The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$514,000, to Meet Deficit in Code No. 2350, "Supplies, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, 1918."

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, May 15, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—I respectfully request that your Honorable Board, pursuant to the provisions of section 188, subdivision 8, of the Greater New York Charter, authorize an issue of special revenue bonds amounting to the sum of five hundred and fourteen thousand dollars (\$514,000), to meet an estimated deficit in Code 2350, Supplies, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, for the year 1918.

The reason for this additional expense is caused by the increased unit prices for forage and the necessity for the Department to feed more horses than the number allowed in the budget on account of the non-establishment of motor districts on the West Side.

The appropriation allowed for 1918 was \$606,954 00  
The estimated expenditure to May 8, 1918, is \$26,760 23

Leaving a balance of \$80,193 77

At the present contract prices, the estimated cost of additional forage required from June 1 to December 31, 1918, will amount to \$94,205 39

Leaving an estimated amount required to December 31, 1918, of \$514,011 62

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor:

Sir—In answer to your communication of the 17th instant, asking if it would not be possible to comply with the recommendations of the Director of Contract Supervision contained in the enclosed reports I have the honor to submit the following:

First: If the probable deficit in Codes Nos. 2350 and 2388, amounting to \$692,964.27 (as shown in table 2) is eliminated from the probable deficits the results will be as follows:

Probable deficits in certain codes other than Personal Service \$132,299 11

Probable surplus in certain codes other than Personal Service 95,051 34

Probable net deficit in all codes except Codes Nos. 2350 and 2388 \$37,247 77

On this basis it is clearly impossible to transfer probable surpluses in other accounts to Code No. 2350, as suggested in the report.

Second: From experience and information obtainable, I am of the opinion that the unit prices per hundredweight allowed in the report for oats, hay and straw are too low, as the prices on the bid opened June 6 for forage necessary to August 31 are as follows:

Oats, \$3.26 per hundredweight; hay, \$1.86 per hundredweight; straw, \$1.21 per hundredweight; bran, \$2.28 per hundredweight.

In the matter of bran the Washburn-Crosby Company of Minneapolis (through the United States Food Administration) have agreed to furnish our requirements for the balance of the year at \$1.781 per hundredweight, f. o. b. New York City, provided we can arrange to pay for same on sight draft basis. I have taken up the matter of payment with the Department of Finance and expect an answer in about ten days, and while there is no doubt that prices for forage necessary from September 1 to December 31, will be lower than the present prices, I do not believe they will reach the figures in the report.

I am of the opinion that Code No. 2350, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, should be replenished by an issue of special revenue bonds amounting to \$308,000 at the present time. Yours truly,

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sir—Application is hereby made to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$3,600, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be used to make good the shortage in Code No. 1131, Fuel Supplies, supporting the budget appropriations to this Department for 1918.

This deficit is because of the fact that in the budget for 1918 \$8.50 a ton for coal was used as a basis, while the actual cost of the coal purchased up to date ranges between \$9.30 and \$10.05 per ton; and also because of the severity of last winter there was an excess consumption of coal over the estimate to the amount of 100 tons.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends approval of the request of the Fire Commissioner that 13 Cable Splicers in the Fire Department be placed on a yearly basis of \$1,730.40 each.

The matter was referred to the Committee on June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 40).

The request of the Fire Commissioner is based on a request from the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers that the salary of Cable Splicers be fixed at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, which was referred to the Fire Commissioner on May 13, 1918 (Cal. No. 58).

There are 16 Cable Splicers in the Fire Department: 1 at \$1,500, 1 at \$1,440, 8 at \$1,400, 3 at \$1,380, 2 at \$1,320 and 1 at \$1,260. One of these employees is a Foreman at \$1,440, and 3 are detailed as Acting Foremen, 1 at \$1,500 and 2 at \$1,400.

The work of these employees consists of splicing and maintaining the underground cable system of the fire alarm telegraph system of the city.

