states that the transfers requested are in excess of the amounts required for the year 1916."

W.—35, Laying Trunk Mains in Manhattan, under East River, and in Brooklyn and Queens," was authorized in an amount of \$450,000 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 1, 1910, and approved by the Mayor on July 27, 1910. There is an unencumbered balance in the fund of approximately

The work in Section 1 chargeable to fund "C. D. W.-35" consists in furnishing and laying about 4,500 feet of twenty-inch water main, connecting up with the twenty-inch main in Vandeventer avenue at 6th avenue, and then running in Vandeventer avenue to 5th avenue, in 5th avenue to Flushing avenue, and in Flushing avenue to Van Alst avenue. The immediate object of this work is to furnish a better hydrant pressure, particularly to the Astoria section, but the main is also part of a proposed trunk line along Van Alst avenue, connecting with the twenty-inch main in Thomson avenue and giving a much needed loop system of trunk lines. The work in Franklin street consists of about 3,400 feet of twelve-inch pipe

between the proposed twenty-inch main at Flushing avenue and Mills street. There is a six-inch main in the street at present, part of which is to be aban-

doned and the taps transferred to the twelve-inch main.

The entire First Ward of Queens is under a fifteen per cent. penalty by the

fire insurance companies, due to inadequate hydrant supply and pressure, and Astoria is particularly weak in hydrant supply. The proposed twelve-inch pipe is to improve this condition, as well as to furnish

a better domestic service to the district.

I have been informed that the New York Fire Insurance Exchange has stated that, if the work included in this contract is done, the penalty will be removed from the whole of the First Ward.

The rest of the proposed work in this section is all new work as follows: Nassau street, from Steinway avenue to Luyster street, and Sound street. from Nassau street to Potter avenue, about 1,800 feet of eight and six inch mains to

supply water to about 32 houses. Skillman avenue,, from Gosman street to Stone street, and Stone street to 700 feet north of Skillman Avenue, about 800 feet of twelve-inch main and 700 feet of eight-inch main to supply water to about eight houses. The main object of this work is to supply the houses on Stone street, and the nearest connection is through Skillman avenue, which is a broad thoroughfare and will ultimately have a twelve-inch main throughout.

Star avenue, from Borden avenue to Greenport avenue, about 1,300 feet of eightinch pipe to furnish water for domestic supply and fire protection to about five large factories and several dwellings.

Van Dam street, from Borden avenue to Review avenue, about 1,400 feet of twelve-inch main to supply water to about twenty dwellings and factories.

Ninth avenue, from Wolcott avenue to 500 feet north of Riker avenue, about 2,300 feet of twelve-inch main to supply water to about seven dwellings and to increase the hydrant supply near Riker avenue, where there are large piano factories and very large lumber storage yards. This is mainly a fire protection project which has been strongly urged by the Queens Merchants' Association. Tests by the Fire Insurance Exchange showed a very inadequate hydrant supply.

Ninth avenue has not been graded, and if the tentative grades are adopted about 300 feet of this new main would have to be lowered, but the proposed work is the cheapest way to furnish the required supply, and there is little prospect of any regrading being done in this street for many years.

The work in 12th avenue and Wolcott avenue consists in laying about 1.800 feet of twelve-inch main between Potter avenue and old Bowery Bay road and in addition to supplying water to twenty-five buildings and a large school house will be part of the plan for reinforcing the fire hydrant service.

The work in section 2 consists in laying eight-inch mains in streets that have no city mains to supply water to houses now without any adequate supply. The work in detail is as follows:

The Secretary presented a communication from the Acting Fire Commissioner dated August 16, 1916, requesting approval of plans, specifications, etc., for repairs and alterations to quarters of various fire companies, at an estimated cost of \$4,265; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On August 16, 1916, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the Acting Fire Commissioner, dated August 16, 1916, requesting approval of plans and specifications for repairs and alterations to quarters of various fire companies.

The estimated cost of the work is \$4,265, payable from the 1916 budget account General Repairs, Care of Buildings and Grounds, Code 1695." sufficient balance to cover the cost of this work.

The proposed work consists of heating, ironwork, masonwork, plastering, plumbing, metal ceiling repairs and electric work. The estimates for the separate items range in cost from \$5 to \$1,200.

The item of \$1,200 is for a steam heating system in quarters of Hook and Ladder 13. for which these plans were approved at an estimated cost of \$700 on May 19, 1916. The lowest bid received was about \$1,200.

All of the buildings have been examined, and it was found that the work is necessary for the proper upkeep of the buildings The plans and specifications are satisfactory, and have been approved as to the electrical work by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The estimate of cost is reasonable.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Deputy and Acting Fire Commissioner, dated September 1, 1916, requesting approval of an increased estimate of cost, \$139,069.43 for furnishing, delivering and installing underground lead-covered distribution cables in the Borough of Manhattan, from 82d street to Fort George avenue; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof:

September 18, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On September 1, 1916, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a letter from the Deputy and Acting Fire Commissioner. dated September 1, 1916, requesting approval of an increased estimate of cost, \$139,069.43, for furnishing, delivering and installing underground lead covered distribution cables in the Borough of Manhattan, from 82d Street to Fort George Avenue.

On August 25, 1916, you approved an estimate of cost of \$125,000 for this work, as requested by the Fire Department. Your approval was based on a statement by the Bureau of Contract Supervision, dated August 25, 1916, as follows:

"The estimate of cost represents an increase of thirty-two per cent, over the estimate prepared in July, 1915, upon which the appropriation for the completion of the new Fire Alarm Telegraph System was based. Other contracts recently awarded have been forty per cent. over the original estimate, but it is possible that a lower cost for materials may permit bids within the estimated cost of \$125,000 for this work."

