## Work Performed by Prisoners.

Painter's Report—Material Used: 4,300 pounds of white lead; 101 pounds of drop black, 35 pounds of emerald green, 5 pounds of raw sienna, 10 pounds of chrome yellow, 5 pounds of burnt sienna, 44 pounds of burnt umber, 33 gallons of boiled oil, 7 gallons of banana oil, 70 gallons of turpentine, 1 gallon of orange shellac, 18 gallons of dryers, 55 pounds of chrome green, 15 pounds of yellow ochre, 10 pounds of Prussian blue, 5 gallons demar varnish, 2 gallons varnish remover, 2 gallons benzine, 13 pounds silver bronze powder.

The above material was used in painting the hospital, painting radiators throughout all prisons, and cells in the new, annex and female prisons.

Tinsmith's Report—New Work: 4 20-gallon tin boilers, 4 6-gallon tin boilers, 1 ice cooler, 100 feet galvanized iron gutter, 50 tin boxes for Electrician's shop, 1 tin box for tickets, 1 galvanized tin cover for dynamo.

Carpenter's Report—New Work: 28 benches, 2 racks, 1 step, 15 sash cords, 1 wardrobe, 4 chairs, 2 slate boards, 4 drawers, 5 boxes, 4 tables, 16 frames, 7 shelves, 2 closets, 3 door panels, 12 poles, 1 lamp box, 1 sign board, 1 curtain rod, removed and remade woodwork for padded cells. Repairs: 4 locks, 2 sash cords, 3 chairs, 5 benches, 3 closets, 3 windows, 2 doors, 2 desks, 2 saw files, 8 knives sharpened.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT PRISONS.

New York, July 7, 1913.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending June 30, 1913.

At Second District Prison by paid labor completing the repairs on water main and installing new curb box valve and rod, this work necessitated the opening of the street, and the labor thereon needed took two weeks, and the work was satisfactorily done and the pavement restored to its proper aspect. The work done by the staff during the last quarter was the general overhauling of the entire plumbing system throughout the prison, also general repairs were done to Fairbanks' scale; the new material consisted of 113 feet of yellow pine joice, 3 inches by 8 inches wide, and 6 pounds of No. 60 penny nails. The material used in overhauling the boilers was furnished by the department and the work was done by staff, consisting of 5 pounds rainbow packing, 5 pounds square flax packing, 5 pounds of gailock packing, the fireplace renewed, 50 fire bricks, ½ barrel fire clay. The Duparquet, Hoot & Moneuse kitchen range was repaired and new part furnished thereto.

At Fourth District Prison general renovating and painting of prison prior to its reopening for business, in remodeling the court room a new iron stairway has been built, leading direct from the court pen to the prison.

Prior to the remodeling of the court house, prisoners were received from the court to prison by a wooden stairway leading from the corridor of the court to the prison, as this part of the building has been entirely eradicated for public use, owing to its dangerous condition in case of fire. This new iron stairway in yard of prison has been built in place of the wooden structure, an improvement which is worthy of mention.

At Fifth District Prison general repairs to plumbing, done by staff throughout the prison, new parts installed wherever necessary. The interior of prison was renovated, also the electric light system has been repaired and placed in first-class condition. The Department of Water Supply, Gas & Electricity having substituted in place of the Gem lamps a new supply of 25 watt plain Tungsten lamps, which improves the light to a higher degree and reduces the cost of power.

At Seventh District Prison a new cement sidewalk and runway was laid. This repair was most necessary, and, owing to the bad condition of the sidewalk, this improvement has proven a betterment to the conditions prevailing. Overhauling and repairing the plumbing system wherever necessary was done by staff with material furnished by the department.

The female prisoners transferred from the Work House to the District Prisons to serve their sentences are employed in cleaning, scrubbing and doing some laundry work in the institution.

The male prisoners are employed in cleaning, painting, cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find statements showing the disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending June 30, 1913; also the amount of moneys collected from fines and telephone receipts from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain, the Board of Health and the General Bookkeeper and Auditor of the Department in liquidation of monthly telephone bills.

REPORT OF THE BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKERS ISLAND.