The Commissioner recommends that the salaries of 13 of these 16 be fixed at \$1,730.40 and that there be no change in the salaries of 3 who are now receiving \$1,400. The Assistant Engineer in charge of the Bureau of Fire Alarm Telegraph states that no increase is recommended for these three for the reason that they are not as capable in the work to be performed as are the others.

The actual time a Cable Splicer works is 276 regular 8-hour days and 22 equivalent 8-hour periods, consisting of holidays, Sundays and Saturday afternoons, the men taking turns on working and being on call during this time. During the last four years none of the men have been called out during the night for duty.

The requested rate of \$1,730.40 is based on \$5.60 per day for 276 days, 8 hours per day, and 22 days at \$8.40 per day (time and one-half) for Saturday afternoons, Sundays and holidays.

The New York Telephone Company Cable Splicers of first grade receive a salary of \$34 per week and the second grade men \$28 per week. For Sunday work time and a half is paid. The men are allowed Saturday afternoon off, with pay, during the months of May to September. If they are required to work Saturday afternoons during this period they are paid an extra hour for every hour worked. The ten holidays during the year they are allowed with pay. If required to work on holidays they are paid an extra day for every day worked. The company also provides for pensions.

The Safety Insulated Wire and Cable Company pays \$5 per day for 8 hours' work. Sunday work is paid for double the daily rate. The men do not work Saturday afternoons. Holiday work is paid for at the same rate as Sunday work. The company has no pension arrangement. The men lose no time for delays due to bad weather or waiting for instructions.

James Sugden Company pays \$5 per day for 8 hours per day. When required to work Sundays or holidays they are paid time and one-half. Men are allowed Saturday afternoon off during summer months, and when required to work they only get straight time up to the time that makes an 8-hour day. No pension arrangement.

The City of Cleveland pays \$120 per month. No extra time allowed for emergency work. The men get Saturday afternoon off and work one-half day on holidays. No pension arrangement.

The City of Baltimore has one man and pays \$3.60 per day for 8 hours per day.

The City of Boston pays \$4.75 per day for 6 days' work and time and one-half for overtime and Sunday work. They do not work Saturday afternoons. If called upon for holiday work time and one-half is paid. They receive a pension after 25 years of service and 55 years of age.

The City of Philadelphia pays \$1,400 per annum and \$40 additional for uniforms. They are rated as electrical plumbers; one foreman at \$1,600 and \$40 additional for uniforms. They are allowed Sundays and Saturday afternoons off as well as holidays, but are subject to call for any emergency that may arise and are allowed two weeks vacation.

The City of Chicago pays \$7 per day and double time for Sunday, Saturday afternoon and holiday work. They may be retired on pensions. Prior to January 1, 1918, the Splicers were paid \$6.25 per day.

The New York and Queens Electric Light and Power Company pays 54½ cents per hour (\$4.36 per day). Time and one-half is paid for Sunday work and for Saturday afternoons after 3 p. m. and after 7 p. m. on other week days. They are paid for one-half day for all holidays.

It would appear, therefore, that a rate of \$1,730.40 per annum should be fixed for the Cable Splicers employed in the Fire Department.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Docks, on May 28, 1918, presented a petition from eleven Machinists' Helpers, employed in the department, for increases in wages from \$3.25 to \$4 per diem.

This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades (No. 80, Calendar of June 7, 1918).

On April 6, 1918, the United States Shipping and Wage Adjustment Board fixed the rate for Machinists' Helpers employed on government work at 46 cents per hour, 8 hours a day, with extra compensation for overtime, Sunday or holiday work. This is at the rate of \$3.68 per diem.

All individuals and firms engaged in ship building and boat repairs in Greater New York are paying the \$3.68 rate, and the work required of Machinists' Helpers employed by them, especially repair work, is similar to the work performed by the Machinists' Helpers in the Dock Department.

