A special meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby called for Friday, September 6, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Proposed Agreement Modifying Contract with the Underpinning and Foundation Company for the Construction of That Portion of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad Known as Section No. 2 of Route No. 20, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 1).

The Secretary presented a report of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, recommending approval of agreement modifying contract between The City of New York and the Underpinning and Foundation Company for the construction of that portion of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, known as Section 2 of Route 20, along Canal street in the Borough of Manhattan, said modifying agreement providing for the release to the contractor of all retained percentages under the contract, less \$20,000, which is to be retained by the City for the time being.

William Fullen, representing the Public Service Commission for the First District, appeared and requested that the matter be laid over.

The matter was laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Proposed Contract with A. W. King for Construction of Station Finish for a Part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, Routes Nos. 4 and 36, 49th Street and 57th Street Stations, Borough of Manhattan, and Issue of Corporate Stock Therefor (Cal. No. 2).

The Secretary presented the following:

State of New York, Public Service Commission for the First District, 49 Lafayette Street, New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District herewith transmits to you for your consent, as required by law, a proposed contract between The City of New York, acting by this Commission, and A. W. King, for the construction of Station Finish for a part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, Routes Nos. 4 and 36, 49th Street and 57th Street Stations.

The Public Service Commission for the First District requests your Honorable Board to consent to said contract herewith transmitted and to prescribe a limit to the amount of bonds available to meet the requirements of executing said contract, to wit, the sum of one hundred and fifty-three thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$153,262.25), and also to direct the Comptroller of The City of New York to issue the bonds of said City at such a rate of interest as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of said City may prescribe for the purpose of providing the necessary means for meeting the City's obligations under said contract, to wit, the sum of one hundred fifty-three thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$153,262.25).

The Public Service Commission for the First District does hereby, pursuant to section 45 of the Greater New York Charter, make request for the authorization of corporate stock for the full amount sufficient to pay the entire estimated expense to the City of executing such contract, to wit, the sum of one hundred and fifty-three thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$153,262.25). This requisition is a subrequisition on account of and not in addition to the requisition made by this Commission upon your Honorable Board for sixty million dollars (\$60,000,000), and the subsequent requisitions made upon your Honorable Board for the purpose of carrying out the contract dated March 19, 1913, known as Contract No. 4, between The City of New York, acting by this Commission, and the New York Municipal Railway Corporation for additional rapid transit railroads.

Gentlemen—On August 8, 1918, the Public Service Commission for the First District accepted, subject to the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the bid of Terry & Tench Co., Inc., for the construction of a temporary inspection shed in the vicinity of the Jerome Park Reservoir, on Section No. 2 of Route No. 16 of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The estimated cost of the contract is \$17,500, for which an appropriation of \$20,000 is requested, to provide for contingencies and extra work.

Contract No. 3, between The City of New York and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, under chapter 111, article VIII, provides for the construction by the City of necessary terminals, storage yards and shops. As the construction of the proposed storage yard in the vicinity of the Jerome Park Reservoir has been postponed on account of the war conditions, it is necessary to provide temporary facilities for the inspection and repair of cars.

Bids were asked for the construction of an inspection shed, with the understanding that bidders might submit an alternative plan, which would not materially differ from the requirements of that upon which bids were invited.

The contract provides that the contractor shall furnish all plant, tools, power, water, appliances, labor and material for the construction and completion of the temporary inspection shed, in accordance with the specifications annexed to and made a part of the agreement, and as indicated on the contract drawings, all to the satisfaction of the engineer.

Miscellaneous, New York City; President, Borough of Richmond—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 9).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated July 30, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Richmond, herein; and the following report of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller:

September 6, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Under date of July 30, 1918, the President of the Borough of Richmond requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to provide certain additional moneys, viz.:

For Code 774, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, an additional sum of.... \$10,797 05

For Code 800, Shoeing and Boarding Horses, including Veterinary Service, an additional sum of..... 664 00

Concerning this request I would advise as follows:

Code 774.

