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### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1907.

New York, October 3, 1907.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending September 30,

On September 30, the total Force was 9,392. In addition there were on probation, 2 Surgeons, 37 Patrolmen and 4 Doormen. The effective Force on September 30, was 8,400; absent without leave, 259; sick, 184; suspended, 8; absent without leave, 1 Sergeant; detailed, 540.

During the last quarter the losses in the several ranks were as follows:
Retired—Surgeon, 1; Captains, 2; Lieutenants, 12; Sergeants, 3; Patrolmen, 32; Doormen, 3, making a total in all ranks of 53.

Died—Inspector, 1; Surgeon, 1; Lieutenants, 4; Sergeants, 1; Patrolmen, 15; Doormen, 2, making a total in all ranks of 24.

During the quarter 21 Patrolmen-were dismissed and 12 Patrolmen resigned. There was a widespread strike of meat wagon drivers during the month of August. The efforts of the Police resulted in extremely little violence.

The strike of the telegraph employees which began during the quarter has also, so far, been successfully handled with almost entire absence of disorder. The Fourth of July passed without undue troubles. In this connection, attention is called to the fact that the sale of explosives was not permitted by the Fire Department to begin until the 25th of June. In spite of all efforts to the contrary, however, there was a good deal of noise from explosives before the Fire Department to begin until the 25th of June. It is suggested that the sale of explosives should not be permitted until after the first day of July. This leaves quite sufficient time for the sale of "trouble" for the citizens of New York, and would, to a certain extent, limit the nuisance which the firecracker dealers and the small boys between them give the rest of the City. There were 1,238 arrests of all kinds on the Fourth, which is about double the record of previous years. Over 500 revolvers were confiscated on this day.

The estimates of the Police Department for 1908 were forwarded on July 15, in a carefully itemized budget.

On July 31, after trial, it was found necessary to dismiss a man from the Police Force for cowardice; the first time, I am informed, that such a necessity has arisen for nearly thirty years.

It was found possible, at last, to divide the old Nineteenth Precinct into two. This precinct was formerly bounded by Fourteenth street and Forty-second street, by Seventh avenue on the west, and by Fourth and Park avenues on the east. This district has required special police attention for years. It has been divided along Twenty-seventh street, the lower half being called the Nineteenth Precinct, and the upper half being designated as the Twenty-third Precinct. The station house of the new Nineteenth Precinct is at No. 120 West Twentieth street. The new arrangement will greatly facilitate the work of the Department in that section of the City.

A new plan in police work went into effect by the establishment of a night court by the City Magistrates on August I. This court should be effective in

the prompt arraignment and settlement of a certain class of cases and also in the breaking up of professional bondsmen.

On the 1st of September the new law went into effect, permitting the destruction of weapons taken in criminal cases instead of their sale at auction. Over four thousand weapons have been destroyed under the personal direction of the Police Commissioner.

The question of the use of dogs in police work, both for trailing and for patrol, has been under consideration and study. It is hoped before long to arrive at definite conclusions one way or the other.

The Primary elections took place September 24. Special care was taken by the Police Commissioner to insure the rights of citizens and the suppression of

violence.

A blackmail murder occurred during the quarter in the Armenian colony. This Department was active but greatly hampered in obtaining arrests by the fear of the Armenians themselves. The difficulty of obtaining information was aggravated by the lack in the Detective Bureau of men who could speak the language. These facts emphasize what I have represented to your Honor before, namely: That the work of the Detective Bureau cannot be what it should be until it is organized on business principles. The Police Commissioner must have a civilian branch composed of experts of all nationalities who are not known to the foreign criminal population as members of the regular Force are.

There was a good deal of excitement during the quarter from a so-called crime wave. This excitement was mostly due to exaggerations by the yellow journals. There was, it is true, a good deal of crime, particularly assaults on women and children, and it was found véry difficult to catch the criminals, but investigation has shown that the actual number of cases reported did not really exceed the average of past years. This phase of crime has, however, received particular attention and the Department hopes to be in position next year to reduce it considerably.

