MONDAY, JANUARY 7, 1901,

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Council the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 774.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,
January 7, 1901.

To the Honorable the Council:

I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution adopted by you on December 4, 1900, authorizing the issue of City Stock in the sum of \$450,000, to be expended upon the City Prison. My objection to this resolution is that, under the provisions of the Charter, action should first be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of authorizing the issue of \$350,000 Corporate Stock for enlargement of and alterations to the City Prison (page 244, Minutes, April 24, 1900), respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the expenses incidental to the enlargement and alterations of the building known as the City Prison ("Tombs"), occupied by the Department of Correction.

No. 2.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Textile Publishing Company to erect, keep and maintain a post surmounted by a clock on the sidewalk near the curb in front of their premises, Nos. 190½ to 200 Greene street, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided the dimensions of said post shall not exceed eighteen inches square at the base and the clock shall not be used for advertising purposes, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

No. 3.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Michael Anglin to erect and maintain a stand for the sale of newspapers and periodicals under the stairs of the elevated railroad at the northeast corner of Desbrosses and Greenwich streets, Borough of Manhattan, provided said stand be erected in conformity with the provisions of chapter 718 of the Laws of 1896, and subject to the conditions of the ordinance regulating the placing of stands under the stairs of the elevated railroads, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

Resolved, That a sub-committee of five, with power to add to its numbers, be appointed by the Chair to carry these resolutions into effect, and that for this purpose said committee shall have full power of action.
