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### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

The City of New York, Office of the Mayor, November 6, 1912. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York: Gentlemen-In pursuance of section 226 of the Charter of The City of New York, I hereby call a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen, to be held on Tuesday, November 12, 1912, at 1 p. m., to consider the Budget for 1913. Dear Sirs-In accordance with the direction contained in the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 31 1912, I have the honor to transmit herewith the Budget of The City of New York

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1913 for consideration and action thereon, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter." Yours very truly, JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following:

## BUDGET FOR 1913.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, the total amount appropriated being one hundred and ninety-three million and forty-seven thousand two hundred and forty-six dollars (\$193,047,246.00), divided as follows:

First-The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and to meet a direct state tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, one hundred and eighty-four million five hundred and twelve thousand five hundred and eighty-four dollars and fourteen cents (\$184,512,584.14).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1912, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, two million three hundred thousand dollars (\$2,300,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, six million two hundred and thirty-four thousand six hundred and sixty-one dollars and eighty-six cents (\$6,234,661.86).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under

the following terms and conditions: First-

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Regular Employees."

(b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."

(c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."

(d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Temporary Employees."

(e) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations classified as "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," or "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers," to any appropriation other than the one classified as "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," of "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers,"

(f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Com-

(g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of

appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden.

(h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the budget resolutions in the budget for 1913.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for

month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries, Regular Employees."

(b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1913 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual

compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any such appropriations, or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as

changed.

(c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said num-

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of

the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures

against such schedules as changed. (f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

Resolved, That, whenever an appropriation under any classification other than "Personal Service," "Supplies" or "Materials" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule, and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

-Be it further Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies" or "Materials" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amount of "Supplies" or "Materials" consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation for "Supplies" or "Materials," which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

-Be it further Resolved. That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First-That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

porting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

Resolved, That the several Boards, Departments, Offices and Bureaus of the City and County Government are hereby directed to keep records dating from January 1, 1913, showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles, equipment, supplies and materials purchased in 1913 and charged against appropriations made in this Budget; and such Broads, Departments, Offices and Bureaus are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each month a statement of purchases made the preceding month, and also a statement of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials consumed in the preceding month.

Resolved. That the appropriation made herein of two hundred eleven thousand eight hundred sixty-six dollars and sixty-six cents (\$211,866.66) for four hundred and fifty-four additional Patrolmen be made with the proviso that it shall not become available for expenditure, and no additional Patrolmen shall be appointed thereunder until such time as this Board shall ascertain by inquiry the present and proposed distribution of the police force and the reasons therefor, and shall reach a conclusion based upon fact as to the exact number of additional Patrolmen which should be provided by the use of such appropriation in whole or in part for such purpose; and that this Board may make available for use all or any part of said appropriation when and as in its judgment it may deem wise.

Resolved, That nothing in the foregoing resolutions shall be construed as nullifying the resolutions preceding the so-called "cost data appropriation" for the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the De-

partment of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

### CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS. Fixed Charges and Contributions.

Care of Dependents in Private Institutions. Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

Preamble. All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following

A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

Food stuffs. Clothing. b.

RECORD.

- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services. Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- m. Printing, stationery and advertising. Postage and telegrams.
- Hospital and sanitarium charges.
- Funerals. Recreation expense.
- Miscellaneous expenses.
- Expense for boarded-out children.
- Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
- a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment. b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
- c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts

shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropritions shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of

instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Deparment of Public Charities by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other

accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation. 4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished

for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance. 5 Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriaion made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to re-

ceive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and mintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall

have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received. 7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, not-withstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita

rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof. 8. No money shall be paid to any institution which

pays any salary to, gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by, has any business dealing with, or

secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from any officers or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the. Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable pfivate charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and

Sir-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 13, a communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, requesting the consideration of a proposition to enlarge the Isham Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, on the ground that the proposed extension was "very important for the satisfactory rounding out of this park, and the preservation of a group of noble trees." The matter was at this time referred to the President of the Borough in order that a map might be prepared showing the modification proposed in the park boundary.

The desired map has now been forwarded by the Secretary to the President under date of August 9, 1912, this indicating that the project proposed by the Park Commissioner relates to the northeasterly boundary of the park, which is to be now given a position distant 100 feet southwesterly from West 215th street. The proposed change will result in the discontinuance of West 214th street through the three blocks between Park Terrace East and Indian road, and its inclusion within the park limits, which are also to be increased by the addition of three separate parcels having an aggregate area of about 1.6 acres, the total area of the extension comprising about 2.3

Isham Park was placed upon the City map under resolutions adopted on June 15. 1911, and March 21, 1912, with the understanding that the lands affected in each case would be ceded to the City by representatives of the Isham family, who desired to have this area set aside as a memorial to the late William B. Isham. In recognition of the generosity of the donors and of the rugged topography of the territory, the Board, in favoring this project, departed from what has heretofore been considered as one of the fundamental requirements for park reservations, and did not insist upon the provision of a marginal street for the entire area. be an unsightly border to this pleasure ground. The objections noted to the plan as heretofore adopted in this particular apply with much greater force to the modifica-tion now proposed by the Park Commissioner, inasmuch as this would result in the elimination of a marginal street along the northeasterly boundary of the park, a condition which I am confident would later be found to necessitate the acquisition of the intervening area between the proposed boundary and West 215th street.

An examination of the ground shows that there are a large number of trees within the lines of West 214th street and in the immediate vicinity of the north line of the proposed addition to the park which it would be very desrable to perpetuate if any practicable way could be found to bring about this treatment. A large number of these trees will, however, have to be sacrificed in order to improve Park Terrace West, while the preservation of the remainder would probably require the expenditure of a sum entirely out of proportion to the benefit to be derived.

The books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments indicate that land in this vicinity is valued at rates ranging from \$1,500 to \$2,800 per city lot and that the assessed valuation of the land which would yet have to be acquired aggregates about \$80,000. From such information as is available relative to the actual land values in this vicinity, it would appear reasonable to assume that the cost of acquiring the property would amount to about \$150,000.

Under a resolution adopted by the Board on June 27, 1912, proceedings are in progress for acquiring title to West 214th street, between Park Terrace East and Seaman avenue, and to the unacquired portion immediately adjoining Indian road, as well as to a small triangular area which is included within the limits of the park as heretofore laid out, but which, under the plan proposed by the Park Commissioner, would be excluded from the park area.

In my judgment the proposed extension is not a commendable one, and I very much doubt the willingness of property owners in the vicinity to share in the expense which would be involved. The matter is submitted, however, for such action as the Board may deem proper, but with the suggestion that in case the project is favored it should be with the distinct understanding that the expense of carrying it out would, to a large extent, be made a local charge. Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Williamsburg District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on July 25, 1912, recommending a change in the line of North 15th street, between Banker street and Nassau avenue.

From the papers presented with this resolution it appears that the Local Board has been requested to initiate a proceeding for acquiring title to the short block of North 15th street, between Banker street and Nassau avenue, and that, before carrying out such a proceeding, it has been deemed desirable to make provision for including in the street system the small triangular area bounded by North 15th street, Nassau avenue and Banker street, this having a length of about 56 feet and a depth of a little less than 30 feet. The parcel is valued on the tax books for 1911 at \$1,200.

The map submitted with this resolution shows that the triangular area of reference is to be included within the lines of North 15th street, and fixes the position of a line which would separate this street from Banker street, with the effect of providing two independent but adjoining thoroughfares, and of opening up of a large paved and flagged area at the junction of three unimportant streets.

In my judgment the triangular area, if acquired, should be set aside for park treatment. I would, therefore, recommend that the matter be referred back to the Borough President to be amended in such a way as to carry out the suggestion now made, but with the distinct understanding that the expense of acquiring the area, if placed upon the City map, will be assumed by property owners in the immediate NELSON P. In preparing the profiles for these improvements it was found necessary to change the grades along these two streets, and I forward blue print showing the changes proposed, entitled "Change of Grades in East 13th Street from Avenue P to Kings Highway, and from Avenue V to Avenue X, and of East 17th Street from Avenue V to Avenue W," together with copy of report of our Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau in explanation thereof. E. 17th Street is under contract at the present time, and I would respectfully request that the question of grade changes be

tionment: Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, bearing date of June 27, 1912, requesting the approval of a map showing changes proposed in the grade of East 13th street between Avenue P and Kings highway, and between Avenues V and X, and in the grade of East 17th street between Avenue V and Avenue W.

On July 6, 1911, authorization was given for carrying out a grading improvement in East 17th street, from Avenue S to Neck road, and on June 13 last a similar improvement was authorized for that portion of East 13th street between Avenue O and Neck road. In preparing the contract plans for the grading, it has been deemed advisable to insert a summit in the block of East 13th street between Avenue P and Kings highway, and in the block of East 17th street between Avenue V and Gravesend Neck road, in order to legalize improvements already carried out in the former

street and to adequately provide for the removal of surface drainage in each case. Gravesend Neck road was placed upon the City Map under a resolution adopted on November 16, 1911, but no provision has yet been made for legalizing its grades. This omission is supplied on the plan now presented in so far as the intersections with East 13th street and East 17th street are concerned.

