Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a certified copy of a report, approved by the Board of Education on the 13th inst., requesting approval by the Building Code Revision Commission of an amendment to section 103 of the Building Code, exempting from the provisions thereof in regard to requiring the erection of fire escapes, all school buildings which can be vacated by its occupants in not more than three minutes.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that, under date of April 25, 1907, a 38-page report, approved by the Fire Commissioner, was received from Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, giving the locations of various public school buildings in all boroughs requiring fire escapes and fire appliances, and stating that violation notices regarding the same would be served at the earliest possible moment.

The matter was referred to the Chairman of your Committee, and he addressed a communication to the President, stating that, while there was no doubt as to the good faith of the examination on which the requirements of the Fire Department were based, they exhibited a lack of uniformity and a failure to recognize the facts that many of the school buildings are fireproof and comply most strictly with all provisions of the law; that said buildings, no matter of what construction, are not hotels, lodging houses or places of residence; that efficient discipline and fire drills are maintained in the schools organized therein; that these requirements are entirely different from those previously made and carried out; that the thought naturally arises as to whether or not it would be feasible to arrive at some standard of safety, based upon, say, the celerity with which pupils and teachers can leave the building, and that he would suggest that a conference be held in the hall of the Board of Education between representatives of the Fire and Building Departments and the Board of Education for the purpose of reaching a settlement of what promises to be a vexatious and extremely expensive problem.

In accordance with this suggestion, and at the request of the President, a meeting was held and a committee appointed, consisting of representatives of the Bureaus of Buildings of the several boroughs, a representative of the Fire Department and a representative of the Department of Education, which, after careful investigation of the subject, submitted the following report under date of October 30, 1907:

"In June last at the request of Mr. Egerton L. Winthrop, Jr., President of the Board of Education, a committee was appointed consisting of a representative of each of the Bureaus of Buildings of the various boroughs, a representative of the Fire Department and a representative of the Department of Education to consider the recommendations of the Fire Department, dated April 25, 1907, as to fire protection in public schools; also to formulate some rules whereby a school building might be judged as to its safety or adequate equipment with stairways or fire escapes; and, further, to make whatever recommendations might seem proper in the premises.

"The committee has held several meetings and adopted rules for the general betterment of conditions in non-fireproof schools; has visited and inspected several schools, in four of which rapid dismissal drills were had for the benefit of the committee, three of the schools being of the old style non-fireproof; the average time of dismissal was three minutes. It being admitted by the Fire Department that it would take the first or nearest fire company on an average of about three minutes to reach the scene of a fire and prepare for work, within that period the majority of schools would be free of occupants and the Fire Department would have free and unobstructed entrance thereto; the committee is, therefore, of the opinion, as the result of its inspections made to date, that outside fire escapes on the average public school are not required, as under the present system of drilling the scholars they can be much better and more expeditiously handled and guided by their teachers on a continuous line of stairs leading to exits than they could if compelled to pass through rooms and halls leading to windows or openings onto broken lines of outside stairs; and as the stairways in most schools at the present time are practically fireproof, the danger of fire or smoke obstructing any or all of the several lines of stairs within the short space of three minutes is very remote. In one school on the lower East Side, containing over twenty-three hundred (2,300) pupils, the dismissal took place in two minutes and thirty-one seconds. The main objection to placing outside fire escapes on public schools by the Department of Education is that they would greatly obstruct the light in class rooms, secondly, that stairways are preferable to outside escapes, and third, that the cost of carrying out the recommendations of the Fire Department as to outside escapes would entail upon the City an expenditure of millions of dollars.

"As before stated the committee, in view of its experience, is of the opinion that outside fire escapes are not required or necessary on such of the public schools wherein it can be demonstrated that such schools can be dismissed within a period of time of three minutes or less, and at its meeting of October 25 a resolution was passed directing that an amendment be drawn and submitted to the Building Code Revision Commission for its approval and adoption, exempting such schools from the provisions of section 103 of the Building Code.

"The committee respectfully requests that you give the proposed amendment your personal consideration, and if it meets with your approval, that you sanction its adoption by the Building Code Revision Commission.

The proposed amendment referred to is to the following effect:

Amendment Recommended for Insertion in Section 103 of the Building Code.

Provided, however, that whenever it shall be demonstrated that any public school building in The City of New York can be actually vacated by its occupants at the rate of four hundred in three minutes through one 5-foot exit, and that a sufficient number of exits are provided to permit such building to be vacated by all its occupants in not more than three minutes, then the provisions of this section as to providing outside means of escape from such building shall not apply; and any and all school buildings which shall meet the above prescribed requirements shall be exempt from the

provisions of this section as to fire escapes. Such exemption shall be determined in the case of any school building as the result of an actual inspection of a rapid dismissal of pupils during regular school hours, such inspection to be made by an officer of the Fire Department attached to the battalion or company in the district in which the school building is located, an officer of the Bureau of Buildings of the borough in which the school building is located and a representative of the Superintendent of School Buildings of the Department of Education. An official record of the reports of all such inspections shall be kept in the office of the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances of the Fire Department, and copies of said reports shall be forwarded to the Superintendent of Buildings for the borough in which such inspections may take place, and to the Department of Education.

