Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Herewith I transmit for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1905, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held October 31, 1904.

The Budget is as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the unanimous vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and five, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year, including State taxes; and, secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and ten million five hundred and twenty-five thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and four cents (\$110,525,259.04).

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 00
For delinquent children, per annum.....	110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	110 00
For inmates in homes for fallen and friendless women, per annum.....	110 00

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

\* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

To the Honorable, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—On August 31, 1903, contract was entered into between The City of New York and J. Charles Weschler, for installing medina sandstone pavement in accordance with the prevailing City specifications, on Adams street, from Johnson street to Tillary street, and from Concord street to Sands street; and on Concord street, from Fulton street to Adams street, and from Pearl street to Jay street.

Some time ago the contractor requested permission to substitute City specification granite block for the medina block called for in the original specification, all other conditions as to foundation, curbing, tar and gravel joints, price, etc., to remain as originally called for.

Modified contract covering this substitution has been in the Corporation Counsel's office for some time, and request is hereby made to your Honorable Board for authorization to modify the original contract as stated.

As regards wearing qualities, granite blocks will furnish a pavement in every wise as acceptable as medina sandstone. It might be mentioned that medina sandstone would probably never have reached its present place as a paving material had it not been for the prevailing scarcity of granite at the time medina sandstone was added to the list of paving materials.

As regards price, would state that in the contract under consideration the contractor is to receive \$3 per square yard, whereas on a street only two blocks from Adams street, and intersecting Concord street, the same contractor recently completed a contract for installing granite, and received \$3.10 per square yard, under the identical specifications that will govern the work covered in the Adams street and Concord street contract.

As regards time, would state that the contractor can complete the work in a shorter time if permitted to use granite.

Thus, from the standpoint of utility, economy and time, the ends are equally well, if not better, served by permitting the modification of the specification, and the permission of the Honorable Board is requested.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—President Littleton, of the Borough of Brooklyn, has advised me that he has applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consent to a modification of a contract entered into between The City of New York and Mr. J. Charles Weschler on August 31, 1903, for repaving Adams street, between Johnson and Tillary streets and between Concord and Sands streets, and Concord street, between Fulton and Adams streets and between Pearl and Jay streets, with medina sandstone pavement, by substituting granite block in the place of medina sandstone. He has sent me a copy of his communication to the Board, and requested me to have a report prepared in order that the matter may receive consideration at the meeting to be held on the 30th inst.

It appears that the contractor has requested permission to substitute granite block for medina sandstone, he having found it very difficult, if not impossible, to procure the latter material. It appears that this request was made some months ago, and it was assumed that the Corporation Counsel would advise the Borough President that such a change could properly be made, while he has recently stated that the proper course to pursue would be to obtain the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It will be seen that the contract bears date of August 31, 1903, and that practically thirteen months have elapsed since it was executed. This would undoubtedly have given the contractor plenty of time to secure medina sandstone block, but for the fact that he expected that the City would consent to the substitution of granite block, and he has, therefore, made no effort to secure sandstone, but has done the preliminary work of grading, etc., and is now ready to lay the pavement.

Upon inquiry I am informed that the selection of medina sandstone block for these streets was not made on account of the grade, such pavement generally being considered somewhat less slippery than granite block, and that there is no objection on that ground to the change. I am also advised that the average prices of these two kinds of pavements have been almost the same, varying but two or three cents per square yard, and that, owing to the presence of surface railroads in both streets, it is probable that granite block will give more satisfactory results.

The Borough President in his letter states that the same contractor has recently completed a contract on an adjacent street, in which there are no railroad tracks, under which his price was \$3.10 per square yard, while his contract for the medina block on Adams and Concord streets is \$3 per square yard. It would seem, therefore, that the change would be in no way prejudicial to the best interests of the City, and that there is no good reason why the request of the Borough President should not be complied with. Such action is hereby recommended.

SIR—Hon. John J. Pallas, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication under date of October 4, 1904, forwards to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, as required by the provisions of chapter 556 of the Laws of 1897, and chapter 627 of the Laws of 1900, form of contract and specifications in triplicate for work and material for the installation of steam power, heating and ventilating apparatus in New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, Fifth avenue, Fortieth and Forty-second streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, being the work embraced in Contract No. 5.

I would report: Mr. Alfred R. Wolff, Consulting Engineer for the heating and ventilating plant, has prepared for me the following description and outline of the steam power, heating and ventilating apparatus:

#### Power Plant.

The boiler plant, located at the west end of the Fortieth street vault, consists of eight boilers of the water tube type aggregating 1,759 horse-power.

The coal supply is taken in from the Fortieth street side and dumped from the carts directly into a weighing hopper. From this hopper and storage bin the coal falls by gravity into a bucket conveyor which discharges the coal in the coal storage bin above the boiler-room. This conveyor is also arranged for collecting ashes directly from ash hoppers under boilers, discharging them into a storage bin or directly into carts waiting to receive them. From the storage bin above boiler-room the coal falls by gravity through large hoppers fitted with valves for regulating the flow. A movable weighing hopper is provided with spout leading to boiler-room floor, so arranged that coal can be weighed from any hopper outlet. The conveyor is an endless chain bucket conveyor, traveling over the entire length of the coal storage bin and the covered driveway, and in the same vertical plane underneath grates of boilers.

The feed pumps, feed-water heater, muffler, blow-off and drip tanks are located in a room in the centre of the Fortieth street vault, between boiler and engine room, the engine-room being at the east end of the Fortieth street vault. The plumbing and air sweeping apparatus are located in the main building and adjoining boiler and engine room.

#### Method of Heating.

The heating of the entire building is to be accomplished by low-pressure steam circulated through radiators placed, wherever possible, underneath the windows. These radiators are to be inclosed in screens of wood or marble, according to the trim of the room. All radiators are to be controlled automatically, so that the temperature in the rooms will be maintained uniform without hand control and irrespective of outside conditions of wind and weather.

No mechanical means, such as blowers for forcing hot air into the rooms, will be installed for the heating. The blowers will be used solely for ventilation and independent of the heating system. This separation of heating and ventilating apparatus is fraught with economy of operation, for, while in the winter months the building must be heated for twenty-four hours per day, the ventilating systems are usually required for a much shorter period, depending upon the department which each system supplies.

#### Ventilating Plant.

The ventilating apparatus is divided into several units, serving respectively the administration offices, the large reading-room on third floor and the stackroom. This divides the ventilating apparatus into three independent systems, allowing the ventilating apparatus to be run according to requirements.

The fresh air is taken from the southerly court and drawn through the cheese cloth air filters, which free it from dust and the finer mechanical impurities which may be present. The dust, etc., thus collected by the cheese cloth filters is drawn from the cheese cloth by specially designed brushes on hose, connected with the air sweeping apparatus.

The fresh air, after passing through the filters, is heated to about room temperature by the tempering coils and supplied with additional moisture, when necessary, by the air moistening apparatus. It is then propelled by the blowers into the distributing ducts, connecting with the vertical flues and shafts leading to the various rooms throughout the building.

The air supply for the various rooms is to be at or near the ceiling, so as to minimize the danger of draughts.

The exhaust fans for removing air from the various rooms and toilets are located in the attic. A system of exhaust ducts connect the vertical flues from the various rooms and toilets with the exhaust fans, which again is divided into units, each unit corresponding to the air supply units denoted above. The exhaust from the various rooms is taken from or near the floor level, except from the toilets, which is taken from the ceiling. No air is forced into the toilets, the idea being to have an influx of air to the toilets rather than a tendency to force air from these rooms to the public corridors and other rooms. Louvres or other means are provided in doors of toilets to insure this influx of air.

The stack room will have special arrangement for ventilation, the air being supplied in moderate volumes and introduced at a number of places to secure as far as possible an even distribution. The exhaust will be on either end, opposite the stairways, and in the centre of the room.

#### Air Sweeping Apparatus.

There will be provided for the entire building a vacuum air-sweeping system.

Lines of pipe will be provided throughout the building connecting with the air-sweeping apparatus and with outlets at convenient points, so that hose connection can be made to these outlets and flexible hose taken to the various rooms and corridors which are to be cleaned.

Specially designed hand renovators will be provided in stack room, Directors' room, etc., where directed. These renovators for dusting books, papers, etc., are to have corrugated contact surfaces for preventing the adhesion of loose paper, etc.

By the installation of this system no dust that has settled in the building will be stirred up, but will be drawn into the vacuum system, which collects the dust, discharging the air thus collected to the atmosphere. All books can be brushed with the specially designed renovators before delivery. There will be specially designed brushes for removing the dust collected by the air filters.

Mr. Wolf also states that the cost of the plant complete will be about \$500,000.

The specifications have been carefully drawn, and, in my opinion, will give a fair competition, and I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 556 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 627 of the Laws of 1900, may properly approve the contract and specifications as requested by the Commissioner of Parks, for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held the 16th day of September, 1904, at the request of Mr. Felix Warburg, Chairman of the Committee on Special Schools of the Board of Education, approved of the location of a site for a Truant Home, in the Borough of Queens, and authorized the acquisition thereof at private sale at a price not exceeding \$700 per acre.

There was submitted to the Board of Education an old survey made by D. S. Denton, together with the description contained in the deed of the owner, and the Board of Education was requested to have their surveyor examine the property to see if the description corresponded with the survey, in order that in taking title, we might obtain all of the property contained in the description and included within the lines of the survey.