The map also shows a slight change proposed in the grade of East 17th street where such marginal streets were omitted the park lands would be separated from at Avenue V, the occasion for which is not explained; it is assumed, however, that

adjustment required in the grade of the adjoining sections of Avenue V and Gravesend Neck road, in order to make them conform with the grade now fixed for East 13th street and East 17th street, will be provided for under another plan which will be forwarded for consideration in the near future.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, bearing date of June 11, 1912, requesting the approval of a map showing changes proposed in the grades of the street system within the territory bounded by Parrott place, 7th avenue, 86th street, 14th avenue, Dyker Beach Park and 92d street, and also showing the discontinuance of that portion of the Dyker basin west of 14th avenue, together with the adjustment in street lines incidental to the discontinuance of this basin.

The street grades for this territory were fixed by the New Utrecht grade chart, which was approved prior to consolidation. From information which has been presented relative to the treatment heretofore contemplated for other adjoining sections, in order to permit of their development along reasonable lines, it has been found necessary to radically modify the grades originally proposed so as to reconcile them to the topography. The grade modifications sought under the plan now submitted are stated to be desired in order to more nearly equalize the cut and fill. These changes range up to a maximum of nearly ten feet at the junction of Benson avenue with Bay 4th street. The streets forming the northerly, easterly and westerly boundaries of the section have been improved at grades which are to be retained and which generally conform with those heretofore legalized.

The laying out and acquisition of Dyker Beach Park has made the construction of the Dyker basin impracticable, and in recognition of this condition the plan makes provision for the subdivision of the area traversed by extending across it 13th avenue, Bay 4th street and Bay 5th street, the first and last named forming prolongations of streets previously laid out, while Bay 4th street will subdivide a block which would

otherwise have excessive dimensions.

In 1903 attention was called by your Engineer to the desirability of providing a marginal street along the northerly side of Dyker Beach Park, which has an irregular boundary adjoining private lands. The plan now submitted contemplates the retention of this boundary, with the effect of requiring a park entrance at each street or of here creating a cul de sac. In my judgment it would be desirable to remedy this condition at the earliest date practicable and before improvements have advanced to such an extent as to make the modification unduly expensive. Such a street, if given a position distant about 375 feet south of and parallel with Benson avenue, would require the acquisition of an additional area about equivalent to that which could be released from the park, making it practicable to adjust the holdings with a minimum of expense to the City, even if no assessment were to be levied for benefit. In this connection it might be also pointed out that in this case the grades proposed for streets leading to the park would require further modification at the park boundary in order to reconcile them to the suggested marginal street.

I would recommend the approval of the map now submitted after a public hearing, but with the suggestion that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of making the further modification now outlined.

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, bearing date of July 12, 1912, requesting the approval of a map providing for incorporating upon the City Plan North street, between Walton avenue and Morris avenue.

This street is to have a width of 50 feet and is intended to subdivide transversely the block bounded by Walton avenue, East 176th street, Morris avenue, the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and East 175th street, this having a length of about 500 feet and a depth of about 350 feet. The street is to be given a position apparently intended to coincide with that of an old street which was ignored when the final map for the street system for this locality was prepared.

At the meeting of the Board held on March 23, 1906, a similar plan was referred back to the Borough President with a recommendation that the width of the street be decreased in the section adjoining Morris avenue, where, by reason of the steep gradient, it was proposed to provide steps and to limit the use to pedestrian traffic.

On May 31, 1911, another plan for this street, this providing an unbroken grade through the entire length of the block, was referred back to the Borough President, an objection having been raised to the steep gradient contemplated, this being at the rate of more than 13 per cent., and at that time the suggestions made in 1906, concerning what was believed to be the most advantageous treatment, were renewed.

In the plan now submitted the entire street width is again given over to the use of steps at the Morris avenue terminal, but, by reason of the provision made for giving them a zig-zag position, it will be necessary to give up a length of only about 40 feet of the street to this use as compared with about 125 feet contemplated under the original plan. The Commissioner states in his communication that the plan now offered is believed to both meet the objections heretofore raised and at the same time to best meet the needs.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of July 23, 1912, requesting the approval of a map showing a change in the lines of the street system within the territory bounded by Borden avenue, Maurice avenue, Cassel avenue, Marabel avenue, Maspeth avenue, Van Cott avenue, Maurice avenue, Halle avenue and Betts avenue.

This change relates more particularly to Broad street between Borden avenue and Maspeth avenue, and is desired for the purpose of making the street conform with the lines of a street now in use through the two blocks between Maspeth avenue and Clinton avenue and to harmonize more closely with the lines of an old road located between Halle avenue and Cassel avenue than did the plan previously adopted.

A proceeding for acquiring title to Broad street between Borden avenue and Pacific street was authorized on November 3, 1905, and was amended on September 24, 1909. This proceeding is now practically complete. An examination of the damage maps shows that the expense involved has been very seriously increased by reason of damage to buildings which enroach upon the lines as heretofore mapped in the section adjoining Maspeth avenue, and also by consequential damage to other buildings which would be deprived of street frontage as well as similar damage to property left with dimensions unsuitable for development. The change now proposed will result in greatly relieving property owners within the district of assessment and without prejudicial effect to the street plan.

The case presented is of the character to which attention was called in a report presented to the Board at its meeting of October 3, 1912, in which it was pointed out that the failure to recognize the lines of old streets which had been dedicated to public use would in almost every instance be followed by a revision of plan and the recognition of the original lines.

The map shows the discontinuance of the small public place heretofore laid out to comprise the triangle at the intersection of Maurice avenue, Broad street and Cassel avenue, this having an area of 0.065 acre. The area of this parcel, by reason of the change in the line of Broad street, is now sufficiently enlarged to permit of its utilization for building purposes.

A number of grade changes are shown on the plan, all of which appear to be of a minor character and due to the new position given Broad street.

The treatment proposed for the unmapped area was shown upon a tentative map of the Whitestone section, which was adopted by the Board at its meeting of July 11 last.

The plan now submitted makes provision for an adjustment in the lines of Jackson avenue between Botanic street and Eagles (17th) street, which is stated to be for the purpose of securing closer conformity with existing conditions, aside from which modification the plan ratifies the layout contemplated under the maps heretofore adopted.

In general, the street lines for the area which has heretofore been only tentatively mapped appear to coincide in so far as practicable with the street system as recognized by the property owners, excepting in the case of Hildreth place, which it is now proposed to discontinue; it is understood that this street has not been used as a basis for subdividing property and that the closing can be effected without damage.

This plan relates to an area of about 94 acres, of which plans for about 46 acres have heretofore been adopted by the Board as a part of the final map of sections 40, 60 and 63 the new mapping proposed relating to an area of about 48 acres, this comprising territory north of Jackson avenue immediately adjoining Whitestone avenue on its easterly side. The treatment shown for the latter area harmonizes with that indicated on the tentative plan of the Whitestone section, which was adopted by the Board on July 11, 1912. Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of September 26, 1912, requesting, on behalf of the Borough President, the approval of a map showing the closing of Preston street, between Review avenue and Newtown Creek.

Under the plan adopted by the Long Island City Commissioners provision was made for laying out a succession of streets from Greenpoint avenue to Laurel Hill boulevard, across the area traversed by the Long Island Railroad, between Review avenue and Newtown creek, but no steps have yet been taken to make the plan effective, while on the other hand the advantages offered for transportation by rail and by water have resulted in the creation of a commercial development of substantial magnitude, the encouragement of which appears to involve the abandonment of any attempt to develop a street system along lines other than those already in use, it being understood that sufficient access to the property is afforded by well recognized easements.

The determination by the Public Service Commission relative to the treatment of the Laurel Hill boulevard appears to warrant a conclusion that the elevation of the railroad in this portion of its length will not be radically changed, and that the elimination of grade crossings will have to be effected by carrying the streets over the rail- proval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment three copies of "Map showing

road in such a way as not to materially disturb the present railroad grade. It is therefore evident that the carrying out of the original street plan in this territory would either involve the establishment of grade crossings or giving the streets an unsuitable elevation as a means of access to adjoining property.

Preston street is not in use at the present time in any portion of its length, and I am informally advised that there is no public easement in the land within its lines.

Under these conditions I believe that the plan may properly be adopted and would

recommend such action after a public hearing.

I would also recommend that the attention of the Borough President be drawn to the desirability of submitting a map at the earliest date practicable providing for permanently adjusting the street system of this locality in such a way as to adapt it to proper development, and at the same time establish suitable grades for Greenpoint avenue and Laurel Hill boulevard to conform with the plan proposed by the Public Service Commission. In this connection, attention might be called to the desirability of providing access to the property adjoining these streets by making provision in the plan for separating the grade of the portion of the street to be carried over the railroad from that required to give access to the adjoining property, and along lines which were noted in the report submitted to the Board on February 8 last relative to the proposed grading of Van Dam street. President, the approval of the final map of section 119. This plan relates to the territory bounded approximately by Audley street, Grenfell street, Onslow place, Kew Gardens road, Keystone street, DeGraw street, Kew Gardens road, Cottage street, Hillside avenue, Maure avenue, Jamaica avenue, Spruce street, Hillside avenue, Lefferts avenue and Ashland street, and to the territory

bounded approximately by Barrett street, Hutton street, Sussman street and Windener street, comprising an area of about 367 acres.

Definite plans for a street system have already been adopted by the Board for the area south of St. Anns avenue and Metropolitan avenue, comprising an area of about 115 acres, while the lines of Kew Gardens road west of Iris place were shown upon a map adopted on May 16 last. Provision is now made for amending the former plan in so far as it relates to the territory south of Jamaica avenue by modifying the position of streets in such a way as to make them conform with the street system as heretofore recognized by the property owners. These changes will involve an amendment of the final maps of sections 118 and 121 to correspond, which changes it is assumed will be given immediate consideration by the Borough President in case the map now submitted is approved.

