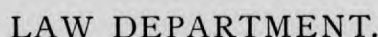

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 8, 1881.

Present—The full Board.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held the 2d instant were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Iron Steamboat Company—For permission to cut down the end of Pier, new 1, North river, in two places, to facilitate the landing of their passengers from their boats. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report on the same.

From Stephens and Condit Transportation Company, lessees—For permission to erect small triangular platform at Pier 22, North river. Applicants requested to call on the Commissioners in reference to the same.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to the widening of Pier 21, East river, on its westerly end. C. H. Mallory & Company, applicants for said improvement appeared, and were heard in reference to the additional rent to be charged for the addition, if made to the pier.

From James Fitzpatrick, Corporation Wharfinger—As to incumbrances on bulkhead between Bank and Jane streets, North river, bulkhead south of Pier at Little Twelfth street, and bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river.

From Schwarzschild & Sulzberger—For permission to erect platform between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report the condition of the premises.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Theodore F. Tone, lessee—To have repairs made and dredging done at Piers at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth, One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river. Applicant informed that repairs and dredging to be done at said premises have been ordered.

From John J. McCook, lessee—To have repairs made and dredging done at bulkhead at Fourteenth street, North river. Applicant informed that repairs and dredging to be done at said premises have already been ordered.

From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to form of contract for dredging various slips on the North and East rivers.

From New York Ontario & Western Railway Company—In reference to the use of the Borer "Woodcock," loaned to it by the Department; also report of the Engineer-in-chief in reference to the same. Engineer-in-Chief directed to report when the boring rods belonging to said machine, lost while in service by said company, are replaced.

From Daniel Dailey, lessee—To have dirt and refuse removed from the bulkhead at Fourteenth street, East river. Secretary directed to address a communication to the Police Department, calling attention to the communication sent them on the 29th of April last, in reference to the removal of the refuse from the aforesaid premises, and requesting that the said dirt and refuse be removed without delay, as the lessee cannot use the premises in its present condition.

From John Russell's Sons and others—To have the Public Bath removed from Pier at Fifty-first street, North river, in order to afford additional wharf accommodations thereat. Commissioner of Public Works requested to advise this Department in writing if it is possible and expedient to have said bath removed to some other location.

From D. P. Turcott—In reference to his discharge from service in the Department.

From T. Eldridge—To have dredging done at Forty-second street, East river. Applicant advised that dredging at said premises has already been ordered.

From Union Stock Yard and Market Company—To have a runway cut in the end of pier to be built by this Department, at Fifty-eighth street, North river. Applicants informed that this Department has no objection to them having said runway made under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided they make arrangements with the contractor for building said pier, to do the work at their own cost and expense, and obtain from him, and file in this office an agreement to the effect that the making of said improvement shall not in any way affect his obligations under the contract with this Department for building said pier.

From Maine Steamship Company—To repair shed on Pier 38, East river, and hold occupation of said pier till May 1, 1882. Applicant informed that his request cannot be granted, as it is the intention of this Department to enter very soon upon the premises for the purpose of rebuilding the same.

From P. Hotchkiss—In reference to stone incumbering the bulkhead between Horatio and Gansevoort streets, North river. Corporation Wharfinger for the district directed to notify the owners of said stone to remove it forthwith.

From P. Clyde, lessee—In reference to having repairs made to the portion of Piers 33 and 34. East river, owned by private parties, at the same time that this Department is repairing the portions owned by the city. Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare form of contract and specifications for having the work done by the private owners conjointly with this Department.

From Arthur D. Williams, Chairman—In reference to resolution of Legislature limiting the time for investigating the affairs of the Department of Docks.

From New York, Lake Erie, and Western Railroad Company—Requesting that the coping be so placed on bulkhead wall, between Piers, new 20 and new 21, North river, occupied by them, as to bring it on a level with the piers, in order to facilitate the discharge of freight, etc., and also to erect sheds on said bulkhead, etc. Secretary directed to state in reply, that this Department cannot comply with its request in either case, it never having agreed to give permission for the erection of sheds upon the said bulkhead, or others constructed upon the new plan adopted by this Department for the improvement of the water-front; and further, that the Engineer-in-Chief has been instructed to proceed with the work of placing the coping in position from the north to the south end of the bulkhead in question.