During this quarter the following work was accomplished by the prisoners: 290 feet of concrete walk 11 feet wide and 5 inches deep was laid on a 14-inch bed of ashes, which had been well tamped and packed. A cement curb was made of the outer side. At the same point a catch basin was built to carry off the rain water, from the roads, and a gutter has been laid for a distance of 175 feet along the new walk.

The roads around the entire island have received constant attention, screened ashes being spread over them, the same wet down, tamped and rolled until at present they are in excellent condition. The road leading to the Chapel has been widened and received the same attention.

Over 1,000 loads of refuse have been removed from the field at the west end of the island, in doing which we not only removed this unsightly hill and made same a level field, but by dumping this refuse at the east end of the island one eighth of an acre of new ground has been made. The west side of the bank running north and south from the dock has been terraced and 150 loads of stone and ashes removed from same.

The beaches have been continually cared for and all refuse removed from same. Especial attention has been given to the farm this spring, a large gang of prisoners being worked on the same, two new fields have been opened up, making a total of twenty acres of ground farmed, in which the following space has been allotted: 1/4 of an acre, beets; 1 1/2, corn; 1/8, celery; 1/2, onion sets; 1/8, leeks; 1/8, sprouts; 1, lettuce; 1/4, muskmelon; 1/4, watermelon; 3/4, peas; 1/4, red peppers; 1/2, radish; 1/2, spinach; 1/4, New Zealand spinach; 2 1/2, tomatoes; 1/4, turnips; 1/4, pumpkins; 1/4, parsnips; 1/4, parsley; 1/2, onions; 2 1/2, cabbage; 2 1/2, beans; 1/4, cucumbers; 1/4, carrots; 1/8, rhubarb; 1-16, horseradish; 1 1/2, potatoes.

The following vegetables were received from the farm to date, viz.: 2,000 head of lettuce, 10 bushel green peas, 5,000 bunches radish, 1,000 bunches scallions, and 350 bunches rhubarb, of which the following were sent to the storekeeper on Blackwells Island, 10 bbls. lettuce, 3 bbls. radish, 75 bunches rhubarb, and 4 bushels green peas. As the season progresses shipments will be made daily or as often as possible.

Several beautiful flower beds have been laid out which add greatly to the appearance of the island. The lawns have received constant attention, the grass being cut and weeds, etc., removed. Three new lawns which were laid out this year and over which grass seed was sown are at present in first-class condition.

The buildings also have received such repairs as was possible to be done by prisoners, such as painting, carpenter work, plumbing, tinroofing, etc. The Chapel has been entirely renovated, a new entrance consisting of a half round stoop and portico being built; two new windows were put in on the altar and covered with windowphaine to represent stained glass; the balance of the windows, eleven in number, were also covered with a plainer quality of windowphaine. The interior of this building was painted, the floor and benches stained, and new carpet laid on same. These improvements have long been necessary and both Clergymen have expressed their appreciation of the improved appearance.

A barge of coal containing 289 ton was unloaded and stored at the rear of the prisons.

During the quarter the prisoners have been constantly employed and their health has been excellent.

Painters—Dormitory No. 1, painted and trimmed; office of building two coats; roof and leaders painted one coat; foundation walls whitewashed.

Dormitory No. 2, roof and leaders painted one coat and foundation walls whitewashed.

Mess Hall, officers' and prisoners' kitchens and officers dining room trimmed and painted two coats; roof and leaders of Mess Hall and Kitchen painted one coat.

Storehouse, outside of building painted and trimmed, one coat; roof and leader pipes painted one coat; foundation walls whitewashed.

Doctors' Quarters and Hospital, outside of building trimmed and painted one coat.

Keepers' Quarters, outside of building including roof and leaders trimmed and painted one coat, and foundation walls whitewashed.

Head Keepers' House, roof and leader pipes trimmed and painted one coat; outside of building trimmed and painted two coats; floors of porches and screens painted one coat; foundation walls whitewashed.

Office B ilding, outside of building, roof and leaders painted one coat; interior trimmed and painted two coats; floor painted and varnished; also chairs cleaned and varnished.

Chapel, interior side walls, ceiling, window frames and doors of church trimmed and painted two coats, and both Chaplains' rooms varnished. Altar, altar rail, two tables, four chairs, and one stand stained and shellaced, floor and benches stained and varnished, 14 windows varnished with Demar varnish over windowphaine.