Instead of becoming lower in price, materials have advanced since the date of approval of the estimate of cost of \$125,000. Copper, which was calculated at 19

cents per pound in the original appropriation, is now 28½ cents, and other materials have also advanced, and indications are that they will go still higher.

The increased estimate of cost is 421/2 per cent. over the original estimate, and is the lowest of three bids received on August 31, 1916. It does not appear probable that readvertising would reduce the cost.

There is a sufficient unencumbered balance in the corporate stock fund "C. F. D. 3B" to provide funds for the increased cost.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Fire Commissioner, dated August 2, 1916, requesting approval of form of contract, specifications and estimate of cost at \$74,762 for the purchase of fire hose; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof at an estimated cost of \$74,405:

The form of contract was not submitted with the request, but has been furnished in a form to cover the following additional items, specifications for which have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

2,500 feet of 34-inch internal diameter hose (Manhattan). 2,500 feet of 34-inch internal diameter hose (Brooklyn).

The item "210 feet 4-inch cotton rubber-lined hose at \$1.70, \$357," has been omitted. No specification has been prepared for 4-inch cotton rubber-lined hose and, as the quantity to be purchased is small, it will be purchased by open market order.

The cost of the hose for which approval of specifications has been requested is to be charged to the appropriation of \$75,000 special revenue bonds approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 27, 1916, as requested by the Board of Aldermen on July 7, 1916, which is intact.

The estimate of the quantities of the several sizes of hose to be purchased, varies materially from the amounts estimated at the time the funds from which the cost is to be paid were authorized. This condition is brought about by a change in the policy of the department, from that expressed at the time the request for funds was made.

The request was based upon an estimate which proposed the replacement of most of the hose in the department which was over eight years old. Now it is proposed to withdraw such hose as appears to be unsafe for service in the most important fire districts, irrespective of its age. In some instances this includes hose, which has reached the limit of the guarantee period or slightly over four years old.

The changed basis of estimating, naturally upsets the quantities as they appear in the report to the Board of Aldermen upon the department request for revenue

The department has recently withdrawn from use large quantities of 2½ and

3-inch hose which it is now proposed to replace. The specifications for fire hose prepared by the Bureau of Contract Supervision and used by the Fire Department in contracts, bids for which were opened on August 18, 1913, were reviewed, at the request of the Fire Commissioner, by a committee of engineers representing various civic and technical organizations. The report of this committee dated December 24, 1914, approved the specifications, but recommended

The specifications now submitted for approval differ in certain respects from the specifications approved by the Fire Commissioner's committee. All of the latest proposed changes do not appear to be proper. The items, in which a modification is desirable are as follows:

The requirement that the tensile strength of the tube per square inch across the seam shall be not less than 1,260 pounds has been inserted.

It is difficult to obtain the true strength per square inch of the rubber in the seam, owing to the fact that there is always an excess of rubber at the seam, which does not add to the strength, but does add to the measurement of thickness of the rubber as tested. This difficulty will be obviated by changing this paragraph to read "Tensile strength per linear inch in the seam, minimum 75 pounds. For the seam in

the cover of rubber hose this should be 45 instead of 75 pounds." Clauses have been added to the specifications requiring certain minimum tensile strength and elongations at breaking point after samples have been subjected to dry

heat at 220 degrees F. for two hours.

certain modifications.

This test will probably be of value in determining if the rubber has been so highly vulcanized that its deterioration with age will be excessively rapid. As the purpose of the test is to determine the rapidity of deterioration, rather than the absolute strength or elasticity of the material (these are determined by other tests), the requirement should be a minimum reduction in strength or elasticity due to the heat treatment expressed in percentage of the original strength, an average of three samples before and after being taken. When changed to the percentage form the clause reads as follows:

Reduction in tensile strength-Maximum-20 per cent.

Reduction in elongation-Maximum-15 per cent." A clause has been added to the specification, requiring the smoothness of the interior lining of the 11/2, 3 and 31/2 inch hose to be tested by the loss in pressure allowable loss in pressure, and as a practical requirement the clause as written is

From tests made by the Board of Fire Underwriters the requirements should be:

For $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, not exceeding 17 pounds per 50-foot length. For 3 inch hose, not exceeding $4\frac{1}{4}$ pounds per 50-foot length.

For 3½ inch hose, not exceeding 3½ pounds per 50-foot length.

The loss being measured for a flow of 100 gallons per minute through 7-8 inch nozzle for 11/2 inch hose, for 300 gallons per minute through 11/4 inch nozzle for 3 inch hose, and for 400 gallons per minute through 11/4 inch nozzle for 31/2 inch hose. A description of the method of ascertaining this loss in pressure should be

inserted in the methods of test as follows "The hose shall be stretched straight on a plain surface, a pressure gauge shall be attached between the feed line or hydrant and the first coupling of the hose to be tested. Another pressure gauge shall be attached between the discharge end of the hose and a standard New York Fire Department short taper

nozzle." A requirement has been added to the specification that the hose when curved to a radius of 27 inches shall withstand a pressure of 600 pounds per square inch,

without showing any signs of failure. The clause, as written, allows the City to make this test or not as it pleases. This test is unreasonably severe, and it is probable that the City could reject any hose offered to it if it elected to make the test. It is believed that the kink test at 350 pounds for 11/2 and 21/2 inch hose and 300 pounds for 3 inch hose is a sufficient test of the hose in this respect.

