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## BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections, held Thursday, August 23, 1906, at 12 o'clock noon.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Maguire.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board, held on the 31st ult., and the 7th and 14th inst., were read and approved.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From Hon. R. Waldo, Acting Police Commissioner, dated the 15th inst., acknowledging receipt of communication from the Board forwarding circular letter to the various Precinct Commanders of the City. Filed.

From Hon. George W. Morgan, State Superintendent of Elections for the Metropolitan Elections District, dated the 17th inst., acknowledging receipt of copies of maps showing the new election district divisions of the Assembly Districts in New York City. Filed.

From Hon. George W. Morgan, State Superintendent, etc., dated the 20th inst., requesting permission to assign six of his Deputies to the Queens Borough office of the Board, for the purpose of redistricting the 1905 cards of Electors in Queens County on file in his office, according to the new apportionment. Filed, having been answered orally.

From Joseph Haag, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated the 17th inst., requesting that the departmental estimate of the Board for the year 1907 be furnished as soon as possible. Filed.

The President submitted for the consideration of the Board a proposed estimate and statement in detail of expenditures of the Board of Elections for 1907, required by section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, to be furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for use in preparing the annual City Budget. On motion, the said estimate and statement was approved as submitted and a copy thereof directed to be transmitted to the Mayor, as Chairman of said Board, the Secretary of said Board, the Comptroller, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

From N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller, dated the 15th inst., stating that the Comptroller's certificate has been endorsed upon the contract of the Martin B. Brown Company for supplies for election purposes, and the same is now a valid contract. Filed.

From John E. Smith, Secretary, Kings County Republican General Committee, dated the 14th inst., acknowledging receipt of copies of maps showing the new election district divisions of the Assembly Districts in Kings County. Filed.

From Leander B. Faber, Chairman, Queens County Republican General Committee, dated the 18th inst., stating the size and number of ballots which will be required for use at the Republican primary elections to be held in said County on the 18th proximo. Filed.

From Hon. Joseph Cassidy, Chairman, Queens County Democratic General Committee, transmitting duly certified statement of the conventions and committees for which delegates and members, respectively, are to be elected at the ensuing Democratic primary elections in Queens County. Filed.

An anonymous communication, dated the 15th inst., protesting against the designation of the premises used at the general election of last year as the polling place for the Twelfth Election District, Second Assembly District, Kings County, for the same purpose this year. Filed, the Chief Clerk of the Brooklyn Borough office having reported that the grounds of the protest are untrue, and that the premises are suitable for use as a polling place.

Pratt Company, of No. 52 Duane street, Manhattan Borough, New York City, to furnish organizations, parties or persons ordering and receiving the same, all the paper necessary for the ballots for use at the primary elections to be held on September 18, 1906, in conformity with the resolutions adopted by the Board of Elections on August 14, 1906.

Two writs of mandamus, issued by Mr. Justice Dickey, Supreme Court, Kings County, directing the Board to change the enrollment in the Eleventh and Twenty-seventh Election Districts, respectively, Seventeenth Assembly District, Kings County, enrollment books of George Heissenbuttel and Frederick Meilio. Complied with.

The following preamble and resolution was adopted and a copy directed to be sent to the United States Standard Voting Machine Company and the Dean Ballot Machine Company, viz.:

Whereas, It was stated by his Honor the Mayor, in expressing his disapproval of the bill introduced at the last session of the Legislature of this State, providing for a mandatory use of voting machines at public elections in this City, viz.: "There is no reason why a test of their usefulness should not be made at the next election in such districts as the Board of Elections may deem advisable, so that their practical operation may be carefully watched and a final decision reached as to their merits;" and

Whereas, The Board of Elections has been informed by representatives of the manufacturers of the voting machines that may be lawfully used in this State, of their willingness to co-operate in a test or further test of the usefulness and merits of their respective machines, by supplying from ten to fifteen machines of each of their respective types and manufacture, for use at the ensuing general election in this City, November 6, 1906, at a fair and reasonable compensation for the cost of transportation to and from the City, and for their care during the time the same are required in this City, prior and subsequent to the said election; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Elections of The City of New York hereby authorizes and permits the use for experimental purposes, as provided in section 164, chapter 909, of the Laws of the State of New York, of fifteen of the United States Standard Voting Machines, of Rochester, N. Y., at the general election to be held in this City November 6, 1906, said machines to be constructed so as to admit, if required, of voting for thirty candidates, to be nominated by each of ten different party organizations, and also to provide for voting for each office, for a candidate therefor not duly nominated. The cost of the storage and care of the said machines while in the City for a period of thirty days, both prior and subsequent to said election, will be assumed by the Board of Elections at an amount not to exceed the sum of \$65 per machine when used. Each machine to be placed by the said company for use, when directed, at such polling place in this City as may be designated by the Board, and to be cared for and maintained in perfect working order by the said company, as the owner or manufacturer thereof, at all times when required for its lawful use, or for the purposes of demonstration to, or instruction of, the voters of the district in which it may be placed; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Elections of The City of New York hereby authorizes and permits the use for experimental purposes, as provided in section 164, chapter 909, of the Laws of the State of New York, of fifteen of the Dean Ballot Machines, of Minneapolis, Minn., at the general election to be held in this City November 6, 1906, said machines to be constructed so as to admit, if required, of voting for thirty candidates, to be nominated by each of ten different party organizations, and also to provide for voting for each office, for a candidate therefor not duly nominated. The cost of the storage and care of the said machines while in the City for a period of thirty days, both prior and subsequent to said election, will be assumed by the Board of Elections at an amount not to exceed \$65 per machine when used. Each machine to be placed by the said Company for use, when directed, at such polling place in this City as may be designated by the Board, and to be cared for and maintained in perfect working order by the said Company, as the owner or manufacturer thereof, at all times when required for its lawful use, or for the purposes of demonstration to, or instruction of, the voters of the district in which it may be placed.

The Board then adjourned.