The northeasterly portion of the territory included within the limits of the plan is largely occupied by the Maple Grove Cemetery, while it is approximately bisected by the main line division of the Long Island Railroad. Provision is made for laying out streets to correspond approximately in alignment with that of the cemetery boundary, but in the case of Barrett street and Keystone street the map indicates that it is proposed to include within the street system small portions of the cemetery property.

The plan indicates railroad crossings at Onslow place, Lefferts avenue, Metropolitan avenue and Hillside avenue. The two former crossings have been constructed under the Maple Grove franchise which was authorized in 1908, while provision for the construction of the two latter bridges was made under the agreement entered into

with the Long Island Railroad Company on July 21, 1911.

The plan shows Metropolitan avenue and a small section of a street adjoining Forest Park as having a width of 100 feet. In the case of the former street this width harmonizes with that which has been adopted through almost its entire length, while in the latter case I am informed that the street as now proposed is intended to be given a position such as to place about one-half of its width within the limits of the park area, the remainder being taken from the holdings now in private ownership.

Austin street, distant approximately 100 feet north of and parallel with the railroad right-of-way, occupies a position similar to that which has been fixed for it in plans of sections to the west, while Grenfell street and Cuthbert place, located on the southerly side of the right-of-way, are given a broken alignment. Through a portion of its length the latter street immediately adjoins the railroad property, while through the remaining length both this street and Grenfell street depart from it to a maximum of about 170 feet. It is understood that the treatment of the streets now planned conform with the lines to which improvements are being carried out by the owners of the property.

I see no reason why the plan should not be adopted and would recommend such action after a public hearing. I would also suggest that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of modifying the plan in so far as it relates to Keystone street and Barrett street and as required to avoid the acquisition of cemetery NELSON P. Sir-Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of June 7, 1912, requesting, on behalf of the Borough President, the approval of a map showing the position of the pier and bulkhead lines along the northerly side of Newtown Creek, and for Maspeth Creek, Dutch Kills Creek, the East River, Bowery Bay and Flushing Bay, the map including within its limits the entire Queens water-front between the Borough line at Metropolitan avenue and Villaview road (1st avenue) at College Point, excepting that portion of Flushing Creek east of Jackson avenue, the lines for which have recently been legalized.

The Borough Secretary states that the map has been prepared at the suggestion of this office and is intended to more accurately define the position of the pier and bulkhead lines with reference to the adjoining street system. It is understood that through a considerable portion of its length the determination heretofore made by the War Department relative to pier and bulkhead lines does not definitely fix their position, and for this reason it has seemed to your Engineer essential that the interpretation of the action heretofore taken by the War Department should be clearly made at this time in order that there may be no confusion between the plans which are being carried out for a street system in the vicinity of the water-front and those proposed by the Federal authorities for the latter.

The map is intended to remove any question of this character by accurately fixing the position of the pier and bulkhead lines with reference to lines incorporated upon the city plan.

Provision is made in the plan for legalizing the bulkhead lines for Dutch Kills Creek and Maspeth Creek not heretofore laid out by competent authority, and for extending the basin meeting the water-front at the foot of 7th avenue southwardly one block to Winthrop avenue.

The plan also shows slight modifications in the bulkhead line as heretofore adopted for the East River in the sections between Pier street and 10th street, in the section between Temple street and Elm street, in the vicinity of Orchard street, and between Hoyt avenue and Halsey street. It also shows a restoration of the line of the Newtown Creek at and adjoining Laurel Hill boulevard and as originally laid out by the Secretary of War in 1890. The latter line was modified in 1911 at the request of The City of New York and in order to clear the way for the construction of Creek street. Under an order recently entered by the Public Service Commission, a radical change in the treatment of Creek street will be required, owing to the proposed elevation of the bridge carrying the Laurel Hill boulevard over the railroad tracks and the creek, by reason of which the Creek street layout will here have to be abandoned.

I would recommend that a copy of this plan be sent to the Secretary of War with the request that it be adopted. I would also suggest that another copy be sent to the Commissioner of Docks and his attention called to the request submitted to the Federal authorities. Respectfully,

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, bearing date of April 10, 1912, requesting the approval of a map fixing the lines and grades for Garfield avenue, between Rosebank avenue

(Tompkins avenue) and Bath avenue (McFarland place). Garfield avenue, having a width of 60 feet and a length coinciding with that indicated on the plan now under consideration, was shown upon a tentative plan for a large adjoining area which was adopted by the Board on December 17, 1909. The treatment then proposed was also ratified under a tentative plan which was forwarded by the Borough President on May 11, 1911, but which has not yet been acted upon owing to a question subsequently raised concerning the treatment of a

portion of the area.

The plan now submitted differs from the tentative maps by decreasing the street width to 50 feet and by establishing lines across what is intended ultimately to be a large open space north of Hooker street, which is occasioned by reason of the acute angles here formed at street intersections. Provision is also made for modifying the street grade, the maximum change of this character being located at Reynolds street (Lincoln avenue), where the grade is to be raised 2.6 feet. The street is to have a length of about 1,800 feet and a position such as to justify a belief that it will serve as a minor traffic artery, which would require a width at least as great as was originally planned. That it is destined to assume some importance is evidently recognized from the fact that in order to secure reasonable grades provision has been made for establishing a grade at the Hooker street intersection, which will require a fill of nearly 12 feet. No information is given by the Borough President as to the occasion for the proposed decrease in width, and from such information as is available it would appear that the original plan could be carried out with but little damage to buildings. The street is in use only in the two blocks between Reynolds street (Lincoln avenue) and Howard street (Sherman avenue), where the lines heretofore recognized by the property owners seem to be based on a street width of about 45 feet.

In my judgment the establishment of the lines indicated in the section north of Hooker street would be disadvantageous both to the City and to the property owners, inasmuch as the carrying out of opening proceedings along these lines would have the effect of goring property with the assurance that the remnants would have to be acquired under an independent proceeding when provision is made for carrying out the permanent plan, while at the same time any physical improvement of the street along the lines indicated would later have to be radically modified.

I would recommend that the map be referred back to the Borough President with the suggestion that the width of 60 feet originally contemplated be retained, if practicable, and that provision be made for modifying the treatment in the section north of Hooker street in such a way as to definitely fix the position of the street lines forming a part of the open space which is here contemplated.

Sir—Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on August 14, 1912, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the following streets: Roberge place, from West 3d street to West 5th street; West 2d street, from Sheepshead Bay road to Sea Breeze avenue; excluding from each street the right of way of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad

Each of these streets has been laid out upon the City Map to have a width of 50 feet, and the resolutions affect 1,100 feet at the southerly end of West 2d street, and 300 feet, comprising the entire length, of Roberge place. The streets occupy relative positions such that they can advantageously be combined into a single opening proceeding, such treatment being recommended.

The roadway of Roberge place is approximately graded for a distance of about 200 feet adjoining West 3d street, but with this exception the streets are not in use, and a large number of buildings in each case encroach upon the land to be acquired. The Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad crosses West 2d street at a point about 200 feet north of Sea Breeze avenue, but does not intersect Roberge place. The Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-Under date of March 7, 1912, your Board referred to this office the matter of acquiring title to Avenue H, from Ocean Parkway to Ralph avenue, excluding the right of way of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad. At the meeting held on the above date a number of property owners protested against the limits of this proceeding, and since then protests have been made to this office. I transmit herewith copy of report made on the subject by Mr. Chas. R. Ward, Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau, and in accordance therewith respectfully request your Honorable Board to adopt a resolution for opening Avenue H, from Ocean Parkway to Coney Island avenue; from Ocean avenue to Flatbush avenue; and from the southeasterly line of the right-of-way of the Long Island Railroad Company to Ralph avenue.

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on March

7, 1912, a hearing was given concerning a district of assessment in a proposed proceeding for acquiring title to Avenue H, from Ocean parkway to Ralph avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, at the close of which and at his request the matter was referred back to the Borough President for further consideration.

In the report originally submitted on this proceeding, it was shown that Avenue H has been given a width of 80 feet, and that certain sections of the street were deemed to have been dedicated to public use. In the belief, however, that the expense to be incurred would not be materially increased by the inclusion of the dedicated areas, it was recommended that provision be made for securing a continuous fee title to the entire street length.

In a communication bearing date of April 22, 1912, which is herewith transmitted, the Borough President advises that the interested property owners have protested against the inclusion of the dedicated sections, and he requests that the proceeding be limited to the remaining area.

Such a proceeding would affect thirty-six blocks or about 9,600 feet of Avenue H, which is in use only for about 1,000 feet at its westerly end. The abutting property is almost entirely unimproved, but at East 10th street and at Coney Island avenue

buildings fall within the street lines. To conform with the request of the Borough President the resolution should provide for acquiring title to Avenue H from Ocean parkway to Coney Island avenue; from Ocean avenue to Flatbush avenue; and from the southeasterly right-of-way line

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge strict, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on June 5, 1912, requesting the rescission of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of March 13, 1908, under which proceedings were instituted for acquiring title to Wakeman place from 1st

avenue to 3d avenue and to 67th street from 1st avenue to 3d avenue. From information received at the office of the Assistant Corporation Counsel in Charge of the Bureau of Street Openings it appears that title to all of the land within the lines of these streets between the limits named is now vested in the City under deeds of cession, excepting a length of about 100 feet of Wakeman place west of 3d avenue, and a similar length of 67th street west of 2d avenue. The Corporation Counsel has also advised that both of the parcels not ceded have been dedicated to public use and in recognition of this dedication assessable physical improvements have been authorized by this Board.