The Committee on Buildings has carefully considered this matter, heartily endorses the above-mentioned report and recommends approval of the amendment to the Building Code as above quoted.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That certified copies of the foregoing be transmitted to the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Building Code Revision Commission, with the approval of the Board of Education and with the earnest request that affirmative action be taken thereon.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—There is transmitted herewith for the consideration of your Honorable Board a request for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000) for repairing and repaving pavements which have been destroyed by bonfires.

This request is made by reason of the fact that in the year 1906 Special Revenue Bonds were issued for the repair of street pavements to the amount of \$238,000, of which a balance of \$70,000 now remains in the fund, and which, it seems, cannot be used for repairs that have been made this year, although the damage to the pavements was done in 1906.

The work having been completed and certified to the Comptroller as a proper charge to the Revenue Bond issue of 1906 was later withheld by the Finance Department upon an opinion of the Corporation Counsel advising that expenditures for subsequent year could not be charged to a bond issue of a previous year where the bond issue was for the purpose of replenishing an appropriation.

As there is no appropriation available from which to pay the cost of this work and as the charge was a proper and just one for which Revenue Bonds were provided and for which a sufficient balance still exists, it will therefore be necessary to provide the funds which I am prevented from expending upon a legal technicality heretofore unknown.

The details of this application are set forth in the annexed communication, and Judge Humphrey appeared before the Committee, and stated that by order of the Appellate Division, Second Department, a second part of the Supreme Court, Queens County, was inaugurated on the first of March, 1907, and has been running since. That this additional part required two additional Clerks at \$2,500 each, and two additional Attendants at \$1,500 each. That he has tried to go through the year without asking for relief, but he finds that that is now impossible, and he will require the amount of \$3,166.84 to finish out the year. Gentlemen—Application is hereby made for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188 of Charter of New York City in the sum of \$3,166.84. The proceeds are to be added to the Court Fund of the Supreme and County Courts of Queens County to meet a deficit for the current year; and are to be devoted to the payment of the salaries of two (2) Special Deputy Clerks, and three (3) Court Attendants.

The reason for this application is that Hon. Garret J. Garretson, about the first of the current year, owing to the establishment of two parts of Supreme Court in Queens County, and the division of the Second Judicial District, appointed three additional Court Attendants, a Stenographer (who now receives his compensation from the State Comptroller), and the County Clerk of Queens County, with the consent of the Supreme Court Justices of the Second Judicial District, appointed two additional Special Deputy Clerks.

REPORTS:

The details of this application are set forth in the annexed reports and representatives of the railroad companies appeared before the Committee. From its investigations not more than \$500,000 of this amount is due and the balance was only anticipated. The City must pay its accrued obligations, but the Committee is opposed to issuing bonds at this time in anticipation of expenses which will not accrue for perhaps from six months to a year to come. The Committee therefore recommend that this ordinance be rejected at this time, and that a new ordinance be passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the authorization of \$500,000, or whatever amount may be actually due for this purpose. The Committee, therefore, recommend the rejection of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one million three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,350,000), to provide means to meet the proportionate cost of the improvements to be borne by The City of New York in connection with abolishing grade crossings of highways and railroads, pursuant to chapter 507, Laws of 1903, as amended.

The details of this application are set forth in the annexed report, and Acting Superintendent Stewart appeared before the Committee, and stated that on account of the large number of repairs and supplies made necessary during the year, that the Budget allowance of \$234,000 for this purpose had been entirely wiped out early in October, and there are absolutely no funds to carry on the work up to January 1, 1908. The bureau has charge of forty-five public buildings owned by the City, and sixteen public buildings leased by the City, making a total of sixty-one buildings, and if these are to be maintained at all some allowance must be made. The Committee believes, however, that the bureau should try to get along with \$20,000, and therefore recommends the adoption of a substitute resolution for that amount.

REPORTS:

The details of this application are set forth in the annexed report, and Chief Clerk Smith of the City Court appeared before the committee and stated that it was proposed to erect a two and one-half story temporary structure immediately east of the present City Court House. The committee regret that it is necessary to erect such a structure in City Hall Park, but as it is only to be temporary, and as some immediate action must be taken to carry out the provisions of the law increasing the number of Judges of the City Court, and as the City Court Judges state that this is the only practical proposition that can be adopted at this time, your committee recommend the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), to provide means for the erection, furnishing and equipment of a building in City Hall Park, fronting on Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the City Court of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 18, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Under the terms of hiring, the Department agreed to keep the boat in thorough repair, and as the Department has no funds available for this purpose, it is necessary to make an appropriation, which the Department assumes will total \$3,000. Sir—Since September 1, 1906, the steam launch "Velox" has been leased by this Department from Harry B. Mingle, of No. 7 East Forty-second street, Manhattan, at a rental of fifty dollars (\$50) per month, for the use of the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion, in charge of the fire boat fleet of this Department, in responding to alarms for fire along and contiguous to the waterfront of Greater New York, in making official inspections, and as a tender for the delivery of supplies for the fire boats, and an application is now pending before your Honorable Board to authorize the purchase of the launch for the use of this Department, without contract at public letting.