Employers of Machinists' Helpers who have no government contracts and no marine work are paying their workmen on the average of 40 cents per hour, or at the rate of \$3.20 per diem. Their workmen, however, are not as skilled as the Dock Department workmen or those employed in other City departments, a large majority of whom are qualified to assist the Machinist in setting up heavy work and outside repair work and in disassembling machines. They are also competent to do minor machinists' work, filing and grinding, and to work on the drill press.

Machinists' Helpers who are at all skillful are demanding and receiving from many employers almost the same rates paid to Machinists. Helpers who are paid less than \$3.50 or \$3.68 per diem are generally handy men who have little knowledge of the trade.

The prevailing rate for Machinists' Helpers is not \$4 per diem, as requested by the Dock Department, and it is recommended that the request, in so far as it relates to that rate, be denied. The prevailing rate is \$3.68 per diem for workmen of the class employed by the Dock Department.

It would be advisable at this time to make the \$3.68 rate applicable to all City departments, for the reason that workmen of the trade employed by the City have been employed, with few exceptions, for many years and their experience and knowledge is valuable to the departments in which they work.

The increased cost of the new rate for the Dock Department will amount approximately to \$800 and for other City departments to \$3,000.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution fixing the rate for Machinists' Helpers employed in City departments at \$3.68 per diem, effective as of June 1, 1918. Respectfully,

Gentlemen—On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 103), the Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication from the then Secretary of the Health Department requesting an additional appropriation of \$2,181.47 on account of contract of William E. Austin, architect, for preparing final plans, specifications and the supervision of construction of the measles pavilion on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital. This Committee on January 30, 1918, requested the Health Commissioner to furnish additional and more definite information with regard to this request. Under date of February 8, 1918, the Secretary of the Health Department advised this Committee as follows:

"On July 29, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the contract of Wm. E. Austin, architect, for the final plans, specifications and supervision of construction of a measles pavilion on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital in the sum of \$8,000, based on an estimated cost of construction of \$200,000; before the final plans for the building were approved, additional funds in the sum of \$60,000 were authorized for the construction of an additional wing to the building which increased the estimate cost of the building to \$260,000. These plans and specifications were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 28, 1911. Under the terms of the contract the fee for service of the architect were as follows: 5 per cent. on the total cost of construction and 2½ per cent. additional fee for all heating, plumbing, electrical work, power plants and apparatus, appliances, fixtures and equipment.

**Communication from the Corporation Counsel Relative to Resolution Calling for a Report of Method and Procedure by Which the City Could Take Over the Properties Owned and Operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.**

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, April 18, 1918.

Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication from you, dated January 17, 1918, signed Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Committee on Finance, and reading as follows:

"In accordance with the action of the Board of Aldermen, I respectfully refer the enclosed resolution for your consideration, and request that you report to the Finance Committee with respect thereto at your earliest convenience."

The resolution enclosed by you is as follows: "Resolution Calling upon the Corporation Counsel for Report to the Board of Method and Procedure by Which the City Could Immediately Take Over the Properties Owned and Operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company."

"By Aldermen Vladeck and Wolff—

"Whereas, Conditions of travel on the surface and elevated lines of the Borough of Brooklyn do especial violence to all standards of human decency; and "Whereas, Such conditions of travel not only continually and in special measure discommode, inconvenience and degrade those who are forced to use the said surface and elevated lines, but also and in equal measure place in jeopardy their very life and limb; and

"Whereas, Such conditions grow steadily worse, creating a feeling of bitter resentment among all classes of the population in the said Borough of Brooklyn; therefore, be it

"Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

"(1) That the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, by virtue of his position as legal advisor to the said Board, as provided for in section 255 of the City Charter, is hereby directed to ascertain each and every method and form of procedure consistent with the Federal and State Constitutions, and with or without specific authority granted by the Legislature of the State of New York for that purpose, by which the said City could immediately take over the properties now owned and operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, and any or all of the subsidiary companies affiliated therewith, and by which the said City could own and operate the same for the sole benefit of the inhabitants thereof; and

"(2) That the said Corporation Counsel is hereby directed to present a full report of his findings in this matter to the said Board within a period of six weeks from the date of the adoption of this resolution.