No commissioners have been appointed in the proceeding, but the records show that expenses have been incurred aggregating \$330.73. Under the rules of the Board the discontinuance of this proceeding should be preceded by the payment to the City of a sum representing the total expenditure up to the date of discontinuance. In view of the unimportant character of each of the streets, of the comparatively small area to which the proceeding would relate if it were to be maintained, and of the slow progress which has been made in advancing it, the Board may deem it advisable to in this case depart from the policy which has recently been observed. Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Van Courtlandt District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on April 15, 1912, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to West 180th street from Aqueduct avenue to Osborne Place.

This resolution affects four blocks or about 1,400 feet of West 180th street which has been laid out upon the City map to have a width of 60 feet. The street is not in use excepting for a short distance where a private roadway falls within its lines, and the abutting property is almost entirely unimproved. It is believed that there are no buildings on the land to be acquired.

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on November 4, 1910, a Local Board resolution for acquiring title to Fowler avenue from Walker avenue (West Farms road) to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, was referred back to the Borough President for the reason that a modification in the street layout was under consideration. The changes contemplated have recently been effected through the approval of the final map of section 40, and in a communication bearing date of August 14, 1912, which is herewith trans-

mitted, the Borough President requests that the matter be again presented to the Board. On the later map the street is designated as Paulding avenue. The street comprises two disconnected sections located respectively north and south of the New York. New Haven and Hartford Railroad, which will probably ultimately be connected by means of a footbridge.

The Local Board of the Chester District by resolution adopted on January 3, 1912, which is also herewith transmitted, has recommended the acquistion of title to Paulding avenue from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Bronx and Pelham parkway, and it would seem advantageous to combine the two sections into a single

Near Bronx and Pelham parkway the street merges with Bogart avenue, and to avoid any uncertainty as to the area to be acquired the proceeding should be amplified so as to include the adjoining section of Bogart avenue. In my judgment a resolution should therefore be adopted for acquiring title to the following streets: Paulding avenue from West Farms road to Bogart avenue; Bogart avenue from Paulding avenue to Bronx and Pelham parkway south.

Such a proceeding would relate to ten blocks or a little over one mile of Paulding avenue, and one-half block or about 400 feet of Bogart avenue. Each street has been laid out to have a width of 60 feet excepting where they merge at an irregular and greater width. With the exception of Paulding avenue south of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, where the roadway is approximately graded, neither of the streets is in use. The abutting property is almost entirely unimproved. It is believed that there are no encroachments.

The New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad crosses Paulding Avenue in tunnel at a point about 800 feet south of Bronx and Pelham parkway, and it will be unnecessary therefore to exclude the railroad right of way from the proceeding.

I would recommend the adoption of a resolution for acquiring title to Bogart avenue and Paulding avenue between the limits indicated; that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following areas:

- 1. Beginning at a point on the northerly line of West Farms road where it is intersected by a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the northeasterly line of Bear Swamp road and the westerly line of Paulding avenue as these streets are laid out immediately adjoining West Farms road, and running thence northwestwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with the southerly right-of-way line of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad; thence eastwardly along the said right-of-way line to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Paulding avenue and Hone avenue, as these streets are laid out immediately adjoining West Farms road; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Paulding avenue and Hone avenue and along the prolongations of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of West Farms road, the said distance being measured at right angles to West Farms road; thence west-wardly and parallel with West Farms road to the intersection with a line at right angles to West Farms road and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line at right angles to West Farms road to the point or place of beginning.

AMENDMENT OF THE PROCEEDING FOR ACQUIRING TITLE TO FORT SCHUYLER ROAD FROM WESTCHESTER CREEK TO SHORE DRIVE, BY EXCLUDING THE SECTION SOUTH OF MORRIS LANE, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Dear Sir-Replying to your communication of the 12th inst. with reference to the amendment of the proceeding for acquiring title to Fort Schuyler road, from Westchester Creek to Shore drive, Borough of The Bronx, by excluding that portion of the street south of Morris lane, calling our attention to the fact that, under the policy of the Board the petitioner should indicate a willingness to assume her proportionate share of the expenses incurred on account of this proceeding, we beg to say on behalf of the petitioner that, if necessary, and if made a condition to the granting of the petition, she is willing to assume her proportionate share of such expense. There are several reasons, however, why this should not be made a condition in this instance, and we should like to have an opportunity of stating these special circumstances at the proper time, if you will advise when we may do so. Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 1912, two petitions were presented by Arabella D. Huntington. One of these requested a change in the lines of Fort Schuyler road, between Morris lane and Shore drive, while in the other the Board was asked to amend the proceeding for acquiring title to Fort Schuyler road, between Westchester Creek and Shore drive, by excluding that portion of the street south of Morris lane.

At this time the Board was informed that all of the land within the lines of Fort Schuyler road, south of Morris lane, was owned by the petitioner; that the street as laid out would result in the destruction of a very old Cedar of Lebanon tree of historic interest; and that by reason of the position given to the street the approval of the request would not affect any interests other than those of the petitioner. The matter of changing the street lines was at this time referred to the Borough President, while the petitioner was informed that under the policy now being observed by the Board the discontinuance of a portion of the proceeding should be preceded by payment to the City of such sum as would represent the proportionate share of the expense already incurred and charged against the Street Opening Fund.

In the accompanying communication from Messrs. Parsons, Closson and McIlvaine, attorneys for the petitioner, bearing date of July 17, 1912, the Board is informed that Mrs. Huntington is willing, if necessary, to assume her share of the expense already incurred if the petition is granted, but that this case involves features which should not make it necessary to enforce this condition, and an opportunity of explaining the same is requested.

The opening proceeding was authorized on July 27, 1911, and the rule map, together with the damage map relating to the area west of Waterbury avenue, were approved on March 21, 1912. The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were appointed on May 20, following, but up to a recent date had not held any meetings.

I am informally advised that the total expense incurred under this proceeding now aggregates about \$5,000, of which approximately \$400 is chargeable to the section south of Morris lane. In case the proceeding were to be amended as desired by the petitioner and the district of assessment as heretofore fixed is retained, I believe that the adjustment of the expense relating to the discontinued section might be properly left to the Commissioner of Assessment, and that under these conditions it would not be necessary to exact payment from the petitioner at this time.

I am also informally advised that the Borough President has been requested by property owners in the locality to complete the mapping of Shore drive, and to institute proceedings for acquiring title to it. In case this were done, the effect would be to provide a continuation of Fort Schuyler road in such a way as to affect other interests than those of Mrs. Huntington.

Under these conditions it would seem proper to refer the entire matter to the Borough President, with the request that he advise the Board as to his views, and I would recommend that this be done before further action is taken. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

VESTING TITLE TO WHITE PLAINS ROAD, FROM CLASONS POINT ROAD TO THE BULKHEAD LINE OF THE EAST RIVER, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and report of the Chief Engineer, were presented:

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, Office of Consulting Engineer, October 2, 1912.

Mr. Joseph Hang, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir-Proceedings are pending for acquiring title to White Plains avenue from West Farms road to the bulkhead line of the East River. Damage maps were forwarded from this office on March 16, 1910. Commissioners were appointed on July 26, 1910, and their oaths were filed on October 11, 1910. Title was vested in that portion of the proceeding from West Farms road to Westchester avenue on January

The White Plains avenue sewer (now under construction) traverses that part of White Plains avenue between Clason's Point road and the bulkhead line of the East River, and at the present time the City has only a 50-foot easement. In view of the very deep cuttings and of the very large dimensions of the proposed sewer, the 50-foot easement gives scarcely room enough for the contractor to carry on the work without encroaching beyond the easement lines.

With a view to expediting the work of constructing the sewer by giving the contractor sufficient space to carry on his operations, I hereby request that title be vested to White Plains avenue from Clason's Point road to the bulkhead line of the East River, by a resolution at the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Sir-Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, bearing date of October 2, 1912, requesting that provision be made for vesting title to White Plains road from Clason's Point road to the bulkhead line of the East River.

On March 22, 1907, the Board authorized the construction of the trunk sewers in Drainage District No. 43, these including a sewer in White Plains road, south of Lacombe avenue. On the same date provision was made for vesting title to an easement within the lines of this street, which had a width varying from 50 feet to 70

feet, and which was included in a proceeding instituted in 1905. The Borough President now advises that the deep cuttings and large dimensions of the sewers in White Plains road make the easement heretofore acquired inadequate for the purposes of construction, and he accordingly requests that provision be made for vesting title to the street for its full width of 100 feet south of Clason's Point

The opening proceeding relating to White Plains road was instituted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 18, 1909, and included all of the street from West Farms road to the bulkhead line of the East River. The oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on October 11, 1910, and title to the land can be vested in the City at any time by resolution of the Board.

In accordance with the request of the Borough President, I would recommend that on October 18, 1912, title to all of White Plains road from Clason's Point road to the bulkhead line of the East River be vested in the City. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

The party of the first part is the sole owner in fee of all the lands embraced within the lines of Winthrop avenue as laid down and shown upon the Commissioners' map of Long Island City, adopted April 25, 1873, between the bulkhead line of the East River and the prolongation of the easterly side of the boulevard, in the Borough of Queens, County of Queens, City and State of New York; and

Whereas, The Local Board of the Newtown District, pursuant to Titles 2 and 3 of Chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, adopted resolutions on January 7, 1909, as amended June 30, 1910, to institute proceedings to legally open Winthrop avenue from the bulkhead line of the East River to the easterly line of the Boulevard, and from the easterdly line of Chauncey street to the old Bowery Bay road, in the

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a communication from Messrs. Shearman and Sterling, attorneys for the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company, bearing date of October 8, 1912, transmitting an executed stipulation to cede the land within the lines of Winthrop avenue, between the Boulevard and the East River, in the Borough of Queens, for highway purposes on or before January 1, 1915, and to grant an easement for the construction of a sewer within the street lines, providing that the proceeding now in progress for acquiring title to this street is amended by the exclusion of the area west of the Boulevard.