Stable, outside of building including roof and leader pipes, trimmed and painted one coat, interior 20 stalls whitewashed.

Blacksmith's shop, outside of building including roof and leader pipes trimmed and painted one coat.

Boatman's house, outside of building, including roof and leader pipes, painted two coats, porch and floor of same also trimmed and painted two coats.

Oil sheds, outside of building including roof trimmed and painted one coat.

Miscellaneous: Whitewashed base of 250 trees, 100 spiles at dock, backs of 20 signs, and the letters, "Department of Correction, Rikers Island."

Painted 14 benches, grained and varnished 28 chairs, 10 benches, and 4 tables.

Stained and varnished interiors of cabin, summer cabin and pilot house of launch "Josephine Whitney"; one coat of stain and two coats of varnish, painted inside of hull with one coat of red lead, outside of cabins and roof painted two coats, hull painted two coats, below water line two coats of copper paint, deck of this launch received two coats of hard finish.

Carpenters—Dormitory No. 1, floor and partitions in bath room repaired, new hinges on front door, 10 new window lights put in, also 10 sash cords.

Dormitory No. 3, four windows repaired and 11 new lights put in.

Dormitory No. 4, built new stoop and door at rear entrance.

Church, removed two windows from altar and replaced same with two, made to represent a stained glass window. Built a half round stoop and portico at entrance, made eight new kneeling benches, repaired altar rail and put in six lights of glass.

Hospital, built new stoop at entrance, broke out partitions and made one large clothes room, repaired floor, put new hinges on door, also lock. Put in four new lights of glass and five sash cords.

Shops, built new stoop at entrance, removed partition and built shop 50 feet longer, changed door frame from west to east side of building.

Miscellaneous, constructed shed for new truck, made 7 bread boxes, 6 benches, and one large table for officers' quarters. Repaired office door, including new lock on same, also repaired front door and stoop of boatman's house.

Plumbers and Tinsmiths—Dormitory No. 1, repaired four hoppers and two tanks, and put in four new faucets in bath room.

Dormitory No. 3, repaired two hoppers and put in one faucet in bath room, also repaired sewer in cellar, putting in four lengths of 4-inch earthen pipe.

Laundry: Repaired eight traps under tubs, and also repaired sewer pipe, putting in 20 feet of 4-inch pipe.

The roofs of the following buildings were repaired: Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, mess hall, hospital, and keepers' quarters.

Blacksmiths: Iron bars placed on one window in annex, and also on one window in new clothes room. Six openings made in each door of four dark cells; 14 horses shod; put heavy chain on float to secure launch at night time.

Laundry: Washed and ironed 3,000 outside shirts, 7,000 outside pants, 400 bed sheets, 2,100 pillow cases, also washed 4,800 undershirts, 3,600 underdrawers, and 8,000 pairs of socks for prisoners. Additional work for officers as follows: 210 pillow cases, 70 bed spreads, 22 pairs of blankets, washed and ironed, also 10,000 towels washed and ironed.

Shoemaker: 900 pairs of shoes repaired.

Plumber's Report—Put on complete new tin roof on Office Building, repaired roof on Female Prison and Keeper Brady's house, packed valves at Buildings Nos. 2, 4, and 5 and Subway, repaired main steam line and boiler in No. 5, repaired leaks in Engineers' Quarters, Ice House, Pavilions Nos. 4 and 5, Kitchen, Laundry and Ice House, put up and connected pumps in Boiler Room, recharged all fire extinguishers on Island, overhauled mangle in Laundry, put in new pump in back of Laundry, put in new water line in Warden's House, and for Gardener, repaired all doors and locks in Cooler, put in new waste water line in Ice House, repaired steam line in Subway, put in new toilets and wash room in Pavilion No. 4, made extensive repairs on Church, put in new line from old well at stone shed to Boiler Room, put in air line at Dynamo room, and steam line for Hot House, Reformatory, put up new railing at Pavilion No. 4, made repairs to boat Correction, put up watering trough on hill for horses, and made all necessary repairs around Island.