At 2.10 o'clock p. m. on the 6th inst. the launch was sunk opposite the coal pockets at the Erie docks, near Pavonia avenue, Jersey City, as the result of the steam lighter "Leonard J. Busby" colliding therewith, the facts and circumstances of the occurrence being set forth in the report of the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion, dated the 7th inst., and reading as follows:

New York, November 7, 1907.

EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

Sir—In compliance with existing orders, I respectfully report the sinking of steam launch "Velox," through collision with steam lighter "Leonard J. Busby," at 2.10 o'clock p. m. on the 6th inst.

The launch "Velox" was proceeding from the foot of Essex street, Jersey City, to the berth of the fire boat "George B. McClellan" at Gansevoort street, North river. When opposite the coal pockets at the Erie docks, near Pavonia avenue, Jersey City, the pilot, James Gallagher, noticed the steam lighter coming out. He blew one whistle, which was necessary, but received no answering signal. As the steam lighter was coming toward him in such a way as to involve risk of collision, he blew his alarm whistle and immediately backed his boat. The pilot in charge of the steam lighter did not check the speed of his boat until too late to prevent the collision, nor did he answer the alarm signal. The steam launch "Velox" was struck on the port bow, the force of the blow driving in the planking to such an extent that the launch sank while being towed to the Brown & Miller Dry Dock at Morris street, Jersey City.

I called up the Merritt-Chapman Wrecking Company, and they sent a derrick to lift the launch. It will be necessary to dock her at once. A survey can then be held to determine damages. The office of the owners of the steam lighter is in the Produce Exchange building. I shall look them up in the morning and report to you all necessary information as soon as possible. I was aboard the "Velox" at the time the collision took place. On reaching shore I at once notified Secretary Downes of the accident, and of my action in the matter.

The "Velox" is now on dry dock and cannot be floated in her present condition, and must be kept there at an expense of forty dollars (\$40) per day until the work of repairs is ordered.

It is estimated that the expense of making the repairs and of dry docking the boat will approximate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000). There are no funds available to the Department for doing the work, and it is imperative that the launch be repaired without delay. Copies of surveys are enclosed.

In order to provide for the emergency which confronts the Department in this matter, I have therefore the honor to request that the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the expense of placing the steam launch "Velox" in condition for service, and further, in pursuance of the authority conferred by the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, that your Honorable Board authorize and empower me to have the necessary work done without contract at public letting, it being imperative that this work be done with the least possible delay.

I enclose draft of preamble and resolutions designed to accomplish the object in view, immediate action upon which is urgently requested.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of the basement of the German Evangelical Mission Church, at the southwest corner of Leonard and Stagg streets, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as an annex to Public School 43, for a period of one year from December 12, 1907, at an annual rental of \$1,200, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owners, the Board of Trustees of the German Evangelical Mission Church, Leonard and Stagg streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, subject to the approval of the Department of Health as to sanitary conditions, to authorize a lease of the basement of the Tremont Presbyterian Church, on Washington avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, as an annex to Public School 4, for a period from November 15, 1907, to July 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$2,000, payable quarterly; said lessors to furnish heat and janitor's service, and to keep the exterior of the building in repair; the Board of Education to have possession of the premises mentioned on all days of the week except on Saturdays and Sundays. Lessors, Tremont Presbyterian Church, H. M. Jackson, secretary, No. 449 East Tremont avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

(a) Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a renewal of the lease to the City of premises Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from July 1, 1907, at an annual rental of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200) with the privilege of renewal for two years at an annual rental of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), otherwise on the same terms and conditions as in the existing lease; lessor, George R. Rodemann; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

(b) Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a renewal of the lease to the City of premises Nos. 67 and 69 Broadway, Flushing, Borough of Queens, for a period from October 15, 1907, to May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of one thousand four hundred dollars (\$1,400), from May 1, 1908, to May 1, 1909, at an annual rental of one thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,450), and from May 1, 1909, to May 1, 1910, at an annual rental of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500); lessor, James V. Graham; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

(c) Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a lease to the City of the premises No. 162 East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a period from November 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of twenty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250), and water tax, the Board of Education to make all repairs and comply with all orders and ordinances pertaining to said premises during the above-mentioned period; lessor, Emanuel Alexander; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Miss Mabel Seely, Stenographer and Typewriter, whose name was certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as Clerk to the Local School Boards of Districts Nos. 2 and 3 and to District Superintendent Richman, at a salary of \$50 per month, the appointment taking effect October 15, 1907, and to continue for a temporary period.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in increasing the salary of Miss Flora Guterman, Clerk to the Local School Boards of Districts Nos. 23 and 24 and to District Superintendent Davis, from \$750 to \$900 per annum, to take effect November 2, 1907, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Accepting the resignation of David A. Lubarsky, as Office Boy in the Bureau of Audit and Accounts, taking effect August 13, 1907, and approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Benjamin Addis, whose name was certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as Office Boy (title changed to first grade Clerk) in the Bureau of Audit and Accounts, at a salary of \$300 per annum, the appointment taking effect October 18, 1907.

