HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, NEW YORK, October 30, 1877.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, October 27, 1877, 429 deaths were reported to this Bureau, being a decrease of 105 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 5 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending October 20, was 528, which is 33.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.37 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,080.

The six most fotal discovered at 1,000 persons living the population estimated

The six most fatal diseases during the past week were the following, which caused 55.71 per cent. of the total mortality, viz.: Phthisis pulmonalis, 84; pneumonia, 45; diarrhoeal diseases, 34; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 27; Bright's disease, 25; diphtheria, 24. Compared with the deaths for the corresponding week of last year the deaths from phthisis pulmonalis, were 12: Pneumonia, 8; diphtheria, 6; scarlatina and typhus fever were each I more; and small-pox, I; membranous croup, 2; bronchitis, 4, and typhoid fever I less than during that week.

The deaths during the past compared with the preceding week showed a decrease from the following causes, viz.: Scarlatina, 10; diphtheria, 8; croup, 2; whooping cough, 7; erysipelas, I; cerebrospinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhead diseases, 15; inanition, 3; bronchitis, 2; diseases of the heart, 7; marasmus and scrofula, II; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 19; entertiis, gastritis and peritonitis, 7; cyanosis, I; premature and pretrematural births, 2; while measles increased 2; typhus fever, I; cancers, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 18; pneumonia, 11; hydrocephalus, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 5. There were 7 less deaths from suicide, 5 from drowning, 14 of persons 70 years and more, 28 of children under 1 year, 25 under 2, and 52 under 5 during the past than were reported for the previous week.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 63 were in institutions, 215 in tenementhouses, 143 in houses containing 3 families and less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 93 on the first, 145 on the second, 66 on the third, 40 on the forth, 10 on the fifth, and 2 on the sixth; 421 were stated to be residents o

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections and amendments of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 189. Whenever a nuisance in any place at or upon any premises in the City of New York, shall have been found or declared by resolution of the Board of Health to exist, and an order shall have been made directing the owner or lessee of such premises to make suitable and necessary repairs or improvements, or to abate the said nuisance, such repairs or improvements shall be made, and such nuisance shall be fully abated in the manner directed by the Board of Health, within five days after notice thereof.

Section 190. All sinks, basins, and stationary tubs in every hotel, lodging, tenement, or boarding-house in the City of New York, shall be provided with proper stench traps directly under each sink, basin or stationary tub, so connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed as directly under each sink, basin or stationary tub, so connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed as directly of New York, within twenty feet of any dwelling, shall be ventilated by means of an eight-inch earthenware pipe, laid at least six inches below the surface of the yard, from the said vault to the nearest wall of the building of the greatest altitude at or upon said premises, and there connected with a vertical metallic shaft of like diameter extending not less than two feet above the roof of such building. And every privy vault in the City of New York in accordance with directions from and orders made therefor by the Board of Health.