Blacksmith's Report—For Reformatory, sharpened 40 picks, and put on 48 feet



round iron; put 50 feet round iron in New York City Reformatory Greenhouse; made 24 hooks for Carpenter, repaired 1 ice tongs, 2 ox carts, 156 chisels, made 8 fire hoes, 4 straddle hooks, 1 extension wrench, 2 fire shakers, made 2 new sewer plates with rings and eye bolts, 4 lazy bars for Fireroom, 2 last trees for Shoeshop, made 16 angle irons for Hospital, 1 clasp and staples for Oil House, and 8 clasps and staples for Pavilion No. 5, made and placed 24 new bolts, repaired 4 hand trucks for Correction steamer, 2 rollers, 2 hooks to secure boats, repaired 2 ice trucks, 1 dead wagon, 1 cot steamer Correction wagon, 50 bed springs, put on 4 ash can handles, repaired 4 lever bars for Plumber, made 200 awning staples, 12 key pins, made fixtures for flag pole, repaired one stone mould, 3 packing irons for mould box, made 17 awning cleats for Reformatory Greenhouse, put on 296 horse shoes and 2,368 nails, and made all repairs necessary.

Mason's Report—Made concrete work at rear of Kitchen, made new cement floor, alterations on toilet and other repairs in Pavilion No. 4, plastered and repaired cement work and other repairs in Pavilion No. 5, made new foundation for 3 dynamos, also subway for steam pipe, cutting and repairing walls in Engine Room, making new foundation for extension to New York City Reformatory Building.

Painter's Report—Painted interior of Pavilions Nos. 2 and 5, exterior of Warden's cottage; Waiting Room at City Island dock, put in glass around Island and made all necessary repairs.

#### CITY PRISON, QUEENS BOROUGH.

Report of the Warden of the Prison.

Work Done by Contract or Open Market—On the main floor of the east wing of the administration building erected and installed oak office partitions with marble baseboard, desks, bronze grilles, etc., for the Warden's private office, reception office and general bookkeeping office making a decided improvement in the general aspect in that portion of the building; also in the same portion of the building laid terrazzo floors, etc.; also installed in private lavatory of Warden's office toilet complete with flushometer and all necessary connections, iron enameled basin with nickel plated supply and waste pipes, oval French plate beveled mirror, tiled the four (4) walls and laid terrazzo floor; on the main floor of the building between the administration building and men's prison laid terrazzo floor, etc., and also installed and erected oak office partitions with marble baseboards, etc., for receiving office, the general design the same as that of receiving office at the City Prison, Brooklyn; furnish and installed three (3) new oak doors and jambs and all necessary trim in main floor of administration building; furnished and installed one (1) kalamein door at main entrance to men's prison with frame, all necessary hardware, etc., with strong lock with three (3) keys; furnished and installed under floor of east wing of administration building about 130 feet of 12 inch vitrified sewer pipe for tunnel for steam pipes, etc.; installed new main steam line and return in tunnel aforesaid; repaired steam pipes in kitchen and connected same with vent pipe; repaired leak in steam pipe in lavatory adjoining kitchen; repaired faucets at sinks and tubs in Warden's apartments; installed new closet and flushometer in cell No. 416, men's prison, and one (1) new wall outlet with flushometer complete without seat in cell No. 115, men's prison, for the purpose of testing their durability, etc.; furnished and installed in the female prison one temporary private lavatory complete for the exclusive use of the Matrons; repaired all flushometers in women's prison and removing a sufficient number from the men's prison for the purpose of installing same in the female prison where same are missing; repaired several bath tubs and basins and cleaned waste pipes in women's prison.

Work Done By Prison Labor—The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and about the women's prison, the Warden's offices, general office and main corridor on the main floor of the administration building, mending clothing, bedding and doing such other work as may be deemed advisable.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and about the men's prison, kitchen and portion of the administration building, assisting in the cooking and distribution of the food; properly caring for the food; built several tables and benches for the mess room; two (2) tables for the counsel room; graded the entire prison yard and laid approximately 1,500 square feet of cement walk. Fines collected and cash bail received from prisoners committed from the Magistrates' Courts and the Court of Special Sessions of the Borough of Queens, respectively and deposited with the Chamberlain: First District Magistrate's Court, fines, \$121; cash bail, \$400. Second District Magistrate's Court, fines, \$55; cash bail, \$200. Fourth District Magistrate's Court, fines, \$9. Court of Special Sessions, fine, \$40.

