### BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Wednesday, April 21, 1897, at 3.10 o'clock P. M.

Present—Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; Francis M. Scott, Counsel to the Corporation; John W. Goff, Recorder.

On motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the minutes of the meetings of October 30, 1896, and January 21, 1897, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors without objections on the dates mentioned, viz.:

The assessors state that the return of the Department of Public Works shows that 9,046 cubic yards of retaining-wall were constructed, at a cost of four dollars per cubic yard, and that the wall is of cut stone, with a heavy coping built in cement.

Also that, from the testimony submitted, they are of the opinion that a dry rubble masonry wall was sufficient for the purpose, and \$1.50 per cubic yard would be the fair cost for its construction.

The Assessors further state that, in accordance with the request of the Board of Revision and Correction, the assessment list has been revised by deducting pro rata the excess over the fair cost of a sufficient retaining-wall, and that the list thus corrected is retransmitted for action thereon.

EXTRACTS FROM THE OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC CHARITIES FOR WEEK ENDING MAY 15, 1897.