Amending section 44 of the By-laws of the Board of Education by inserting after subdivision 3 a new subdivision, to be known and designated as subdivision 3a, reading as follows:

3a. Absence from duty on the part of the City Superintendent of Schools, any Associate Superintendent or District Superintendent, or any other member of the supervising or teaching staff, or any member of the Board of Examiners, or other employee of the Board of Education, for the purpose of advocating or opposing any legislative or other measure or proposition affecting the public schools or the public school system, before any official or body having jurisdiction in the matter, is prohibited, except by express permission of the Board of Education or of its President, or, in the absence of the President, of the Vice-President; and it shall be the duty of the Board of Education to cause charges to be preferred against any person violating this provision, and amending subdivision 4 of section 44 of the By-laws of the Board of Education by inserting between the word "duty" and the word "may," in the first line thereof, the words "except as prohibited by the next preceding subdivision."

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Nostrand avenue and Sandford street, south of Willoughby avenue, in Local School Board District No. 29, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of

Taxes and Assessments, is \$34,400, and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

Relieving the Committee on Elementary Schools from further consideration of the matter of the suspension of Mr. Robert Simmons, a Teacher in Public School 18, Borough of Richmond, by District Superintendent Bardwell, for insubordination and neglect of duty, Mr. Simmons' resignation having been received by the City Superintendent.

Approving the action of the Board of Superintendents in transferring Evelyn M. Goldsmith, Kindergartner (Schedule III.), from Public School 103, District No. 20, to Public School 104, District No. 8, to take effect October 14, 1907.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Elementary Schools in finding the charges of neglect of duty preferred against Miss Anna E. Holly, a Teacher in Public School 144, Borough of Brooklyn, by District Superintendent McCabe, sustained and dismissing Miss Holly from the public school system, but without prejudice in the event of an application for her retirement being hereafter made by her or on her behalf.

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending September 30, 1907.

Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platforms at this locality and the steamboat landing have been maintained during the quarter.

Pier "A" and Boat Landing, North River.

Sundry repairs have been made to Pier "A" where necessary, the boat landing has been maintained during the quarter and the float inside the landing has been repaired from time to time, as needed.

Rector Street Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of December 16, 1903, and is at the cost and expense of the owners of the property to be improved. A bulkhead has been built to hold earth filling at north end of the section, and a temporary platform has been built in front of shed north of Pier 7. The new-made land has been graded for paving and a second-hand granite pavement has been laid along the northerly end of the section.

Cedar Street Section, North River.

The wall at this section was built under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks December 10, 1902. During the present quarter earth filling has been deposited in rear of the wall built and the approach to Pier 10 is being removed.

Liberty Street Section, North River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks December 10, 1902, Bureau Order No. 919, under which the Central Railroad of New Jersey is constructing bulkhead wall. The necessary blocks for this wall have been built by the force of the Department, and same set in position under Bureau Order No. 4953 at the cost and expense of the Central Railroad of New Jersey. The above railroad company is also building bulkhead sheds and new ferry house in the vicinity of Liberty street.

Pier (New) 36, North River.

The erection of an iron shed over the extension to this pier by the Clyde Steamship Company has been supervised, the work being done under permit from this Department, Bureau Order No. 5026.

Christopher Street, North River.

The asphalt pavement in the vicinity of this street has been repaired by the New York City Railroad Company under permit from this Department.

Chelsea Section, North River.

On December 28, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North river. Large property interests in this vicinity have in the past been acquired, and extensive work done in the construction of the wall. The wall is now practically completed for the entire length of the section. During the present quarter an island of safety has been built at the north end of the marginal street. Piers within the limits of the section have been widened and fender system placed. A contract, No. 1090, has been awarded for preparing for and building freight sheds on Piers 57, 58 and 59, North river, with lateral extensions on the adjacent bulkhead platforms. A contract, No. 1091, has been awarded for preparing for and building freight sheds on Piers 60, 61 and 62, North river, with lateral extensions on the adjacent bulkhead. A contract, No. 1054, has been awarded for preparing for and building freight sheds on Piers 54 and 56, North river, with lateral extensions on the adjacent bulkhead platforms, and work under this contract will shortly be begun. A contract, No. 1069, has been awarded for curbing and flagging and for laying granite pavement, with crosswalks, within the area of the marginal street on the Chelsea Section, between Bloomfield and West Fifteenth streets, North river, and work has been in progress. A contract, No. 1074, has been awarded for preparing for and curbing and flagging and for laying granite pavement, with crosswalks, within the area of the marginal street on the Chelsea Section, North river, between West Nineteenth and West Twenty-second streets, and work has been in progress during the quarter. A contract, No. 1028, has been awarded for preparing for and building foundations for the columns of the bulkhead shed in the rear of the bulkhead wall between about the southerly line of West Nineteenth and the northerly line of West Twenty-second streets, North river, and the shed column foundations on Pier (new) 62; also for preparing for and laying a concrete pavement over the above-described bulkhead shed area and the deck of Pier (new) 62, and work has been begun.