Band and Violin Class—About 210 inmates are profiting by the instruction in the ordinary band instruments and the violin. There are fifty boys in the regular band, sixty in the second band, and thirty in the violin class.

Orchestra—There are about fifteen boys in the orchestra under the leadership of one of the inmates.

Scholastic Education—The regular classes are held daily. There are both morning and afternoon sessions. Library and reading from 7 to 8 p. m.

Military Drill—Calisthenic exercises and military drill from 7.30 to 8.15 a. m. daily.

Shoe Department (Repairing)—Those in this branch of the work are employed solely in repairing.

Tailoring Department—The inmates employed in this department prepare clothing for the institution, making new shirts, etc., and at the same time repairing and pressing the old work.

Plumbing Industry—The work of the plumbing class has been confined to the repairs in the different buildings of the Reformatory and in any new work necessary.

Painting Industry—The inmates of this department are occupied in practise work for beginners, at the same time receiving elementary instruction; and as advanced are put on work such as painting the interior of the school building, dining rooms, kitchen, pantries, etc.

Tinsmith Industry—The inmates have been occupied at their usual work under the instructor's care, also making new articles for this and other institutions of the department and repairing old work.

Carpentry Industry (Manual Training)—In this department the boys are taught the uses of tools and begin practise work. As advanced they are put on the general work of the Institution, which comprises new and repair work required in the different buildings.

Electrical Industry—Daily classes are held in the shop under the tutelage of the electrical instructor. They are put through a course in the various elements of magnetism and electricity. They are first instructed in the theory of which they then make practical application under the guidance of the instructor. They are given daily lessons whenever possible in the repairing of all the electrical work of the Institution.

Printing Industry—Our printing department is now doing all the printing matter for the Reformatory, also for other branches in the Department of Correction. The instructor of this department is daily giving instructions to the boys as how to set type, and how to distribute same in cases and also proof reading.

Gardening Industry—The general instruction in the gardening class are as follows: Sowing grass, flower and vegetable seeds, also transplanting flowers and planting flowers in beds and boxes.

Health of Inmates—The general health of the inmates has been good. Following are the number of hospital cases: 24 cases of chancroid; 40 cases of La Grippe; 10 cases of conjunctivitis; 8 cases of gonorrhoea; 3 cases of herpes; 4 cases of tuberculosis; 5 cases of scabies; 3 cases of eczema; 6 cases of poison ivy; 2 cases of otitis media; 1 case of hemorrhage; 3 cases of boils; 1 case of severe cold; 18 cases of diarrhoea; 3 cases of itch; 8 cases of constipation; 3 cases of pneumonia; 4 cases of bronchitis; 3 cases of carbuncle; 1 case of epileptic fits; 5 cases of pleurisy; 4 cases of syphilis; 1 case of dipsomania. Died, No. 2276, Victor Olsen; cause of death, intestinal obstruction.

Following are the number of hospital clinic cases: 10 cases of tuberculosis; 3 cases of syphilis; 4 cases of bronchitis; 15 cases of tonsillitis; 8 cases of scabies; 14 cases of boils; 3 cases of gonorrhoea; 7 cases of conjunctivitis; 6 cases of tooth-aches; 5 cases of rupture; 9 cases of piles; 5 cases of chancroid; 2 cases of rheumatism. 30 cases of constipation; 3 cases of heart disease; 20 cases of diarrhoea; 18 cases of sprains; 2 cases of weak kidneys; 22 cases of lacerations; 23 cases of burns; 15 cases of rash; 5 cases of broken arches; 6 cases of stys.

Spiritual Welfare—The spiritual welfare of the inmates has been carefully attended to by the Protestant, Hebrew and Catholic Chaplains of the Department. The attendance at the religious service has been usually large, though not compulsory.

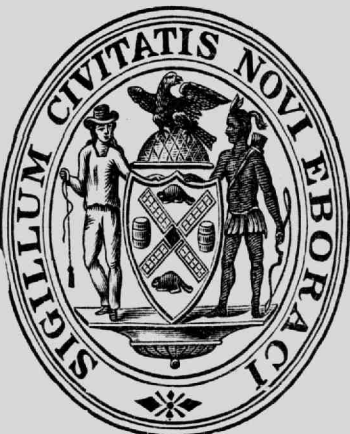

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness, any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