A clause has been inserted in the specifications stating that all chemical and physical tests shall be made in accordance with the Board of Estimate's Standard Methods of Test.

No standard methods of test have been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Certain proposed standard methods of test have been drawn up, and undated copies have been sent to manufacturers who might be interested. The standards have been changed, however, and manufacturers cannot be sure that the copies they have on file are the latest standard methods of test. As changes in the methods of test materially affect the meaning of parts of the specifications, the methods of test should be made and distributed, as part of the form of contract and specifications, so that all bidders will understand them.

The specifications have been amended in accordance with the above recommendations, and copies of the revised methods of test have been attached. Some slight modifications in wording to clarify the meaning have also been made. The amended form is satisfactory to the Fire Commissioner.

Department of Health-Approval of Contract, Plans, Amended Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 37).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary, Department of Health, dated July 25, 1916, requesting approval of form of contract, plans, amended specifications and estimate of cost, \$3,200, for furnishing and installing kitchen fixtures in the Medical Staff House and Nurses' Home on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof at an estimated cost of \$2,400:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-On July 31, 1916, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the Department of Health, dated July 25, 1916, requesting approval of the form of contract, specifications, plans and estimate of cost, \$3,200, for furnishing and installing kitchen fixtures in the medical staff house and nurses' home on the grounds of Willard Parker Hospital, Borough of Manhattan.

The cost is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. H.—19B, Department of Health, Construction of Medical Staff House and Nurses' Home at Willard Parker and Reception Hospitals, for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 26, 1913, approved an appropriation of \$260,000. On August 7, 1916, an unencumbered balance of \$43,135.55 remained in the fund.

The equipment to be provided consists of one combination coal and gas cooking range, one gas fired boiler and roaster, one cook's table, one saucepan rack, one kitchen work table, one dishwashing machine and tables for dishes, one set of tea, coffee and hot water urns, one urn stand and cup warmer, one steam table and dish warmer, one vegetable parer, one ice cream freezing machine, one general storage refrigerator and one service refrigerator.

The building is now almost completed and the kitchen equipment is needed, so that the building may be put in service as quickly as possible, in order to provide accommodations for the medical staff and nurses.

There is not sufficient room at present for the staff and nurses, owing to the large number of patients that have to be housed at this hospital. The old nurses' home was built to accommodate 60 nurses. There are now 225 nurses, and it is necessary to place three and four in a room. The meals require five sittings to provide for the large number to be fed.

The new building will provide accommodations for 105 nurses and 35 doctors. It is expected that 150 to 160 persons will be housed therein, when pupil nurses are taken and that between two hundred and fifty and three hundred persons will be fed in the dining room, for which the kitchen equipment is now to be provided.

The specifications have been amended by the architect, in accordance with suggestions of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, so as to permit the installation of articles of standard stock construction and eliminate special construction as far as possible. The estimate of cost has thereby been reduced to \$2,400, which is reasonable. The form of contract, plans and amended specifications are satisfactory.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the form of contract, plans, amended specifications and estimate of cost. \$2,400.

The facts in relation to these items are as follows: Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4.

These are emergency jobs which it was necessary to have performed without delay The amounts given as estimated costs are the amounts of the low bid in each case except that of Item 1, the cost of which was \$285. Bills for these items have been rendered and are awaiting the approval of your Board as to the expenditures.

No. 5. The form of contract, specifications and plans for the erection of these glass partitions are submitted for approval. It is proposed to divide the wards of the east pavilion into cubicals to provide for the isolation of patients. The form of contract, specifications and plans are satisfactory. The estimate of cost is reasonable.

The cost is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled, "C. C. H. 33J Addition to East Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital," for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, authorized an appropriation of \$200,000. On September 18, 1916, an unencumbered balance of \$7,223.74 remained in the fund.

The work on the steamboat "Bronx" was necessary to repair damages due to a collision. Dry docking was necessary, and the Government Steamboat Inspectors required additional work to be done, before granting permission to replace the vessel in commission. The cost of repairs is \$650. The bill is held by the Department of Public Charities pending approval of the amount by your Board. No. 7.

This item is for the installation of electric equipment in the stable and garage, Kings County Hospital, which was badly damaged by fire last year. The contract as now submitted for approval embraces the following grading work together with such drainage construction as appears necessary to be done in connection therewith; excavating and disposing of earth and rock; furnishing, depositing and shaping fill; building surface basin; raising existing brick manholes to grade; furnishing and laying vitrified drain pipe; furnishing and setting bluestone steps; altering existing receiving basins; taking up and resetting existing bluestone curb and flags; furnishing and laying cement gutter.

The engineer's estimate of the work and materials to be done and furnished is as follows: 300 cubic yards of earth excavation; 680 cubic yards of rock excavation; 6,200 cubic yards of fill; 1 surface basin complete; 5 manholes to be raised to grade; 65 linear feet of 8-inch vitrified drain; 21 cubic yards of rubble masonry; 130 linear feet of bluestone steps; 35 linear feet of bluestone cheeks; 2 receiving basins to alter; 100 linear feet of bluestone curb to be taken up and reset; 400 square feet of bluestone flag to be taken up and reset; 1,500 feet of cement gutter.

The alterations to existing manholes, receiving basins, curb and sidewalk are due to the fact that 137th Street will be closed and brought up to the grade of the playground. These changes will cost approximately \$360. The finished grade of the playground will be from three to six feet above the sidewalk on Convent Avenue and from six inches to six feet on St. Nicholas Terrace. To afford access to the playground from these streets and to protect the slopes, two flights of bluestone steps have been included in this contract on the old center line of 137th Street. The approximate cost of this portion of the work will be \$340.