The Board of Education at a meeting held September 21, 1904, adopted a resolution approving the selection of this site, and the description of the property which the Board includes in their resolution is slightly different from the description contained in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The lines of the property as shown on the survey of the Board of Education and that which is shown on the survey submitted by the owner, are nearly identical.

The difference in the amount of land contained within the area of the lines of both surveys is only 868-1,000 of an acre, but in order to have the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment conform to the resolution of the Board of Education, I would respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 16, 1904, be rescinded, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of a site by the Board of Education for a Truant Home, in the Borough of Queens, and authorize its acquisition at a price not exceeding \$700 per acre, which is the price named in the original resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

At a meeting of the Board of Education held on the 24th day of June, 1904, a full report was presented in the matter of this school site. The Secretary of the Board was directed to return the papers requesting that the Board of Education "furnish the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with a statement setting forth why a site 321 by 150 feet was not of sufficient size to erect thereon additional school buildings suitable to accommodate the needs of the school population in that section for the next five years." At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 15, a communication was presented from the Board of Education in reply to their request, and was again referred back for additional information. In a communication under date of September 16, the Chairman of the Committee on Sites of the Board of Education, addressed the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and furnished the information requested.

The Board of Education desires to erect on the property a large building, the height not to exceed two stories, and to so utilize the grounds that they will be enabled to provide a 16-room addition and an assembly-room which it is proposed to make a separate building, and also to provide for a high school department in this addition. In the congested districts of New York City, the Board of Education erects buildings covering approximately the entire site, and four stories high, but they feel that in the country districts a building covering more ground and only two stories high would be better for school purposes, and on that point I agree with them.

In the examination we made of the property to be acquired, it was discovered that it would be impossible to purchase this site at anywhere near a fair market value and that condemnation proceedings would have to be instituted to acquire the same. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the selection of the site of the Board of Education, and authorize the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the same.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, New York City:

DEAR SIR—On June 22 I wrote you concerning the delayed proceedings for acquiring additional site for Public School 1, at Tottenville. I received your reply June 24, stating that you had referred my communication to the Board of Education. Under date of July 11 Assistant Superintendent Smith wrote me that the matter had been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and referred back for the purpose of "ascertaining why the Board required additional school properties when they already had a school site 321 by 150 feet, which would accommodate all the scholars in that vicinity for a number of years to come, and in case additional school accommodations were required at the expiration of five years, it would possibly be found by the Board of Education that a school site in another locality would be more desirable."

\* There is an error in the description in the resolution of the Board of Education. The line should read "easterly" instead of "westerly line of Garretson avenue."



Commissioner Harkness, Chairman of Committee on Sites, under date of July 13, made a comprehensive and detailed reply to this inquiry, stating in substance that the matter had received the careful consideration of Local School Board No. 46, of the Committee on Buildings, of the Committee on Sites, of the Superintendent of Buildings and of the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools, and that all had agreed upon the necessity for this site and that its situation would meet the demands of the locality not only for the next five years, but for a much longer period, that a high school department with a two years' course was to be established at this point in connection with Public School 1, etc., etc.

Notwithstanding this carefully considered and complete reply, the Real Estate Appraiser of the Department of Finance reported to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the communication from the Board of Education did not answer the questions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the matter was again referred back to the Board of Education on July 19 for a reply to the questions already carefully answered. Nothing has been done in the matter since.

School has reopened, and yesterday District Superintendent Bardwell reported to our Local Board that over 31 per cent. of the pupils at Public School 1 were obliged to be put in part-time classes.

Will you please have this matter placed upon the calendar for attention at the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and kindly have me notified of same, and also whether you will grant us a hearing upon the matter at that time.

DEAR SIR—Replying to your communication of July 19, transmitting a copy of a report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, relative to the matter of the acquisition of an addition to the present site of Public School 1, at Tottenville, Borough of Richmond, which report was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 15, 1904, and referred to the Board of Education with the suggestion that it answer the question contained in the communication of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of June 27, 1904, to wit: "That the Board of Education furnish the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with a statement setting forth the reasons why a site 321 feet by 150 feet is not of sufficient size to erect thereon an additional school building suitable to accommodate the needs of the school population of that district for the next five years," I have the honor to inform you that my letter of July 13, 1904, replying to your communication of June 27, 1904, was intended as an answer to the above question.

