

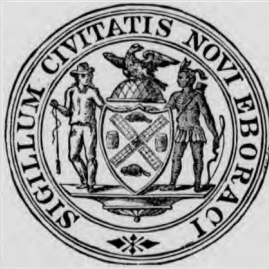
# THE CITY RECORD.

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### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 12 o'clock A.M., on Monday, October 21, 1889.*

Present—Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Richard Croker, Chamberlain, and Walton Storm, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held September 9, 1889, were read and approved:

The Comptroller presented the following report upon a Special Sinking Fund created for the redemption of bonds issued for the supply of water, in the City of New York, under the provisions of section 11 of Article VIII. of the State Constitution, as amended in 1884.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held February 6, 1885, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

"Whereas, section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 provides that, 'For the payment of all bonds and stocks of the said City issued after June third, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, pursuant to the provisions of any statute authorizing the same, and which by the provisions of such statute are payable from taxation—other than revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes—there shall be included in the annual estimate each year, 'to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, a sum sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the amount of said bonds or stocks by the time the same shall be payable, as such sum shall be certified to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Comptroller, and which sum so raised by tax shall be paid annually, on the first day of November, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and shall be invested by them in the same manner as the revenues pledged to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt,' and

"Whereas, The amendment of the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the last general election provides that, 'The term of the bonds issued to provide for the supply of water shall not exceed twenty years, and a sinking fund shall be created on the issuing of said bonds for their redemption, by raising annually a sum which will produce an amount equal to the sum of the principal and interest of said bonds at their maturity,' therefore

"Resolved, That in conformity with the foregoing provisions of law and the State Constitution, a Sinking Fund shall be and is hereby created for the redemption of bonds hereafter issued for the supply of water, by raising annually by tax a sum sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the amount of said bonds at their maturity."

And on January 16, 1889, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to separate the amounts of annual installments raised by tax for the payment, at maturity, of bonds issued for the supply of water, pursuant to section 11 of Article VIII. of the State Constitution, to be kept as a distinct fund from the general account, and designate the securities in which the moneys are invested, to be reported from time to time, to this Board."

In compliance with this resolution a statement has been prepared showing the amount of annual installments raised by tax for the payment of bonds issued since January 1, 1885, for the supply of water, with the accumulations of interest thereon up to October 1, 1889, computing interest on investments at the average rate of three per cent. per annum, which is hereto annexed, together with designations of the stocks placed in the special Sinking Fund, and directions for the entries to be made upon the books in the Finance Department, as of October 1, 1889.

The report was accepted and ordered to be printed in the minutes.

The Comptroller presented the following report upon stocks and bonds, payable on November 1, 1889, with resolutions authorizing their payment in part from the Sinking Fund from "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt" and the cancellation of a part held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as investments:

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

GENTLEMEN—Certain stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, originally payable by law from taxation, become due and payable on the first day of November, 1889, amounting to \$4,443,100, a portion of which, amounting to \$554,900, is held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the remainder, \$3,888,200 being held by private owners and corporations.

On December 19, 1888, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution pursuant to the provisions of section 191 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, certifying to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the estimated revenues and accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt for the year 1889 would be sufficient to redeem said stocks and bonds without in any way impairing the preferred claims upon said fund, thereby rendering it unnecessary to raise the amount by taxation from which by law said stocks and bonds were made payable.

Section 176 of said Consolidation Act authorizes the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to pay from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, any portion of the bonded debt of the City, provided such payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as specified in section 175 of said Consolidation Act.

Resolutions are submitted, therefore, to authorize the Comptroller to pay that part of the stocks and bonds originally payable by law from taxation, which become due and payable on November 1, 1889, not held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, out of the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," amounting to \$3,888,200, and to cancel that part held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, amounting to \$554,900.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby authorize and direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to pay the stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, originally payable by law from taxation, which become due and payable November 1, 1889, from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, amounting to three million eight hundred and eighty-eight thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,888,200), as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby authorize and direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to cancel certain stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which fall due on November 1, 1889, amounting to five hundred and fifty-four thousand nine hundred dollars (\$554,900), as follows, to wit:

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution in a lease from the Commissioners of Emigration of premises on Ward's Island.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

GENTLEMEN—A resolution was adopted by this Board on May 16, 1889, upon the application of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City from the Commissioners of Emigration of certain premises on Ward's Island, for the term of one year, from May 1, 1889, at a yearly rental of \$5,000, payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for one or more years, at the same rent, and a lease on these terms and conditions was

prepared accordingly by the Counsel to the Corporation and submitted to the Commissioners of Emigration for execution.

A letter has been received from the Commissioners of Emigration, which is herewith submitted, returning said lease without execution and stating that they are willing to renew the lease for two years, and not for one or more years, as provided therein.

With the approval of the Department of Public Charities and Correction I herewith submit a resolution to authorize the alteration of the renewal provision in the lease, by changing the provision to renew it accordingly.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to alter the renewal provision of a lease to the City from the Commissioners of Emigration of certain premises on Ward's Island, for the use of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, by substituting the words "two years" for the words "one or more years," in the provision contained therein for a renewal of said lease, in accordance with the provision of the lease of said premises, which expired May 1, 1889.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report on a petition of property-owners and residents on Washington Heights, for a reduction of the area of High Bridge Park, with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on the subject:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of this Board, held on September 9th, a petition of property-owners and residents of Washington Heights, praying for a reduction of the area of High Bridge Park was presented, and was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion upon the question of authority to take any action in regard to the matter.

