Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1878.

THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 20,946, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the months ending March 31, 1878, was 1,369, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 543 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the port; 673 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 151 permits to remove and transport manure; 30 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 17 miscellaneous permits were granted under the Sanitary Code.

The amount of meat, fish, and offal, etc., received at the offal dock for the quarter ending March 31, 1878, was: Horses, 1,089; cows, 47; offal, 5,804 barrels; poultry, 2,325 pounds; meat, 5,575 pounds; fish, 1,227 pounds; goats, 48; sheep, 23; calves, 474; cats and dogs, 4,080; eggs, 147 barrels; rabbits, 41; steer, 1; colt, 1; mule 1; and 1 buffalo.

During the three months ending March 31, 1878, six thousand six hundred and eighty (6,680) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and thirty-eight (238) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and sixty-eight (568) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and twenty-one (721) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and forty-five (345) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and two hundred and seventy-eight (278) transcripts of the records of deaths, thirty-seven (37) of marriages, and forty-one (41) of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand four hundred and eighty-eight (3,488) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand six hundred and eighty (6,680) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1878, the number of notices issued by the Board was 2,871. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleansing, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquent under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.