Regarding the utilization of the present site of said school from the construction standpoint, the Superintendent of School Buildings confirms the opinion heretofore expressed that the work required can only be performed (because of the existence of the present building in the centre of the plot, and practically on the street line at the present time) by adding the new building on the end of the present one, and extending practically from the street line to the rear line of the plot, and probably some one hundred to one hundred and fifty feet along the front; so that when the work was completed we should have a long block of brick and mortar, cramped into a long and narrow plot, and crowded to the street line, in a region entirely residential, where the houses are all set back from the streets, and where for many years this condition will continue, making an edifice that will always appear out of place; that would be a blot on the landscape so far as fitness is concerned, and, what is more serious, would admit of no such amplification as the growing needs of the section might make necessary within ten years—and probably will—and would exert no influence whatever upon the minds of the children attending school here in the development of a sound sense of the dignity and harmony that can exist even in a school building with suitable environment for a suburban territory; influences which in themselves tend to draw the child to the school as an attractive spot in its life, and one to which its allegiance will continue, and so stimulate patriotism and local pride, all of which are parts of the work achieved by our schools.

Were this locality in a densely crowded city section, while regretting deeply the possible need for making the school simply a mass of brick and mortar, with no grass or trees or flowers about it, I should yet feel that the great cost of adjoining properties under such conditions might legitimately be deemed a bar to a larger site. But in this section of territory, where land is cheap and where the plot desired will cost but some \$4,000 or \$5,000, we do not think that it can be the intention of the City Government to compel the erection upon the old site of a building that can be but temporarily adequate to the present needs of the community, and that permits of no possibilities of future amplification.

On being examined before the Comptroller, Edward Riegelmann testified that by profession he is an attorney and counsellor at law, admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of the State of New York; that he has his office at No. 45 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan; that on December 30 or 31, 1903, he was appointed counsel to William E. Melody, whose term of office as Sheriff of Kings County expired on December 31, 1903; that such appointment was for the purpose "of closing up the business of the office, and in addition to complete those mandates that the law required the Sheriff to complete for the purpose of defending and prosecuting such proceedings as might be brought by or against William E. Melody, as Sheriff of Kings County, for alleged acts of omission or misconduct in his official capacity by virtue or color of his office as Sheriff"; that such appointment was made under chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901, and chapter 464 of the Laws of 1903; that the present claim, therefore, covers the services rendered by witness to claimant for the period from January 1, 1904, until the date of the claim, September 12, 1904.

Witness testified in substance that the statement attached to his claim correctly sets forth the titles of the actions in which he rendered professional services to claimant, and the exact character and amount of the services so rendered; that the action of Henry E. Smith against Charles E. Akron and another was an order to show cause why the bondsman for the defendant, Charles E. Akron, should not be discharged; that it appears that Akron was confined in the Kings County Jail in some civil action; that the moving party had given bail for him and desired to have the bail discharged; that witness consequently appeared in court on the return of the order to show cause; that witness's contention was that the bondsman was discharged without any further act; that the Court took that position, "so there were no proceedings necessary"; that for appearing in court he is charging \$10.

Witness testified that the action of Jacob Richman against Nathan Liebermann and William E. Melody, as Sheriff of Kings County, was an action in replevin; that under a writ of execution against the defendant Liebermann the Sheriff levied upon some goods which Mr. Richman claimed; that Richman brought an action to replevin these goods; that the action was brought in the Municipal Court, Fourth District, Borough of Manhattan; that the services rendered by him to Sheriff Melody consisted in attending court; that after some considerable discussion and argument he prevailed upon the plaintiff to release Mr. Melody; that he thereupon secured a dismissal of the action against the latter; that witness charged for said services the sum of \$20.

Mr. Riegelmann testified that the action of James E. Stanley against William E. Melody was an action against said Melody as Sheriff of Kings County for false imprisonment; that legal proceedings had theretofore been commenced against Stanley, and he had been arrested and placed in jail under a proper process; that he had been subsequently discharged, and claimed that his arrest was improper, and he thereupon commenced suit against Mr. Melody to recover \$5,000 damages; that the suit was pending at the time of the expiration of Mr. Melody's term of office; that witness was afterwards substituted as counsel for the defendant; that the services for which compensation is charged consisted of preparing, entering and serving an order of substitution, examining the records of the Sheriff's office and at the jail, interviewing several of the Deputy Sheriffs and the Jailer at the Kings County Jail, making an extensive examination of the law relating to the case, as shown by the facts, and preparing the case for trial; that for a while it appeared as though the case would actually go to trial; that witness attended court, and, noting that the defendants failed to appear, moved for the dismissal of the action; that the action was dismissed; that additional services were rendered in preparing and entering an order of dismissal, and serving a copy of such order of the attorney for plaintiff; that he charged for his services in this action \$100.

Attorney Riegelmann testified that the action of Jacob Morrison and another against Nathan Liebermann and William E. Melody, as Sheriff, was an action in replevin to recover possession of certain chattels seized by Sheriff Melody under a process against said Liebermann; that a summons was served in the action, together with an affidavit entitled "In an action to recover a chattel," an inventory of the articles replevied, and the undertaking of plaintiff's sureties in the action; that he served a notice of appearance on behalf of Mr. Melody; that the amount involved was the sum of \$294.76; that the services rendered by him consisted in examining the summons and affidavit mentioned, examining the inventory of the chattels sought to be recovered, examining the records of the office of the Sheriff in Kings County so far as they related to this particular action, interviewing the Deputy Sheriffs and others for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not Mr. Morrison had any grounds for claim against the Sheriff; that after a conference with Attorney Rogers, counsel for the plaintiff, witness succeeded in securing a discontinuance of such action; that he is charging \$60 for the services rendered in such action.

