




#### **Key Findings**

- HOPE count down 25% since 2005
  - 1,089 less New Yorkers living unsheltered in public spaces
- Total estimate of 3,306 unsheltered individuals
  - Decrease of 12% from last year
- Subways decreased 30% from last year




## Unsheltered Population Declines 25% Since 2005






## Homeless Living Unsheltered in NYC Declines 12% in Last Year






# Subway Population Drops 30% from 2007

# Success through Innovation and Partnerships



#### From Street to Home

- New housing resources and choices for longest street homeless population
- Single point of accountability in each borough increases provider responsibility and coordination
- In the last six months has moved 450 of the longest street homeless New Yorkers into housing



#### A Safe Haven from the Street

- Targets hardest to serve population by providing temporary housing with few requirements or restrictions
- Average client's length of street homelessness is 8 years
- 200 new beds since November 2006; more than 500 expected by the end of 2008



#### City/MTA Partnership

- MTA and DHS outreach teams increasing coordinated efforts and sharing best practices
- MTA using Street to Home program and Safe Haven beds to place longest homeless clients
