DEAR SIR—With a letter of the 6th ultimo from the Secretary of your Board was transmitted to me, for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Municipal Assembly, recommending the laying of water-mains in Fiftieth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues; in Narrows avenue, between Bay Ridge avenue and Seventy-first street, and in Sixtieth street, between Second and Third avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

In response thereto I desire to say that, from report made to me by the Chief Engineer of this Department, I find that water-mains are necessary in Narrows avenue and in Sixtieth street, as called for in the resolution, the total distance being 1,600 feet, on which there are ten houses to be supplied with water, and the total estimated cost of the mains being \$2,100.

In respect to Fiftieth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, the Chief Engineer reports that the street is not yet regulated and graded, and that there is only one house on that block to be supplied with water; consequently, the laying of water-mains at the expense of the City would not at present be justified.

I have also received, through the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply for the Borough of Brooklyn, a petition for water-mains in Gelston avenue, between Ninety-second and Ninety-fourth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, on which the Chief Engineer reports that there are thirteen houses to be supplied with water on a distance of 610 feet, the estimated cost of the mains being \$800, and I recommend that authority be given for the laying of these mains.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 12 o'clock M., on Friday, November 10, 1899.

Present at roll-call—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held October 9, 1899, were read and approved.

The following communication was received from Mr. Charles T. Wills, relative to an extension of time for the completion of the Court-house for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court:

NEW YORK, October 16, 1899.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

I hereby respectfully request an extension of the time for the completion of the Court-house for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the First Department, for three months, from October 1, 1899, for the following reasons: The building is now substantially completed, except the paintings and sculpture, which under the contract were not required to be completed until thirty months from the date of the execution of the contract, which time will not expire until

June, 1900, and some work in relation to the decoration of a part of the building, in finishing the stairways, halls and floors. The decoration was delayed until the contract could be made for furnishing the interior of the building, which contract was not executed until August 25, 1899, and it was then too late to finish the contract within the time specified. These contracts will be entirely completed and the building turned over to the City finished, with the exception of the statuary and painting, within the time now asked for; and as I understand that it is not the intention of the court to occupy the building until the first day of January, an extension of time will enable me to complete and furnish all the building together and much more satisfactorily than if the decorations be pushed before the furniture is ready to be delivered.

I, therefore, request that the time for the completion of both contracts, that of the building itself and the furnishing of the building, be extended until January 1, 1900.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Mr. Charles T. Wills, contractor for the erection of the new Court-house for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, in communication of October 16, 1899, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests an extension of time for the completion of his contracts from the first of October, 1899, to the first of January, 1900. He states that "the building is now substantially completed, except paintings and sculptures, the time limit for which has not been reached; and some work in relation to the decoration of a part of the building in finishing the stairways, halls and floors. The decoration was delayed until the contract could be made for furnishing the interior of the building, which contract was not executed until August 25, 1899, and it was then too late to finish the contract within the time specified."

He, therefore, requests that the time for the completion of both contracts, that of the building itself and the furnishing of the building, be extended to the time stated above.

The request is approved and recommended by the architect of the building, Mr. James Brown Lord, and by Judge George L. Ingraham.

At the request of the architect, indorsed by Judge Ingraham, the time for the completion of the contract for the building was extended by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution adopted July 13, 1899, to the first of October, 1899.

The penalty named in the contract for non-completion of the work on the building at the time agreed upon is \$200 per day.

Subsequently a contract was entered into for certain furniture, etc., for the building, under section 3 of chapter 196, Laws of 1897, referred to by Mr. Wills in his communication, in which no penalty was named, the time limit of which was October 1, 1899.

The matter of an extension of time rests entirely with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by the requirements of chapter 196, section 2, which says, "except that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, by a contract in writing, extend the time for the completion of any contract in case the public interests shall require."

I have examined the work and find there is a great deal to be done in the way of final finish; so much, in fact, that I think it will require active exertion on the part of the contractor to accomplish what he promises.

There is no allegation of neglect or undue delay on the part of the contractor, and I would not therefore enforce the right to demand the \$200 forfeiture of the contract, but would recommend that the time be extended to January 1, 1900, with the understanding that no further extension will be granted.

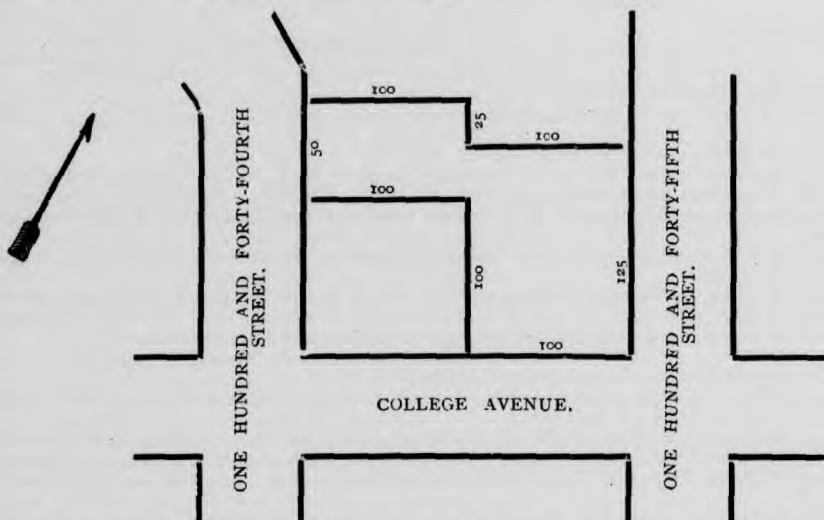

The lease of the premises at the southeast corner of Park and Clinton avenues, Brooklyn, used by this Department for storehouse and other purposes, will expire with the present year. The Deputy Commissioner of this Department in said borough states that the rent now paid by the City is at the rate of \$780 a year.