The budget for 1918 contained an appropriation of \$20,500 for Forage and Veterinary Supplies. Due to the increased prices of forage, this amount has proven insufficient, the deliveries under contracts for the first eight months of the year having practically exhausted the whole appropriation. The list given hereunder shows the prices on which the budget allowance was based, compared with the prices actually paid for the period from January 1 to August 31, 1918.

At the present time there is an unexpended balance in Code 774 of \$32.60, and at the prices now quoted (which are slightly lower than for the first eight months of the year) the forage needed for the balance of the year and to give a margin of safety of 15 days at the close of the year will, it is estimated, cost \$10,722.50. The amount of \$10,689.90 is therefore needed in addition to the balance remaining in the account. It is important that this amount be provided immediately, as the forage delivered under the contracts expiring August 31 is practically exhausted.

Code 800.

The amount of \$664 will be required to meet the needs of the Bureau of Street Cleaning. The total appropriated in the 1918 budget for Shoeing and Boarding Horses, including Veterinary Service, in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond, was \$3,800. Of this amount \$2,500 was allotted to the Bureau of Street Cleaning and \$386.50 additional has since been given to that Bureau, which is all that can be made available therefor from Code 800. Due principally to the fact that it has been necessary to pay at the rate of \$2.50 per month per horse for shoeing, whereas it was estimated at the time the 1918 budget was prepared that the cost would be but \$1.60 per horse per month, the expenses for shoeing and veterinary service for this Bureau will exceed the amount provided. If the present number of horses is continued for the balance of the year, the 1918 cost will be approximately:

From an examination of the accounts of the President of the Borough of Richmond it is evident that the amount of money required cannot be obtained by transfer within the accounts of that department. It is therefore recommended that the required sum be transferred from Code 3052, "Miscellaneous, Repairs and Replacements to Sidewalks," and I submit herewith a resolution which, if adopted by your Board, will effect this transfer. Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Report on Investigation of Prevailing Rate of Wages for Skilled Labor (Cal. No. 10).

(On May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 34), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 14, 1918, from the Labor League, and various communications from labor unions in Greater New York, herein; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

August 8, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On May 14, 1918, the Labor League of New York City requested the appointment "of a sub-committee from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of ascertaining officially the prevailing rates of wages and conditions of labor existing in private employment in positions similar to those of the union men employed direct by the City." (No. 34, Calendar of May 17, 1918.)

The Committee on Salaries and Grades reports as follows:

On May 24, 1918, the matter was referred by the Committee to the Secretary of the Board for investigation and report.

At a conference with the Secretary of the Board, Mr. Peter J. Brady, Secretary of the Labor League, agreed to present a complete list of occupations in the skilled trades in private employ in Greater New York, certified by an official of the Labor League, with rates paid as of June 1, 1918.

Mr. Brady at once transmitted to the Secretary a printed copy of wage scales setting forth the prevailing rates paid in private employ in 75 trades and specialized occupations of the Building Trades, nearly one-half of which are not in City employ. The wage rates were accompanied by printed copies of agreements with employers in four occupations for the payment of rates set forth. None of the wage scales was certified to.

On May 28, 1918, the Secretary of the Board wrote Mr. Brady for a specific statement of prevailing rates in the skilled trades in Greater New York, to be certified by the Secretary or President of the Labor League.

The Secretary of the Labor League replied that the proper business officer of the Unions in Greater New York has been requested to forward to every head of department where union members were employed, to the Secretary of the Board, and to every member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, a copy of the wage scale and working conditions contract in each trade.

The result was that a large number of wage circulars and petitions for increase in rates poured in to the Secretary of the Board and other City officials mentioned above, the applicants evidently having been encouraged by the general invitation extended by the Secretary of the Labor League.