The estimated cost is reasonable. The form of contract is that in general use. and the plans and specifications are satisfactory.

Item 1, 12th story, Department of Street Cleaning; for installing a new door between rooms 1232 and 1240, including cutting and patching of terra cotta partition, marble work, installation of electric door loop and cutting and fitting of metal trim for this opening, estimated cost, \$108.

Item 2, 21st story, for installing new door opening and drinking water lavatory in the 21st story, in accordance with Architects' drawing No. 1021-R3, dated June 21, 1916, including electric, marble, terra cotta and plaster work, estimated cost, \$242.46.

It is proposed to charge the cost of these alterations to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. B-37, Municipal Building, Construction of Manhattan Terminal of New York and Brooklyn Bridge," in which, on September 15, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$357,560.90.

On the 12th floor, the Department of Street Cleaning requires a new doorway between rooms 1232 and 1240 to provide convenient communication between these two rooms. The opening has been broken through the terra cotta partition. The work to be done consists of cutting and setting the marble base, loop for electric wires, metal

door and trim, plastering and making good all damage.

The estimate of \$108 includes the cost of cutting the terra cotta partition. As this has been done, the cost of the work necessary to complete this installation should not exceed \$96.

On the 21st floor it is desired to provide larger offices for the chief engineer and the principal assistant engineer by constructing a partition in room 2121, now used as a record room. This partition will be erected under another contract. Its construction will render necessary the installation of a lavatory in room 2121, for the use of the chief engineer, where none now exists and the cutting of an opening and installation of a door in the partition between the hallway and this room, to provide an entrance.

The lavatory, door and trim are to be taken from other locations in the building. The cost of the work should not exceed \$125.

The estimates submitted are based on the unit costs of the Thompson-Starrett Company's contract for the interior work on the Municipal Building.

Your Board has previously indicated its desire to have this contract closed out. It appears reasonable that such items of alteration as these should be performed on open market orders based on bids from other contractors and should be charged to the tax levy funds.

Gentlemen-On June 23, 1916, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested an issue of \$136,000 corporate stock for extensions and improvements to the water distribution system in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the request was referred on June

27, 1916, reports thereon as follows: "Item 4, \$9,000 for materials, was authorized by the Board of Estimate and

Apportionment on July 27, 1916.

"Items 1, 2 and 3 are supported by detailed lists of locations and estimates of cost of the work proposed. This data is used in forming an estimate of the amount of money required, but it is understood that emergencies and changed conditions may make it necessary to do some work not included in the list submitted, and that the necessity for any of the work will be considered when proposed contracts are submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

"Item 1, \$7,000, is for transferring taps from six inch to twelve inch mains. Under previous administrations twelve inch mains were laid in many of the streets in lower Manhattan, to improve the distribution service and to replace existing six inch mains, but in numerous cases the taps were not transferred when the twelve inch pipe was laid and the Department is now making the transfers at times when the streets are to be repaved.

"A list of seven streets is submitted under this item at an estimated cost of \$7,000, but inasmuch as provision has already been made for doing part of the work at an estimated cost of about \$1,900, it is reasonable to allow \$5,000 for this

"Under Item 2 there is submitted a list of 14 locations, at a total estimated cost of \$15,000, at which mains should be laid at once, as well as a list of 31 locations, at a total estimated cost of \$70,415, at which mains have been approved and should be laid as soon as possible.

"In the first group, six of the proposed extensions have been provided for since the list was made up, at an estimated cost of about \$5,000.

"In the second group, one of the proposed extensions has been provided for and three have been withdrawn, which permit of a deduction of about \$5,000. This reduces Item 2 by \$10,000, leaving the total estimated cost of Item 2, \$75,000. "This \$75,000 is made up, approximately, as follows:

New extensions which will bring immediate additional revenue to the City Fire protection 1,000 00 9,700 00 Improvement of distribution system Changes due to regrading streets in The Bronx, some of which are 12,300 00 also necessary on account of insufficient capacity

"The Department has also submitted a list of applications on file which do not need immediate attention but some of which may become urgent on account of new building, at a total estimated cost of \$168,550. "Under Item 3, replacement of hydrants, the Department submits a list of

500 locations for replacement of obsolete types of hydrants, to be done by the repair forces of the Department. "The Department has now 70 hydrants in stock and under contract for Man-

hattan and The Bronx, and 276 hydrants have been borrowed from Brooklyn for use in Manhattan and The Bronx.

"The old type of hydrant is replaced only when it becomes leaky and beyond reasonable repair. In 1915 the Department forces replaced 626 hydrants.

"It seems reasonable therefore to allow the 500 hydrants requested, 200 to be returned to Brooklyn and 300 to be used by the Department force for replacement of leaky old type hydrants and for use at new locations requested by the

"The estimate of cost, \$70 per hydrant, includes the cost of the hydrant, a six inch valve and valve box and is reasonable.

"The total amount recommended is as follows: Removal of taps from 6 inch to 12 inch mains.....

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity-Proposed Agreement with German-American Improvement Company and Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal.

(On June 4, 1915 (Cal. No. 46), a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, submitting agreement and requesting issue of Corporate Stock to provide for same, was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget. On August 15, 1915, the Secretary transmitted to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from said Commissioner urging action in the matter. On February 4, 1916 (Cal. No. 112), and April 14, 1916 (Cal. No. 132), communications from the Commissioner on this subject were referred to said Committee.)