"Which was referred to the Committee on Finance with instructions to communicate with the Corporation Counsel in the matter."

In answer, I am of the opinion and advise you that both section 73 of the Greater New York Charter and the Rapid Transit Act (Laws of 1891, chapter 4, as amended) empower the City to provide in its franchise grants for the taking over of the property of street railway companies at the termination of the grants to them, or at a fixed time after notice. They also authorize the City to operate street railways so taken over.

Upon receipt of your communication I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to inform me fully as to the provisions contained in franchise grants to the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and its subsidiary companies (copies of my letters are hereto attached), and until I receive this detailed information I will not attempt to advise you what procedure to follow, where the City may have reserved the right to take over or to purchase the plant and property of those companies or any of them.

Where there are no provisions in the grant for taking over or purchasing the railway property I do not think there is any power in the City to do so by condemnation or otherwise.

It would seem that the most effective way, in fact the only way, for the City to acquire and operate the Brooklyn Rapid Transit System as a whole would be to secure specific legislative authority and in this connection I call your attention to a bill introduced at the last session of the Legislature entitled "An act to amend the general city law in relation to the power of cities to acquire, construct, own, operate and lease public utilities" (Nos. 747, 808, 1130).

The enactment of this or a similar law would permit the City to take over and operate any or all street railways as well as other public utilities.

In planning to purchase public utilities, such as a street railway system, the City's constitutional debt limit must of course be considered, and in this connection whether the particular street railway is or is not self-sustaining may prove to be an important factor.

Upon receipt of the information requested from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment I will advise you further. Respectfully yours,

#### An Ordinance to License Second-hand Postage Stamp Dealers.

By the Vice-Chairman—

AN ORDINANCE to license second-hand postage stamp dealers.

Section —

**Definition Exceptions.** Any person, partnership or corporation dealing in the purchase and sale of uncanceled United States postage stamps, postal cards or stamped envelopes is hereby defined to be a postage dealer. Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed to apply to the general post-office or any branch post-office or postal station, or any person authorized by the United States Government to sell postage stamps, postal cards or stamped envelopes.

Section . No postage dealer shall carry on business without a license from the Commissioner of Licenses of the City of New York, nor at any other place than the one designated in his license, nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired.

All licenses for postage dealers shall be issued as of August first in each year, and shall expire on the thirty-first day of July next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

Section . Every postage dealer shall keep a book in which shall be legibly written in English, at the time of every purchase, a description of all stamps, postal cards or stamped envelopes purchased, the number and amount thereof and any description or other marks or identification that may appear thereon, the name, place of business and a general description of the person from whom purchased, the day and hour of the purchase and the sum paid therefor. Said book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, the Commissioner of Licenses or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate of the city, or any person duly authorized in writing for that purpose by the Commissioner of Licenses, or by any magistrate who shall exhibit such written authority to the postage dealer.

Section . Every postage dealer upon being served with a written notice so to do by a member of the Police Department, or a representative of the District Attorney of any County within the City of New York, shall report to the Police Commissioner or such District Attorney, on blank forms to be furnished, a copy of the records kept under section of this article during the day or days specified in such notice.

Section . No postage dealer shall purchase any postage stamps, postal cards or stamped envelopes from any minor, apprentice or servant, knowing or having reason to believe the person to be such, or from any person or persons whatsoever between the hours of 6 o'clock in the evening and 7 o'clock in the morning.

Section . Any person who shall violate or neglect or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding , or by both such fine and imprisonment.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 12, article 1, chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to amusements and exhibitions, by adding a new paragraph beginning after the words "any street."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: That no person, firm or corporation shall permit tickets to be sold at more than the price stamped on same, nor shall they permit tickets to be sold at any place other than the recognized box office of such building, garden, grounds, concert room, roof, roof garden, or other room or place within the city where the performance of any tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing, wrestling, boxing, baseball games, six day races, football games, and any part or parts thereof, nor any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, nor any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances, or rope dancers.

