

# THE CITY RECORD.

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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks held May 9, 1895, at 3 o'clock P. M.  
Present—President O'Brien, Commissioners Einstein and Monks.

The communications from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting the suspension of Louis Weinheimer, Laborer, Acting Watchman, and recommending that he be discharged, and also respecting the resolution of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation in reference to the renumbering of piers, were tabled for one week.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board :

North and East River Steamboat Company—For tally-house on Pier, new 32, East river.

Old Dominion Steamship Company—To erect temporary awning on the platform in front of Pier, new 26, North river.

Owen McCann—For watchman's house on Pier foot of West Twentieth street, North river.

Commonwealth Transportation Company—For tally-house on Pier 9, East river.

George Ferris—For watchman's house on Pier 61, East river.

Brown & Fleming—To load cellar-dirt at the bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Department.

Thomas J. Murray—To maintain float at the foot of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Harlem river.

Standard Gas-light Company—To place a sign on the bulkhead foot of Lincoln avenue, Harlem river.

Metropolitan Street Railway Company—To erect temporary awning on the new-made land in front of Pier, new 19, North river.

McDermott & Co.—To place temporary steam hoist on the Pier foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Bouker Contracting Company—To dredge in front of the dumping board between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, East river.

M. G. & G. A. Wright—To repair dock at One Hundred and Thirty-third street and Southern Boulevard.

Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents—To construct a dock at Randall's Island, opposite the foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, said dock to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following communications were ordered on file :

From the Counsel to the Corporation—1st. Advising the Board that it has no authority to grant permits to allow coal pockets to be placed on the wharf property under its control.

2d. Requesting an unmounted map of high and low water mark and the original grants of land under water around New York. The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to furnish same.

From the Finance Department—Approving sureties on Contract No. 498.

From the Health Department—Requesting that the slip between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, North river, be dredged, before the advent of summer weather. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From the New York City Civil Service Boards—1st. Stating that the laborers and dock-builders, discharged prior to May 1, 1895, could not be reinstated unless certified from the Civil Service lists.

2d. Declining to waive examination in the case of Major Eaton for the position of Superintendent of Repairs.

3d. Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment as enginemen.

4th. Reporting that Robert F. Aram is eligible for appointment as Apportionment Clerk. On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That Robert F. Aram be and he hereby is appointed Apportionment Clerk, on probation, with compensation at the rate of twelve hundred dollars per annum, to take effect on and after May 9, 1895.

From the Morris and Cumings Dredging Company and sureties—Consenting to the extension of time granted on the 18th instant, for completion of dredging under Contract No. 493.

From John H. Fenner and sureties—Consenting to the extension of time granted on the 18th instant, for the completion of dredging under Contract No. 489.

From the West End Association—Protesting against the use of the Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street, for dumping-board, and for the handling and storing of sand, brick and coal.

From Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted April 26, 1895, for the erection of shed, etc., on the platform north of Pier 39, East river.

From Davis & Kaufmann, attorneys, for Albert H. Hastorf, lessee—Requesting the removal of sand from the bulkhead between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river. The Dock Master notified to remove.

From L. Edward Muller, lessee—Requesting the Department to take up and relay pavement necessary to enable him to place portable scale at the north of bulkhead, between Piers, new 38 and 39, North river, at his cost and expense. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work and report cost for collection.

From John D. Crimmins—Requesting permission to assign bids made by him April 23, for Pier, new 53, except wharfage room and water on the southerly side, which is used by the Erie Ferry, and the southerly one hundred and forty feet of bulkhead between Pier, new 53 and Pier, new 54, North river, to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Permission granted.

From the Maritime Association of the Port of New York—Transmitting copy of preambles and resolution adopted on the 8th instant, commending the Board for its appointment of Edward S. Atwood, as Superintendent of Docks, which, on motion, were ordered spread in full on the minutes as follows :

Whereas, We learn that the Dock Department of this port have appointed as Superintendent of Docks Mr. Edward S. Atwood, Ex-President of this association ; and

Whereas, We deem it important to maritime interests that an official should be empowered to have control and supervision of docks and Dock Masters of this port, under the direction of the Commissioners of Docks ; therefore,

Resolved, That we commend the action of the Dock Department, not only in filling the office of Superintendent of Docks, but in appointing one so admirably fitted for the place by reason of integrity, experience and practical knowledge of the needs of shipping.

From Dock Master Wheeler—Requesting supplies for his office. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish same.

From Dock Master Moore—Requesting leave of absence, May 13, 14, and 15. Granted.

From Dock Master Abeel—Stating that it is impossible to collect wharfage on the undivided ninth part of Pier, old 42, East river. The Counsel to the Corporation requested to advise the Board as to what measures should be taken to protect the City's interest in said pier.

From Dock Master Monaghan—Reporting repairs required to piers foot of Bethune and West Twentieth streets. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From Dock Master Woods—Reporting repairs required to bulkhead at East Twentieth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report cost for collection.

From Dock Master Brady—Reporting repairs required to Pier at West Thirty-fourth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From Dock Master Patterson—1st. Reporting repairs required to pier foot of West Fifty-first street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for making repairs to said pier, and report cost for collection from G. W. Plunkitt & Smith, the former lessees.