(On July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 38), the matter was laid over until September 15, 1916, and on the latter date (Cal. No. 223) it was laid over until this meeting.) The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget, recommending approval of the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas

and Electricity of a proposed agreement with the German-American Improvement Company for the sale to the City of certain water pipes and appurtenances laid by that company in the Borough of Brooklyn, and an appropriation of \$45,000 to provide for such purchase.

Delos F. Willcox, representing the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, appeared in support of the request.

The matter was laid over for one week (September 29, 1916).

President, Borough of Manhattan-Amendment of Issue of Corporate Stock Funds (Cal. No. 55).

(On July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 53), the report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget was presented and the matter laid over until September 15, 1916, under Rule 19; on the latter date (Cal. No. 224) it was laid over until this meet-

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Corporate

July 20, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-The Corporate Stock Budget Committee, having been informed that proposed court and jail building, to be erected at Second avenue and Second street, Borough of Manhattan, would cost about \$1,000,000, and that an appropriation of only \$300,000 was available for the purpose, directed that a careful and complete study of the entire project be made.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the matter was referred, reports thereon as follows:

"On June 3, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$300,000, to provide means for the construction of a new court house and prison for the Third District Magistrates' Court on the site of the old Essex Market Court House, Borough of Manhattan. On June 28, 1910, the Board of Aldermen concurred in this resolution.

"On July 11, 1912, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested an appropriation of \$150,000 for the purchase of a site on the southeast corner of 2nd Avenue and 2nd Street, upon which to erect a new building for a Magistrates' Court, the Municipal Court of the Second District, and the Ludlow Street Jail.

"In a report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee dated July 12, 1912 (prepared by the President of the Borough of Manhattan), it is set forth that the proposed building would house the courts and jails contemplated, more adequately and with a saving to the City, both in first cost and in cost of administration, if located at the site selected rather than at Essex street and Essex Market place, the site of the old Magistrates' Court of the Third District, where at one time it was thought that a new court house should be located. In this report it is estimated that the sites of the old courts and jail to be abandoned could be sold for \$250,000, and that the value of the new site selected was \$175,000.

"By resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the selection of the Second street site was approved and the Corporation Counsel authorized to

institute proceedings to acquire the property.

"In December, 1912, the authorization of \$300,000, made on June 3, 1910, was amended to provide for the construction of a new court house and prison for the Third District Magistrates' Court, on the site at Second avenue and Second street. "On February 25, 1913, in a letter addressed to Leo Arnstein, Secretary, Bor-

ough of Manhattan, Mr. Alanson T. Briggs, then Secretary to the Court House Board, stated, in part, as follows:

"In accordance with your request I have considered with some care the

problems involved in the proposed building to be erected on Second avenue and Second street to house the City Magistrates' Court for the Second District, the Municipal Court for the Second District, the Prison and Court Jail. * * I have prepared and enclosed herewith a draft of a proposed programme of competition containing a schedule of requirements, which is sufficient as a basis

This building comes under the jurisdiction of the Board of City Magistrates, the Municipal Court Justices, the Commissioner of Correction, the Sheriff and the State Prison Commissioner. * * * If you desire to have me take this up with them and carry forward for you I shall be very glad to give you may services. * * *

'My examination of inferior courts in this City leads me to conclude that there is nothing very good in any of them, and that it is high time that a model type of a combined Court House and Prison for inferior courts should be devised. * * *

"On March 4, 1913, Frederic Travor Hill, Chairman, Sub-Committee on Buildings, of the Committee on Criminal Courts of the Charity Organization Society, in a communication to Mr. Alanson T. Briggs, stated as follows:

"'I have carefully examined the proposed programme for the combined City Magistrates' Courts and Municipal Court, Second District, and herewith beg to submit the following suggestions in reference thereto':

"Some of the suggestions are as follows:

"'Schedule 1 (City Magistrates' Court.)

"There is no need of a witness room. "'The District Attorney's office could be easily limited to 200 square feet or even smaller. In fact, he does not need much more than a place to keep his hat

'There is no need for a private examination room. If the Justices' robing room is 400 square feet he can use that for any private examination that he may need, which is very rare.

'The size of the court room strikes me as undesirably large. * * *

'Schedule III (Justices' Chambers.) 'There is no need for chambers for the City Magistrate on the fourth floor. His robing room is all that he requires, provided it be of the size that I have heretofore indicated.

'I do not see why each Municipal Justice should require a separate chamber as well as his robing room. This seems to be duplication.

"I did not know that it was proposed to supply dining rooms for the Justices. I did not know that there was any need of a large consultation room and library. I do not know why there should be a general office.

"'Schedule IV (City District Prison.) "I think the number of cells is too large. I think the provisions for the county prison are grossly excessive. I do not believe that the county prison has seen 15 inmates at a time for a generation, but provision is made in here

for 50. "I see no reason for having a library and reading room.

"'The space reserved for a chapel is much too large.' "Numerous other criticisms of like nature are contained in this communi-

"On April 15, 1913, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested the Board to approve a form of competition for the selection of an architect for the proposed building and also of the form of architect's contract. On May 1, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the programme of competition and the expenditure of \$11,000 for distribution to the competitors, and at the same time aproved the form of contract for full services of the architect to be selected, at an estimated cost of \$30,000.

The programme of competition contained a schedule of requirements for the several courts and jails under six subdivisions; it indicates the number, size floor and purpose of each room, thus definitely establishing the size and character of the building required. Most of the causes for criticism herein before noted remained

in the approved schedules of requirements.
"On December 8, 1913, Mr. Alfred Hopkins, 101 Park Avenue, New York, was appointed by the Borough President as the architect for the work, the designs submitted by him, in competition with others, having been selected as the most meritorious. At the same time he was ordered to proceed with the preparation of complete plans and specifications for the construction of the building.