Any person, firm or corporation offending against the provisions of this chapter and every person aiding in such violations by advertisements or otherwise, and every owner or lessee of any building, part of building, grounds, garden, roof, roof garden or concert room, or other room or place, who shall lease or let out the same for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance or assent that the same be used for any such purpose shall have revoked and annulled the license of the convicted licensee and said licensee shall not thereafter be entitled to a license under any provision of this chapter.

##### Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Filing an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, the Sanitary Code, Relating to Buildings.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on February 13, 1918 (Minutes, page 401), the annexed ordinance to amend article 4 of chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, the Sanitary Code, relating to buildings, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That your Committee, being of opinion that the Board has no authority to amend the Sanitary Code, appointed a subcommittee to confer with the Chairman of the Board of Standards and Appeals and the Superintendent of Building, Manhattan, for the purpose of drafting an ordinance which would meet the purpose without conflict with the Sanitary Code. The result of such conference was the introduction of No. 654 (Ord. No. 66) June 25, 1918.

This matter requiring no further consideration is recommended for filing.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 4 of chapter 20, section 52 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to buildings of the Sanitary Code, by adding Section A thereto.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 52 of article 4 of chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Sanitary Code, is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new section, to read as follows:

Section A. No owner or lessee of any building, premises, or part thereof, which is rented or leased for dwelling purposes and which building, or part thereof, is equipped with steam radiators or steam risers and wherein the only adequate means of heating properly the said building, or part thereof, is by means of steam, shall permit the said building, or part thereof, to remain heated at a temperature of less than 68 degrees Fahrenheit for a greater period than six hours during any twenty-four hours, where the said owner or lessee receives notice that a person in the said building is ill.

Upon the conviction of any person for the violation of the above section said person shall be punished by a fine of \$250.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The purpose of the ordinance is to compel the Public Service Corporations to procure permits for all highway subsurface work, so that the Department may have jurisdiction over the same and see that the work is completed in the speediest manner without keeping the City's streets continually torn up.

Your Committee being fully in accord with the purpose of the ordinance recommends its adoption.

##### AN ORDINANCE to Amend Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1, Chapter 23, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE 19.

Section 253. No gas company, telephone company, electric light company, nor any individual, company, corporation, or association of persons, shall be allowed to lay, relay, install any pipes, mains, conduits, or services, for the use and transmission of gas, electricity, pneumatic power or steam, or perform any work that is under the jurisdiction, cognizance and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in any street or public place, without a written permit from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Section 254. No person shall violate any provision of this article, or any notice of special direction issued thereunder, under a penalty of \$100 for each offense.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect on

Dear Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the purchase in the open market, without public letting, of forty-eight (48) sets of double truck harness, at \$77.90 each, a total expenditure not to exceed \$3,739.20.

The reasons for this request are as follows: The last time we purchased double truck harness was in March, 1917, at the same price per set as now offered. Since then the United States Government has fixed the price of harness leather at 75 cents per pound, which is about 7 cents per pound higher than in March, 1917. Owing to the demands of the Government for linen thread, such as is used in making harness, it is impossible to obtain the same at the present time without a Government release.

The Linen Thread Company, which is the largest thread manufacturer in this country, will not furnish thread except to those who hold contracts with the government for making harness or aeroplanes. This Department has had considerable difficulty in obtaining a release for a sufficient quantity of thread with which to make necessary repairs to harness.

This ordinance provides that where a probation member of the Police or Fire Departments shall have been dismissed the aggrieved may apply to the Mayor for a rehearing of the charges upon which he was dismissed.

This ordinance simply transfers a provision of State law to the Code of Ordinances, making it one of local nature.

Your Committee recommends its adoption.

## SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 18 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "police," by changing the title thereof to read "police and fire," and by inserting in said chapter, under "article 2, uniformed force," a new section relating to the hearing or rehearing of charges or causes for the dismissal of reduction of members.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Chapter 18 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Police," is hereby amended so that the title thereof shall read "Police and Fire."