The construction of subway conduits on the marginal street area of the Chelsea Section has been superintended. The tracks of the New York City Railway Company, between West Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, have been rearranged and reconstructed. A 12-inch gas main has been laid along the easterly side of the marginal street by the Consolidated Gas Company. Subsidiary connections have been made to Pier (new) 59 by the Empire City Subway Company, Ltd.

West Forty-second Street Section, North River.

By an order from the Engineer-in-Chief, dated November 14, 1905, the sections originally known as "West Forty-second Street Section," "West Forty-second Street Section Extended" and "West Forty-third Street Section" were consolidated and now known as "West Forty-second Street Section." The wall was practically completed with the exception of the coping for all the portion except that extending across the foot of West Forty-second street, during a prior quarter. During the present quarter vertical and bracing piles were driven, material was excavated and removed and about 28 feet of water at mean low water was made over the area dredged at the foot of Forty-second street. The old sewer at the foot of Forty-second street is being removed. The ferry terminal at the foot of West Forty-second street is being rebuilt by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from this Department.

Fifty-second Street, North River.

The sheathing and decking of the pier at the foot of this street has been repaired by the force of the Department under Bureau Order No. 5307.

Fifty-fourth Street, North River.

The sheathing and decking of the pier at the foot of this street has been repaired by the force of the Department under Bureau Order No. 5306.

Between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth Streets, North River.

It having been decided by the Board of Armory Commissioners that a pier should be constructed in this vicinity, the force of the Department has been engaged in building a pier, 325 by 25 feet, between these two streets, under Bureau Order No. 4891, and the work was completed on September 4, 1907. A water main between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets has been extended by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The United States steamship "Granite State" has been moored at the north side of the pier at Ninety-seventh street.

Claremont Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks passed November 16, 1900. During the present quarter earth filling has been placed and grading done for paving and pavement laid between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets.

Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-second Street, North River—Work on the inner end of this pier has been in progress, and 196 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-third Streets, North River—Earth filling has been deposited between these two streets.

Carmansville Section, North River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of May 15, 1907, Bureau Order No. 5221. Rip-rap has been inspected and deposited on the bulkhead line. Test piles were driven and soundings taken.

Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mount St. Vincent.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are widening the present railroad embankment between these two points, and rip-rap is being deposited along the line of the widening, under permit from this Department.

Marginal Street, North River.

A contract, No. 1094, has been awarded for repairing the asphalt pavement on the North and East rivers and work has been begun under same. Repairs have also been made where necessary to the asphalt pavement already laid by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company under their bonds to maintain the pavement in good condition.

Whitehall Terminal, East River.

The work at this location will be found described further on in the report under the heading "Ferries." The work of removing the old structures between Whitehall and Broad streets, East river, and building a new ferry structure for the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry terminal is in progress under Contract No. 1019. A plank driveway has been built by the force of the Department and repairs to the ferry racks, bridges, etc., of the Whitehall terminal of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry have been made. Earth filling has been placed in rear of the wall at the Whitehall section.

Broad Street Section, East River.

Work at this section, which was done under resolution of the Board of Docks, passed December 22, 1899, was completed a few years ago as far as could be done until possession of the inner end of Pier (new) 7 was obtained. During a previous quarter, work was resumed at this portion of the section and the wall has been built across the inner end of Pier (new) 7 and northerly thereof. Granite block pavement has been relaid in this vicinity.

Old Slip Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks, on the 7th of December, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead wall from the northerly side of Pier (new) 7, where it joins the Broad street section, to the northerly side of Burling slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections, the Old slip section and the Maiden lane section.

The Old slip section extends from the northerly or upper end of the Broad street section and runs along the established bulkhead line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. During the past quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall has been in progress and 127 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by that portion of the work done. Earth filling has been deposited in rear of bulkhead wall. A granite block pavement has been laid between Piers 7 and 8, at Pier 9, Pier 10, between Piers 10 and 11, at Pier 11, and between Piers 11 and 12. The wall is practically completed as far north as the southerly side of the Wall Street Ferry. This section embraces Piers, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, all of which were built prior to the present quarter.

Maiden Lane Section, East River.

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated 7th of December, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead wall along this section of the water front was ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street, where it joins the Old slip section, to about the southerly line of Burling slip, East river. During the present quarter granite pavement has been laid between Piers 13 and 14, at Pier 14, and between Piers 14 and 15.

Fulton Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall was authorized by the Board of Docks on the 26th of April, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904. During the present quarter some work on the bulkhead wall has been done, and granite pavement has been laid between Piers 17 and 18. A platform about 50 feet long was constructed between the westerly side of the approach to Pier 17 and the easterly side of the Fulton Ferry house by the force of the Department.

James Slip Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated April 30, 1907. This section extends from the easterly side of Oliver street pier, or Pier 25, East river, westerly along the bulkhead line to the centre line of Pier (old) 31, a distance of about 326 feet. Work has been in progress on this section by the removal of old work preparatory to the construction of the bulkhead wall. A temporary awning shed is being erected over the platform at the foot of James slip by the Long Island Railroad Company, under permit from this Department. A shed and other structures were removed from the pile platform between James slip and Oliver street by the Long Island Railroad Company, under permit from this Department.

Peck Slip Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks of January 14, 1903. During the quarter granite block pavement and crosswalk stones have been relaid between Piers 19 and 20.

Market Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks, passed February 23, 1900. The wall at this section was completed during a prior quarter. During the present quarter granite pavement has been relaid in the vicinity of and between Piers 28, 29, 30 and 31.

Rutgers Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks, February 3, 1899. The only work done at this section during the quarter has been the relaying of the granite block pavement between Piers 32 and 33.

Between Fourth and Fifth Streets, East River.

The coal pockets, derricks, etc., belonging to Hencken & Willenbrock, formerly located at the foot of Stanton street, East river, are being transferred to between Fourth and Fifth streets by the above firm, and repairs were made to the crib bulkhead by the same company under permit from this Department.

Twenty-second Street, East River.

A freight shed has been constructed on the pier foot of this street by the New England Navigation Company, under permit from this Department.

New Bellevue Section, East River.

The officials of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, being desirous of extending the grounds of the Bellevue Hospital, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets, East river, by reason of the extensive improvements proposed to the hospital buildings in that locality, the bulkhead wall is being built along the new bulkhead line as modified by the Secretary of War September 16, 1903, with the further modification extending the bulkhead line across the foot of Twenty-eighth street and back to the established line of 1890, at the northerly side of Twenty-ninth street. Work on this section of the bulkhead wall has been in progress during the quarter under Bureau Order No. 4081, action of the Commissioner, February 6, 1907, which supersedes Bureau Order No. 1859. The inner end of the pier at the foot of Twenty-eighth street is being removed to make way for the construction of the bulkhead wall and temporary approach is being constructed. At Twenty-ninth street a bulkhead was placed to retain the stone filling and sheathing placed to retain earth filling.

Pier at Thirty-ninth Street, East River.

The erection of a motor house on this pier has been in progress and changes have been made in the pier to fit it for such use under permit to the New York Edison Company.

Yorkville Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order No. 2757. During the quarter no work has been done on the bulkhead wall proper. A contract, No. 1046, was awarded during a prior quarter for the excavation and removal of rock over the site of a proposed bulkhead wall and outshore from same, between East Sixty-fifth and East Seventy-fourth streets, East river, and work has been in progress during the quarter.

Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order No. 2756, the work of improving the water front which was being done under resolution of the Board of Docks for the East Seventy-fourth, East Seventy-fifth and East Seventy-seventh street sections was consolidated and a new section established as Blackwell Section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth street and East Seventy-fifth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter and work was suspended until the work in the other sections make a joint with it. During the quarter work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, and 99 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done. Earth filling was deposited between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-seventh streets, and granite pavement relaid in the vicinity of Seventy-eighth street.

Ninetieth to Ninety-first Streets, East River.

A timber basin has been established at this locality and during the quarter old material has been rafted and cared for.

One Hundred and Third Street, Harlem River.

Plans, specifications and form of contract have been prepared and submitted for the construction of a pier at the foot of this street.

One Hundred and Sixth Street, Harlem River.

Plans, specifications and form of contract have been prepared and submitted for the construction of a pier at the foot of this street.

Between One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth Streets, Harlem River.

The crib bulkhead in this locality was rebuilt from low water up for a distance of 50 feet south of the south line of One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Harlem river, by the Washburn Wire Company, under permit from this Department.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street, Harlem River.

A coal pocket has been erected at this locality by Henry Meyer, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 15, 1907, and finished September 15, 1907.

One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street, Harlem River.

An extension to the coal pocket at this locality has been built by G. Robitzek, under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 15, 1907, and finished August 21, 1907.

One Hundred and Fortieth to One Hundred and Forty-second street, Harlem river,

The area at this locality is being filled in by Charles Hamilton, under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 5, 1907, and is in progress.

Sherman's Creek.

The work of grading and paving in the vicinity of Sherman's Creek has been in progress during the quarter by the force of the Department under Bureau Order No. 5084.

North Brother Island, East River.

The work of preparing for and building a concrete seawall and platform on piles at the easterly side of North Brother Island under Contract No. 1036 was begun January 23, 1907, and suspended March 27, 1907, in order to allow the rip-rap upon which the concrete sea wall was to be built to properly settle. The work has not yet been resumed, but it is expected that it will be recommenced in the early spring.

North of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Street, Harlem River.

The waterfront in this location is being improved by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company under permit from this Department. This work was begun on the 1st of September, 1905, and is in progress.

One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-ninth Streets, Port Morris.

A power house is being built and a concrete bulkhead wall constructed at this locality by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 1, 1904, and finished August 24, 1907.

Between Third and Lincoln Avenues, Harlem River.

Freight terminal structures, etc., have been erected at this locality by the Central Railroad of New Jersey, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 1, 1907, and finished July 16, 1907.

One Hundred and Eighty-ninth to One Hundred and Ninety-second Streets, Harlem River.

A crib bulkhead is being built at this locality and filling placed in rear of same by the Kingsbridge Real Estate Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun January 25, 1905, and has been suspended.

Westchester Creek and Eastern Boulevard.