The instrument submitted by the petitioner has been drawn along lines carrying out the recommendation made by the Corporation Counsel in this matter, and as outlined by him in an opinion presented at the meeting of September 19. It also conforms with the terms heretofore fixed by the Board relative to the discontinuance of the

This proceeding, as authorized on June 29, 1911, relates to that portion of Winthrop avenue, between the bulkhead line of the East River and the easterly line of the Boulevard, and between the easterly line of Chauncey street and the old Bowery Bay road. The rule and damage maps have not yet been submitted to the Board. I am advised that the expenses incurred in advancing this proceeding up to this date aggregate \$751.55, and that \$28.50 represents the share of this expense chargeable to the area to be excluded from the proceeding. Under the rules now observed by the Board, payment of this amount to the City should precede the amendment of the proceeding.

I would recommend that after giving a new hearing concerning a modified district of assessment and upon payment by the petitioners of \$28.50, the instrument now presented be accepted, and that the proceeding be amended in such a way as to relate to the section between the easterly line of Chauncey street and the old Bowery Bay road. The revised area of assessment should comprise the following district:

Dear Sir—Replying to your communication of the 20th ultimo, calling attention to the fact that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on the 19th ultimo, there was referred back to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn matter of construction of sewer at the foot of West 32d street, as follows: "In order that steps might be taken for the acquisition of the necessary sewer easement."

We have had this matter carefully investigated by our Topographical Bureau, and the records searched, with the result that we find there is a 11-foot strip along the prolongation of the westerly line of West 32d street for which there has been

The Chief Engineer of our Sewer Bureau reports that this outlet sewer can be

constructed in this 11-foot strip, as the sewer is only 42 inches in diameter. I therefore respectfully submit these facts for attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and further request that this sewer authorization for "Surf avenue from West 27th to West 37th streets and in West 32d street from Surf avenue to a point in the Atlantic Ocean about 900 feet south of Surf avenue, etc.," be placed upon the calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration at the next public improvement meeting, to be held on October 17.

There has been very serious demand for sewers in Coney Island, and in order to construct these sewers early in the spring it is absolutely necessary for us to obtain, at once, preliminary authorization so that our Bureau of Sewers can commence work

on the plans.

I enclose herewith copies of reports made by the Chief Engineers of our Topographical and Sewer Bureaus, also sketch showing position of water grant at the foot of West 32d street, this Borough. Yours very respectfully,

The oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on February 1 last, and title to the land can be vested in the City at any time.

One relating to West 29th street, from Surf avenue to Neptune avenue, together with a number of other streets, excluding the right of way of the New York and Coney Island Railway, was instituted on April 20, 1911. The oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on February 1, 1912, and title to the

land needed for this street can also be vested in the City at any time.

At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 13, 1912, this resolution was presented for consideration. At that time attention was directed to the proposed occupancy of land under water along the prolongation of West 32d street, and to the fact that this land had been made the subject of a grant by the State to the riparian owner. The matter was at this time referred to the Corporation Counsel with the request that he advise the Board as to the legality of the water grant, and with the understanding that if this were found to be valid a proceeding would be instituted for acquiring easement rights to permit of carrying out the sewer construction.

The Corporation Counsel subsequently advised that there was no reason for questioning the validity of the grant referred to, and on September 19 last the matter was referred to the Borough President so that steps might be taken for the acquisition

of the necessary sewer easement.

In a communication bearing date of October 8, 1912, which is herewith transmitted, the Borough President presents information showing that there have been no water grants made by the State along the prolongation of a strip 11 feet wide located on the westerly side of West 32d street. He states that the sewer can be constructed in this area, and requests that the matter be again presented for the consideration of the Board. Under the assumption that the acquisition of the fee to the upland carries with it the rights to the land under water in the strip to be occupied, it would seem proper under the circumstances to grant the authorization requested.

The resolution affects lengths varying from one block or about 800 feet of West 29th street, to nine blocks or about 2,700 feet of Surf avenue, aggregating about 4,400 feet. Surf avenue is paved and the remaining streets are approximately graded, the abutting property being, in each case, partially improved. The outlet sewers are

provided for.

The work is estimated to cost about \$60,000, and the assessed valuation of the

property to be benefited is \$1.676.820.

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on April 15, 1912, initiating proceedings for grading East 222d street, from Bronxwood avenue to Arnow avenue.

The grading of East 222d street, from the Hutchinson River westwardly has been made the subject of a number of Local Board resolutions which were presented for the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on various dates between April 19, 1907, and May 4, 1911. These resolutions were in each instance returned to the Borough President without approval for the reason that property values at the easterly end of the street were insufficient to justify the improvement on the scale proposed by the Local Board, and at the same time attention was directed to the desirability of limiting the improvement to the sections of the street where property values were adequate, or of curtailing the work where property values were low by excluding curbing and flagging, and by limiting the grading to a portion of the street width and, if necessary, to an elevation below the grade established for the street.

As the result of such recommendations, a Local Board resolution was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 3, 1909, under which East 222d street was regulated and graded from Carpenter avenue to Bronxwood avenue, this comprising the section of the street where property values are highest.

The resolution now presented affects about 8,700 feet of East 222d street, title to which has been legally acquired. The street is not in use, and east of Baychester avenue traverses a territory which is low and partially swampy.

The cost of the improvement as now proposed is estimated to be \$150,500, and the assessed valuation of the property within the area of benefit is stated to be \$835,100. On the basis of the estimate furnished, the average cost of the improvement

would be about \$8.65 per linear foot of frontage, which would require a minimum value of about \$430 per City lot of 25x100 feet to permit of collecting the entire expense by direct assessment against the frontages.

From information recently presented by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, it appears that this value exists only west of Givan avenue. Between the latter point and Arnow avenue the street has a length of about 3,200 feet, and on the basis of the average cost the improvement would here involve an expenditure of about \$55,000, although it should be noted that the land is here low and the actual cost would probably be considerably in excess of the average quoted. In this section of the street the land has a value ranging from about \$100 to about \$300 per City lot, with an average of approximately \$200. It therefore appears that if the improvement is authorized as now proposed, a considerable part of the expense to be incurred east of Givan avenue will have to be borne by the City at large.

East 222d street is a diagonal thoroughfare which has been laid out to have a width of 100 feet. Between Fowler avenue and Givan avenue the street crosses the New York, Westchester and Boston railroad, and a railroad bridge has already been erected at this intersection. The street will undoubtedly become an important artery of traffic in the future, although it is not probable that it is needed for its full width east of the railroad at the present time. It would therefore appear that in this section of the street length the grading improvement could advantageously be limited to a portion of the area within the street lines, and also, if necessary, to permit of collecting the entire cost by direct assessment, to an elevation lower than the grade established for the street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 19, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 15 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$25.00.

The work to be done comprises the following: 680 square yards asphalt block pavement, 400 linear feet new and old curbing.

Sir-Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of Queens advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with.

1. Sewers in the following streets Ditmars avenue, from 51st street to 43d street; 43d street from Ditmars avenue to the bulkhead line of Flushing Bay; together with a temporary grit and screening chamber in 43d street and a temporary sanitary sewer on the line of this street from the bulkhead line to the pierhead line. The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionprobable cost would be about \$145,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 250 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$3,017.84. The work to be done comprises

the following:

1,000 linear feet 3-foot 4-inch by 4-foot 0-inch timber sewer, 610 linear feet 5-foot 7-inch by 3-foot 834-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 1,870 linear feet 10-foot 0-inch by 7-foot 7¼-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 1,291 linear feet 7-foot 6-inch by 7-foot 7¼-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 1,172 linear feet 7-foot 6-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 35 linear feet 24-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 1,480 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 42 manholes, 2 cleaning shafts, 8 receiving basins, 1 screen and grit chamber, I overflow chamber, I drop chamber. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$205,300.

2. Sewer in Van Alst avenue from Paynter avenue to Beebe avenue. The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 21, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$47.89. The work to be done comprises the following: 560 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewers; 4 manholes. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,600.

3. Sewer in 2d avenue from Ditmars avenue to the crown 400 feet westerly therefrom. The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 27, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for he preliminary work amounts to \$23.72. The work to be done comprises the following: 580 linear feet, 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer; 3 manholes. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,000.

4. Temporary sewers in the following streets: 7th avenue, from 21st street to 22d street; 22d street, from 6th avenue to 7th avenue. The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 16, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,600. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$31.11. The work to be done comprises the following: 630 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 6 manholes, 1 receiving basin. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$1,700.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improve-

ments should not be authorized and would recommend such action.

BRIDGE CARRYING 8TH AVENUE OVER THE TRACKS OF THE LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY AND OF THE SEA BEACH RAILWAY COMPANY, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN. The following communication from the Sea Beach Railway Company and

Dear Sir-I am handing you herewith one blueprint copy each of plans Nos. 1, 2 and 3, showing details of construction and specifications for the proposed bridge on 8th avenue crossing the tracks of this company and of the Long Island Railroad Company. These plans have been approved by the engineers of the two railroad companies and are sent you for your examination and for action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, preliminary to submitting the matter to the Public Service Commission. Will you kindly have them checked up at your convenience and advise me when approved, and I will have the tracings forwarded your office for signature, furnishing,

thereafter, such additional copies as you may require.

The detail plans referred to follow, in general, the diagrammatic plans previously submitted to you and found satisfactory. The structural features are fully indicated, including data of loading and stresses. It is proposed to construct this bridge as a

single structure under a joint contract.

The structure provides a roadway 44 feet in width with two (2) 10-foot sidewalks and two (2) 3-foot pipe galleries. The design covers a steel structure completely enclosed in concrete, with reinforced concrete sidewalks and roadway, the latter being designed to permit installation of trolley tracks at a later time. In general, the structure conforms with similar structures recently constructed by the Long Island Railroad as a part of the Bay Ridge improvement. Yours truly,

Sir-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 25, 1912, there was submitted with a report from the Chief Engineer of the Board a general plan showing the type of the bridge by which it was proposed to carry 8th avenue across the tracks of the Sea Beach Railway Company and the Long Island Railroad Company.

The bridge spanning the tracks of the last named company is being built under the superivision of the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission, while the crossing of the Sea Beach tracks, not falling within the jurisdiction of the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission, was ordered by the Public Service Commission for the First District. This order was issued by the Commission on October 27, 1911, and provided that before the beginning of construction plans and specifications should be approved by the Chief Engineer of the railroad company and the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Engineer of the Board not being a statutory officer, the plans should, in my judgment, be submitted to and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

As before stated, a sketch plan showing the general type of structure to be built has already been submitted to and approved by the Board. The present plans are complete in detail and follow the general plans heretofore submitted. They provide for a roadway 44 feet in width, with two sidewalks 10 feet wide, outside of which are supports for pipes 3 feet in width on each side. The plans are accompanied by data indicating the loading and the stresses. These have been carefully examined and the plans are found to be satisfactory.

While the bridge is to be made a continuous structure, it is only that portion which is designed to carry the street over the tracks of the Sea Beach Railway toward which the City will be obliged under the Railroad Law to contribute.

I would recommend that the plans be approved. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

Dear Sir-Supplementing Mr. Peters' letter, President of the Long Island Railroad Company, to you of June 13th, 1912, I beg to enclose herewith drawing No. 1, bridge B-49, dated September 12th, 1912, for bridge over Kossuth place. This plan is to supersede plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the meeting of said Board on June 27th, 1912. The original plan provided for a 50-foot street, but since said approval the Borough authorities have requested the railroad company to provide a bridge for a 70-foot street. Sir-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 27, 1912, at the request of Mr. Ralph Peters, president of the Long Island Railroad Company, and of Mr. Samuel Rae, president of the New York Connecting Railroad, a general drawing was approved showing the bridge planned to carry these railroads over Kossuth place in the Borough of Queens. At that time a map was also presented for the elimination of the existing crossing at Myrtle avenue, but it was pointed out that a change in the width of this street then in contemplation made it inadvisable to consider the Myrtle avenue plan.

The bridge at Kossuth place was designed to span a 50-foot street, which is the width heretofore fixed for this street. I am informally advised, however, by the Engineer of the Topographical Bureau that a map will be presented at an early date under which the street width will be increased to 70 feet.

Under a map approved on June 27, 1912, the width of Myrtle avenue was reduced

from 100 feet to 70 feet, and at the same time a special roadway ordinance was adopted, fixing the roadway width of this street at 45 feet, centrally located.

In a communication bearing date of September 18, 1912, which is herewith transmitted, the Long Island Railroad, through Mr. L. V. Morris, chief engineer of the Bay Ridge Improvement, has presented plans modifying those heretofore presented for crossings along the lines of Kossuth place and of Myrtle avenue, these conformal with the layoute proposed for the former street, and with the modification forming with the layouts proposed for the former street, and with the modification already made in the latter.

The bridges are on the line of the Manhattan Beach Branch between the Brooklyn Borough Line and Fresh Pond Junction, and are intended to here complete the elimination of all grade crossings without cost to the city, and also to provide for carrying the tracks of the New York Connecting Railroad which are to adjoin the Long Island Railroad in the manner contemplated under the agreement of February 14, 1907, between the former company and the City of New York. Each bridge will carry four tracks and will have solid reinforced concrete docks. They will have concrete abutments at the street line with intermediate column supports just back of the curb lines. Their principal characteristics are as follows:

Kossuth Place—The railroad crosses this street approximately at right angles. The bridge will be a deck plate girder with a maximum girder length of about 40 feet and a clearance of a little over 15 feet over the roadway.

Myrtle Avenue—The railroad crosses this street at an angle of 45 degrees. The bridge will be a deck plate girder with a maximum girder length of about 68 feet and a minimum clearance of 14 feet over the roadway as specified in the agreement referred to. This bridge will carry a station platform.

The drawings are of a general character and show little detail. They clearly indicate, however, that a suitable type of construction has been selected. They have already been approved by the Borough President, and I would recommend that favorable action be accorded by the Board,

I would also recommend that the resolution of June 27, 1912, under which general drawings were approved showing bridges carrying the Long Island Railroad and the New York Connecting Railroad over Wyckoff avenue, Cypress avenue, Scneca avenue, Forest avenue and Kossuth place, be modified by the rescision of the provision relating to the bridge at Kossuth place. Whereas, In that section or district in the Borough of Manhattan, bounded and described as follows, to wit: bounded on the north by the northerly side of Franklin street, on the east by the westerly side of Hudson street, the westerly side of West Broadway and the westerly side of Greenwich street, and the south by the northerly side of Dey street, and on the west by the easterly side of West street, there is now and has for many years been a market conducted on private properties for the receipt, sale and delivery of said food products, in which market a large part of the said products are received and distributed throughout the city; and

Whereas, A large proportion of said food products are perishable, and it is, therefore necessary that it be quickly sold and distributed; and,

Whereas, Most of the receiving, sale and reshipping of said perishable products

is done at night when the sidewalks in the said section or district are practically free

of other traffic; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the streets within the above described section or district be and they are hereby designated as market streets, and on the sidewalks of said streets, between the hours of eight (8) o'clock in the evening and eight (8) o'clock in the morning, produce of a perishable nature may be placed, received, sold or delivered, but at all times there shall be maintained a free passageway for pedestrians in the centre of the sidewalk; and be it further,

Resolved, That on the streets so designated as market streets, existing sheds or awnings over the said sidewalks may be retained for the protection of said food products where such sheds or awnings are not less than ten feet above the level of the

said sidewalks, provided they are supported wholly from above.

CHANGE IN THE LINES OF ATLANTIC AVENUE, AT EAST NEW YORK, AND EXCHANGE OF PROPERTIES WITH THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The following petition of the Long Island Railroad Company was presented:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

PETITION.

In the matter of the application of the Long Island Railroad Company for a change in the lines of Atlantic avenue, at East New York and Van Sinderen (Vesta) avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for an Exchange of Properties with The City of New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The petitioner herein, The Long Island Railroad Company, alleges:

1. That it is a domestic railroad corporation, organized and existing under and, by virtue of the provisions of chapter 178 of the laws of 1834, the acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and the Railroad Law of the State of New York. That it is engaged in the operation, by steam and electric power, of a railroad on

Long Island, in the State of New York, including the railroad of the New York, Brooklyn & Manhattan Beach Railway Company.

2. That on the complaint of citizens or residents of the Borough of Brooklyn to the Public Service Commission of the State of New York for the First District, alleging insufficient station and platform accommodations and facilities at the East New York Station of the petitioner's railroad, said Commission, after public hearing, entered its final order, bearing date February 26, 1909, a copy of which is attached hereto, marked "Exhibit A," directing that the petitioner herein relocate its East New York Station, platforms, tracks and gates, and reconstruct the same in accordance with certain plans in evidence before the said Commission. That thereafter the said Public Service Commission, by order dated August 15, 1911, a copy of which is hereto attached and marked "Exhibit B," modified the aforesaid final order, and again, by order dated June 14, 1912, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked "Exhibit C," modified said final order as modified by the order of August 15, 1911.

3. That, to comply with the requirements of the aforesaid final order of the Public Service Commission as modified by the orders of August 15, 1911, and June 14, 1912, your petitioner will be obliged to relocate certain of its railroad structures near the intersection of Atlantic and Van Sinderen (Vesta) avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and occupy a portion of said Atlantic avenue for the new station layout of its Atlantic Division and its Manhattan Beach Division at East New York, in the

said Borough of Brooklyn.

4. The necessity for new and improved station facilities at said East New York station arises by reason of the reconstruction and relocation of the Manhattan Beach division of the petitioner's railroad, in accordance with plans of the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission, which plans provide for the construction of a tunnel for said railroad under the Atlantic Division of the petitioner's railroad, immediately west of the intersection of Atlantic and Van Sinderen (Vesta) avenues. Said proposed new station layout is shown upon the plan attached hereto, marked "Exhibit D," which plan was approved by the aforesaid order of the Public Service Commission, dated June 14, 1912.

6. That, to construct the aforesaid station as shown upon said plan marked "Exhibit D," it will be necessary for the petitioner to occupy and use that portion of Atlantic avenue outlined in red upon the plan attached hereto and marked "Exhibit E," the area of the said portion of Atlantic avenue so required to be occupied and used being 8,210 square feet.

