The President laid before the Board the following Departmental Estimates:

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

New York, March 7, 1902.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith a revised estimate for the Department of Street Cleaning for the current year, showing a comparison of costs for the years 1898, 1901 and 1902. It will be observed that in the accounts of General Administration, Administration and Carting there are increases, and in the other three accounts it will likewise be observed that there are decreases.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The increase in General Administration of \$3,000 arises from the following causes: First, \$2,000 salary of the Superintendent of Stables, which position was abolished; consequently, that \$2,000 was not estimated for in the first estimate, since which time the position has been filled. In addition to this there is \$1,000, accounted for by the increase of \$500 salary of the General Bookkeeper and the Superintending Payroll Clerk, which makes this total increase in that account of \$3,000.

ADMINISTRATION

The increase of \$11,000 in Administration, which is shown in this estimate, is an increase only over the amount estimated for in the former estimate for this year, as the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment reduced the estimate in this account \$14,600, so this present estimate asks for \$3,600 less than was estimated for before the former Board.

CARTING.

The amount formerly estimated for in this account was \$1,065,432.50; the amount authorized by the former Board was \$1,049,126.10, a reduction between the amount requested and the amount authorized of \$16,306.40, so that the increase as shown in this estimate of \$57,715.30 is really an increase of \$41,408.90 over the amount originally estimated for, and this increase is, in my judgment, absolutely necessary to conduct the work of carting in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx in an efficient manner.

The total increases, it will be seen, amount to \$68,715.30, and the decreases to \$6,837, not including General Administration.* Therefore, the net increase in the working accounts is \$61,878.30.

If it is desired to give a specific and itemized exhibit showing how these increases arise dollar for dollar, I would be very glad to do so.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The amount estimated for all accounts for the Borough of Brooklyn for the current year, \$1,757,934.65, and the amount authorized, \$1,421,919, making a difference between the amount requested and the amount authorized of \$336,015.65.

In the present estimate submitted it will be noticed that the amount covering all accounts is \$1,644,930.10, or, in other words, an increase over the amount authorized by the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment of \$223,021.10, and without going into minute detail covering this increase, I desire to say that in the short time that I have been Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and the facilities I have had for looking closely into its needs in every respect, I am thoroughly convinced that the \$223,021.10 increase over the amount authorized by the former Board is not only absolutely necessary, but I doubt very much if even the increase herein named will suffice to do the work in the Borough of Brooklyn in anything like a satisfactory manner, or in a manner approaching that in which the work is performed in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. I am, however, at the present time not prepared to state just exactly what the amount absolutely required should be, but certainly no less than this estimate calls for.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In pursuance of instructions contained in the communication of his Honor the Mayor, of the date of January 6, 1902, and of the Comptroller of the date of January 15, 1902, I forward herewith a departmental estimate of the amount required to conduct the public business of my office as Register of this County for the year 1902, giving the names, official titles and salaries of the working force of the office, classified in accordance with the directions contained in the said communication of the Mayor. As far as practicable I have also equalized salaries.

In submitting said estimate, I beg to state that after assuming the duties of the office in January, 1902, I made a careful examination into the requirements of the office and found a considerably larger force employed than was necessary to properly conduct the public business.

Accordingly, during the months of January and February of this year, I deemed it necessary to abolish twenty-seven (27) positions in the clerical force of the office. These positions and the respective salaries of each are set forth in the columns of the estimate submitted. The amount in salaries of the positions thus abolished aggregates \$44,440. Although this makes a reduction of twenty-three (23) per cent. of the positions in the office, I feel assured that the efficiency of the service will be in no way impaired thereby.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Relative to the item of \$1,260 for typewriting machines in the estimate for supplies forwarded herewith, I deem it advisable to submit the following explanation:

During the past month I have been testing a new method of binding record books in this office, which, I believe, will secure quicker and better execution of the work. The proposed plan is as follows:

The leaves are unbound, and after each one is typewritten in the ordinary way it is immediately bound in a record book by means of a device which holds and locks it firmly in position. During the process of writing, if any error occurs or damage is done to the leaf which renders it unfit for use it can be rejected without inconvenience or injury to the book and a new leaf substituted. The leaves are of the same size, style and appearance as those now in use, and the pages are securely bound, as in the present libers, against all possibility of removal, except by being cut or torn out. The leaves are bound and locked as the work progresses.

Another proposed improvement is submitted which will involve but a mere nominal expense. When recorded instruments are returned to the proper parties, duly certified by the Register, the general practice is that the lawyers who represent these parties send some competent person to the Register's Office to compare the originals with the records in the libers, so as to be reassured of accuracy, notwithstanding the certificate of the Register. This involves loss of time to lawyers on the one hand and interference with those who may be using the public records on the other. This condition can be remedied, as follows:

At the time each leaf is typewritten, a carbon copy of the page so written may be made on light paper, so that when the instrument is returned the said carbon copy may accompany it. In this way the owner of the instrument, or his attorney, will have before him an exact copy of the record, which can be examined without further interference with the public business in this office. It seems to me that the saving of the wear and tear of the books alone would more than compensate for the trifling expense of the carbon sheet.
