Resolved, That the Young American Benevolent Union be granted permission to hold a masked ball, at Pythagoras Hall, February 27, 1877, subject to the conditions of Rule 841.

Reports of the Inspectors, relative to the observance and enforcement of the Excise Law in their respective districts on Sunday, 14th instant, were ordered on file.

Communication from M. J. Shandley, in the matter of arrest of Charles McBride, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

Communication from P. M. Wilson, relative to his arrest, and a report of Inspector Dilks thereon, were referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

An application of Roundsman Michael Smith, Eighteenth Precinct, for permission to receive a reward of \$100, for the arrest and conviction of an illegal voter, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

Communication from Miner & Beebe, making complaint against Patrolman James N. Morey, Twelfth Precinct, for failure to arrest a man who had fired a pistol from a coach, and an affidavit of said officer relative thereto, were referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

An application of John O'Shaughnessy, for reappointment as Patrolman, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

Communication from James Riley, relative to condition of sidewalk in front of 414-426 West Thirty-first street, caused by water, was ordered to be forwarded to the Health Department, and a copy to the Department of Public Works.

Communication from Charles C. Mowton, Superintendent New York Gas-light Co., asking telegraphic connection with the Eighteenth Precinct Station-house, was referred to the Committee on Repairs and Supplies.

Resolved, That Patrolman Jacob R. Wilkins, Fourth Precinct, be and he is hereby transferred to the Thirty-third Precinct, for duty therein.