From Theodore F. Tone, lessee—To have spring piles placed at Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, for the protection of steamboats landing passengers thereat. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work.

From William McConkey, Corporation Wharfinger—In reference to the casks of bleaching powder incumbering Piers 3 and 4, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owners of said piers, and J. L. and D. S. Riker, and Wing and Evans, consignees of said casks, to remove the same forthwith, in default of which the penalty of \$50 per day, established by this Department for failure to comply with the notice of removal, will be imposed.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting the return of Department Pile Driver No. 7, loaned to Holmes Brothers. Secretary directed to forward bill to said Holmes Brothers, for the amount due for the use of said pile driver, with the request, that they pay said amount to the Treasurer of this Department.

A communication was received from the Hoboken Land and Improvement Co., in reference to their application to improve the ferry premises at Barclay street, North river, and, being read, was,

On motion, referred to a Committee of the full Board.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief, suspending Thomas Potter, for absence from duty, and, being read, was,

On motion, referred to Commissioner Vanderpoel.

Commissioner Vanderpoel, to whom was referred the application of the East River Bathing Company to locate a bath at Pier at Fifty-first street, East river, reported that he had conferred with the applicants, and that they had consented to pay the sum of \$200 as wharfage for the use of said premises.

On motion, the report was accepted, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the East River Bathing Company to place and maintain during the pleasure of the Board at the foot of Fifty-first street, East river, a floating bath; provided said company shall file in this Department an agreement to pay, on the 15th of July next, the sum of \$200 as rent for said premises for the season of 1881.

Commissioner Vanderpoel, to whom was referred the application of P. & A. McDonnell, to have the location of the derrick on bulkhead north of Pier, new 1, North river, changed, reported that he had conferred with the applicants, and recommended that their petition be denied.

On motion, the report was accepted, and the aforesaid application denied.

The application of Crawford Maxwell, for permission to insert drain-pipes through the bulkhead at Jackson street, East river, was,

On motion, taken from the table and denied.

The Secretary reporting that, by direction of the Commissioners, permission had been granted on the 4th instant to Franklin Wight to insert a six-inch drain-pipe in bulkhead, between Piers 39 and 40, East river, the consent of the owners of said bulkhead having been filed in this office,

On motion, the action of the Commissioners was approved.

W. J. Preston appeared, and was heard in reference to the application for building a Pier at Forty-ninth street, North river, and stated he would confer with those interested, and advise what rent he would be prepared to give for said pier when built.

N. L. McCready appeared in reference to the rent to be charged for Pier, old 37, and, being heard in reference thereto,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and directed to cause to be charged and collected from the Old Dominion Steamship Company, in conformity with resolution adopted July 16, 1879, the sum of \$1,000, as wharfage, due for the use of a portion of Pier, old 37, North river, while awaiting the completion of Pier, new 26, North river, erected on the site thereof.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify C. H. Mallory & Company, lessees of Pier 21, East river, that before the Department can proceed to make the desired improvement, it will be necessary that they file in this office an agreement, in writing, to pay as rent for the addition to the width of the pier the sum of \$800 per annum, and also to obtain the written consent of the lessees of the bulkhead between Piers 20 and 21, to the proposed widening of Pier 21.

Commissioner Laimbeer reporting that he had on the 6th instant suspended Thomas McCarthy, Senior, Foreman of dump at Chambers street section,

On motion, the matter was referred to Commissioner Laimbeer for examination and report.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting form of contract and specifications for repairing piers at Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Thirty-fourth, Fortieth, Forty-seventh, and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, and, being read,

On motion, it was,

Resolved, That the form of specifications and contract as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for repairing piers at Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Thirty-fourth, Fortieth, Forty-seventh, and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, be and hereby is approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The Board went here into executive session.

An opinion was received from the Counsel to the Corporation as to the powers of this Department to reject bids received by the Department after being duly advertised according to law, and, being read, was,

On motion, placed on file.

A communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation in reference to certain data regarding the occupation of Pier 37, East river, and, being read, was,

On motion, referred to the Secretary to furnish any facts which he can obtain in reference to the subject.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the

duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
