

The 786 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.29, as against 27.37 for the previous week, and 27.41 for the corresponding week of 1888.

The decrease of 32 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 7 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 24 from phthisis, of 12 from diseases of the nervous system, while there was an increase of 5 in the deaths from dispatchers, and of 8 from parameters.

There was a marked increase of diphtheria in the Nineteenth Ward, and a decrease in the Twelfth and Eighteenth Wards. The decrease of scarlatina was most marked in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, with an increase in the Twentieth.

#### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, March 1, 1889.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at I P. M., at the office of his Honor the

Mayor. Present—The Mayor, the President Commissioner of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald and Colonel

Emmons Clark.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A communication from Colonel William Seward, Jr., commanding the Ninth Regiment, was received and read, having been transmitted through the office of the Mayor.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, transmitting a copy of a communication from a Committee of Veterans of the Ninth Regiment, which was presented at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held on February 4, 1889, and which was referred by them to the Armory Board. It contains preambles and resolution adopted by that association on January 9, 1889. A copy of the same communication was also received from Valentine Marsh, Chairman of the

Committee. They were ordered on file.

A communication was received from James A. Deering, No. 181 Broadway, relative to Harlem

armory sites.

It was read and ordered on file.

A communication was received from I. Joseph, No. 40 Wall street, offering a plot of 125 by 200 feet on Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, 200 feet west of Eleventh avenue, at \$90,000, for an armory site; and also a plot, 100 by 200 feet, on Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, 100 feet east of Tenth avenue, at \$140,000, for an armory site.

They were ordered on file.

A communication was received from Byron W. Anderson, No. 45 Broadway, offering for an armory site a plot, 200 by 450 feet, on the east side of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Thirteenth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets. Price, \$275,000. It was ordered on file.

A bill was presented from Ammerman & Ford for \$150 for surveying on the site of the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, in accordance with resolution of this Board, passed September 20, 1888.

Section 230. In every public hospital and dispensary
in the City of New York there shall be provided and
maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the
temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious
disease, who shall immediately be separated from the
other persons and other patients at such dispensary or
hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one who
has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course
of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care
at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of
New York of every person infected with a contagious
disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such
person or persons so infected are properly isolated and
kept separate from other persons and other patients.

SEC. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

 $U^{\rm NDER}$  CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 357, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordunary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be determined only building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \*

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for premitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the wa

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wif:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER Shors shall be charged from five to twent dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathmb therein.

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

Bathing Tubs in private houses, beyond one, shall be
charged at three dollars per annum each, and five
dollars per annum each in public houses, boardinghouses, and bathing establishments. Combination

charged the same as bathing tubs.

Building Pupposes.—For each one thousand bricks laid,

Horse Troughs.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laundrings shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

Photograph Galleries shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Printing Offices, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Soda, Mineral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be darged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of fee dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet are visigle will be charged as a constant of the commissioner of each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of the dollars.

Water-Closets and Urinals.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet are visigle will be charged by the commissioner of t

Water-Closets and Urinals.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from
the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock,
and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe
to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the
hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective,
or from which an unlimited amount of water can be
drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five
dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \*
All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.
No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urnals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

DUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

ng water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

such building, or such part thereot as is suppned inrough meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain fied that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