A bulkhead platform and approach are being built at this location by the P. J. Heaney Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 15, 1907, and is in progress.

Lafayette and Turnbull Avenues, Westchester Creek.

A bulkhead platform is being built at the above location by the F. B. Smith Contracting Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 1, 1907, and is in progress.

Cheever place, Fordham Landing and Tiffany Street, East and Harlem Rivers. Test pile examinations were made preliminary to proposed improvements at the above locations.

Between Dupont and Tiffany Streets, Long Island Sound.

Bulkheads are being built at this locality and filling placed in rear of same by the Oak Point Land and Dock Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 3, 1906, and is in progress.

Between Cabot and Tiffany Streets, Long Island Sound.

Four piers and bulkheads are being built at the above location by the Oak Point Land and Dock Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 17, 1906, and is in progress.

Between Truxton and Cabot Streets, Long Island Sound.

A relieving platform is being constructed in the rear of the bulkhead at the above location by the Oak Point Land and Dock Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 10, 1907, and is in progress.

Two Hundred and First Street, Harlem River.

A pile platform has been constructed at the above location by the Harlem Contracting Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 29, 1907, and finished July 16, 1907.

Repairs to Unleased Piers and Bulkheads Owned by the City.

Repairs were made to unleased piers and bulkheads owned by the City on the North, East and Harlem rivers, as required, from time to time.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Whale Creek, Brooklyn.

In that section of the Borough of Brooklyn, adjacent to Newtown creek, near Greenpoint avenue, proceedings have been instituted to acquire the necessary property to secure pier room which existed only on Whale creek, an arm of Newtown creek. Near the mouth of Whale creek the property to be acquired will not only enable the City to build over 1,000 feet of bulkhead, but also two piers. Plans and specifications for this concrete seawall and one pier with an improved modern concrete reinforced deck were prepared during a prior quarter, but as yet nothing has been done towards the improvement on this part of the waterfront.

Between Twenty-eighth and Sixty-fourth Streets, South Brooklyn.

A plan has been submitted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund establishing new lines for bulkheads and piers, with marginal street, wharf or place, extending from Twenty-eighth to Sixty-fourth streets, south, Brooklyn. Plans and studies are in progress for the dock improvement of this waterfront in the future.

North Fourth Street, Brooklyn.

Crib bulkheads, transfer slips and fender piers have been built at this locality by the Havemeyer & Elder Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 25, 1907, and finished September 30, 1907.

Pier 3, Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

A bulkhead platform, with shed on same, is being constructed at the above location by the New York Central Railroad Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun January 10, 1907, and is in progress.

Pier 5, Erie Basin, Brooklyn.

An extension to the storehouse and pile platform on the north side of Pier 5, Erie basin, is being constructed by the Estate of William Beard, under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 23, 1907, and is in progress.

Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets, Brooklyn.

Five piers and bulkheads between are being built at the above location by the Bush Terminal Company, Limited, under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 5, 1902, and is in progress.

Sixty-fifth Street, Bay Ridge.

A pier and rack is being built at this locality by the Long Island Railroad Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 1, 1907, and is in progress.

Third Street, Gowanus Canal.

Two sheds have been erected at this locality by Paterson & Elder, under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 3, 1907, and finished September 10, 1907.

Between Bay Forty-sixth and Bay Forty-seventh Streets, Gravesend Bay.

Two small piers and a pile bulkhead are being constructed at the above location by Eugene J. & Sidney Grant, under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Neptune Avenue, Coney Island Creek.

A sheet pile bulkhead and lift bridge are being constructed at this locality, and gas mains and water pipe laid below the bed of the creek by the Brooklyn Borough Gas Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 22, 1907, and is in progress.

Manhattan Beach, Sheepshead Bay.

A pile bulkhead is being constructed and filling placed in rear of same, and a marginal street built at the above location by the Manhattan Beach Surety Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun on January 30, 1905, and is in progress.

Rockaway Parkway and East One Hundred and First Street, Jamaica Bay.

A sheet pile bulkhead is being built at this locality and same filled in by the Brooklyn and Canarsie Realty Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Bell Avenue, Willet's Point, Long Island Sound.

A crib and pile pier have been constructed at the above location by Daniel A. Skinnell, under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 3, 1907, and finished July 27, 1907.

West Side of Little Bay, Whitestone.

A crib bulkhead has been constructed at this locality by the Mercantile Land and Improvement Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 19, 1907, and finished September 1, 1907.

Third Street, College Point.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at this locality by the American Hard Rubber Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 16, 1907, and is in progress.

West of Grove Street, Flushing Creek.

A pile platform has been reconstructed at the above location by D. S. Jones, under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 9, 1907, and finished August 6, 1907.

Between Vernon and Pierce Avenues, Ravenswood.

A shop, yard crane, and offices are being constructed at this locality by Rabitch Brothers, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 1, 1907, and is in progress.

Between Pleasant Avenue and Maple Place, Rockaway.

A sheet pile bulkhead has been built and filling placed in rear of same by Charles Crabbe, under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 9, 1907, and finished September 20, 1907.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

A large number of permits have been granted to occupy land and to erect structures thereon at Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A description of the work being done for the ferry terminals in this borough will be found later on in the report under the heading of "Ferries."

