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### APPROVED PAPERS.

#### Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending March 29, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to E. A. & M. D. Currier to erect and keep ornamental lamp-post and lamps, not to exceed the dimensions prescribed by law, in front of No. 144 Fulton street, the work to be done and gas supplied at their own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 11, 1879.

AN ORDINANCE to secure the right of way to ambulances belonging to the Department of Public Charities and Correction and to incorporated hospitals in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The ambulances belonging to the Department of Public Charities and Correction and incorporated hospitals in the City of New York shall have the right of way in the streets of said city as against all persons, vehicles, or animals, when conveying any patient or injured person to any hospital in the city, or when proceeding to the scene of any accident by which any person or persons have been injured; and any person refusing to yield the right of way, where it is possible, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished pursuant to the provisions of sections 20 and 21 of chapter XL, Laws of 1833, and the provisions of section 5 of article IV., Laws of 1853; and the Commissioners of Police are hereby required to enforce, rigidly, the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, March 25, 1879, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Whereas, The necessity for a readjustment of the relations existing between railroad corporations and the public, on a new basis, will be admitted by all, save stockholders in railway companies. The general railroad law of this State was passed nearly thirty years ago, when this system of transportation was in its infancy and in need of the fostering care of the State Government. It was called into being by the creation of the New York Central and Erie Railways by the State of New York, and was intended as an auxiliary to its own system of water transportation. For years after it was engaged in a struggle for existence, but owing to the fostering care and protection of the State, extended with a too lavish hand, it has now grown to such portentous proportions as to be the dominating power in the State Government; and

Whereas, A due regard for the welfare of the people of this State and city, and a proper attention to their interests, demands that action should be taken by the State and city authorities, in union with representatives of the several commercial, manufacturing, and other interests, to attempt the task of bringing about a readjustment of the relations now existing between the State and these giant corporations that monopolize the carrying business within its limits, and at their own will and pleasure, in the exercise of the despotic and dangerous power they now possess, can and do arbitrarily, unnecessarily, and unjustly add to the cost of nearly every article of domestic production that enters into the daily consumption of our people; and

Whereas, While it cannot be denied that these monopolies, the creatures of the State, and the beneficiaries of its people have, as was intended they should, added very materially to the wealth and prosperity of the State, it is equally undeniable that their own private interests, and the value to them of the public franchises they control, have precedence in all cases, and that the interests of the public are only of secondary, if of any importance whatever, to them in the management and control of this property. The reverse should be the case. The interests of the public, when both interests are not mutual or identical, should be first considered and have precedence. This can only be effected after a revision of existing statutes and the enactment of new laws having this object in view. With a view, therefore, of obtaining the desired legislation, which can be secured only after the most persistent efforts on the part of the people, and a continued agitation of this question, so vital to their interests; be it

Resolved, That the Committee on Railroads be and is hereby instructed to tender the aid of the Common Council of the City of New York to the Board of Trade and Transportation, the Chamber of Commerce, the Produce Exchange, and the other associations of our citizens interested in or connected with the vital question of "Taxation for Transportation" within this State, and to concur with them with a view of securing the united and harmonious action of all concerned in the efforts to correct the evils and abuses of the present system of transportation, and in making a combined effort to make the interests of the people of this State and city paramount and of greater importance than the interests of private individuals or corporations.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to memorialize the Legislature of this State, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, praying for an amendment to the act, chapter 125, Laws of 1878, so as to authorize and empower the Board authorized to make and enter into contracts for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the City of New York with gas, to include the public parks of said city; and to that end that he be and is hereby also requested to transmit a copy of such memorial and amended act to the State Legislature, now in session, at his earliest convenience.

Whereas, At midnight on the 25th of November last the steamship Pommerania, on her outward trip from this port, collided with the British barge Moel Eilian, and was sunk in the British Channel, and for several days it was supposed that her brave commander, Captain Hans F. Schwensen, the last living human being on the steamer, had perished and gone down with his ship; and

Whereas, The escape of the captain, by which he was restored to this world for future usefulness, was certainly providential, and is a subject for sincere congratulations to his many friends; and

Whereas, The undaunted bravery and courage and heroic fortitude shown on this trying occasion by Captain Schwensen, who, regardless of personal safety, battled with death on every side for the safety of his passengers and crew, entitles him to the esteem and confidence of all mankind; and

Whereas, According to present information Captain Schwensen will arrive at this port in the early part of April next, in command of the steamship Selisia; therefore be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of five members of this Board, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed to receive Captain Schwensen on his arrival in this city, and to tender him the congratulations of the people and government of the City of New York, and the use of the Governor's Room, in the City Hall, on any day that may best suit his convenience to receive personally the felicitations of his friends and our citizens generally;

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and resolutions be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated by the signatures of his Honor the Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen, the corporate seal affixed, and attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and presented to Captain Hans F. Schwensen, as a recognition of his bravery and fidelity, and as a slight token of the respect of the people of the City of New York.

Whereas, Since the passage of said resolution officers of the United States have requested that, in addition to the purposes for which it was provided by said resolution that said premises should be used, the said United States should have the liberty to use and occupy such premises for public purposes other than those mentioned in said resolution;

Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That said resolution be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Mayor and Clerk of the Common Council do execute and deliver to the United States of America a proper deed of conveyance, to be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, of all the estate, right, title, and interest of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York in and to the triangular piece of land, being that portion of the grounds commonly known as the Battery, in the City of New York, lying westwardly of and adjoining the lands now belonging to the United States, and between such lands and the slip or basin in the said Battery known as the New Whitehall boat slip.

That said conveyance be made for and upon such pecuniary consideration, nominal or otherwise, as shall be agreed upon by and between the United States and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City and County of New York, and upon the proviso and condition to be embodied in said conveyance that said lands, or so much thereof as may be required by the United States, shall be filled in wholly by and at the expense of the United States, and that the filling in and construction of the exterior wall of the Battery extension in front of the lands so conveyed shall be made by and at the expense of the United States, such exterior wall to be equal in character and quality to that in front of the other portion of the said Battery extension; and also upon the proviso and condition that the title thereby conveyed shall revert to the city whenever the said premises shall cease to be used and occupied by the United States for a barge office and other suitable buildings and structures for the transaction of public business connected with the United States revenue service, or other business of the United States Government, and for the landing of revenue and other Government boats and barges for the use, convenience, and accommodation of the United States Custom-house for the Port of New York.

Resolved, That the United States Government be requested, in erecting the barge office, to do all work on said structure by day's work, and not otherwise; and that no person shall be employed, either as mechanic or laborer, who has not been a resident of the City and County of New York for the last six months prior to the time that work upon said barge office has been commenced.

Resolved, That the usual vacation of two weeks be and is hereby granted to each of the officers and clerks of this Board, and that the Secretary, Sanitary Superintendent and Attorney be and are hereby authorized and directed to so arrange the vacations of the subordinates respectively, that the business of this Department shall in nowise be interrupted or its efficiency impaired by such leaves of absence.

The President presented the following report with regard to the drainage of the Twenty-fourth Ward:

"The Mill Brook sewer, now in process of construction, is designed to extend from tide water to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street only. The bulk of the population of the Twenty-fourth Ward is above One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, and drains into Mill Brook above the northern extremity of the new sewer. For the proper protection of this neighborhood this main trunk sewer should be extended about two and a half miles north from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Fordham. To make this possible, Webster avenue must first be legally opened. This being an avenue of the first class, necessary for drainage as well as for a thoroughfare, the exclusive power to initiate proceedings for opening it lies, according to chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874, in the Park Department."

Which was adopted, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That this Board of Health is of the opinion that the trunk sewer from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Fordham, is imperatively demanded for the proper protection of health and life in the Twenty-fourth Ward, and this Board respectfully urges upon the Department of Parks the great importance of immediate action in this connection.

Resolved, That a copy of the President's report and of the above resolution be forwarded to the Department of Parks.

Plans No. 49, of proposed house in Seventy-ninth street, west of Second avenue, and No. 84 of proposed house south side Forty-seventh street, 150 feet east of Eighth avenue, were laid on the table until the next meeting.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,824, as follows, viz.: 7 public buildings, 741 tenement-houses, 163 private dwellings, 45 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, 38 slaughter-houses, 1 fat-melting establishment, 4 lodging-houses, 3 piers, 1 stock yard, 5 dumping grounds, 1 ash dump, 1 garbage dump, 13 manure dumps, 1 lime kiln, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 1 smoke house, 80 yards, courts, and areas, 67 cellars and basements, 137 waste-pipes and drains, 150 privies and water-closets, 186 street-gutters and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 4 piggeries, 1 cesspool, 7 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 494.

During the past week 220 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 59 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

70 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 117 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 111 houses, 111 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. One case of scarlet fever and one of typhoid fever was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

45 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 114 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 96 houses, 96 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of scarlet fever was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 520 births, 45 still-births, 100 marriages, and 623 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 22, 1879. This shows an increase of 240 births and 19 deaths, and a decrease of 31 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 253 births, 5 still-births, and 56 deaths, and a decrease of 10 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; croup, 1; erysipelas, 3; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; pneumonia, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; premature and preterm births, 6; suicide, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 10; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 5; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 8; bronchitis, 5; heart diseases, 11; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; surgical operations, 1; and drowning, 2.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 96 were in institutions, 325 in tenement-houses, 182 in houses containing 3 families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 11 were on the basement floor, 127 on the first, 189 on the second, 117 on the third, 57 on the fourth, 11 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 618 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 73 were stated to be single, 140 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 331 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 623; still-births, 45; bodies in transit, 25. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 82 were upon certificates received from the coroners. 760 births, 100 marriages, 45 still-births, 623 deaths, 25 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 53 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 32 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 22, 1879, was 37.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 29.984, the mean humidity 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 901, and the total amount of rainfall was 1.35 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Report on Ventilation of the Rooms of the New Court-house.

SANITARY BUREAU, HEALTH DEPARTMENT,  
301 MOTT STREET,  
NEW YORK, March 22, 1879.

W. De F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent :

SIR—In accordance with your request, I have re-inspected the building known as the New Court-house, with the view of ascertaining what had been done towards improving its sanitary condition, and whether the changes recommended by this Department in June, 1876, had been adopted.

At the former inspection made under the direction of this Department, the building was found to be very badly ventilated in many particulars. The air, which was supplied to the Court-rooms and offices by means of fans, was drawn from the cellar. The water-closet compartments immediately adjoining the Court-rooms were very offensive.

The air in the over-crowded rooms was never thoroughly removed during their occupancy, the windows being almost invariably kept closed to prevent draughts of cold air. The ventilating flues were insufficient in number, and the Court-rooms were found to be frequently greatly over-crowded. This over-crowding occurs in rooms occupied on an average for six hours a day by the Judges and others, who are compelled to remain almost constantly in them, and to breathe over and over again the impure air which is never effectually changed from the opening of the Court in the morning until the noon recess is taken or the Court has adjourned for the day, when the windows are opened. Since the inspection referred to was made, the cupola over the centre of the building has been completed, and the air supply is now taken from the outside of the building. Little else has been done to improve the bad conditions enumerated and which still exist in nearly all the Court-rooms. It is evident from the inspection made by this Department, that the flues, which are intended to ventilate the rooms, are inadequate and fail to remove the foul air as rapidly as is necessary; and as additional flues cannot be constructed in the walls without great expense and alteration, I would respectfully recommend in connection with the former changes suggested by this Department, that a sufficient number of metallic flues, heated at the base and having outlets at the tops of the windows, be constructed in each Court-room and so adjusted as effectually to remove all foul air therefrom.

Resolved, That the following shall be the form of certificate to be issued to persons who may, after the first day of May, 1879, be granted badges to admit within the police lines at fires:

"HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
155 AND 157 MERCER STREET,  
NEW YORK, 18 .

"Permission to hold and use Badges No. , for the purpose only of obtaining admittance within the police line at fires, is hereby granted to , as , of the , for the period ending with May 31, 18 , upon the following conditions, to the faithful observance of which the holder binds himself in accepting this privilege; a deposit of two dollars shall be made therefor, to be returned upon the surrender of the badge and this certificate:

"The badge shall not be transferred to or worn or used by any other person.

"Should the badge be lost, immediate information of such loss must be communicated to this office in writing, under penalty of responsibility for the acts of any person into whose possession the same may come, and in case of non-recovery the deposit shall be forfeited.

"It is expressly understood that this badge is issued only in right of the position herein designated, and that the same is to be surrendered together with this certificate, immediately upon the vacating of such position.

"The use of this badge for any other purpose than that of obtaining admittance within the police lines at fires, is strictly prohibited, and a violation of this condition shall entail the revocation of this permission and the surrender of the badge.

"The badge shall be surrendered whenever demanded by the Fire Commissioners.

"If the further permission to use the badge is desired by the holder, after the 31st day of May in each year, the same can be obtained only by appearing in person at the headquarters of this Department during the month of May, exhibiting the badge and certificate, and answering truthfully such questions, in relation to its use or abuse by him, as may be put to him; in case such permission be then renewed, an indorsement to that effect, with the date of the same, will be put upon the certificate and signed by the Secretary. In default of obtaining such renewed permission during the period specified, this permission shall thereby be revoked, the immediate surrender of the badge will be demanded, and its further use prohibited.

"In the event of any change in his address, the holder shall immediately notify the Secretary of the Department thereof.

"Attention is directed to the following provisions of law:

#### "CHAPTER 249 OF THE LAWS OF 1865.

"\* \* \* SECTION 26. It shall be the duty of the department hereby created and of the Metropolitan Police Board, their inspection officers and men, to co-operate together in all proper ways, and the said board and department may respectively provide for protection against fires, and for the arrest of all persons who may at or near any fire commit or attempt to commit any crime against the laws of this State, or may violate any rule or regulation of said board or department. \* \* \*"

"By order of Board of Commissioners. "....., Secretary."

Resolved, That all certificates of permission for use of badges to admit with police lines at fires, given previous to May 1, 1879, be returned and cancelled, and all permission to use badges be revoked and rendered null and void on and after the 1st day of June, 1879.

Resolved, That new certificates and permission be granted to such persons as may apply in person, present their badges, sign proper applications, and be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the Fire Department of the City of New York during the month of May, 1879.

Resolved, That the cash account for badges be settled, and all moneys uncalled for or forfeited be paid to the Relief Fund for its use and benefit. Adopted.

## PROPOSALS FOR LIGHTING THE PUBLIC LAMPS.

**PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR**  
other Illuminating Material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing, and Maintaining the Public Lamps (and supplying Gas, etc., for New Lamps when required) on the Streets, Avenues, Piers, and Places in the City of New York, under the care and charge of the Department of Public Works, excepting the Twenty-third Ward, and that portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward formerly known as the town of West Farms, for the period of one year, commencing May 1, 1879, and ending April 30, 1880, both days inclusive.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and chapter 125 of Laws of 1875, and Revised Ordinances of 1859, chapter 8, article 2, and included in a sealed envelope indorsed "Proposals for furnishing the Illuminating Material for, and Lighting and Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining the Public Lamps," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works until 12 o'clock M. of Monday, April 7, 1879, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or proposal, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by section 27,

article 2, chapter 8, of Revised Ordinances of 1859, or guaranteeing the Municipal Government of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture; and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen candle power by photometrical test, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, crossheads, lamp-irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1, 1879, to April 30, 1880, both days inclusive; stating the price for the above named period of one year for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and relighting, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.

For each column relighted, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of lamps to be contracted for is about nineteen thousand.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than illuminating gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made, in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alterations shall be done, and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is four thousand hours.

The amount of security required is \$50,000 on all contracts, which will amount to \$100,000, or more, and on smaller contracts the security shall be sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be readvertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless a written permission shall have been previously obtained from the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works.

The right is reserved to assign and designate to any bidder, whose bid shall be accepted, the number and location of the lamps to be lighted by such bidder, in any portion of the city for which proposals are received, and to increase or diminish such number.

The right is reserved to determine and designate, after the proposals are opened, what illuminating material shall be used in the public lamps, or any number of them, during the period before mentioned; also to decline any or all proposals if deemed for the interests of the Corporation; and no proposal will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

If the proposal of any bidder proposing to furnish illuminating gas shall include any lamps with which the pipes or mains of such bidder are not connected at the time of the making of the bid, and a contract for furnishing the gas for and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining any such lamps, shall be awarded to such bidder, in that case, thirty days from the date of the execution of such contract, and such further time, not exceeding thirty days, as may be deemed reasonable by the Commissioner of Public Works, shall be allowed to such bidder in which to connect such pipes or mains with such lamps.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made for the time so allowed, nor until the same shall have been connected with the mains of such bidder, nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been fully performed.

**AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH**  
of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits, or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offal dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease, or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in such city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