7. Your petitioner is the owner of that parcel of property outlined in yellow upon the said plan and containing an area of 8,768 square feet, and the petitioner is desirous of exchanging with The City of New York the aforesaid parcel outlined in

vellow for the aforesaid parcel outlined in red.

8. The petitioner desires that the lines of Atlantic avenue be so changed that said avenue shall deflect from its present lines and shall exclude therefrom the property outlined in red upon the attached plan marked "Exhibit E," including the property outlined in yellow thereon.

9. The petitioner, by petition dated April 19, 1909, applied to your Board for a change in the lines of Atlantic avenue, at East New York and Van Sinderen (Vesta) avenues, but so as to lay out said Atlantic avenue in a position north of that now proposed, and a resolution was adopted by your Board, changing the lines of Atlantic avenue as then proposed by the petitioner; but said resolution was never signed by his Honor the Mayor of the City of New York, for the reason, your petitioner believes, that no deed of cession for the land required was ever presented to the proper City authorities.

Wherefore, the petitioner asks that the necessary steps be taken by your Board and by the proper officials of the City of New York, to accomplish a change in the lines of Atlantic avenue, and to accomplish the exchange of properties between the City of New York and the petitioner herein, as set forth in the foregoing petition.

-and thereupon, on the 10th day of October, 1912, resolutions having been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the President of the Borough of Queens to prepare the necessary plans, specifications and an estimate of the cost of the proposed improvement based on actual survey and further resolving that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will consider the authorization of the construction of the proposed improvement after the President of the Borough of Queens had submitted certain statements as provided in the said resolution, and the said resolution having been duly complied with by the President of the Borough of Queens, as appears by papers and documents on the files of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and there having been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate in writing in such detail as the Board has directed that the cost of the proposed work or improvement, together with the preliminary expenses, will be the sum of \$2,900, and a statement of the assessed value according to the last preceding tax roll of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, to wit, the sum of \$40,000 having also been presented, it is

Resolved. That the said resolution of the Local Board be and the same is hereby approved and the construction of the local improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized. This Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the aforesaid preliminary expenses, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement.

EXTENSION OF TIME FOR THE COMPLETION OF THE VARIOUS VIADUCTS AND BRIDGES IN THE GRAND CENTRAL TERMINAL, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan asked and obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of this matter and offered the following report of the Committee, to which the matter was referred on October 10, 1912:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, October 16, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on October 10, 1912, an application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company by its Vice-President, Mr. Ira A. Place, for an extension of time for completing the various viaducts and bridges in the Grand Central Terminal, was referred to the Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to which other matters relating to this terminal improvement have heretofore been referred.

Your Committee begs to submit the following report:

Chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, which authorized the Grand Central Terminal Improvement, and the original agreement between the City of New York and the Railroad Company, dated June 19, 1903, provided that the depression of the tracks and the construction of the viaducts should be completed within five years from the date of the delivery of the agreement. These five years expired on July 1, 1908. Subsequent to the making of the original agreement the plans were extensively changed and the scope of the improvement was greatly enlarged. Subsequent legislation authorized the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to grant extensions from time to time for the completion of the work, no single extension to be for more than 18 months. Acting under this authority, the Board granted extensions of 18 months each on June 5, 1908, on December 13, 1909, and on June 15, 1911, the third agreement extending the time for completion to December 31, 1912.

Notwithstanding the exceptional difficulties connected with this work, which increased as it approached completion, we believe that the Company has made every effort to complete the entire work within the time covered by the last extension. To do this it has resorted to night work, which has been the cause of much complaint from those living in the immediate vicinity. These complaints have become so pronounced that the President of the Borough of Manhattan has requested the officers of the Company to discontinue night work. This the Company has agreed to do, and we understand that it has already done so, but in consequence thereof the time required for completion will be somewhat increased. There are certain portions of the work which could not have been completed before December 31 of the present year in any event, owing to changes in the plan which were approved by the Board on June 15, 1911, and the Company is now asking for extensions of time on nine (9) different items of the work, all of the extensions being from December 31, 1912,

to the dates named. They are as follows:

52d street to 53d street, and Vanderbilt avenue from 42d street to 43d street. until February 1, 1913.

2. For the viaducts to carry 43d street and West Park avenue from 48th street to 49th street and from 50th to 51st streets, until March 1, 1913.

3. For the viaducts to carry 44th street and Vanderbilt avenue from 43d street to 45th street, until April 1, 1913.

 The viaduct to carry 46th street, until May 1, 1913.
 The viaducts to carry 47th street and West Park avenue from 49th street 50th street, until June 1, 1913. The viaducts to carry 48th street and West Park avenue from 51st street

to 52d street until August 1, 1913.

RECORD.

The viaduct to carry 45th street, until January 1, 1914.

The elevated roadway along Vanderbilt avenue and 42d street to the westerly line of the proposed viaduct to be built by the City across 42d street, until February 1913.

9. The portion of the elevated roadway opposite the northerly end of the proposed viaduct across 42d street, until August 1, 1913.

It will be noted that the proposed extensions cover only a few months, except in the case of the completion of 45th street, in which case an extension of one year is asked for, it being believed that the temporary street now in use should not be disturbed until other streets are available for use.

We believe that the requests for extensions of time are reasonable, and we would recommend the approval of the accompanying agreement making these extensions

On motion the matter was referred to the committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, appointed at the meeting of the Board on May 13, 1910, to consider the proposed improvement.

STREET OPENING PROCEEDINGS IN THE RICHMOND HILL SECTION, BOROUGH OF QUEENS. The following communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel was presented: City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, October 15, 1912.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen-I am in receipt of a communication, dated May 10, 1910, signed by Joseph Haag, Secretary of your Board, transmitting copy of a communication dated April 29, 1910, from Joseph P. Slensby, Secretary of the Richmond Hill Board of Trade, transmitting resolutions adopted by the residents of Richmond Hill relative to street opening proceedings in that section of the Borough of Queens.

These resolutions request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should direct that no expense be incurred for the making of damage, rule and profile maps for the legal opening of Maure avenue; and that the Board rescind all authority that it has given for the legal opening or widening of the street, and also that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the legal status of streets where petitions for the legal opening thereof have been submitted and which streets are contained in a list and shown upon a map filed with the Borough President, November 16, 1909, and subsequently with your Board, and that the Richmond Hill Board of Trade be notified of such reference, to the end that evidence may be submitted showing that an easement has vested in the City.

Miss Leventritt presented the following; which was adopted:

To the Board of Education: The Committee on Vocational Schools and Industrial Training begs to call attention to the fact that a resolution was adopted by this Board on September 13, 1911, accepting the offer of the New York Preparatory Trade School (Incorporated), located at No. 305 East 41st st., Manhattan, to turn over said school to the Board of Education upon the condition that the full equipment for teaching trades should be transferred without cost to the Board of Education, such equipment to meet the standard of the Board of Education, and upon the condition that certain changes should be made by the Directors of said school in the buildings on East 38th st., in the rear of Public school 49, Manhattan, so as to make the same available for occupancy by said school.

Your Committee would call attention, further, to the fact that on April 10, 1912, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Education authorizing the Committee on Vocational Schools and Industrial Training to open said school as an evening school in the buildings mentioned, when the Superintendent of School Buildings certified that the same were ready for occupancy, the Board of Directors of the institution having agreed to pay the salaries of the teachers up to the close of the spring term. At the meeting of this Board held on April 24, 1912, a resolution was adopted designating the above mentioned school as the Murray Hill Evening Trade School, and on May 8, 1912, a resolution was adopted expressing the thanks of the Board of Education to the Board of Directors of the New York Preparatory Trade School for their generosity in maintaining said school pending the completion of arrangements for the taking over of the same by the Department of Education.

Your Committee now reports that the Superintendent of School Buildings advised your Committee on April 22, 1912, that the new rooms formed at Public School 49, Manhattan, for the use of the school above mentioned had been examined and found satisfactory. On April 15, 1912, the Murray Hill Evening Trade School was opened to accommodate the pupils who formerly attended the New York Preparatory Trade School, in order to allow them to complete their course, but with the arrangement regarding teachers and salaries above specified, and the sessions continued until May 3, 1912. The matter is now closed as respects the Board of Directors of the New York Preparatory Trade School, who have fully and satisfactorily carried out their part of the transaction. It is deemed appropriate at this time that special recognition should be made of their generous action and businesslike procedure. It is the intention that the work of the Murray Hill Evening Trade School shall be regularly undertaken in the autumn, with teachers assigned by the Board of Education and the necessary supplies, etc., furnished by this Department.

Dr. Haupt, on behalf of the Committee on Special Schools, presented the following statement and resolution, which were Requesting Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board held on May 22, 1912, and requested that of Aldermen that the compensation of the same be printed in the Minutes of

> Associate City Superintendent Edward B. Shallow was assigned to the work of enforcing the Compulsory Education Law in February, 1907, and continued to work under such assignment until May 2, 1912, when he was assigned to other duties at his own request. In addition to his work in connection with the enforcement of the

dent Shallow has performed supervisory duties in six Local School Board Districts in the Borough of Manhattan.

The Committee on Special Schools takes pleasure in testifying that during the past five years, while Superintendent Shallow has been so intimately connected with the work of managing truant schools, of supervising attendance officers, and of performing several other duties in relation to the enforcement of the law, many improvements have been made in the service. He supervised our truant schools in such a manner as to reflect credit on the Board of Education; he permitted no incompetent or undesirable employees to remain in these institutions; he established and maintained the merit system in the matter of paroles from such schools, and generally safeguarded the interests of the Department of Education.