Included in the requests for increases sent in were the following in City employ: Blacksmith, Boilermaker, Bridgeman and Riveter, Bookbinder, Baker, Compositor, Elevator Constructor, Flagger, Housesmith, Machinist, Marble Setter, Painter and Specialties, Pressman, Press Feeder, Plasterer, Pattern Maker, Rigger, Ship Carpenter, Ship Caulker, Stone Mason, Stationary Engineer, Steam Roller Engineer, Upholsterer, Varnisher, Wheelwright, Asphalt Worker, Blacksmith's Helper, Elevator Constructor's Helper, Fireman, Oiler.

Following is a complete list of per diem men in the skilled trades in City employ with rates paid as of August 1, 1918, rates claimed as prevailing, and rates recommended to be paid:

In the above tabulation no claim has been made for increases in rates in a number of the trades, and the rates now paid are enumerated, no change being recommended.

Investigation, however, shows that there have been increases in rates paid certain wage-earners, although no requests for increases in their wages have been presented.

For the information of this Board the following table is presented, showing the rates now paid by the City and the rates that appear to prevail in the trades referred to:

Stripers—Prevailing rate is \$5.50 per diem and they are included in the painters group.

Letterers—Prevailing rate is \$5.50 per diem and they are included in the painters group.

Grainers—Prevailing rate is \$5.50 per diem and they are included in the painters group.

Plasterers—The prevailing rate for plasterers is \$6 per diem. This rate is paid by firms and individuals employing a very large majority of plasterers. In fact there are very few plasterers receiving less than \$6 per diem.

Carpenters—The Carpenters employed in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, are paid the prevailing rate of \$5.50 per diem. Carpenters employed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, are paid \$5 or 50 cents less per diem. The prevailing rate for Carpenters is now \$5.50 per diem throughout Greater New York. The \$5 rate until recently was effective in all boroughs, except Manhattan, where the \$5.50 rate has prevailed.

Compositors—The rate for Compositors has been increased from \$28 to \$30 and is the prevailing rate in the printing trade.

Pressmen—Pressmen are now receiving \$31 instead of \$29 per week. The higher rate prevails in the printing trade, and was fixed by agreement between employers and labor unions representing the trade.

Ship Carpenters—The United States Shipping Commission and Arbitration Board fixed the rate for ship carpenters employed on government contracts at 70 cents per hour, \$5.60 per diem for 8 hours a day's work. This rate now prevails throughout the trade and over 90 per cent. of ship carpenters are now receiving \$5.60 per diem.

Ship Caulkers—Prevailing rates the same as ship carpenters, \$5.60 per diem.

Elevator Constructors—Elevator Constructors are now receiving \$5.96 per diem. This rate prevails and is paid by all the elevator companies. The workmen employed by the City are repairers, but repairers receive the same rate paid to members of the trade who construct elevators. The City men are skilled in all branches of the trade.

Elevator Constructor's Helpers—The prevailing rate for Elevator Constructor's Helpers is now \$3.98 per diem and is the rate paid by elevator companies.

Firemen—Firemen employed by the City are now paid \$3.50 per diem. Firemen employed by private individuals and firms are paid \$26 and \$27 per week for six days. The members of the General Contractors' Association are paying \$27 per week and the work is not continuous. The Firemen's Local Union request that Firemen employed by City be paid \$26 for 6 days work a week. It is recommended that \$4 per diem or \$28 a week for seven days' work be allowed for Firemen.

Oilers—The rate in private employ for Oilers is the same as that for Firemen. The request is that the oilers be paid at the same rate, \$26 per week. The \$4 per diem rate is recommended for Oilers.

Pattern Makers—The rate for Pattern Makers has been increased to 85 cents per hour or \$6.80 per diem for 8 hours, a day's work. The City is now paying \$5 per diem. The \$6.80 rate is paid to Pattern Makers who are the highest skilled in their trade and whose employment is generally on temporary work. The Pattern Makers employed by the City are first class workmen and are regularly employed. The prevailing rate for Pattern Makers of the same class and who are regularly employed is \$6 per diem, although many Pattern Makers are steadily employed at a higher rate. It is also a fact that there are members at the trade who receive less than \$6 per diem. The City men would seem to be entitled to \$6 per diem.

