MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Monday, Dec. 31, 1917, at 1:30 P. M.

Present—Benjamin Patterson, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meetings held Dec. 28 and 29 were approved.

The Commission then took up the case of Barbara Widder, an Examiner (per diem) in the office of the Commission, who appeared at a meeting held Dec. 28 to answer charges of conduct unbecoming an Examiner and subversive of proper discipline. The explanation made by Miss Widder having been unsatisfactory, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Acting Chief Examiner be and he is hereby directed not to assign any work of the Municipal Civil Service Commission to Barbara Widder, Examiner (per diem), for a period of one month from Dec. 31, 1917.

The Commission then took up the matter of the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the non-competitive class for the Departments of Public Charities and Health, which had been considered at a previous meeting. On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:
