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### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

#### Report for Quarter ending March 31, 1901.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376, Laws of 1897, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending March 31, 1901.

#### REPORT.

On the 31st day of March, 1901, the number of the Force, of all grades, was 7,372.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 25,995½ days. Sick time paid, 12,997¾ days; sick time unpaid, 12,997¾ days. Total days' time of the Force was 662,133 days. Per cent. of sick to full time, 3.93; for preceding quarter, 2.68. Amount paid for sick time, \$50,946.95, an increase of \$15,654.02 over that paid for preceding quarter.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: males, 25,058; females, 5,914. Total, 30,972. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,732; number discharged without trial, 763; number acquitted, 319; number convicted, 594; number sent to other authorities, 62; number died, 7; number pending, 987.

#### LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 229; females, 76. Total, 305. Restored to parents or guardians, 299; other dispositions, 6. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 206.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the Station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the Station-house at the time of the arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

#### HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The aggregate number of days' detention was 1,152½. Number of meals, 3,458, costing 25 cents each, amounting to \$864.50.

#### SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as engineers, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "D."

#### PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners and other transactions of the Property Clerk's office will be found in schedule annexed, marked "E."

#### DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.

The number of officers dismissed the Force was 13.

The number of charges made against members of the Force and filed in the office of the Chief Clerk during the quarter was: January, 261; February, 225; March, 244. Total, 730.

The following is the number of charges disposed of during the quarter: Charges on which officers were dismissed, 15; fines, 421; reprimands, 176; complaints dismissed and withdrawn, 222. Total, 834.