Blacksmiths—The City rate for Blacksmiths is \$5 per day. The request is for \$6.50 per day. There are several branches of this trade and the wages run from \$4.50, \$5, \$5.50, \$6 and \$6.50 per diem. The prevailing rate for Blacksmiths employed in the same kind of work as those employed by City is \$5.50 per diem. The higher rates are paid to Blacksmiths employed on building operations. The City work is chiefly of a repair character.

Blacksmith's Helpers—The prevailing rate is now \$4 per diem, an increase from the \$3.50 rate paid by City. The request is for \$4.50 per diem. The latter rate is only paid to those who are helpers to the highest paid Blacksmiths on building construction work.

Stationary Engineers—The City is now paying \$5 per day for Stationary Engineers. The prevailing rate for men of this trade in private employ is the \$5 rate. The Stationary Engineers who are receiving a higher rate in private employ are Compressor and Hoisting Engineers. The City rate for Pile Driving and Steam Roller Engineers is \$6 per diem.

Bakers—The City employs Bakers at rates as follows: Foreman Baker, \$1.380, without maintenance; Head Baker, \$1.260, without maintenance; 1 Baker, \$1.200, without maintenance; 6 Bakers, \$1.140, without maintenance; 2 Bakers, \$1.080 without maintenance.

The prevailing rates for Bakers and which are now paid to over 75 per cent. of the Bakers are as follows:

Foremen, \$35 per week; Bench Workmen, \$6.50 per day, broken time; Oven Men, \$7.50 per day, broken time; Oven Men, \$27 per week, regular work.

The prevailing rate for journeymen Bakers is \$27 per week. This rate is paid throughout the Greater City and is the result of agreement between the boss bakers and the Baker's local union. At a per diem rate it amounts to \$4.50 for 6 days a week, 8 hours a day.

Inasmuch as the Bakers employed by the City are on an annual salary basis, the following per annum rates are recommended for 1919 to meet the prevailing rates: Foreman Baker, \$1.800, without maintenance; Head Baker, \$1.440, without maintenance; Bakers, \$1.380, without maintenance.

The Foreman Baker has charge of the Blackwell's Island Bakery but he also is supervisor over all the bakeries and bread making under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities. Besides 10 paid employees, the Foreman Bakers supervise the work of 40 inmates employed as Laborers at the bakery. The Bakers employed at Blackwell's Island are Oven men, the highest type of Bakers and investigation shows that they are entitled to the prevailing rate of \$27 a week in so far as it can be paid on an annual salary basis.

The Head Baker at \$1,260 is employed at Kings County Hospital, where 2 Bakers are under him.

Bookbinders—Bookbinders' Local Union 1-3 has requested an increase in rate for Bookbinders, to be effective in the Budget for 1919. Employees in this craft are paid on a per annum basis. In private employ the rates prevailing for extra forwarders and coverers and extra finishers, the two branches of the trade combined in the services of those in City employ, are \$28 and \$32 a week. A fair per annum equivalent of the weekly rates would be \$1,500 per annum, which the Bookbinders request, an increase from \$1,260 per annum. The rate of \$1,500 per annum for Bookbinders is therefore recommended for 1919.

Letterers and Sign Painters in a communication request a \$6 rate. Previous to January 1, 1917, Painters received \$4 per diem, and Decorators, Letterers and other specialists \$4.50. In securing the present rate of \$5 per diem the Painters' Union insisted that all distinctions be eliminated. In recommending a uniform rate of \$5.50 all specialists in painting are therefore now included.