Witness testified that the action of Bernard J. Feeley, as executor and trustee under the last will and testament of Adam Lamb, deceased, against William Nickell, was an action of foreclosure against the defendant, William Nickell; that the amount involved was \$6,000; that under the law foreclosures of Kings County are turned over to the Sheriff; that the Sheriff sells the property and passes title by Sheriff's deed; that in the regular course of events the property in question was sold; that the property was located on the corner of Fifteenth street and Second avenue; that The F. J. W. Bursch Company was the buyer; that this concern is a corporation and refused to take title on the



ground that there was a defect in the same; that proceedings were thereupon commenced against the purchaser, and against William E. Melody, as former Sheriff of Kings County, to compel the purchaser to take title; that two proceedings were instituted, one of which was discontinued; that such proceedings were in the nature of orders to show cause; that he attended court on the return of the first order to show cause, as no notice had been given to him by the moving party of the latter's intention to discontinue the proceeding; that when the second order to show cause was served, it was necessary for the witness to examine the second set of papers; that he examined the law relating to the questions involved, and attended court on April 30, 1904, when the proceedings were adjourned at the request of the court; that the same thing occurred on May 4, 1904; that on the adjourned day, May 6, proceedings were again adjourned at the request of the court; that on May 7, 1904, he attended court and assisted in the argument; that for these services he is charging \$85.

Witness testified that the services rendered by him in the action of William M. Furey, judgment creditor, against Augustine G. Gastagneto, judgment debtor, were necessary owing to the fact that in such action Mr. Melody, as Sheriff, had collected \$150, which was part of the amount due under an execution against Gastagneto; that the money was collected from The Nassau Brewing Company, which owed the money to the judgment creditor; that the same was collected under an order of the Supreme Court; that such order required that \$150 be applied to the satisfaction of the judgment; that after the return was made, and the proceeding had passed out of the Sheriff's hands, and the return noted on the County Clerk's books, the attorney for the judgment creditor presented an order dated the same day that the return was made, requiring the Sheriff to credit the sum of \$30 out of the said \$150 as costs, and the balance in satisfaction of the judgment; that as the return had already been made and the money had been paid over to the judgment creditor, the Sheriff clearly could not do what was requested; that in order to avoid having the Sheriff disobey the order of the Supreme Court, and in order to straighten the matter out, witness felt it necessary to vacate the order requiring the Sheriff to apply \$30 as costs, or else obtain an order permitting the Sheriff and the County Clerk to amend their dockets; that to accomplish this he was compelled to prepare several papers; that he interviewed several Deputies in regard to the proceeding, and attended court and secured an order permitting the Sheriff to amend his docket, and authorizing the County Clerk to do the same; that the amount involved was not very much, but it was necessary to take the aforesaid procedure in order to avoid having the Sheriff placed in a position where he might be considered in contempt of court; that he is charging \$50 for the services so rendered by him.

Witness testified that the action of Isaac Levine and Ellis Levine against William E. Melody, as Sheriff of Kings County, was an action to recover the sum of \$500 for the alleged wrongful taking of property belonging to plaintiffs; that the property had been taken under a process executed by Melody as Sheriff; that it was not until December, 1903, that the aforesaid action was instituted; that in connection with said proceeding he rendered services in preparing, rendering and serving an order of substitution, examining the complaint in the action, interviewing deputies, examining the records of the Sheriff's office, examining the law, interviewing the attorney for the sureties, examining affidavits and examining the order to show cause for the substitution of indemnitors; that he attended court on February 10, 1904, when a motion to adjourn was made by the plaintiff; that he again attended court on February 26 and assisted in the argument of the order to show cause, which resulted in securing a decision relieving the Sheriff and substituting the indemnitors; that he is charging \$90 for the services so rendered.

