

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1885.

Headquarters Fire Department—City of New York, Nos. 155 and 157 Mercer Street, Office Board of Commissioners, New York, April 20, 1885.

To the Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor of New York:

SIR—We have the honor to submit herewith the report of the operations and actions of this Department for the quarter ending March 31, 1885:

Changes in and Present Organization of the Uniformed Force.

Engine Company No. 53, to consist of one Foreman, one Assistant Foreman, one Engineer of Steamer, one Assistant Engineer of Steamer and eight Firemen, was organized January 14, 1885, located in the new quarters on One Hundred and Fourth street, between Lexington and Third avenues, and assigned to the Eleventh Battalion. It was equipped with one steam fire-engine, (formerly spare engine of the Tenth Battalion), drawn by two horses, and one four-wheel tender, to be drawn by two horses.

The company was immediately assigned to duty.

As thus changed, the company organization, complement of officers and men, kind and number of apparatus and number of horses, were as follows: The number of alarms responded to and number of fires each company performed duty at, is also given in this table:

The above companies are organized into twelve battalions, each consisting of from four to nine companies, commanded by a Chief of Battalion; the Assistant Chief of Department commanding the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Battalions, and the Second Assistant Chief of Department commanding the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh and Twelfth Battalions; the entire force being under the command of the Chief of Department.

NOTABLE FIRES.

January 24.—Steamboat "St. John" of the People's Line, New York and Albany, lying at Pier 41, North river, near the foot of Canal street, 417 feet long, 81 feet beam and 9½ feet depth of hold. The cause could not be definitely ascertained, but was probably carelessness of workman engaged in repairing. Originated in or near water-closets on port side of saloon deck, amidships. The first alarm was received at 2.15 A.M., and required the services of thirteen engine companies (including both floating engines) and five hook and ladder companies to extinguish it. Two of the engine companies were delayed by frozen hydrants. The vessel was considerably damaged, and the fire was under control in an hour. Loss, \$200,000.

February 4.—Nos. 51 and 53 Barclay street, five-story, 50 by 200 feet, brick with marble front, situated on the northeast corner of Barclay street and College place, and extending through to Park place, and occupied as a lithographic establishment. The fire was caused by carelessness of employee using benzine, which ignited, and setting fire to his clothing burned him severely. It originated on the third floor and extended to the fourth and fifth floors, considerably damaging the building. The fire-alarm was received at 6.35 P. M., seventeen engines with two water-towers and four hook and ladder companies were at work, and the fire was under control in three hours. Fireman James P. Smith, of Engine Company No. 17, fell from a ladder to sidewalk and was instantly killed. Loss, \$124,650.

February 5.—Nos. 108 to 114 Wooster street, six-story, 100 by 90 feet, brick with iron front. The fire originated in the cellar, which was occupied as a chemical manufactory, the basement of No. 108 being in flames when the fire was discovered. The cause could not be ascertained. The first alarm was received at 12.14 A.M., and the services of seventeen engine and four hook and ladder companies were required. The fire was under control in three hours. The building was destroyed, and by the falling of its walls the four-story brick building No. 116 Wooster street (adjoining on the north) was considerably damaged, and the one-story frame building No. 113 Wooster street (opposite) was slightly damaged. Loss, \$271,550.

February 20.—Nos. 224 to 322 West Thirty-seventh street eight story, brick Los by 60 feet.

Wooster street (opposite) was slightly damaged. Loss, \$271,550.

February 20.—Nos. 324 to 332 West Thirty-seventh street, eight-story, brick, 125 by 60 feet, occupied as a safe manufactory, and connected by passage-ways on the upper floors with a rear building used as a stable, etc. Neither the cause or place of origin could be definitely ascertained, although a watchman was in the building at the time, who was, however, himself notified by a neighbor that the building was on fire. The first alarm (sent by special building signal, with which system the premises were connected) was received at 2.28 A. M. The services of sixteen engine, one water-tower and five hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in three hours. The main building was destroyed, and the fire extended to the rear building, which was considerably damaged, to the one-story frame dwelling No. 322 West Thirty-seventh street, which was also considerably damaged, and to the two five-story brick tenements Nos. 320 and 334 West Thirty-seventh street, respectively 25 by 60 and 25 by 80 feet, which were slightly damaged. Loss, \$142,000.

February 21.—Nos. 16 and 18 South William street, four-story brick building, 40 by 85 feet, occupied as a restaurant and dwelling. The cause of the fire was floor-beams igniting from defective grate on the first floor. The first alarm was received at 11.09 P. M., and the fire, requiring the services of eleven engine companies, one water-tower and four hook and ladder companies, was under control in one hour. Police Officer James Murray with his family, consisting of his wife and three children, were suffocated before the arrival of the Department. Three other occupants were rescued by members of the Department by the use of scaling ladders, one of them having been severely burned. Fireman Lyons, of Engine Company No. 10, while upon a scaling ladder was overcome by heat and fell from the third story, sustaining severe injuries. One of the companies was delayed by a frozen hydrant. Loss. \$20,200.

March 27.—Nos. 66 and 68 Duane street, six-story brick building, 30 by 100 feet, occupied as a blank book manufactory, etc. The fire was probably caused by spontaneous combustion of oily rags on the third floor, and extended to the roof, considerably damaging the building. The first alarm was received at 12.11 A.M., and the services of eleven engine companies, one water-tower and four hook and ladder companies were required during the fire, which was under control in one hour and a quarter. Loss, \$70,000.

March 29.—Nos. 32 to 36 Bleecker street, five and six story brick building, 75 by 100 feet, situated on the southwest corner of Bleecker and Mott streets, and occupied as a lithographing establishment. The fire was caused by spontaneous combustion of oily rubbish carelessly thrown into the waste-paper room in the basement. From thirteen to fifteen minutes of the most valuable time was lost by the vain efforts of the watchman to extinguish the fire before sending the alarm. The first alarm was received at 6.25 P. M., and the fire, which required the services of sixteen engine and four hook and ladder companies and one water-tower (which was slightly damaged by falling bricks, etc.), was under control in three hours. The fire extended to the roof throughout the western part of the building, and to the two upper floors in the remaining part. Damage to the building considerable. Loss, \$150,000.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 65 visits were made, and 43 disinfections,

and 15 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 9.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,936, of which 1,205 were primary and 731 re-vaccinations

There were seized and condemned 7,985 pounds of meat and 11,850 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 118, and the amount of fines imposed was \$25.

The certificates of 479 births, 56 still-births, 200 marriages, and 657 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 16, 1885. This shows a decrease of 62 births, 91 marriages, and 48 deaths, and an increase of 18 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 29 births, 3 still-births, and 41 deaths, and a decrease of 85 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 20; croup, 11; typhoid fever, 3; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 8; heart diseases, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 17; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 14; gastritus, enteritis and peritonitis, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 20; premature and preternatural births, 4; drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 2; diphtheria, 2; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrheal diseases, 6; inanition, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 9; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 2; and suicide, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough, erysipelas, cerebro-spinal fever, aneurism, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 140 were in institutions, 356 in tenement-houses, 151 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 181 on the second, 115 on the third, 68 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 657 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 68 were stated to be single, 179 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 333 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 657; still-births, 56; bodies in transitu, 20; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 83 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 479 births, 200 marriages, 56 still-births, 657 deaths; 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 122 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 0 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 92 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 16, 1885, was 58.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.922, the mean humidity was 52, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,073, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.03 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