"On March 17, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Hon. Marcus M. Marks, communicated with Mr. Frederick Trevor Hill, Mr. Lawrence Veiller and the Hon. William McAdoo, stating that, following the completion of the competition, the preliminary plans for the building had been submitted, but before accepting the suggested plans he would like them to consult with the architect and with himself, as a committee, to go over the entire plan.

"On April 17, 1914, Mr. Lawrence Veiller, in a communication to Dr. W. R. Patterson, Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, wrote in part as follows:

'I was very greatly pleased with Mr. Hopkins. He seemed to know his business and to be open-minded and fair. I don't think any mistake was made in selecting him for architect, but the plans as drawn are, of course, wildly extravagant and in many respects utterly inappropriate, due not to the architect's fault, but to the faulty Competition Programme.'
"On April 23, 1914, in a communication addressed to Mr Alfred Hopkins,

the architect for the building, and signed 'Frederick Trevor Hill' and 'Lawrence Veiller,' the plans for the building were severely criticized. In conclusion, the

'As explained at our conference, our committee has recently, in cooperation with Chief Magistrate McAdoo and Chief Clerk Block, had occasion to study this whole problem from the ground up and in connection with the new Women's Court now under construction in West 30th Street, of which the architects are Messrs. Griffin and Wynkoop, have developed a plan which we consider a standard or normal type of plan for all Magistrates' Courts, that is, so far as the functioning of these courts is concerned.'

"In answer to this letter, on April 27, 1914, the architect wrote, in part, as

follows

"'I judge that some of your suggestions are the result of your perusal of the large quarter-inch plans which you have, and you have evidently misunderstood my intention in some details. In this connection I want to call your attention to the fact that these plans were drawn in one of the City Departments while I was away in Europe and were never shown to me or to my office. They are rather crude interpretations of my competition drawings, and in some particulars they do not altogether convey my idea of the building as expressed by my original drawings. While I appreciate the interest that prompted having this work done, I cannot refrain from again calling your attention to the fact that neither my office nor I ever saw these drawings until they were all completed.'

The architect fully revised that part of the plan which related to the Magistrates' Court, so that on May 15, 1914, Mr. Lawrence Veiller wrote the architect, stating that the new plans seemed to him admirable; from this letter it would seem that Judge McAdoo was also satisfied with the arrangement made

for the Magistrates' Court in the building.

"On May 29, 1914, the architect, in a letter to the Assistant Commissioner of

Public Works, stated as follows:
"I have sent the plans to Dr. Davis, Judge Levy, who is Chairman of the Municipal Court Committee whom Judge Tierney appointed to confer with me with regard to the plans, Judge McAdoo and the Sheriff. * * *

"On June 4, 1914, the President, Borough of Manhattan, wrote to the Hon. Aaron G. Levy, Hon. Max S. Grifenhagen, Dr. Katherine Davis, Commissioner of Correction; Hon. William McAdoo, Hon. Lawrence Veiller and Mr. Frederick Trevor Hill, as follows:

"'The architect for the Courts of Inferior Jurisdiction has submitted to me the tentative plans, which you have been kind enough to consider and, I am told, accept. In order that there may be no misunderstanding, I would be pleased to receive from you a statement to the effect that these plans are acceptable and meet your requirements.

"In this connection, I desire to call your attention to the fact that the plans as now drawn will cost approximately \$750,000 to build, which sum is very largely in excess of the amount originally appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this work.

"'With this in mind, I should also be very glad to receive from you suggestions as to any reduction that may be made in these plans looking to the construction of this building for a sum more nearly equal the amount originally appropriated. * * * *

'In answer to this letter, Hon. Aaron J. Levy wrote, in part, on June 15.

1914, as follows:

"'Now without any desire to commit the Committee or myself to a consent to a change of the present Municipal Court House site, in behalf of the Committee I desire to state that we have gone over the plans very carefully with the architect and we consider them prepared and drawn in a very skillful and satisfactory manner. * * *.

"'We note your request that we make suggestions to reduce the cost of the building. This request, we regret to state, we are unable to consider. First, for the very important reason that we know absolutely nothing of the proposed cost and secondly the plans were submitted to us for the first time but recently, and we are not sufficiently familiar with the entire situation to enable us to meet your wishes.'

"The letter goes on to state that any attempt to reduce the floor areas, as provided, would not do.

"A. S. Gilbert, Counsel, answering for the Sheriff on June 19, 1914, states that the provision made is adequate, that not having had occasion to consider the building generally he was in no position to state whether any saving could be made, and also stated:

"Your attention is called, however, again to the fact that legislation will be necessary to validate the use of part of this building for the purpose intended.' 'The Commissioner of Correction, Miss Davis, on June 11, 1914, complained that the 146 cells proposed to be provided would soon be inadequate and suggested that if any reduction must be made it ought to be in the courts rather than in her part of the building.

'Chief Magistrate McAdoo on June 12, 1914, stated:

"'So far as the plans relate to the Court and the prison attached thereto. there is nothing in the way of reduction that I could suggest. Could you cut off the Ludlow Street Jail, top floor arrangement?"

"Mr. Veiller on June 10, 1914, expressed entire satisfaction with the plans, but offered no suggestion for reducing the cost of construction.

'On June 26, 1914, Mr. Veiller, in a communication to the Comptroller, suggested that, in view of the urgency for providing adequate quarters for the Third District Magistrates' Court and in the absence of provision by the Board of Estimate to erect the entire building, that the portion of the building to be devoted to the Magistrates' Court, for which provision was already made, be built.