Witness testified that the application of Aaron Levy and others to punish William E. Melody, individually and as sometime Sheriff of the County of Kings, for a contempt of court, was an application made by the moving party to punish Mr. Melody for discharging one William Asmus, a judgment debtor, from his custody as Sheriff; that the judgment debtor had been taken into custody by the Sheriff under a warrant of commitment dated December 14, 1903, issued out of the Supreme Court; that on December 19, 1903, the prisoner was discharged by the Sheriff by order of Mr. Justice Marean, as the result of certain habeas corpus proceedings instituted; that the judgment creditors claimed that the Sheriff had no right to release said Asmus, even after the Sheriff had been directed so to do by order of Justice Marean; that they thereupon appealed from such order discharging the judgment debtor; that the Appellate Division of the Second Department vacated the order of discharge, which seemed to have the force of leaving the original order of commitment in effect; that after the petitioners had won on appeal they made a demand on the Sheriff to know whether William Asmus was still in jail; that upon being informed that he had been discharged under Judge Marean's order, they contended that the discharge was improper by virtue of the ruling of the Appellate Division; that they then began proceedings to punish Melody for contempt of court; that the questions of law involved in the proceeding were intricate and complicated, and required his personal attention almost to the exclusion of other matters from March 25 to April 6, 1904, and of two assistants during part of that time; that as a result of the contempt proceedings "the Sheriff was then in the position of having obeyed an order of the Supreme Court, and of having an attempt made to punish him for contempt in so doing"; that witness regarded this as probably one of the most important questions that could possibly arise in the administration of the office of Sheriff, and made up his mind that it would be necessary to have the action of the Sheriff sustained, not only so far as it concerned him, but so far as it might relate to the office of Sheriff in any County of the State; that the case on appeal from the order of Mr. Justice Marean consists of about fifty printed pages; that the petition for the punishment of the Sheriff contained about thirty-five pages, and the defendant's exhibits contained twenty pages, and the brief interposed on behalf of Sheriff Melody about twenty pages.

Witness further testified that in the course of his preparation for the argument it was necessary to interview Charles H. Hyde, former attorney for Mr. Melody; George Gru, attorney for the judgment debtor, William Asmus, and the attorneys for the petitioners; that the facts were practically admitted in the case; that in connection with his services he interviewed several Deputy Sheriffs, and examined the records of the Sheriff's office; that his efforts resulted in securing a decision in favor of the Sheriff; that in connection with this action services were rendered by him on March 25, 26, 28, 29, 30 and 31, and on April 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6.

Witness testified that in connection with all the aforesaid proceedings no charges had been made other than those above enumerated, and no sums had previously been collected for the services rendered in such proceedings.

At his examination heretofore held before the Comptroller in the matter of Claim No. 26,280 of William E. Melody for \$1,000 for professional services alleged to have been rendered in the proceeding for the completion and execution of mandates subsequent to the expiration of his term of office as Sheriff of the County of Kings, Edward Riegelmann produced a copy of the certificate signed by William E. Melody, as Sheriff of the County of Kings, under his official seal, dated December 30, 1903, in which it was stated "that I, William E. Melody, Sheriff of the County of Kings, do hereby appoint Edward Riegelmann of said County of Kings counsel to the Sheriff of said county."

Under date of September 28, 1904, William P. Riggs, an Examiner employed in this Department, stated that he has compared the items charged in claimant's bill with all the data concerning the same which can be obtained from official records and from claimant's diary and from said Riegelmann's diary, and from the books in the Sheriff's office, and he is of the opinion that all the work charged for was actually performed.

It appears that the claim now under consideration is similar to Claim No. 25,526, heretofore filed by Norman S. Dike for \$597.25, alleged to be the reasonable costs and counsel fees incurred by him as Sheriff of the County of Kings after the expiration of his term of office, in defending actions and proceedings brought against him. Said Claim No. 25,526 was in connection with the services rendered by Mr. Wingate as counsel to Sheriff Dike during 1903, and was filed under chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901, which provides that "after the expiration of the term of office of each Sheriff of the County of Kings the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York is hereby authorized to audit and allow as charges against said City the reasonable costs and counsel fees paid or incurred by said Sheriff after the expiration of his term of office, in prosecuting or defending any actions or proceedings brought by or against him for any alleged act of omission or misconduct in his official capacity by virtue or color of his office; that said sum so audited and allowed shall not exceed five thousand dollars for any one year, or to be audited and allowed for a longer period than two years after the expiration of his said term of office."

In the report made upon said claim by the Auditing Bureau, Division of Law and Adjustment of this Department, under date of February 3, 1904, it was stated that if said claim be valid the sum of \$597.25 would appear to be a reasonable allowance for the services alleged to have been rendered, and it was recommended that the report be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for his advice concerning the legal liability of the City in the premises.

In a communication transmitted to the Comptroller under date of March 4, 1904, in the matter of the said claim, the Corporation Counsel stated that "I am of the opinion that these are legal charges against the City, and that it is the duty of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to audit and allow such charges if, in its judgment, they are reasonable as to amount."

In view of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel it was recommended that the report upon said claim be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its information, and for such action as it deemed advisable. Claim No. 25,526 of Norman S. Dike, was therefore subsequently adjusted at the sum demanded, to wit, \$597.25, and paid at such amount.