The details of Policemen to various summer resorts were made as usual, but the normal distribution of the men is again in force. The police work at Coney Island during the past summer was particularly good, and in consequence the Captain of that precinct has been promoted to replace Inspector Nally who died August 10, 1007

A year and a half ago careful calculations showed that the Police Force should be increased by 2,000 men. This number was asked for in the Budget for 1907, and an increase of six hundred and seven (607) men was granted who are now on the Force. In the Budget for 1908 I have asked for the balance of fourteen hundred (1400) more Patrolmen to be added to the Force.

The necessity for these men has been elaborately represented to the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen in reports and letters which are on file. The draft on the Force during the summer for the summer resorts, and the peculiar conditions of crime during the summer, made the necessity for an increase especially apparent, and it was deemed necessary to ask for an immediate increase of five hundred (500) Patrolmen. This application is still pending.

As it takes several months after the money has been appropriated before the men can be instructed and enrolled, I again earnestly urge not only the immediate authorization of five hundred (500) more men, but the further authorization of nine hundred (900) more in the Budget for 1908.

During the last quarter a particularly vicious attack was made on my First Deputy. His accusers were given every opportunity to make good their accusations and they failed utterly. As a result of this "mix-up" the First Deputy Commissioner at my instigation laid all the facts in his possession before the Grand Jury of Kings County. On July 24, Mr. Arthur Woods was appointed Fourth Deputy Police Commissioner and placed in charge of the Detective Bureau and Bureau of Repairs and Supplies. Previous to his appointment he had, at his own expense, studied the methods of the English and other foreign police forces.

The endeavor of the Department is to lay the foundation for a new Detective Bureau on broad foundations and to build up a Force which shall be truly effective and not be dependent upon a partnership with crime in order to produce results. The work of the Detective Bureau during the quarter has proved large in quantity and excellent in quality, and the effort of the Department in this direction simply needs the support of the citizens to become what the citizens desire it should be.

It is interesting and instructive to compare the work of the Detective Bureau of to-day with the work this Bureau accomplished in years gone by. Take, for instance, the years of 1890, 1891 and 1892, when former Superintendent Byrnes was at the head of this Bureau. The following table shows the number of arrests during these three years and the number of convictions:

Compare these arrests and convictions with the third quarter of 1907, that is from July 1, to September 30. During these three months there were 2,559 arrests and 498 convictions. In other words, over a thousand more arrests were made during these three months than in the full year of either 1890, 1891 or 1892.

While the number of arrests alone is not a good standard by which to gauge the value of the work of this Bureau, the number and percentage of convictions is. A similar comparison of convictions is over 33 per cent. greater than in the twelve months of 1891, and over 100 per cent. greater than in the twelve months of 1891, and over 100 per cent. greater than in the work of 1892.\*

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Considerable other work has been accomplished in the Detective Bureau, which considerable other work has been accomplished in the Detective Bureau, which is of the utmost importance. For instance, there are nearly 15,000 rogues' gallery pictures. These pictures have been classified by the crimes that criminals are known to commit. Previous to the classification of these pictures a person looking for a dishonest negro servant would have to look at thousands of pictures before finding the one that he was searching for. Now, the negroes, both men and women, are in separate galleries. Pickpockets are in one gallery, burglars in another, etc., making it easier for complainants to find the persons they are after. Classifying these pictures was an immense task, for the numerous aliases of each criminal had to be card indexed also.

Since September I it has been possible to learn in a few minutes how many crimes and what kind of crimes the Detective Bureau has handled in a given time, along with the dispositions and the progress made on each particular complaint. A system has been instituted whereby every case assigned to a Detective is recorded. Until this system was instituted there was no way of telling whether a Detective was working on a case or whether it had simply been allowed to drop.

The Bureau also has made arrangements, with the courteous co-operation of the Board of Coroners, to have a finger print expert at the scene of crimes of violence promptly, so that he may search the body and surroundings for tell-tale finger marks before any one else has been on the scene.

The new vagrancy law passed last winter has in practice proved of very slight

The new vagrancy law passed last winter has in practice proved of very slight help to the Police Department. It requires that three things be proved against the suspect: first, that he was more than once convicted as a thief, pickpocket or burglar; secondly, that he has no visible means of support; and third, that he was loitering in a public place. These three points are very difficult to establish in court against a suspect, especially if the Magistrates require as evidence of the two previous convictions that some officer appear before them and swear that he was present at a previous conviction.

Sanitary Company.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company (Steam Boiler Squad) for the quarter will be found in the schedule annexed marked "F."

Discipline.

The annexed schedule marked "G" gives in brief a record of disciplinary trans-actions concerning members of the Force for the quarter.

Licenses.

The number and character of licenses issued during the quarter, the fees received and the number of applications for licenses denied will be found in the schedule annexed marked "H."

Detective Bureau.

The work accomplished by the Detective Bureau during the quarter is shown in the schedule annexed marked "I." Deaths.

The names of members of the Force who died during the quarter, with the date of death, the rank of each and the command to which he was attached at the time of his death, are in the schedule annexed marked "J."

The matter of Silver street was taken up first by the Local Board at this meeting. Mr. Charles F. Wille appeared and stated there were two reasons why opposition developed to the petition in favor. One was that the street was a residential one and that its present width was sufficient, as there was no business carried on along it, through its entire length, and that the owners though it was wide enough its entire length, and that the owners though it was wide enough. along it, through its entire length, and that the owners thought it was wide enough for years to come. The principal reason property owners opposed the present proceeding was that they believed that if the street was widened at the width as laid out it would result in the destruction of a number of large trees, some of which were sixty years old, and to destroy them would be inexcusable. He believed that there was no need of putting owners to this expense at this time. Later on Mr. Wille stated that probably the owners would not oppose the opening if they were assured that the trees would not be disturbed that the trees would not be disturbed.

Mr. Timothy Power also appeared in favor of having the resolution rescinded as adopted by Local Board.

Chief Engineer Briggs stated to the Board that this street was necessary for

the construction of sewers.

Mr. H. Mapes appeared in opposition to the proposed proceedings for acquiring title to Silver street, as laid out on map, and stated that the street, if widened, would not be of much benefit to owners.

Laid over, and Chief Engineer directed to have survey made of this street, and report with entire facts as to present conditions on this street, and inform Board whether there would be any interference with trees if street is opened as laid out

Williamsbridge Road, Acquiring Title, From West Farms Road to Silver Street.

Protest by Thos. C. Arnow, John Murphy, Michael J. Cooney and about fifty-five other property owners and residents on Williamsbridge road. Duplicate protest signed by John H. Nichols, Ed. E. Miller, Owen F. Dolen and eighteen other property owners and residents of Williamsbridge road. Also protest signed by Timothy Power, Louis Olsen, James J. Smith and thirteen others. (In re Silver street.)

The protests referred to above stated:

"The Williamsbridge road is one of the oldest roads in this section, and is about two and one-half miles long, and extends from West Farms road at Westchester Village to White Plains avenue at Williamsbridge. The part to be taken under this proceeding is in the Village of Westchester and is about one thousand feet in length, which is the business section of the road, improved with large and expensive buildings, while the remaining portion of the Williamsbridge road is vacant property. The widening of this valuable section would make the assessment within this proposed area very heavy and unjust, while if the entire road was opened the full length the expense of acquiring title to the business section of this road would then be levied upon the entire length, and not fall, as under this proceeding, upon this small section.

"If the Williamsbridge road is to be opened, let it be opened its full length to White Plains avenue."

The following gentlemen appeared in opposition to petition No. 363; Mr. Owen F. Dolen, Mr. Thos. Arnow, Wm. M. Fleischmann, Frank Reckert, H. C. Mapes. Laid over until November 14, 1907, and Chief Engineer requested to furnish report and have street surveyed.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety compan

the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