2d. Reporting dredging required at the north side of pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From the Treasurer : 1st. Recommending that permission be granted the Al Foster Steamboat Company to land steamboats at the Battery wharf, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of five dollars per day, Sundays included, for each boat, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the amount of \$39.50, for storage, be remitted from bill against Edwin Taylor. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the offer of the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company to pay \$7,000 per annum for Pier, new 32, East river, and bulkhead adjoining, each side, be declined. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Stating that it is impracticable to grant permit for berth at Pier, old 42, North river, to G. W. Ward. Application of G. W. Ward denied.

From the Engineer-in-Chief : 1st. Report for week ending May 4, 1895.

2d. Recommending the fencing off of the premises foot of Pleasant avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the owners and occupants of the ice-bridges between Jane and Horatio streets, and on the bulkhead on the southerly side of West Eleventh street, North river, be directed to clean the premises. Consumers' Ice Company and Richard J. Foster directed to do the work.

4th. Recommending that the owners and occupants be directed to clean and repair the bulkhead between Jane and West Twelfth streets, and between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets, North river. John S. McLean and the Watervleit Ice Company notified to do the work.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted the following reports on Secretary's Orders :

No. 14790. As to cost of repairs to Pier at West Seventy-ninth street. The Treasurer authorized to collect from the owners of the tugboat "Ida L. Tebo."

No. 14840. As to cost of taking up and relaying pavement in front of Pier, new 20, North river. The Treasurer authorized to collect from the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company.

No. 14868. Submitting map of property between East Seventy-ninth and East Eightieth streets, in connection with the protest of Harriet D. Potter and Elizabeth S. Jones. The Secretary directed to transmit to the Counsel to the Corporation.

No. 14819. Recommending the removal of the tally-house recently occupied by Thomas O'Donnell, at Pier, new 32, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove if not removed by the owners within ten days.

No. 14874. Recommending that dredging be ordered at the foot of and along the northerly side of East Fourth street, requested by Hencken & Co. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging under Contract No. 493.

No. 14889. Recommending that the application of H. P. Campbell and Company for permission to build phosphorous pit on the bulkhead between Bethune and West Twelfth streets, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

No. 14872. Recommending that he be directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for repairing old bulkhead at the foot of East Seventeenth street, and if necessary to remove ramp, dumping-board and cremating plant of the Department of Street Cleaning located thereat. Recommendation adopted.

Nos. 14847, 14848 and 14851. Reporting that the Department could build small pier at the foot of Wolf street, which is the only property owned by the City in the vicinity of Highbridge, upon which the Department of Street Cleaning could build dumping-board ; that there is no water-front property belonging to the City suitable for a dumping-board at Kingsbridge, on the Westchester side of the Harlem river ; that the northerly, easterly and southerly side of the Pier at the foot of One Hundred and Fortieth street, Harlem river, is now occupied by Arthur McMullen, for part of the plant necessary for the construction of the new Third Avenue bridge. As soon as he is able to vacate the premises they could be set aside for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning ; the Secretary directed to transmit a copy of said reports to the Department of Street Cleaning.

No. 14852. That if the Department of Street Cleaning desire a dump at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street, it would be necessary to build a pier thereat, at a cost of about \$10,000, one-half of which could be set aside for the Department of Street Cleaning, the other half to be used for commercial purposes. The Secretary directed to transmit copy of the report to the Department of Street Cleaning, and Commissioner Monks was requested to examine and report as to the advisability of building a pier thereat.

No. 14861. Recommending that the Dock Master be directed to collect wharfage at the outer 250 feet of the southerly half of Pier foot of West Fifty-sixth street, until the Department of Street Cleaning takes possession of the same. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the permit granted Kane & Wright, on the 3d instant, to occupy a portion of the Pier at the foot of East Forty-sixth street, was amended by making the compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of three dollars per day, Sundays included, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

On motion, the permit granted Moses Koenig, on the 3d instant, to locate swimming-bath at the foot of East Fifty-fifth street, was amended by making the compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$12.50 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the general repairs and construction force for the week ending May 3, 1895, amounting to \$3,687.48, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Einstein, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending May 8, 1895, amounting to \$155,072.92, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes as follows :

On motion, the permit granted him on the 3d instant was revoked, and the Dock Master directed to collect wharfage thereat.

From the Terminal Warehouse Company—Declining permit granted on the 3d instant, to occupy the bulkhead between Piers, new 57 and 58, North river.

On motion, the permit was revoked, and the Dock Master directed to collect wharfage thereat.

From George Grossman—Offering \$400 for the northerly side of Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets. Offer declined.

From Louis Bergman—Requesting permission to place milk stand near the foot of Chambers street, North river. Application denied.

From the Dock Masters, Districts Nos. 2 and 4—Requesting supplies for their offices. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish same.

From Dock Master Wheeler—Respecting the nuisance complained of at the north side of Pier "A," North river, by vessels lying at the water hydrant longer than necessary.

From the Treasurer—1st. Recommending that compensation for berth for steamer "Holmdel," at Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$150 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer, commencing May 20, 1895.

2d. Recommending that permit be granted J. N. Briggs to erect portable ice-bridge, three derricks, scale, platform with approaches, tally-house and tool-house, at the Pier foot of East Thirty-seventh street, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$125 per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer.

No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the VERIFICATION be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.