It appears that on July 7, 1903, chapter 464 of the Laws of 1903 became a law. Section 1 of said act amends section 2 of chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901, entitled "An act to make the office of the Sheriff of the County of Kings a salaried office, and regulate the managing of said office." Said act contains provisions similar to those of chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901, respecting the allowance to be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for the reasonable costs and counsel fees paid or incurred by the Sheriff of Kings County after the expiration of his term of office in prosecuting or defending any action or proceeding brought by or against him for any alleged act of omission or misconduct in his official capacity, by virtue or color of his office.

It would therefore appear that the claim now under consideration, to wit, \$33,154, of William E. Melody, is a valid charge against The City of New York, to the extent of the amount which would be a reasonable sum incurred by him for counsel fees and costs in defending the aforesaid actions and proceedings brought against him for his alleged acts of omission in his official capacity. The amount of Claim No. 33,154, to wit, \$715, would seem, under all the circumstances, to be a reasonable sum at which to adjust the said claim.

In view of the foregoing, it is respectfully recommended that this report and the other papers in the case be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its information and for such action as it may deem advisable.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 464 of the Laws of 1903, hereby audits and allows as a charge against The City of New York the claim of William E. Melody for the sum of seven hundred and fifteen dollars (\$715), alleged to be the reasonable costs and counsel fees incurred by him as Sheriff of the County of Kings after the expiration of his term of office in defending actions and proceedings brought against him.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, calling attention to the item of \$50,000 for "Renovation and Reconstruction of Central Park," contained in his application of February 15, 1904, for Corporate Stock to provide for park improvements, Borough of Manhattan.

Laid on the table.

The Secretary presented a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$160,000 to provide for the salaries of 400 additional Patrolmen at \$800 each per annum, for six months during the year 1904.

Laid on the table.

The Secretary presented a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting that \$1,000 be set aside for the payment of the salary of an additional Sergeant-at-Arms for the Board of Aldermen.

Referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The President of the Board of Aldermen made an adverse oral report, and the resolution was laid on the table.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting the establishment of certain salary grades under his jurisdiction.

Referred back to the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, urging the granting of the appropriation of \$2,000 for improving and beautifying the plot of ground at Boston road and Third avenue, as requested by the Local Board of Morrisania in its resolution of February 25, 1904, and transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 5, 1904.

Laid over until the next meeting.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Treasurer of the Blythe-bourne Water Company, stating that said company is the owner of a charter under



which it operates a water company in the Thirtieth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and up to the present time has permitted the City to use its water for fire purposes free of expense, whereas all other private water companies within said borough receive compensation for the privilege, and requesting a hearing before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The Secretary presented a petition from the Municipal Watchmen's Association in behalf of the regular Watchmen of the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting the fixing of the wages at \$17.50 per week, instead of 25 cents per hour, as at present.

Referred to the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioners of Accounts, in relation to the report concerning the prevailing rate of wages for the different trades employed by the City.

Ordered on file.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting that the resolution adopted June 24, 1904, relative to an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000, for the construction of a sewer in D street, in Wallabout Market, be amended so that the proceeds may be applied to the construction of certain sewer basins in C street, in Wallabout Market, as well as for the purposes stated in the resolution:

GENTLEMEN—On June 24, 1904, your Board adopted a resolution approving of the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars for the purpose of providing means for the construction of a sewer in D street, in Wallabout Market, and for the work to be done by the Bureau of Highways in providing gutters of sufficient depth for drainage purposes, and authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of the City in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars, the proceeds thereof to be applied for the purposes aforesaid. As the drainage plans of the market for which this resolution was intended provide means include, besides the sewer in D street, certain sewer basins in C street in Wallabout Market, I am directed by the President of the Borough to request your Honorable Board to amend the resolution referred to herein so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 176 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock, to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars, for the purpose of providing means for the construction of a sewer in D street in Wallabout Market, and for the work to be done by the Bureau of Highways of the Borough of Brooklyn, in providing gutters of sufficient depth for drainage purposes, in the Wallabout Market, in the Borough of Brooklyn; and also for sewer basins in C street in Wallabout Market, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

The reference to the sewer basins in C street was omitted inadvertently in the communication addressed to your Board, upon which the resolution of June 24, 1904, was based. This amendment is asked in order that the records may be corrected.

Which resulted as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Queens—14.

The following resolution as amended was then offered:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at meeting held June 24, 1904, and which reads as follows:

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to an appropriation of \$73,000 for the widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street, known as Cathedral Parkway, Borough of Manhattan.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to invite the attention of your Honorable Board to an item contained in my communication of February 18 last, estimating the amount required for necessary park improvements can be provided for through the issue of Corporate Stock, namely, the sum of \$73,000, required for the widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street (Cathedral Parkway), between Fifth and Seventh avenues.

