

# POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1878.

POLICE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 300 MULBERRY STREET, October 25, 1878.

To the Honorable SMITH ELY, Jr.,

Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, hereby respectfully submit the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department for the three months ending September 30, 1878:

On the 30th day September, 1878, the number of members of the Force, of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,530.

The time lost by members of the Police Force, by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending September 30, 1878, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 5,093 days.

Second District Prison—Reset pavement in yard (812 feet), also flagging (184 feet); built a brick arch from kitchen to hall, also built a brick arch over cells on Fourth tier; placed iron bars in windows, and two scuttles on roof, and repaired lead pipes, etc. Pointed up with cement the wall

in prison yard (112 feet), also the prison wall (170 feet); constructed a new tin gutter for roof of office (8 feet), also a tin leader (15 feet); also speaking tubes from office to male and female prisons

Third District Prison—Repaired water pipes, doors, casings, and placed two new ventilators on roof of office; painted office and roofs of office, dwelling and kitchen.

There has been cut and dressed at stone shed 175 jambs fine axed, bedded, and jointed; 4 pieces water table bedded and jointed, 53 binders bedded and jointed, 10 lintels bedded and jointed, 21 arches bedded and jointed, 1 newel base, 6 newel blocks, 1 newel cap, 3 tops for newel caps, 2 bottom newel bases, 7 platform bases, 5 pieces fine axed table course, 8 steps, 7 water tables, each 9½ inches thick; 1 piece perforated rail, 6 holes; 1 hand rail top for above, 2 chimney caps, 390 building stones, assorted sizes; 2,283 8-inch building stones.

By the prisoners employed at out-door labor 8,000 cubic feet of sea wall has been built, and the stone quarried and cut for same. At Randall's Island—65 feet of brick walk built, 137 feet of sewer pipe laid 260 tons of ice discharged, 47 barges of dirt unloaded at Ward's Island. The sea wall around Blackwell's Island repared and strengthened. All the stone for same has been quarried by the prisoners.

Franch Lunatic Asylum and City Cemetery for the quarter ending September 30.

The average number of male help at Branch Work House for the quarter ending has been 182; of which 12.7 have been working in the various gangs in charge of 5 keepers, and 55 were employed variously, i. e., in bakery, shoe, tailor, blacksmith, tinsmith, and carpenter shops, kitchen, clothes

room, etc., etc.

Subjoined will be found a detailed statement of the work performed by mechanics, etc.

Carpenters—Sheathed interior and exterior of building (56 x 21 feet) used as general kitchen, new flooring; and generally repriving same; made 4 coal boxes, I platform for pump, 27 head boards, 3 stone boats, 2 tables, 3 boxes for water-pipe, I tin folder, 5 signal boards for Branch Lunatic Asylum. Repaired doors, ox bows and yokes, shovels, tubs and wheelbarrows; and for Branch Lunatic Asylum, 38 window blinds, 3 stoops, and 37 benches; handles in 18 hammers, 7 screw drivers, 2 axes, 8 chisels, 4 dippers, 10 ice hooks. Also repaired 3 meat boxes, I meat tray, I boat,

etc., etc.

Blacksmiths— Made 6 pairs ice tongs, I large bread cutter, I wrench, 4 iron knees, 16 wedges, Blacksmiths— Made 6 pairs ice tongs, I large bread cutter, I wrench, 4 iron knees, 16 wedges, 83 feathers, 45 hooks (various), 10 staples, 4 pairs steel compasses, 4 stone breakers' hammers, I iron grating, I small bar, 3 chisels, 4 strap hinges, 'piching tool; dressed 1,360 points, drills, chisels, crowbars and picks; repaired 2 pairs ice tongs, 24 iron beadsteads, I water closet, 4 pumps, 2 stone boats, I wood saw, 12 scythes, 5 pairs of hinges, 3 chains, 13 water pails, II wash kids, 3 ox yokes, 2 ox bows, 4 pairs tinsmith's shears, 3 vises, I revolver, 7 pairs sc ssors; sharpened 2 stone axes; welded I rod for rudder of steamer "Bellevue;" shod 15 horses. And for new pavilions, made 6 bolts, 35 hooks (various), 5 nails, I eye ring, I screw driver, 13 nail punches, 8 bolt plates, 2 staples, 43 feathers, 27 wedges, 2 hasps; dressed 154 drills, wedges, and picks; repaired two crow bars.

Painters—Painted two wash-rooms (female dormitory), general kitchen (exterior and interior), doors and cornices of the various workshops, one boat, ten head-boards, one pump platform, fourteen water pails, eleven wash kids, ten tables, six benches, fifteen stools, two lanterns, eighty clothes hooks, and for Branch Lunatic Asylum, painted four dormitories, four bath-rooms and water-closets, sixty-four window-blinds, eight iron fire guards, five small signal boards, lettered eighteen head-boards, five water-pails; whitewashed three buildings; tarred roofs of twelve buildings; fourteen water casks; metallic paint on 5,600 feet square roofing; glazed thirty-five lights glass.

glass.

Tinsmith—Laid 2,676 square feet tin roofing, made three tin leaders, one solder pot, two tin dish pans, three tin wash basins, two mail boxes, three stovepipe elbows, laid sixty feet water-pipe, repaired sixteen tin cans, twenty two coffee kettles, 33 tin boilers, twenty tin cups, thirty-six mess pans, eleven lamps, eight locks, two lamp reflectors, etc.

Masons—Erected two brick chimneys, cut and laid 150 feet curb and gutter, cut five guard posts, cut one stone step, laid 25 feet rubble masonry, laid 74 feet drain pipe.

Other Work—56 yards stone broken, 59 yards broken stone laid, 534 feet pavement laid, 210 feet roadway repaired, 123 loads seaweed collected.

Shoe Shop—425 pairs men's and 131 pairs women's shoes repaired, 45 pairs women's shoes made for Branch Lunatic Asylum, 20 pairs women's slippers made for Branch Lunatic Asylum.

Tailor Shop—837 pairs men's pants and 939 jackets repaired.

Sewing-room—Repaired 74 sheets, 118 dresses, 79 chemises, 1,358 shirts, 107 undershirts, 139 pairs socks, 73 pairs stockings repaired; and by inmates of Branch Lunatic Asylum, repaired 189 dresses, 154 Canton flannel chemises, 116 petticoats, 702 pairs stockings; made for Branch Workhouse, 200 men's shirts; and knitted for Manufacturing Bureau, 60 pairs stockings and 160 pairs socks.

City Cemetery—Dug 5 trenches, each 45x14.8; 789 bodies interred, 5 bodies disinterred and delivered to friends for interment elsewhere.

Hart's Island Hospital—17½ days work done.

New Pavilions—One pavilion completed with the exception of the plumbing work and stoops; the second one sheathed and first coat of paint given it; made 351 lineal feet roadway, 21 feet wide, 265 yards stone quarried, 54 yards stone broken, 51 yards broken stone laid, 279 yards earth excavated, 6 yards rubble masonry laid, 1 cistern, 10 feet diameter, 16 feet deep, dug. An average of 51 men employed, who performed 3,820 days' work.

4. Thence easterly on a tangent for 117 79-100 feet to a point of curve.

4. Thence easterly on a tangent for 117 79-100 feet to a point of curve.

5. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 75 feet radius 130 99-100 feet.

6. Thence tangent to the above described course southeasterly on an arc of a circle of 315 54-100 feet radius for 76 2-10 feet to a point of tangency.

7. Thence southeasterly on a tangent for 225 53-100 feet.

7. Thence southeasterly on a tangent to 225 53-100 feet.
