On March 31, 1909, the total force was 9,938. In addition there were on probation 49 Patrolmen, besides 1 Sergeant, 1 Doorman and 1 Matron, or a total of 9,986.

Effective force, 8,369; with leave, 84; sick, 203; suspended, 4; detailed by Police Commissioner, 540; detailed in courts, public offices, etc., salaries not paid by Police Department, 402.

Such application will be made to the Supreme Court, at a Special Term thereof to be held in and for the Third Judicial District, at the City Hall, in the City of Albany, Albany County, N. Y., on the 24th day of May, 1909, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard.