This Board has during the past 20 months approved increases in wages for the large majority of members of the organized trades in City employ. It is desirable to proceed with the business of the Board in an orderly manner. Requests for this purpose regularly presented through heads of departments will receive due consideration by this Board.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is of opinion that all applications for changes in rates for skilled trades in City employ should come through heads of departments, in order to preserve an orderly procedure in the consideration by the Board of requests emanating from organizations controlling rates in private employ, and that requests should be predicated upon some examination by the department head or his representative of the claims made by his employees or by trade unions for increase of wages.

Department of Docks—Increases in Wages of Electricians and Helpers (Cal. No. 11).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated August 13, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting copy of notice from the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, regarding increases in wages for Electricians from \$5.20 to \$6 per day, and for Helpers from \$2.50 to \$3 per day, effective as of August 1, 1918.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Prevailing Rate of Wages for Firemen and Oilers (Cal. No. 12).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated July 23, 1918, from the Secretary, Borough of Manhattan, transmitting notice received from the Eccentric Firemen, Local Union No. 56, of the prevailing scale of wages for Firemen and Oilers at the rate of \$26 per week.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

The Borough President asks that that rate be fixed for his office, that the necessary funds be provided for the payment thereof, and that schedule lines be modified.

President, Borough of The Bronx—Increase in Wages for Painters and Decorators (Cal. No. 15).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 10, 1918, from the President, Borough of The Bronx, enclosing copy of communication from the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers, containing notification of an increase in wages from \$5 to \$5.50 per diem for Painters and Decorators. The Borough President requests that action be taken by the Board to fix this new scale if it is found that the figure named is the prevailing rate.

Department of Plant and Structures—Increase in Wages for Painters and Decorators (Cal. No. 16).

Department of Docks—Increase in Wages for Painters, Etc. (Cal. No. 18).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to the notification received from the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers, stating that the wages of Painters and Decorators in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, have been increased from \$5 to \$5.50 per diem; also an additional communication, dated June 25, 1918, stating that Painters in his Department are being paid at the rate of \$5 per day, amounting to 62 1-2 cents per hour, which appears to be the rate at present being paid by contracting firms in the City of New York.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 16, 1918, and approved by the Mayor on July 26, 1918, requesting an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of forty-two thousand and five hundred dollars (\$42,500), the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of repaving with asphalt block pavement the space between the tracks and the rails of the tracks of surface railroads on certain streets in the Borough of Richmond, be and the same is hereby approved of and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding forty-two thousand and five hundred dollars (\$42,500), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the

year of their issue; all obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Parcel "N." Beginning at a point in the eastern line of West Farms road distant 82.19 feet southerly from the intersection of said line with the southern line of East 174th street; thence southerly along the eastern line of West Farms road on the arc of a circle 165.82 feet; thence northerly deflecting 84° 37' 24" to the left from the eastern prolongation of the radius of the preceding course, drawn through its southern extremity 97.98 feet; thence northerly deflecting 17° 47' 54" to the left 23.77 feet; thence northerly deflecting 9° 21' 26" to the left 24 feet; thence northerly 23.78 feet to the point of beginning.

Parcel "O." Parcel "P." Beginning at a point in the eastern line of West Farms road distant 372.14 feet northeasterly from the intersection of said line with the northern line of East 176th street; thence northeasterly along the eastern line of West Farms road 239.25 feet; thence southerly deflecting 86° 7' 20" to the right from the eastern prolongation of the radius of the preceding course drawn through its northern extremity 34.76 feet; thence southerly deflecting 15° 44' 40" to the right 41 feet; thence southwesterly deflecting 9° 49' 40" to the right 120 feet; thence southwesterly 46.02 feet to the point of beginning.

The parcels of West Farms road described above are parts of an old highway known as the road to Hunts Point, existing for over 200 years.

The parcels are located in block 2754 of Section 10 of the Land Map and blocks 2993, 3006, 3007, 3013, 3014, 3015, 3018, 3019, and 3021 of Section 11 of the Land Map of The City of New York.
