WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending June 30, 1894.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 224,993, classified as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 584 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 414 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 7 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds, and 213 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

There were 10,558 deaths during the quarter, being 1,293 less than in 1893, and less than the number for any corresponding quarter since 1890, representing a death-rate of 21.67, which is far below that of any recent year. This great decrease of 1,293 deaths is mainly due to the decrease in the deaths from phthisis (1,122 against 1,422 in 1893), from bronchitis (336 against 443), and from pneumonia (1,251 against 2,094), these three diseases alone being the cause of 1,250 fewer deaths than during the second quarter of 1893. This marked falling off is evidently due to the virtual disappearance of epidemic influenza as an important factor in the mortality of the city.

Contagious and infectious diseases, as a whole, varied little from last year, although some of them showed a marked increase and others just as notable a decrease. The figures are: for cerebro-spinal meningitis, 69 in 1894 against 219 in 1893; diphtheria, 721 against 465; typhoid fever, 43 against 77; measles, 166 against 107; scarlet fever, 209 against 224; small-pox, 55 against 27; typhus fever, 0 against 73; and whooping-cough, 82 against 155 in 1893, the totals being respectively 1,344 against 1,347.

The deaths from suicides were 93, against 72 in 1893, the increase being due, doubtless, to the prevailing financial distress.

Deaths of children under 5 years of age were 4,521 against 4,386 in 1893, and of persons 65 years of age and upwards, 1,043 against 1,175.

The marriages and births reported were 4,235 and 13,998, respectively, against 4,238 and 11,186 in 1893.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending June 30, 1894, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,674. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).
Or for any streets under the control of the Depart-

ment of Parks, Docks and Public Works, except upon the consent of the heads of those Departments.

All existing permits for the occupancy by unharmed vehicles of any of the streets or portions of streets or places enumerated above are hereby revoked.

All unharmed wagons, trucks or other vehicles standing in the streets or public places, other than those for which permits have been issued and which are in compliance with the conditions of the same will be seized and removed to the Corporation Yards of the Department of Street Cleaning, in pursuance of the provisions of the law.