Sec. 2. Chapter 18 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended, under "Article 2, Uniformed Force," by the insertion of a new section to read as follows:

Section 5. *Members, dismissed or reduced; hearing or rehearing of charges or causes therefor.*

§5. *Members, dismissed or reduced; hearing or rehearing of charges or causes therefor.*

When a member of the police department or the fire department shall have been dismissed or reduced, after trial by the police commissioner or the fire commissioner, as the case may be, from the position or rank theretofore held by him, or when a probationary member of the police department or the fire department shall have been dismissed, the person aggrieved may make written application to the mayor setting forth the reasons for demanding a hearing or rehearing of the charges or causes upon which he was dismissed or reduced, and provided that such dismissed or reduced member or probationary member shall waive in writing all claim against the city for back pay, the mayor may, in writing, consent to such hearing or rehearing, stating the reasons why such charges should be heard or reheard. Such application for a hearing or rehearing shall be made within one year after this ordinance takes effect, or within one year from the date of the dismissal or reduction, if such dismissal or reduction occurs after this ordinance takes effect. Such hearing or rehearing shall be had before the police commissioner if the applicant was a member or probationary member of the police department, and before the fire commissioner if the applicant was a member or probationary member of the fire department, and if such commissioner, as the case may be, shall determine that such member or probationary member has been illegally or unjustly dismissed or reduced from his position or rank, such commissioner, as the case may be, may restore him to the position or rank from which he was dismissed or reduced and allow him the whole of the time since any such dismissal or reduction to be applied on his time of service in his department, or for such other and further relief as such commissioner, as the case may be, may determine just, or affirm the dismissal or reduction as he may determine from the evidence. If the applicant be a probationary member of the police or the fire department, the commissioner, as the case may be, may allow him the time already served as a probationary member to count as time served, but shall not allow the time between the date of his dismissal and his restoration to count as service in his department.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Such rehearing shall be had before the Police Commissioner of The City of New York if the applicant [be] was a probationary member or member of the Police Department, and before the Fire Commissioner if the applicant [is] was a probationary member or member of the Fire Department, and if such Commissioner shall determine that such probationary member or member has been illegally or unjustly dismissed or reduced from his position or rank, such Commissioner may restore him to the position or rank from which he was dismissed and allow him the whole of the time since any such dismissal or reduction to be applied on his time of service in such Department, or for such other and further relief as such Commissioner may determine just, or affirm the dismissal or reduction, as he may determine from the evidence. If the applicant be a probationary member of the Police or Fire Department such Commissioner may allow him the time already served as a probationary member to count as time served, but shall not allow the time between the date of his dismissal and his restoration to count as service in such Department.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Fire Prevention."

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on April 30, 1918 (Minutes, page 138), the annexed ordinance to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention" respectfully

##### REPORTS:

That the purpose of this ordinance is to provide a protection against fire and consequent panic in moving picture theatres. Voluminous data has been submitted to the Committee relative to the dangers of fire from broken films and defective machinery. Numerous petitions from operators of moving picture machines advocating the passage of such an ordinance have been received by the Committee. In its investigation the Committee was advised that no such protection is provided at present and believing that there is an imperative need for such, it recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "fire prevention," is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision to read as follows:

2. To prevent films in projecting machines from taking fire. Every motion picture projecting machine used for the projecting of motion pictures, shall be equipped with an approved automatic shutter placed between the condensers and the film, and so arranged as to close immediately and automatically should the film become stationary through breakage or failure of the take-up to work properly.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 2 of section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby changed to and shall be known as subdivision 3.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That the purpose of the proposed ordinance is to make the existing provision of the Code more definite and certain. To permit the present section to stand is to invite confusion and embarrassment to the Borough Presidents, who are charged with the duty of keeping the sidewalks in a safe condition for the traveling public.

Your Committee, believing this ordinance to be a benefit to both property owners and the public, recommends its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 161 of article 14 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "areas;" "special restrictions."