The project of establishing a parental school was first brought forward by Superintendent Meleney and the Committee on Special Schools, but the task of organizing the New York Parental School was given to Superintendent Shallow. This school is now regarded by experts as the beginning of one of the best in-

dustrial schools in this country. The Committee on Special Schools has at all times had the ready and helpful as-. sistance of Mr. Shallow in matters coming before it for consideration. On his initiative weekly and annual reports from officers have been improved, records in his office have been revised, and suitable forms for court work provided. He has worked earnestly for the past four years to bring about a reorganization of the work of attendance officers (1) in the matter of more definite work and accountability for service rendered, such as more certain regulations for the assignment of work to the officers and daily written reports by them, so that the Board of Education might know with reasonable certainty how great a force is necessary to perform the work efficiently, (2) in the matter of more frequent inspection of officers' work by District Superintendents, (3) a uniform system of procedure in compulsory education work throughout the City, (4) more effective disciplining of delinquent officers.

Statistics presented to this Committee by the City Superintendent of Schools show that the greatest improvement in the work of reducing truancy occurred in the period between the school years 1907-08 and 1910-11, when enrollment in the schools greatly increased and truancy was diminished by nearly fifty per cent. This was the period during which Superintendent Shallow was supervising the work as the deputy of the City Superintendent. Therefore

Resolved, That the service of Associate City Superintendent Shallow in connection with the enforcement of the Compulsory Education Law for the past five years be approved, and that the Commit tee on Special Schools expresses its commendation of Mr. Shallow's efforts to raise the standards in this work, and to bring about a more efficient organization of the work of attendance officers.



prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation to be

and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and con-ditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is author-ized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New

York, as follows, to wit: PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT. This contract, made this day of 19, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto

do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing

tracks of the Company in Bailey avenue at or near West 230th street; thence in and upon Bailey avenue to West 230th street; thence in and upon West 230th street to Broadway, and there connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Broadway. And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed,

as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized, is shown upon a

Estimate and Apportionment, dated May 28,

—and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and John F. Fairchild, Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially fol-lowed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First-The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months, or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Rail-road Law to determine if said railway ought to

and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until March 1, 1924, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of com pensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall case shall the rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying onehalf thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums

of money: (a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage

of its gross annual receipts it such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred, and seventy-five dollars (\$175).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$325), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$325).

During the remaining term expiring March 1.

During the remaining term expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the

Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the en-tire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 fol-lowing shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next

preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are in-tended to include the percentages of gross re-ceipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension if said act applies to or controls the Company in relational transfer of the company in relationships and the controls the company in relationships.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed pursuant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes or whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York. Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall

continue throughout the whole term of this con-tract (whether original or renewal), notwith-standing any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights-or privileges hereby granted (whether original or re-newal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter and that created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or to any indiwidual a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described and the Company shall hereinbefore described, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon request of the Board, consent to the use for street surface railway purposes of the tracks and appur-tenances covered by this grant, or any portion thereof, by any such other corporation or in-dividual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City.

Should the City at any time during the term of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right or privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the route herein described, or any por-tion thereof, then the City shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, give notice to the Company that such right has been granted, and of the name of the corporation or individual to which such right has been granted.

At the expiration of ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice such individual or corporation shall have the right to begin the operation of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route, or any portion thereof, over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and to use therefor the tracks, equipment, power and all other property of the Company which shall be necessary in the operation of the cars of such individual or corporation upon the tracks of the Company, and shall have the right to continue such operation until this contract, or the right to use such property under the terms of this contract granted said corporation or individual by the City, shall expire. Such cor-poration or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use such tracks, equipment, power and other property above described, such sum or sums as may be agreed upon in writing by such corporation or individual, and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the even that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, such sum or sums as shall be determined in the manner hereinafter

provided for.

If the Company and such corporation or indi vidual cannot prior to the expiration of said ninety (90) days agree upon the compensation for the use of such tracks, then such compensation shall be fixed by three arbitrators selected

in the following manner:
One fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the Company; one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by such corporation or individual, and the two so chosen shall choose a third fit and impartial person. The decision under oath of any two of said persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive.

The compensation and expenses of the persons selected as arbitrators in the determination of such sum or sums shall be borne by the individual or corporation to which such right may be

granted. Within thirty (30) days after an agreement shall have been reached between said parties, or in case said agreement cannot be reached before he time specified herein, then within thirty (30) days after the determination of the arbitrators, as herein provided, should two of such arbitrators agree, the said parties shall file a duplicate copy of a written agreement with the Board which shall specify the sum or sums which shall have been agreed to by the said parties or de-termined by said arbitrators as the sum or sums which such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for said privileges. If the Company fails to file the same with the Board within said thirty (30) days, then the right hereia granted shall cease and determine.

If either party fails to appoint an arbitrator, as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of a third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the expiration of said ninety (90) days, or if no two of said arbitrators so selected agree upon the sum or sums to be paid by such individual or corporation within sixty (60) days after they shall have been so selected, then such sum or sums shall be fixed by the Supreme Court upon the

shall be nixed by the Supreme Court upon the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or prop-

erty therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting the the Board evidenced by an instrument under by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company. Eighth—The Company shall commence con-

struction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commission ers appointed thereunder that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, othervise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid and the sum of five hundred dol-lars (\$500) deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall there-upon be forfeited to the City, provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full opera-tion may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months, and provided, further, that when the commence-ment or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings, in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be al-lowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth-Said railway shall be constructed and perated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed main.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railways shall be

commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall com-

ply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Elec-

Eleventh-Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First Dis-

trict of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route here-in authorized to be constructed by underground electric power substantially similar to the sys-tem now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or upon the whole or any portion of said route by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and avenues of the City upon said route.

Twelfth-Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the ity. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth-The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees

are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities,

or as may be required by resolution of the Board. Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board,

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require,

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall, if directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curblines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth-The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in per-manent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet be-yond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of twenty (20) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officials, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right here-

Twenty-sixth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comparticler of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the

purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its reports, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Cor-

poration Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days of the the date of such position to the company why after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company subject to the conditions and provi-

sions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate

(a) An additional or second standard gauge railroad track across and upon the following named streets and avenues in the Fifth Ward,

Borough of Richmond:

1. Huguenot avenue near Huguenot station.

2. Seguine avenue near Princes Bay station.
3. Bay View avenue, approximately 1,250

feet west of Seguine avenue.

4. Manee avenue, approximately 350 feet west of Bay View avenue.

5. Woodvail avenue, approximately 1,000 feet west of Manee avenue. Sharrot avenue, approximately 800 feet

east of Amboy road. 7. Amboy road near Pleasant Plains station. —within the lines of said streets and avenues as the same are now laid out or may hereafter be widened; said additional or second track to be constructed within the existing right of way of the Company and immediately to the south of the present track of the Company crossing the said streets and avenues and either at the same grade as the surface of said streets or above or below the grade thereof as shall be determined by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, pursuant to

(b) An additional or second standard gauge railroad track over and across Amboy road approximately 1,100 feet west of Huguenot avenue in the Fifth Ward, Borough of Richmond, within the lines of said Amboy road as the same is now laid out or may be reafter be widened; said is now laid out or may hereafter be widened; said track to be constructed within the existing right of way of the Company and immediately to the south of the present track of the Company crossing over and above said Amboy road;

In the event of rejection, such corporation or individual shall immediately cease the operation of its cars over the tracks of the Company, and shall within thirty (30) days thereafter pay to said Company for the use of its tracks and equipment already enjoyed a sum equal to the legal interest on such portion of the actual cost of construction of said railway structures and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such corporation or individual shall have borne to the number of cars operated by the Company or companies using the same during said period; also a like proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair; also a like proportion of laying and repairing of pavement, removal of ice and snow, taxes, and all duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connec-tion with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, together with the actual cost of the power used for the operation of the cars of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that such corporation or individual shall not be compelled to pay to the Company any sum as compensation for loss to it due to competition.

Sixth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall he title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by the operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise nothwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any

subsequent consent or consents. Seventh-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the either party.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equip ments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be

leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole

cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within one (1) month from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date upon which the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within four (4) months from the date of filing such consents or such order; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall there-upon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court, or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosccuted by the Company and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth-The said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may regulate the service and may, by resolution, require the Company, within a period of time stated therein, to improve or add to the railway equipment, including the rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. In case the Company shall deem such required improvements or additions unreasonable or unnecessary, it may, within ten (10) days after the adoption of such resolution, apply to the Public Service Commission for the First District for a determination of the reasonableness or necessity of such requirements, and the determination of the said Commission shall be binding both on the City and on the Company. If the Company shall not apply to the Public Service Commission for its determination, as above provided, it shall notify the Board, in writing within twenty (20) days after the adoption of such resolution, of its intention to comply therewith. In case of failure of the Company to so notify the Board, or in case of its failure to make the required improvements or additions within the time fixed by such resolution, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine. If the Company shall apply to the Public Service Commission for its determination, as above provided, and such determination when rendered shall be to the effect that the requirements contained in such resolution are reasonable or necessary, or if such determination when ren-dered shall prescribe other requirements, either lesser or greater than those contained in such resolution, the Company shall, within ten (10) days\_after the date of such determination, notify the Board, in writing, of its intention to comply with the requirements contained in such resolution, or with the other requirements prescribed by said Commission, as the case may be, and shall make the required improvements and additions within the time fixed by said resolution; otherwise the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occu-pancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned
