DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, November 9, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Cram.
" Commissioner Phelan.
" " White.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 2d inst. were read and approved.

On motion, the matter of the purchase of the property between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, Harlem river, referred to Commissioners White and Phelan June 22, 1893, was referred to Commissioner Phelan.

J. W. Miller, president of the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company, appeared and requested that his company be permitted to remain at Pier, old 29, North river, until December 1, 1893. Granted.

The communication from Miles M. O'Brien, Commissioner of the Board of Education, requesting permission to allow the school-ship "Saint Mary's" to remain at the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street until ready to sail, was referred to the Treasurer.

The following communications were referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report:
From the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Submitting plans and specifications for a proposed extension to the ferry-rack at Chambers street, North river.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting dredging at the dumps foot of Seventeenth street, East river, and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river.

From Dock Master Fleming—Reporting dredging required on the north side of the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

White Star Line—To extend railroad tracks on Pier, new 38, North river.

New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—To replace spring piles on the north side of the Pier foot of West Twenty-second street, provided the consent of the lessee is obtained.

R. McLaughlin—To build a temporary pile platform at Willis avenue and Bronx Kills, in accordance with diagram submitted; said platform to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file:

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Transmitting duplicate copies of the lease of Pier, new 55, North river, to the Atlas Steamship Company (Limited), with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute said lease.

2d. Advising the Board, that it has no power to purchase water-front property where no new plan has been adopted.

From the Finance Department:

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 461.

2d. Requesting a requisition and voucher for \$27,912.80 in settlement of the judgment entered in the suit of Kingsland et al. vs. the Mayor, etc., for damages and purchase price for wharf property between Spring and Charlton streets. The Chief Clerk directed to prepare the necessary requisition.

From the Department of Public Works:

1st. Respecting the grades of East One Hundred and Sixth, One Hundred and Seventh, One Hundred and Eighth, One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets.

2d. Respecting a hydrant at the corner of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

From the Board of Street Opening and Improvement—Requesting a representative of this Board to be present at the meeting to be held on the 10th instant respecting the change in grade of West Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets. Referred to the President.

From John Peirce—Inclosing the consent of the sureties to the extension of time granted for the completion of Contract No. 455.

From Edward Goodsell—Requesting a twenty years' lease of Pier, new 43, North river. Application denied.

From the Washington Heights Tax-payers' Association—Respecting the construction of a street along Sherman' Creek.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 28 and 29, North river. Application denied.

From the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company:
1st. Requesting the Board to approve of the assignment of the lease of the Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, by the Consumers' Ice Company.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That license and consent be and hereby is granted the Consumers' Ice Company, lessee of Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, to sublet to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, so much of the wharfage granted by a certain lease dated May 1, 1891, as may accrue at said pier, provided the said lessee, the Consumers' Ice Company, and the sureties to said lease, shall file an agreement in writing with this Board that their obligations under the provisions thereof shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of such license and consent to the said subletting.

2d. Requesting permission to erect a shed on the Pier foot of Horatio street, North river. Application denied.

3d. Requesting an extension of ten years of the existing lease of said pier. Application denied.

From James P. Carson—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 460.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging, under Contract No. 460, be and hereby is extended until November 10, 1893.

From John H. Starin—Requesting permission to sublet Pier, new 58, North river, to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That license and consent be and hereby is granted John H. Starin, lessee of Pier, new 58, North river, to sublet to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company so much of the wharfage granted by a certain lease dated September 27, 1892, as may accrue at said pier, provided the said lessee, John H. Starin, and the sureties to said lease, shall file an agreement in writing with this Board that their obligations under the provisions thereof shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of such license and consent to the said subletting.

From the New York Floating Dry Dock Company—Stating that Benjamin Richards is not their authorized agent and representative, and requesting a conference for the purchase of the bulkhead and water-rights between Pike and Rutgers streets, East river.

From the White Star Line—Requesting alterations to Pier, new 38, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to cause an additional finish to be made to the corners of said pier.

From Dock Master Stack—Reporting repairs required to the bulkhead foot of East Sixty-second street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From Dock Master Coye:

1st. Reporting repairs required to Pier 44, Pier, new 29, and Pier, new 32, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

2d. Reporting repairs required to Piers 18 and 21, East river. The owners and lessees notified to repair.

From the Treasurer:

1st. Recommending that the offer made by James Montgomery, on the 2d instant, be declined, as the title to the property between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, is already vested in the City. Report approved.

2d. Recommending that a temporary permit be granted the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the use of the bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street; compensation to be fixed at the legal rates of wharfage payable to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the time for the completion of Contract No. 446, for building an iron awning shed on the Pier foot of West Fifty-second street, be extended until October 28, 1893. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the privilege of filling-in between Twenty-seventh and Thirtieth streets, North river, be granted to Thomas Smith, at the rate of ten cents per load. Recommendation adopted.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Phelan, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending November 8, 1893, amounting to \$114,613.46, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:
