

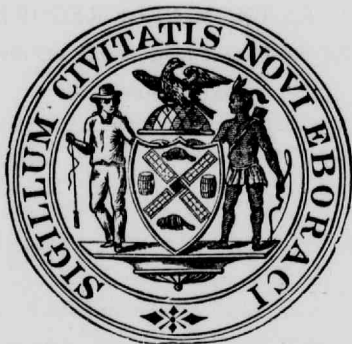

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held March 19, 1879,
Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meetings held March 12 and 15 were read and approved.

A communication was received from William R. Renwick to inclose the spur on the north side of Pier, old 35, North river, with a shed, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to William R. Renwick, occupant of portion of Pier, old 35, North river, to erect and maintain, during the pleasure of this Board, on the addition of spur on the north side of said pier, for which permission was granted on the 12th inst., a shed and other structures for the protection of property received and discharged thereat by steam transportation, said shed, etc., to be constructed subject to the regulations of the Superintendent of Buildings, as required by chapter 249, Laws of 1875, and the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action as stated, to wit:

From Police Department—In reference to repairs needed to certain piers and bulkheads on the East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report as to the repairs necessary to be made to bulkheads at Pier 27, and between Piers 44 and 45, East river.

From Henderson Brothers—In reference to the necessity for having dredging done at Pier, new 46, North river, occupied by them. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report to what extent dredging is necessary to be done at said premises, in order to accommodate their vessels.

From Engineer-in-Chief—In reference to the repairs needed at Pier 33, North river, and the foul condition of the slip at Pier 29, and for the necessity of having dredging done thereat. William R. Renwick, owner of the north side of Pier 33, requested to be present at the next meeting, in reference to the repairs required to be made to said pier.

From Clark & Allen—For permission to place two grain hoppers on bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river. Commissioners to visit premises.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From Hudson River Yacht Club—To erect boat-house at Seventy-fourth street, North river. Application denied, as this Department has no power to permit the water-front of the city to be used for the purposes designated.

From John English—To sublet portion of ferry premises at Roosevelt street, East river, for a flour store. Application denied, as this Department has no power to permit the premises to be used for the purposes stated.

From B. F. Cushman—Application to erect dumping board at Hoboken street, North river. Application denied, as it does not appear that any necessity exists for the erection of an additional dumping place on that portion of the water-front.

From William H. Kirby, offering to sell a quantity of pine piles to the Department, 65 to 75 feet in length. Applicant informed that this Department is not in need of any piles at present.

From New Haven Steamboat Company, lessees of Pier 25, East river—To have dredging done by this Department, at the slip on the south side thereof. Application denied, as by the terms of the sale, held March 7, 1876, under which the lease of the premises was purchased, it was distinctly advertised that all the premises were to be taken in the condition in which they were in on the 1st May, 1876, and that all repairs and rebuilding thereof, and dredging thereat, during the term leased, was to be done at the cost and expense of the lessee.

From Edward Cooper, Mayor, inclosing copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen, in reference to setting aside the pier at Gansevoort street, North river, for the use of vessels bringing produce to the market established on the Gansevoort property. The Secretary directed to acknowledge receipt of said communication, and to advise in reply, that under existing statutes, neither this Department nor the Common Council is empowered to set apart any of the said wharf property of the City for the purposes named, but in order to facilitate the business of the proposed market, this Department withdrew from the sale held 13th instant the lease of the pier at Gansevoort street, North river, and that the Department is empowered either to dispose of the lease of said pier at public auction, or to make collection daily for wharfage accrued, and it has determined to collect wharfage from all vessels using said pier, instead of disposing at public sale of the right to make such collections for the present.

From White Star Line of Steamers, lessees of Piers, new 44 and 45, North river, stating the bad condition of the approach to said premises. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs to said approach.

From Police Department, stating their willingness to make repairs to pier at Thirty-seventh street, North river, occupied by its dumping board, provided this Department will furnish them some old material. Engineer-in-Chief directed to deliver to said Department some of the old material on hand, in order to repair said pier, and to report to the Board the quantity and value of the material so delivered.

From R. J. Cortis, agent, White Star Line, lessee of Piers, new 44 and 45, North river—In reference to the releasing of Thomas E. Broadway, surety on their lease. Applicant informed that this Department sees no objection to the substitution of a surety in place of Mr. Broadway, provided he shall in all respects be satisfactory to this Board.

From Engineer-in-Chief—

1. Report as to work performed during week ending March 15, 1879.

2. Report as to obtaining from the Department of Public Works plans of sewer outlets, etc., on the North river, between Warren and Canal streets. The Secretary directed to address a communication to Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works, requesting that officer, at his earliest convenience, to furnish this Department with full and complete plans of the marginal sewers, with all outlets or overflow sewers, as they are to be built between Warren and Canal streets, North river, in order that the bulkhead wall, to be built by this Department between said streets, may be planned and constructed in accordance with the requirements of the plans for sewer outlets, etc., as determined upon by his Department; and as this Department is about to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead-wall in the locality above referred to, for that reason it is requested that the plans for sewers, etc., be furnished as soon as possible.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, asking to be informed if any telegraph wires insulated with gutta-percha are in use by the Department of Docks, and if so, to what extent they are used, etc.; and, being read,

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to report if any telegraph wires as described are in use by the Department, their extent, and the amount of business transacted over them; and the Secretary directed, upon receipt of the report, to advise the Comptroller in conformity therewith.

An application of Rosewell G. Rolston, Trustee, was presented by John R. Whiting, Attorney, asking that permission be granted for the construction of a bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, within the established bulkhead line, and to fill in the triangular

space thus created, with solid filling, he claiming that the land under water to be reclaimed is private property; and, being heard at length in reference to said application,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit said application to the Counsel to the Corporation, together with a memorandum of the title of the property, and a tracing showing its location, and stating that the petitioner desires to use the land lying under water when improved for his own purposes, that the plans adopted by this Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the improvement of the water front of the city do not extend on the East river above Grand street, and consequently the exterior bulkhead and pier line in the locality referred to, remain as they were established prior to the passage of the act creating the Department of Docks, and that the bulkhead proposed is to be built within the established bulkhead line, and requesting that he advise this Board in writing as to its power to grant the permission asked for, in case no objection to the improvement should present itself, and upon what terms and conditions the same should be granted.

A communication was received from the Finance Department, returning the bill transmitted there by this Department for the expense incurred in draping the offices of the Department in honor of the late President Jacob A. Westervelt; and, being read, was,

On motion, referred to Commissioner Vanderpoel.

A communication was presented by Jeremiah Towle, in reference to the title to the water-front at Sixty-first street, East river, and inclosing—

1st. Affidavit of Jeremiah Towle, dated March 20, 1879;

2d. Copy of an affidavit of John C. Beekman, dated March 8, 1855;

3d. Certified copy of a report of Abraham Bloodgood, Brigham Howe, and Thomas Herrins, Commissioners, relative to the opening of Sixty-first street, from Third avenue to East river, dated July 8, 1828; and

4th. Printed Document No. 42, Board of Aldermen, under date February 14, 1848.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to forward said communications and inclosures to the Counsel to the Corporation for his consideration, and calling the attention of that officer to the communication addressed him by this Department on June 1, 1877, in reference to the title of the property at Sixty-first, East river.

The Secretary stating that the right to collect and retain all wharfage accruing at the following named piers and bulkheads had been sold to the highest bidders therefor, as named below, at public sale held by James M. Oakley & Co., auctioneers, on 13th instant, pursuant to the action of the Board on 19th ultimo, and for the terms and prices as stated opposite each lot respectively, to wit:

ON NORTH RIVER.

Lot 1. Pier, old 42, and bulkhead adjoining southerly side at Hoboken street, to Edgar W. Youmans, for one year from May 1, 1879, at \$4,500 per annum, upset bid \$4,500.

Lot 3. Pier at West Thirty-fifth street (except reservation on northerly side for berth for public bath during summer season), to Scott & Co. for one year, from May 1, 1879, at \$2,900 per annum, upset bid \$2,500.

Lot 4. Pier at West Fifty-fifth street (these premises will not be repaired or dredged by the Department, and the purchaser of this lot will be required to take the premises in the condition in which they may be on the 1st May, 1879), to Western Union Telegraph Co., for one year from May 1, 1879, at \$600 per annum, upset bid \$600.

Lot 5. Pier at West Fifty-seventh street (no dredging will be done at these premises by the Department), to Frederick Schecker, for one year from May 1, 1879, at \$1,525 per annum, upset bid \$1,000.

Lot 6. Pier at West Eleventh street, and bulkhead extending easterly from southerly side thereof to west line of West street, to Chas. E. Boardman, for three years from May 1, 1879, at \$4,500 per annum, upset bid \$4,500.

Lot 9. Pier at West Seventy-ninth street, except reservation of northerly half when required for landing material for City Departments (no dredging will be done at these premises by the Department), to Thomas Fitzpatrick, for three years from May 1, 1879, at \$400 per annum, upset bid \$250.

Resolved, That the sale of the said right at the said several lots of wharf property, upon the terms as reported by the Secretary, be and is hereby approved and confirmed, and the officers of the Board be and are hereby authorized and empowered to execute the necessary leases therefor when prepared and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation.

PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR other Illuminating Material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing, and Maintaining the Public Lamps (and supplying Gas, etc., for New Lamps when required) on the Streets, Avenues, Piers, and Places in the City of New York, under the care and charge of the Department of Public Works, excepting the Twenty-third Ward, and that portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward formerly known as the town of West Farms, for the period of one year, commencing May 1, 1879, and ending April 30, 1880, both days inclusive.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and chapter 125 of Laws of 1878, and Revised Ordinances of 1859, chapter 8, article 2, and included in a sealed envelope indorsed "Proposals for furnishing the Illuminating Material for, and Lighting and Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining the Public Lamps," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works until 12 o'clock M. of Monday, April 7, 1879, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or proposal, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for his faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by section 27,

article 2, chapter 8, of Revised Ordinances of 1859, or organizing the Municipal Government of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture; and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen candle power by photometrical test, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, crossheads, lamp-irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1, 1879, to April 30, 1880, both days inclusive; stating the price for the above named period of one year for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and relighting, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.

For each column relighted, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.

For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of lamps to be contracted for is about nineteen thousand.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than illuminating gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made, in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alterations shall be done, and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is four thousand hours.

The amount of security required is \$60,000 on all contracts, which will amount to \$100,000, or more, and on smaller contracts the security shall be sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be readvertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless a written permission shall have been previously obtained from the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works.

The right is reserved to determine and designate to any bidder, whose bid shall be accepted, the number and location of the lamps to be lighted by such bidder, in any portion of the city for which proposals are received, and to increase or diminish such number.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits, or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of the Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offal dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease, or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