"On July 10, 1914, by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the President of the Borough of Manhattan was authorized to enter into contracts, subject to the approval of the Comptroller and the Bureau of Contract Supervision, for the construction, plumbing and heating of a portion of a Court House and prison for the Third District Magistrates' Court, Borough of Manhattan, to the extent of three hundred and eleven thousand dollars.

"On July 16, 1914, title to the lands and premises at 2d Avenue and 2d Street

vested in the City. "On July 31, 1914, the City entered into a duly registered contract, in form as approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 1, 1913, with Alfred Hopkins for the preparation of complete plans, specifications, etc., and the supervision of the construction of proposed Court House Building complete, southeast corner of 2d Avenue and 2d Street.

"On January 7, 1916, in a letter to the Comptroller, Mr. Lawrence Veiller, after briefly summarizing the history of the project, stated, in part, as follows:

"I am now informed by the architect that it is his opinion, based upon the completed plans which have been carried out in accordance with the terms of the competition with such medification as the public officials affected thereby have thought fit to have made, that to erect the building as planned will probably cost in the neighborhood of \$900,000 or \$1.000,000. This means that if the building is to be erected as originally contemplated it will be necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Adlermen to appropriate additional money to the amount of about \$700,000.

'The various alternatives which confront the city authorities may be

summed up as follows:

'1. To abandon the project. (This would be most unwise; the site has been purchased and some building must be erected for the Magistrates' Court, as it cannot much longer continue to be housed in its present unsafe and inade-

"2. Build a portion of the building, say three or four stories within the present appropriation and count on securing the additional \$700,000 at some

future time. This would seem equally unwise, as the plan proposed would be extremely wasteful under these circumstances, as most of the entire ground floor is devoted to a rotunda and entrance ways for the Municipal Courts and upper parts of the building. There is also grave doubt about the ability to secure these funds in future years.

"'3. So modify the plans as to bring the cost of the building well within the present appropriation. This can readily be done by building on this site a building that will house only the Magistrates' Court, the only building for which there is urgent need. I am informed by the architect that it would be entirely feasible, in his opinion, to erect an appropriate and dignified building for the Magistrates' Court, with the necessary cell and pen capacity, on this site, for about \$200,000."

This communication also offers recommendations for the expenditure of the balance of the fund, together with additional funds to be appropriated, for a

Domestic Relations Court.

"The investigation, judging from the foregoing facts, seems to indicate that there has never been any real necessity or demand for additional accommodations

for either the Municipal Court or for the Ludlow Street Jail.

"Since the inception of the plan of providing cell accommodations for the Department of Correction, the New Hampton Farm Reformatory and the branch penitentiary on Riker's Island have been developed, which, together with the marked reduction in the census in the other institutions under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction, within the last year, makes it unnecessary to provide any further accommodations of the kind contemplated in this building.

"At the request of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, Mr. Alfred Hopkins, the architect, has developed plans for a Magistrates' Court, which is estimated to cost \$150,000, including architect's fees.

This plan contemplates the construction of a building, approximately 90 feet by 40 feet, three stories in height, which will occupy approximately one-half of the site at Second st. and Second ave. The architect's design meets with the endorsement of the Chief Magistrate.

"Appropriations aggregating \$335,000 have been authorized for this improvement, as follows:

July 29, 1903 \$20,000 00 Plans and Specifications, Third District Magistrates'

15,000 00 Plans and architect's fees for new Court and Prison Nov. 12, 1909 at 2d avenue and 2d street.

June 3, 1910 300,000 CO Construction of a new Court House and Prison for the Third District Magistrates' Court.

"There remains an unencumbered balance of \$295,874.51 in the 1910 authorization; the other authorizations being either expended for or encumbered by architect fees and contracts.

'The portion of the contract for architects' fees which is a charge against the 1910 authorization should be cancelled, as against this account, and if the balance in the 1909 account is insufficient to meet the claims under said contract,

any excess should be paid from the revenue bond fund for claims. "The requirements of the situation can be met through the construction of a

building at a cost, including architect's fees, of \$150,000."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, which, with the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, will amend the resolution of June 3, 1910, which authorized \$300,000 for the construction of the Court House at Second Avenue and Second Street, Borough of Manhattan, by reducing the amount authorized to \$150,000. The cost of the improvement was estimated to be about \$3,800.

It was at that time shown that title to the street, which, between the limits named, has a length of a little more than one block or about 400 feet, has been legally acquired; that the street is regulated and graded, although the abutting property is entirely unimproved; and that, with the exception of the gas main, all of the subsurface structures have been completed. Attention was also directed to the fact that the grade to which the street has been improved has a maximum rate of about 6.5 per cent., and in the belief that the surfacing proposed by the Local Board would be unsuitable for an arterial street, having so steep a grade as West 218th Street, permanent pavement of a suitable character, it was recommended that the resolution be referred back to the Local Board for amendment by the substitution of a permanent instead of a preliminary pavement, and with the further understanding that a type of pavement would be selected better adapted to a steep grade than is sheet asphalt. It was, however, suggested that if there is good reason for the use of a preliminary pavement, which appeared to be doubtful, a type be selected which would not involve the destruction of the concrete foundation when the time arrived for the substitution of a permanent pavement. Consideration of the matter was deferred until September 15th.

There is herewith transmitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board on August 29th last, which it is intended to substitute for the resolution of February 29th, 1916, and which provides for the installation of a permanent asphalt pavement

in West 218th Street, between the limits named.

The cost of the improvement as now proposed is estimated to be about \$4,300, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited and as heretofore reported, is \$77,000.