His opinion upon this question is herewith submitted, stating that he thinks the Board of Street Opening and Improvement has the power to alter, enlarge or diminish the area of the High Bridge Park, upon complying with the provisions of law governing the action of that Board.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement has already had the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation before them, rendering it unnecessary for any further action upon the subject by this Board.

Hon. THEODORE W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—In reply to your letter of September 13, requesting my opinion as to the power of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to diminish the area of High Bridge Park, I beg to say that I have examined the laws affecting the proceedings, and have reached the conclusion that the Board have the power.

The original act, chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, conferred upon the Department of Parks the right to commence proceedings for the acquisition of the land embraced within High Bridge Park; but by chapter 185 of the Laws of 1885, the Board of Street Opening and Improvement were granted the same power and authority as "to laying-out \* \* \* altering and closing all streets, parks, parkways and public places in said city as said Board now has as to any street or avenue south of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Harlem river."

By section 955 of the Consolidation Act authority is conferred upon the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, whenever they may deem it for the public interest so to do, after laying its proposed action before the Board of Aldermen and giving full notice of the same for ten days in the City Record, to alter the map or plan of any street, avenue, public squares and places in the City of New York.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the Board of Street Opening and Improvement have the power to alter, enlarge or diminish the area of High Bridge Park upon complying with the provisions of law above referred to.

## To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On July 16 a petition of a large number of citizens of the Nineteenth Ward for the location of a market place for farmers' wagons to stand and dispose of their products in that section of the city east of First avenue, between Fifty-seventh and Eighty-sixth streets, was referred to the Comptroller.

Chapter 540 of the Laws of 1888 provides for the establishment and maintenance of a public market place, and the acquisition of lands for this purpose, and for the regulation and management thereof; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are authorized and empowered by said act to select, locate and lay out a suitable plot or parcel of land in that portion of the Nineteenth Ward, above Fifty-seventh street, and east of First avenue, for a public market place for farmers' wagons, wherein farmers and market gardeners bringing their farm and garden produce to the City of New York in wagons, may dispose of the same.

The petitioners represent that "at least one-third of all the farm wagons that come to this city reach it on the East river by the Ninety-ninth Street Ferry. These are now compelled to take their produce to the Gansevoort Market, nearly six miles from the part of the city at which they arrive. The grocers and others who supply the people of this city living north of Fifty-seventh street, consisting of over one-third of our population, must go to Gansevoort Market to purchase their vegetables and bring them back over the same route taken in the first place by the garden wagons, thus adding a large and unnecessary expense to their cost without any return whatever to the City."

These representations appear to be correct, and the establishment of a market for farmers and market gardeners on the eastern side of the city, within the limits prescribed by the law, is no doubt very desirable, both for the convenience and accommodation of residents in that section of the city and the market gardeners on the western and northerly end of Long Island.

I recommend, therefore, that the petition be favorably considered, and submit the matter to the Board to take such action as may be deemed advisable, in compliance with the provisions of said act, for establishing such market place in the Nineteenth Ward.

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the amendment of the Charter of this Company, which was passed this year, being chapter 182 of the Laws of 1889, the Fifth Avenue Transportation Company, Limited, respectfully apply to your honorable Board, to prescribe the following terms for the running of their stages over the route of this Company as authorized by the said act, to wit, viz.:

That the Fifth Avenue Transportation Company, Limited, shall charge a fare not to exceed ten cents for each passenger and a rate for each parcel that shall not exceed the usual rate charged by express companies, transported over the whole or any part of the route of said company as prescribed by law, from Fifty-ninth street, through Fifth avenue, Washington Parade Ground, South Fifth avenue, Canal and West streets to Desbrosses Street Ferry and return, and from Fifth avenue through Thirtieth street, University place and Ninth street to Broadway and return; and that the said Company shall have the right to reduce and to restore these rates and fares from time to time as it may deem best; and that it shall divide the running of its stages over the various portions of its route in such a way as experience shall show will best accommodate the public.

Your memorialist respectfully shows, that its business has hitherto been done at a great loss; that the transportation of passengers along its route is principally by means of competing, or parallel, steam elevated, or surface railroads, which being much quicker methods of transportation, attract to themselves nearly the whole of the public patronage, while the expenses of maintaining an omnibus line are much larger per vehicle than that per car in railroad transportation.

Your memorialist was called into being through the unanimous sentiment of the people living in the general vicinity of its route, and for the avowed purpose of preserving one route by which our citizens, and especially women and children, could reach the Central Park in their own carriages, without the necessity of passing over a carriage-way obstructed, and often rendered dangerous by rail tracks and the constant passage of crowded cars thereon. And your memorialist still desires to fulfill this object, which the Legislature had in granting it its route, and to do this, it will need co-operation by your Board in the method indicated above.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT** act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any street or avenue in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repaving, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of the lot in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall be deemed to have accepted the obligation to pave, repave, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except the assessment for such paving, repaving or repairing, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereon.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they must state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repaving or repairing.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT** in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1822, passed June 1, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates: All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 1, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

4th. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

5th. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

6th. A penalty of five dollars for each day is hereby established, and will be imposed in each case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

7th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, including, but not limited to, for the use of water, which rent shall be in the manner provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses and purposes, stores, shops, private families, and other consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be added to the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings, when they are retroactively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears.

Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which the water is supplied, and shall be paid in advance, and shall be placed as a lien upon the buildings, when they are retroactively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates.

#### REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

1st. The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be in the manner provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses and purposes, stores, shops, private families, and other consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments.

2nd. The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates.

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hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 332, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