The condition of this street is such that I feel it my duty to urge that action be taken, without delay, to provide for its improvement. It is generally dilapidated, unfitted for traffic purposes, the source of constant complaint, and a menace.

The roadway in its present state is practically useless for traffic, and the cost of repairing this portion alone would be too large to be warranted for repairs alone, but should be done in connection with the general improvement of this street, or avenue, on the lines as now defined, the title to the lands for its widening having been vested in the City since 1900. Being the northerly boundary of the Central Park and a very important thoroughfare, its use is in great demand when the street is in passable condition. That portion of the parkway between Seventh avenue and Riverside Park, with which it connects, has been fully improved for some time past, and the section herein referred to leaves unfinished a greatly needed improvement which has been long sought for.

Aside from the advantages to come from the permanent improvement, the condition of the present roadway is so discreditable that I deem it proper to urge most earnestly upon your Honorable Board the necessity for and wisdom of immediate action.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. John J. Pallas, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication under date of October 3, 1904, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$73,000, to provide means for widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street (Cathedral parkway), between Fifth and Seventh avenues. I would report that I have had the premises examined. As stated by the Commissioner, the roadway in its present condition is practically useless for traffic: the old structures have been removed from the portion taken for the widening and the fence set back on the new line. This leaves a strip on the north side of forty-five feet wide from the old curb line to the new northerly line, which is in a dilapidated condition. The old sidewalk is broken and dangerous in places. This improvement, in my opinion, is very important and should be done at once.

The Engineer's estimate for this work is as follows:

For the necessary excavation of all kinds to subgrade for roadway, sidewalk and tree plots; the setting of eight-inch fine axed bluestone curb; the laying of a roadway pavement of asphalt, or other pavement upon a proper foundation of concrete; the laying of rock asphalt mastic sidewalks, and furnishing and delivering mold and constructing receiving basins on One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Seventh avenues.....	\$60,000 00
For repaving the plaza of circle at One Hundred and Tenth street and Fifth avenue, taking up and resetting curb, building basins and doing other work .....	13,000 00
Total.....	\$73,000 00

The work being necessary, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$73,000, to provide means for the widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street (Cathedral parkway), between Fifth and Seventh avenues, Borough of Manhattan.

Submitting a statement of finances for the nine month ending September 30, 1904. Recommending the assignment of a male graduate Nurse to the reception room of Bellevue Hospital, and asking permission to engage such a man at a salary of \$40 a month.

Recommending that wooden roofs be placed on the tents on the lawn at Bellevue, in place of the canvas flies, which are inadequate to keep out the rain and stormy weather.

Recommending the installation of two additional tanks for sterile water in the room adjoining the amphitheatre.

Recommending the construction of a new floor in the operating room at Fordham Hospital.

Reporting accident to ambulance at Houston street and Broadway on October 25. Asking permission to purchase underclothing for the women in the psychopathic ward, this having been recommended by Dr. Gregory, Acting Physician in charge.

Reporting upon the condition of the tent erected at Fordham Hospital, the difficulty of warming the same, connecting it with the main building, etc.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the Acting Superintendent be given authority to substitute wooden roofs for the canvas flies over the tents on the lawn at Bellevue.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the Acting Superintendent be given permission to purchase underclothing for the women in the psychopathic ward, as recommended by Dr. Gregory.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the Acting Superintendent be authorized to consult with the Kny-Scheerer Company and to get estimates of the cost of equipping all the beds in one ward of the Hospital with rubber-tire wheels.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the Acting Superintendent be authorized to place a large stove in the new tent at Fordham.

## Communications.

Communication was received from Dr. F. W. Jackson, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board, transmitting minutes of the Committee's meeting of October 12.

Communication under date of October 26 was received from Dr. F. W. Jackson, submitting minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on that date, was received, and, on motion, duly seconded, both communications were ordered on file.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Executive Committee be requested to change the wording of their resolution concerning the admission of patients especially recommended to the treatment of some one member of the Visiting Staff, so as to avoid the use of the terms "private" or "special" patients, the hospital acknowledging only one class of patients.

A communication under date of October 8 was received from Dr. Louis K. Neff, Secretary of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board, transmitting minutes of the meeting of the Board, held October 8.

On motion, duly seconded, the same was ordered placed on file.

Communication under date of October 1 was received from Dr. Thomas F. Maguire, Secretary of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, enclosing minutes of the regular September meeting of that Board.

On motion, duly seconded, the same was ordered placed on file.

Communication under date of October 12 was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, Architect of Gouverneur Hospital, recommending the installation in the new hospital of the Kinney Vacuum Sweeping System complete. Accompanying Mr. Almirall's letter is one from Messrs. 5. Upon the payment into the City Treasury by the persons whose bids are accepted of the amounts due for the stock awarded to them, respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them in such denominations provided for by the Charter as they may desire.

6.