In my judgment granite block pavement would seem to be the most suitable pavement for a street of this character when fully developed, pending the bringing about of which condition a bituminous pavement (preliminary pavement) might be used with advantage with the effect of decreasing the cost of the work to be now carried out and at the same time securing a comparatively noiseless type of pavement.

In reports submitted by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment it was pointed out that the rate of grade on these two streets was 6.5 per cent. in the case of West 218th Street, and 6.0 per cent. in the case of Seaman Avenue, and, in view of the fact that both of these streets have been given a width of 80 feet, it was to be expected that they would become rather important traffic thoroughfares, and that a sheet asphalt pavement was not the proper type of street surface under such conditions. Since the meeting of September 15th, I have made a further personal inspection of these streets, and I find that in the case of West 218th Street a sheet asphalt pavement has already been laid between Broadway and a point between Park Terrace East and Park Terrace West, and that the rate of grade on the pavement already laid is precisely the same as the proposed grade for the pavement. I find also that on Seaman Avenue two important buildings are in the course of construction, both of them apartment houses. One of them will probably have stores on the ground floor, but in the case of the other the entire building is evidently to be devoted to residential purposes, with no business whatever. Further than this, the Districting Ordinance adopted on July 25th of this year, restricts both Seaman Avenue and West 218th Street to residences only and provides that no manufacturing shall be permitted in this part of Manhattan Island east of Broadway, while business is only to be allowed on Broadway itself, Indian Road, the street nearest the Harlem River, and on Emerson Street east of Seaman Avenue. These restrictions may have a material effect upon the amount and character of the traffic that Seaman Avenue or West 218th Street will be called upon to accommodate, notwithstanding the fact that their width is greater than that of the ordinary residential streets in the neighborhood.

While I still believe that in the interests of safety for vehicular traffic, the character of the street surface should be largely determined by the rate of grade, and that the preference of the abutting owners should not be controlling where there is doubt as to the suitability of the pavement they prefer, in view of the fact that the adjoining section of West 218th Street has already been paved with sheet asphalt with the same rate of grade as that fixed for the portion under consideration, and in view also of the restrictions which have lately been imposed upon the use of the abutting property, the use of sheet asphalt on these two streets may not involve any great risk.

Gentlemen-There are several sub-requisitions from the Public Service Commission upon to-day's calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and several others for action at the next meeting, which have for their purpose the approval by this Board of certain contracts for subway work under Rapid Transit Contract No. 3, and the consequent authorization of funds amounting to \$404,746.74 to provide for the carrying out of the proposed contract referred to. As the unencumbered balance of the appropriations heretofore made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of meeting the City's obligations under Contract No. 3 is inadequate to provide for these obligations, the Commission was advised by the Department of Finance that it would be necessary to effect rescindments of authorizations heretofore made under Contract No. 3 wherever the work under contracts had progressed to an extent where the total cost could be established and rescindments could be effected.

At a meeting of the Public Service Commission held on the 20th inst., a resolution was consequently adopted, whereby the Commission decided that the work of construction under a contract with the Bradley Contracting Company, authorized by this Board on July 21, 1911, for the construction of Section 10, Route 5, of the Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad had advanced to such a stage that it can now be estimated that a saving will be made of fully \$500,000 from the estimated original contract cost of \$3,253,072.80, which was the amount authorized by this Board on July 21, 1911. The Commission requests that a sum of \$500,000 be rescinded from the authorization referred to and that the amount thus rescinded be

reapplied to the purposes of Contract No. 3. This action was necessary on account of the low rainfall in the Brooklyn watershed during 1916 and the consequent shortage in the normal reserve supply of water.

The Commissioner states that: "'The rainfall for September on the Brooklyn watershed was only .83 inches, which is 61 per cent, below the average. While there has been a heavy rainfall on the Croton watershed and in the City, yet the Brooklyn watershed was hardly affected thereby. The Department should be put in the position where it can continue to purchase five million gallons a day from and after October 1st, and for as much of the present month of October as it may be necessary to do so; otherwise it will be necessary to draw unduly on the surplus reserve of water for Brooklyn which would be most inadvisable.'

"It is proposed to modify the present contract, which was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on August 31, 1916, by extending the period during which the five million gallons of water per day may be purchased from the Queens County Water Company so as to include the entire month of Octo-

'Under the provisions of section 471 of the Greater New York Charter, the separate written consent and approval of both the Mayor and the Comptroller, as well as the assent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is necessary before the proposed extension of the present contract can be made.'

Dear Sir-Referring to your letter of February 18th, 1916, transmitting for com-

ment and criticism of this Department copy of report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate relative to the desirability of establishing some uniform practice with respect to the width of waterways, height and width of bridges crossing them,

Early this year I detailed one of the engineers of this Department to attend the conferences called by the Chief Engineer of the Board to discuss the subject, and the rules presented are the result of such conferences.

The engineer reports that provision is made for a minimum width of waterway in new channels of 200 feet with greater widths where conditions seemed to warrant and provision is made for bridge crossings about every half mile. The heights of all bridges crossing navigable waters throughout the city is to be fixed at the height of the bridges now crossing the Harlem River as fixed by the U. S. Government. While this seems unduly high in some cases it will probably result in securing a uniform height for the stacks, pilot houses, flag poles, etc., of tugs and other craft operating about the harbor at an elevation that will enable them to pass under the bridges and so materially reduce the number of openings necessary for the movable bridges.

The report of the Chief Engineer appears to be well thought out and is satisfactory

so far as this Department is concerned. Very truly yours,





TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

tion of

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, pariner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak-ing the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.
