

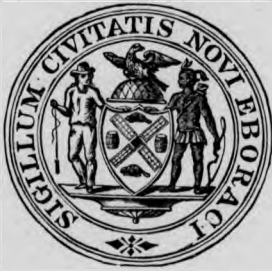

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks held January 15, 1886.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held January 13, 1886, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit :

From the Comptroller of the City :

1st. Requesting value of wharf property occupied by the Union Ferry Company for ferry purposes. Referred to the President.

2d. Reference to estimate in favor of Jenkins & Tregarthen, for \$2,880 for repairing hull of tug "Manhattan," and desiring to be informed why the same is charged to Construction Account, instead of to General Repairs Account. Referred to the President, with power.

From the Department of Public Works—Reporting that the bulkhead and platform in front of pipe-yard on East river, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, are in a dangerous condition. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Requesting copies of certain annual reports of the Department. The action of the President in transmitting said copies was approved.

From Diedrich Willers, Deputy Secretary of State, and Elnathan Sweet, State Engineer and Surveyor—Acknowledging receipt of resolution adopted by the Department respecting applications for grants of land under water.

From John Sloan—Requesting appointment as captain of tug "Manhattan."

From F. P. Eastman—In reference to dumping board at the foot of Bogart street, North river.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of resolution adopted January 13, 1886.

From Edward Abel, Dock Master—Reporting that bearing-pile, half-round fenders and mooring-post are broken at Pier 44, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work required thereat.

From the Engineer-in-Chief :

1st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5010, that he had repaired Pier foot of Thirty-fifth street, North river.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5032, that he had repaired Pier 37, East river.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5033, that he had repaired Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5036, that he had repaired Pier 41, East river.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5041, that he had repaired Pier at Fortieth street, North river.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 5042, in reference to the application of N. Park Collins for permission to build a retaining structure of close piles, fill in, etc., in front of the bulkhead, between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Third streets, Harlem river, and stating that as Mr. Collins had showed him his deed for the land above high water-mark he saw no objection to a permit being granted for a returning structure as suggested in his report on Secretary's Order No. 4961, was received, read and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President, was adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to N. Park Collins, alleged owner of land under water, between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Third streets, Harlem river, and of the upland adjacent thereto to construct and maintain a returning structure of solid pile work on the west side of Harlem river, commencing on the southerly line of One Hundred and Third street and running thence 100 feet and 11 inches to the centre of the block between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Third streets, on a line parallel with the established bulkhead-line, and distant 740 feet easterly of the east line of First avenue, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with the plan submitted therefor, and which is hereby approved, provided the said owner file in this office, within ten days after the receipt hereof, an agreement in writing that he will change or remove the said structure whenever the bulkhead line for Harlem river shall be so changed by the proper authorities as to require the same to be done.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his monthly balance sheet for the month of December, 1885, which was received, and the President was directed to transmit the same to the Comptroller of the City.

The Board then went into Executive Session.

SIR—There were 652 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 16, 1886, which is a decrease of 58, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 9 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending January 9, 1886, was 677, which is 10.8 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.77 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,421,310.

The highest bidder for or purchaser of the lease, other than the Union Ferry Company, shall be required to purchase at a fair appraised valuation, the boats, buildings and other property situated at the landings of the said ferries belonging to the said Union Ferry Company, and used upon the said ferries respectively, actually necessary and used for the purposes thereof, and said appraised valuation shall be made in the following manner, to wit:

The purchaser thereof, other than the present lessees shall nominate and the present lessees, to wit: the Union Ferry Company, shall nominate, each a disinterested person to act as appraiser, and said persons shall together value and appraise said boats, buildings and other property, and report their conclusion thereon, in writing, with their signatures thereto.

The wharf property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York so to be leased along with the franchises of the said ferries consists of all those bulkheads, slips and adjacent piers, now used and occupied by the Union Ferry Company for ferry purposes comprised under the following general description, namely:

1.