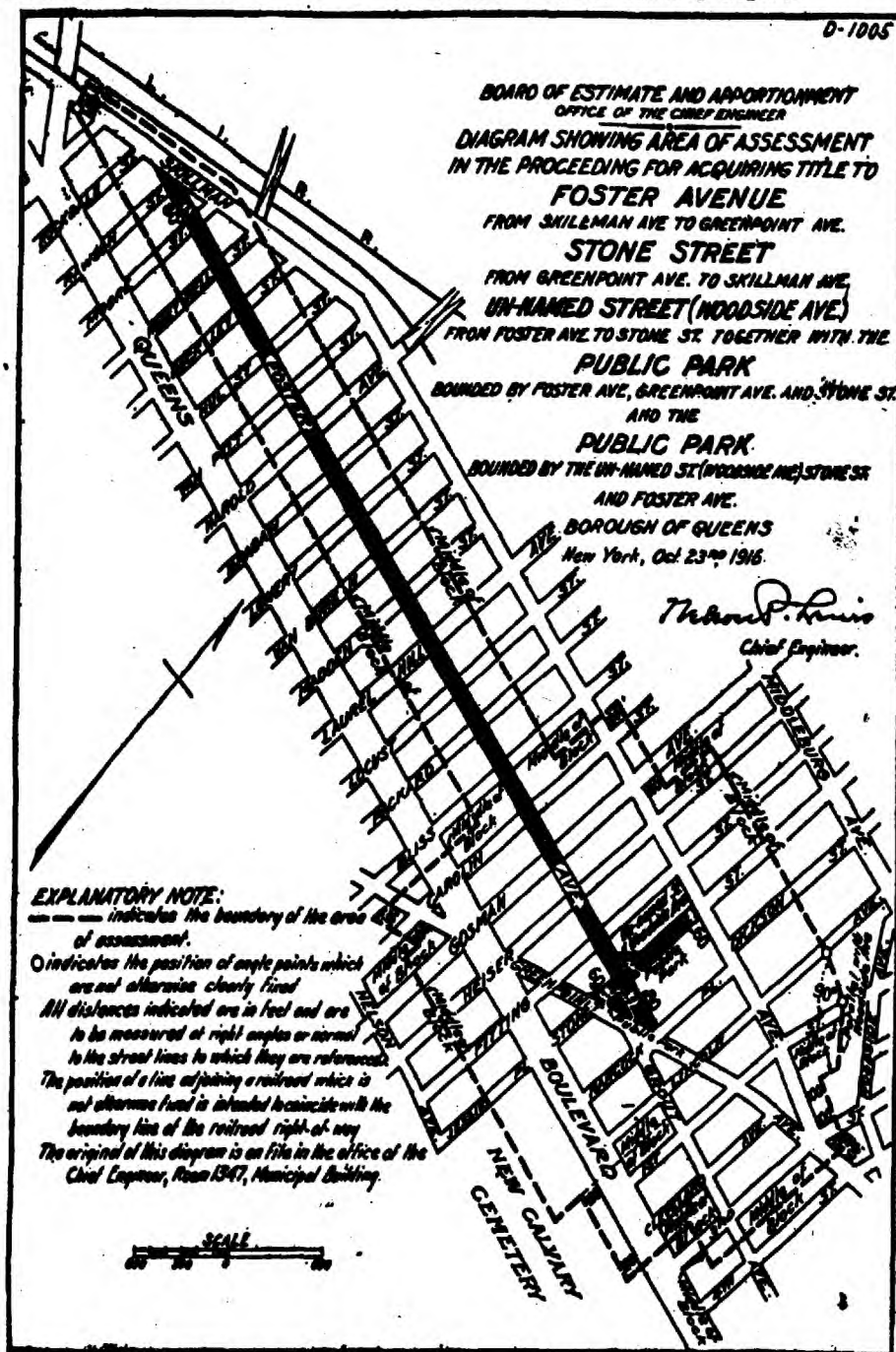

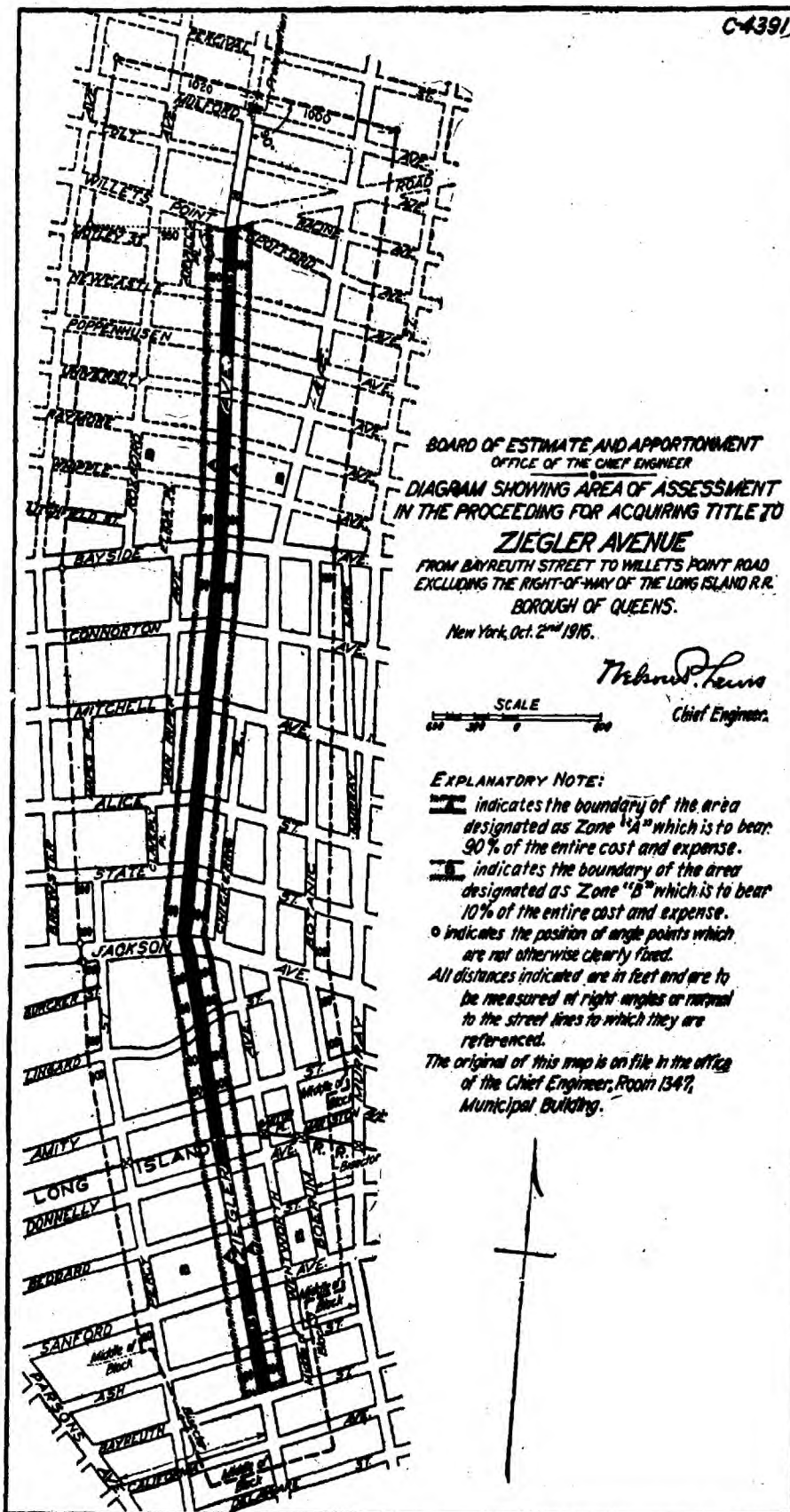

thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.
