## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

### MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF CROTONA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Crotona, Twenty-fourth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on Thursday, March 25, 1909, at 11 a. m.

Present—Alderman Hickey and the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

### Hearing.

No. 302. Laying out an extension of Cambridge avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-second street to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

The petition in this matter was sent to the President of the Borough of The Bronx by C. Pianisani, No. 2142 Belmont avenue, in a letter dated December 5, 1908. The petition is dated November 27, 1908, and is signed by C. Pianisani, William J. Irwin, A. Calleguini, Joseph Chiochi, A. Brand and about thirty-six others, the majority of whom fail to give any address or state whether they own property within the probable area of assessment if the street were to be legally acquired.

An additional petition dated March 20, 1909, was also received in favor of the proposed layout of Cambridge avenue extension, signed by John Ellison, B. Davis, John Lammelle, F. J. Herron, Max Hollander and nine (9) others, who also fail to state where they reside or whether they own property on or near the proposed new street.

### Protests.

A protest against this proposed extension of Cambridge avenue was received from the Hughes Avenue Property Owners' Association, signed by Ernest J. Tarof, president, dated March 24, 1909; also a protest signed by Mrs. Julia Appelboom, Gerhard Geircken and twenty-three others; also a protest signed by John Kohne and two others; also protest signed by Bessie Ceitlin.

Mr. Frank Schaeffer appeared personally and presented a protest signed by himself and seventy-nine others, and this protest contains the address of each signer, and they all appear to live within the probable area of assessment if this street was legally opened.

A large delegation appeared in opposition to the petition for this proposed layout, among whom were Mr. Walter Whewell, John O'Leary, William J. Lee, William Stonderidge and Mr. A. Zaengberg.

Only one property owner (Mr. C. Pianisani) was represented as being in favor of the petition.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That this proceeding be laid over until April 15, 1909, at 11 a. m.

Adopted.

No. 194. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches, drains, walls, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in Monterey avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Quarry road, and all work incidental thereto.

Laid over until April 15, 1909, when report of the Chief Engineer will be ready.

No. 198. For erecting a guard rail on Nos. 815 and 817 East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street for a distance of 60 feet beginning at a point 108 feet west of Marmon avenue.

Laid over until April 15, 1909.

No. 199. Erecting a guard rail on the north side of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street for a distance of 200 feet, beginning at the northwest corner of Prospect avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-first street and extending westerly.

Laid over until April 15, 1909.

On motion, the Board adjourned until April 15, 1909, at 11 a. m.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

### MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF VAN CORTLANDT, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on March 25, 1909, at 2 p. m.

Present—Alderman Hoady, Alderman Hinchliffe, Alderman Crowley and the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted.

No. 204. Laying out on the map of The City of New York a change of lines of Reserve oval and of Reserve place so as to have for Reserve oval a width of not less than 40 feet, and so that the lines both of Reserve oval and of Reserve place shall coincide with the lines acquired by The City of New York where the width is greater than 40 feet.

Mr. James Powers appeared in opposition, and stated that some years ago there were forty persons in opposition to any change in width of these streets. No one appeared in favor at this meeting.

Laid over until April 15, 1909, an account of no report being ready.

No. 205. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches, drains, walls, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in Hawkstone street, from Walton avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and all work incidental thereto. Estimated cost, \$1,700. Assessed value of real estate is \$29,570.

Mr. and Miss Schaeffer appeared in favor. No opposition.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches, drains, walls, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in Hawkstone street, from Walton avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and all work incidental thereto.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 206. Regulating and grading, etc. Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, between Riverdale avenue and Broadway, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and all work incidental thereto.

Petition signed by Emma L. Moller and five others.

Laid over until April 15, 1909. No opposition.

### Laid Over Matters.

No. 162. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Perry avenue, between Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Eleventh street; and in East Two Hundred and Eleventh street, between Perry avenue and Woodlawn road; and in Woodlawn road, between Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Twelfth street; and in East Two Hundred and Twelfth street, between Woodlawn road and Jerome avenue; and in Rochambeau avenue, between East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and Gun Hill road; and in Dekalb avenue, between East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and Gun Hill road; and in Jerome avenue, between East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and the first summit southerly therefrom.

Petition signed by Thomas F. Hill, William Gaul and fifteen others.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 176. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, building retaining walls, laying drains, with basins, etc., constructing drives, walks, steps on the extension of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, between East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Frank Sigel Park, 75 per cent. of the cost and expense of said work to be borne and paid by The City of New York and 25 per cent. thereof to be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited.

Hearing December 23, 1908, and laid over at four subsequent meetings awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

On motion, the Board adjourned until April 15, 1909.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The persons or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the masters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper check in which to enclose the bid, to be made with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, can be obtained without application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