A number of pieces of work have been done in the Borough of Richmond by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

A five-story reinforced concrete building is being erected on the easterly side of Franklin avenue, on the Kill von Kull side, Borough of Richmond, by J. B. King & Co. A bulkhead is being constructed between Grandview avenue and South avenue, Mariner's Harbor, by Meylert M. Armstrong. A crib bulkhead is being built at the foot of Arlington avenue, Mariner's Harbor, by J. Sterling Drake, and a crib bulkhead is being built by the same party at the foot of South avenue, Mariner's Harbor. A pier is being built at the foot of Mersereau avenue, Mariner's Harbor, by the Burlee Dry Dock Company. A crib bulkhead is being constructed at New Brighton, Staten Island, by J. B. King & Co. A crib bulkhead is being constructed at the James D. Leary Long Dock at Stapleton, Staten Island, by Bernard Brady, and a pile platform is being built in front of the present bulkhead, between Richmond road and Clinton street, Stapleton, and a sheet pile retaining structure built extending from Prospect street northerly to a point northerly of Sands street, with a return along the southerly side of the pier thereat, by Thomas H. K. S. Williams. Two piers and a slip are being built at the foot of Western avenue, Howland's Hook, by Proctor & Gamble. All the above work done under permit from this Department.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North, East and Harlem Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers where necessary to repair pavement already laid. The granite pavement along the North and East rivers has been repaired from time to time. The work under Contract No. 1094 for repairing the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers has been commenced and is in progress.

Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river waterfront as required.

Pile Basin, Sherman's Creek.

The pile basin at Sherman's creek on the Harlem river has been maintained and cared for.

Timber Basin, Seventy-fifth Street, North River.

At the Timber Basin timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required, the Timber Basin has been maintained and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

The work of building a new concrete boiler house at the West Fifty-seventh street yard by the force of the Department under Bureau Order No. 5090, has been in progress during the quarter.

Floating Property.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. A contract, No. 1041, was awarded during a previous quarter for building two wooden launches with a length of 60 feet, breadth 11 feet 6 inches and draft of 5 feet 6 inches, complete with all appurtenances, and the work was completed on the 31st of August, 1907, and the boats have been placed in commission.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, soundings, grades, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the waterfronts of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Piers.

The Recreation Piers on the North and East rivers have been maintained during the quarter, and the piers have been painted and repaired.

Public Baths.

During the quarter arrangements were made for receiving the public baths at the various places, and at the close of the season the various berths were restored to their original condition.

FERRIES.

New Staten Island Ferry.

The operation of this ferry by the City was begun on the 25th of October, 1905. During the present quarter the work of constructing the necessary ferry terminals at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, and at St. George, Staten Island, has been in progress. The work of building ferry structures at Whitehall street, East river, under Contract No. 918 having been completed on the 13th of December, 1906, plans and form of contract have been prepared for the erection of a terminal building for this ferry at this locality. At St. George, Staten Island, the work under Contract No. 896 will shortly be completed, and the terminal building has been completed under Contract No. 942 and is now being occupied. At Stapleton, Staten Island, arrangements are being made for the ferry structures in that locality, and the work of constructing a new pier at the foot of Canal street, Stapleton, to be used in connection with the ferry terminal at this locality, was completed under Contract No. 1002 on the 2d of July, 1907. A contract, No. 1023, has been awarded for preparing for and removing all of the old structures between Water and Canal streets, Stapleton, and for building new ferry structures thereat for the new Stapleton Ferry Terminal, and the work under this contract is rapidly approaching completion. A contract has been prepared for building machine shops, fire service, oil house, dumping board, coal pocket and coal handling machinery on the pier foot of Canal street, Stapleton, but as yet has not been let.

Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, South Brooklyn.

On the 1st of November, 1906, the City secured possession of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry to South Brooklyn and has been operating that ferry as a Municipal ferry since that date. A contract, No. 1019, was awarded during a prior quarter and work has been in progress in preparing for and removing old piers and ferry structures between Whitehall and Broad streets, Borough of Manhattan, and for building new ferry structures for the ferry terminal of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry. Under Contract No. 1022, awarded during a prior quarter, the work has been in progress in removing the old structures between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, and building new ferry structures for the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, and one ferry slip has been finished.

New Ferryboats for the New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry.

Under Contract No. 1003, awarded on August 27, 1906, the work of constructing three steel screw propelling ferryboats with two 2-cylinder compound engines each for use on the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry is about completed, and two of these boats, the "Gowanus" and "Bay Ridge" have been completed and placed in commission, and the third boat, the "Nassau," has been completed but not yet accepted.

Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the waterfront, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounts to 3,118 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements amounted to 2,090 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 107,222 square feet. Whereas, The Board did, on June 15, 1906, adopt a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute, in the name and on behalf of the City, a contract between the Company and the City, granting to the Company the right or franchise to construct, maintain and operate a conduit, with the necessary branches and connections therefrom, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, under and along certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of July, 1906, the Acting Mayor did execute, in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, a contract granting to the Company such right, which contract was dated the 22d day of June, 1906; and

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
