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NEW YORK AND BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

Report for the Year ending May 30, 1886.

To the Board of Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge:

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending May 30, 1886, upon the income and maintenance account of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, showing that the gross receipts from traffic in the year ending with the above date, the third in the public use of the Bridge, were \$680,466.87, divided as follows: Promenade, \$18,777.37; Carriageway, \$60,728.45; Railroad, \$600,961.05. The comparison of the receipts with the previous years is as follows:

The total receipts from the traffic of the Bridge to the date of this report were \$1,648,749.33.

The total number of passengers using the Bridge on the promenade and railroad to the date of this report was 51,537,657.

The increase of the receipts from tolls in the year ending May 30, 1886, over the receipts for the year ending May 30, 1885, was \$115,122.41, or 20 1-5 per cent.

The increase of the number of passengers using the Bridge in the year ending May 30, 1886, over the number for the year ending May 30, 1885, was 10,130,957, or 67 3-4 per cent.

The receipts, other than from tolls, were \$5,943.33, of which amount \$3,342.73 was from the Receiver of the Atlantic State Bank, for interest on the money deposited in the bank at the time of its failure; \$1,180.62 was from the Brooklyn Trust Company, and \$731.04 was from the Long Island Bank for interest, and \$688.94 was for labor and material sold. The gross receipts for the year ending May 31, 1886, were \$686,410.20; the gross receipts for the year ending May 31, 1885, were \$568,025.26. The gross expenditures in the year ending May 31, 1886, were \$820,601.43. This sum included \$270,000 paid to the cities of New York and Brooklyn, as provided by the Law of 1875, chapter 601, section 4. The payments were as follows:
