The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3864 to 3877, inclusive, amounting to \$2,501.74, and, on motion of the Mayor, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction submitted the following:

The Committee on Construction report: That they have authorized the Chief Engineer to permit Henry W. Quinan, lately employed as an Inspector of Masonry on the New Aqueduct, to recall his letter of resignation, and to assign him to duty; and we ask your approval of the same.

On motion of the Mayor, the same was approved.

Also the following:

It having been referred to the Construction Committee to ascertain whether certain additional work in connection with the gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street can be done under the terms of the contract for Section No. 15, or whether it is advisable to advertise and make a new contract, the Construction Committee would respectfully report:

That they have examined the matter, and find that the provisions of the contract for Section No. 15 provide for the gate-house, and for certain other work to be found in that contract. The proposed new work consists of a connection of the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-

fifth street with the aqueduct pipe-mains of the old Aqueduct, and a connection of the old masonry Aqueduct by a short stretch of conduit running through One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to the new gate-house.

The Committee are of the opinion that this work was not contemplated at the time when the contract for Section No. 15 was made, and constitutes a new and independent piece of work; and that in conformity with the opinions heretofore rendered by the Corporation Counsel concerning the necessity for separate contracts (in the case of extra shafts) that it is decidedly better to advertise for bids in the manner provided by law, and make a new contract for the proposed extra work.

In connection with this judgment the Committee submit the following resolution:
Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to prepare plans and specifications for the proposed connection of the old Aqueduct at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Tenth avenue with the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, by the construction of a masonry conduit of the size and form of the old Aqueduct; also, for the furnishing and laying of four 48-inch mains from the gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to a point in Tenth avenue near the old Aqueduct gate-house south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted and the resolution adopted.
A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that an appropriation of \$125 be made with which to purchase a case for the Chief Engineer's office to file away reports, and for a mineral case to hold specimens of materials, stone, brick, cement, etc.

On motion of the Mayor, the same was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.
A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, submitting plans, contracts and specifications for building Dams Nos. 1 and 2 on Bog brook, and connecting tunnel for the East Branch Reservoir; and recommending that an appropriation of \$615 be made to cover the printing and binding of contract drawings, contracts and specifications required for said work.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the recommendation was adopted, and the appropriation made.

The Chief Engineer reported that he had appointed Joseph Monks and Thomas Desmond as Laborers, one for duty under Division Engineer Wolbrecht, and the other as Stableman at Tarrytown.

On motion of the Mayor, the action of the Chief Engineer was approved.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, stating that before the letting of the contract for the gate-house at Croton Dam, on Section 1 of the New Aqueduct, the character of the rock indicated that in the cut it would stand nearly vertical, and would require an insignificant amount of filling behind the outside gate-house walls and the rock-face behind the walls, which is to be covered by the price of excavation; when the rock was cut, however, the character of it required a slope of nearly 1 to 1, which would require a back filling of nearly 9,000 cubic yards; and further stating that said filling was not covered by the specifications, and would probably cost more than \$5,000; and recommending that a contract be made to cover the work.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the communication and the subject matter thereof were referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Comptroller, under date of September 1, 1888, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for Manhattan Island Section, \$42,271.35. Which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

The Secretary presented, for the approval of the Commissioners, six similar property maps showing the location and profile of the pipe-line from the gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to and including the gate-house at the Central Park Reservoir.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the same were referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Secretary presented a communication received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving of the settlement made by the Aqueduct Commissioners with John Owen for damages done to his crops in 1885 and 1886 by surveying parties in the employ of the Aqueduct Commission. Which was ordered filed.

An opinion was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated August 30, 1888, advising the Commissioners that it was not within their province to sanction or permit any work to be done on the New Aqueduct on Sundays, and advising them to comply with the petition of the Inspectors of Masonry to be relieved from Sunday work.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the Chief Engineer was directed to call the attention of the several Division Engineers and the contractors on the New Aqueduct to the opinion this day received from the Counsel to the Corporation, advising them that henceforth Sunday work will be prohibited; and also to furnish to each of said parties a copy of the said opinion.

Commissioner Howe, from the Committee on Real Estate, made a verbal report with reference to an action brought against Smith & Brown by one Julia Lynch, for damages said to be done to certain lands occupied by Smith & Brown for dumping grounds; and stating that the matter had been referred to the Chief Engineer and the Counsel to the Corporation for their action and report thereon.

The following bids, upon which the required deposits had been made, were then opened and read aloud by the Secretary:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have the said bids calculated and tabulated with his estimates of the work, and report the same to the Commissioners for consideration and canvassing by them on the 12th day of September, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M., and the bids and checks of the bidders so received are hereby referred to the Committee on Finance and Audit for examination and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders.

Whereas, The bids for furnishing and manufacturing, fitting, placing, etc., stop-cock valves and gearing to be used in the construction of the New Aqueduct, having been received and publicly opened and read; and therefore,

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have the said bids calculated and tabulated with his estimates of the work, and report the same to the Commissioners for consideration and canvassing by them on the 12th day of September, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M.; and the bids and checks of the bidders so received are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resolutions were adopted.
The Commissioners then adjourned.

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF
New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

"The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN
made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
