

Honoring the Life and Service of former NYCEM Commissioner Joseph Esposito

New York City Mayor Eric Adams today released the following statement on the passing of Joseph Esposito, deputy commissioner for enforcement at the New York City Department of Buildings (DOB). Esposito's service in city government began when he entered the New York City Police Department (NYPD) as a trainee in 1968. He served in several commands and bureaus before being appointed chief of department in 2000 — holding that role for 12 years, longer than anyone else in city history. He subsequently served as



commissioner of what is now called the New York City Office of Emergency Management, before joining DOB in September 2022. Esposito, often known as "Espo," died yesterday, January 8, 2024:

"Joe Esposito was not only a friend for almost 30 years, but a hero who dedicated his life and career to keeping New Yorkers safe, and he has earned the gratitude of our entire city.

"He served his city on our darkest days and brightest moments, climbing the ranks from an NYPD officer more than half a decade ago to chief of department and then New York City Emergency Management commissioner. He remains the longest-serving chief of department in the NYPD's history, holding the title of highest-ranking uniformed NYPD officer through the horrific attacks of September 11, 2001, and our recovery after Hurricane Sandy. In recent years, he continued his service as deputy commissioner of the Department of Buildings — still serving New Yorkers, even while battling cancer.

"Espo's dedication to New York City is unmatched. He worked hard for his city — right up to the end. He left us in a better place, and our city stands together to join his family in grieving his loss while honoring his service and commitment to our city.

"As a mark of respect for Joe's tremendous service and contributions to our city, I have ordered all flags on all city buildings, as well as stationary flagstaffs throughout the five boroughs, to be lowered to half-staff today."

Are You Prepared for Winter Storms?

New York City is expecting heavy rain, damaging winds, and moderate coastal flooding today 1/9 into tomorrow 1/10.

As we enter the winter season, gearing up for unpredictable weather is crucial. Being proactive now ensures safety and peace of mind when storms hit.

- Be ready for potential winter storms, torrential rains, and high winds by ensuring your home is equipped with essentials like emergency kits, extra food, water, and batteries.
- **Trim trees** on your property to prevent potential damage from high winds, and **secure outdoor and hanging items** to prevent them from becoming hazards.
- If it's safe to do so, clear leaves & debris from catch basins near your home to prevent flooding. Be sure to wear gloves and watch for traffic.
- If you need to travel, use mass transit and plan for extra travel time. Be careful when walking, biking, and driving on wet roads.
- If you need to be outdoors, dress appropriately for the weather conditions. High winds in particular can cause temperatures to drop below what you expect.

- Have an emergency plan in place for power outages or evacuation if necessary.
- **Stay informed** by monitoring weather forecasts, and signing up for alerts from **NotifyNYC**.



Help! Asylees in NYC Need Safe & Compassionate Shelters

Winter has Arrived. Please Open the Doors to your House of Worship or Faith-based Space. This is a Humanitarian Crisis!



Asylum Seeker Shelter-19 Beds Site

Over 130,000 Asylum Seekers have come to NYC seeking help – hundreds more arrive every day. Over 70,000 are now sheltered in NYC sites. This straining our city's resources to the breaking point. NYDIS has been opening shelters in houses of worship since August. These small faith-based shelters are preferred by migrants because of the kindness, safety and compassionate care they receive – and, our shelters cost tax payers significantly less than hotels and mass shelters. Our current guests are overwhelmingly from South America and West Africa.

Serving the poor and marginalized is an obligation of all faith traditions. To reach our initial goal of opening 50 shelters. We are seeking a minimum of 20 more houses of worship or faith-based organizations to shelter 19 single adult men from 7PM to 7AM over the next 12-24 months – and, we advance \$50,000 each month to cover all direct costs and space use. NYDIS also provides training, shelter supplies and regular operational support onsite.

New York City has recently approved additional food funding and a 15-bed option for houses of worship (HOW) and faith-based organizations (FBO) seeking to partner with New York Disaster Interfaith Service (NYDIS) to shelter asylum seekers that continue to arrive in NYC on a daily basis.

- 1. **19 Beds:** These shelters are now approved for a \$50,000 monthly funding which increases the food allowance. Sites are still required to have a Sprinkler System and Central Monitoring System
- 2. **15 Beds:** These shelters are now approved for a \$47,500 monthly funding which increases the food allowance. Sites are not required to have a Sprinkler System or Central Monitoring System but are required to meet all other code requirements.

Request for Comments: NYCEM Five-Year Accessibility Plan

New York City passed a local law last year (Local Law 12 of 2023) requiring all New York City agencies to develop and implement a Five-Year Accessibility Plan outlining how each agency is and will be improving access for people with disabilities to the agency's services, programs, activities, and workplace.

The law provides for a public comment period that ends on **February 16, 2024**. We are asking for your input on what is currently a draft of that plan. All comments received by the due date will be reviewed as we work to finalize the plan. The draft accessibility plan, itself, can be found

COVID-19 and Flu Season - Protect Yourself with Updated Vaccines

Everyone age 6 months and older should get an updated COVID-19 vaccine.

The COVID-19 vaccines:

- Can reduce how severe your symptoms are if you get sick from COVID-19.
- Reduce your risk of being hospitalized and dying from COVID-19.
- · Reduce your risk of developing long COVID.

While anyone can become very sick from COVID-19, vaccination is especially important — and lifesaving — for people who are age 65 and older, are pregnant, or have certain health conditions or disabilities.

Get an updated vaccine, even if you have had COVID-19 or been vaccinated before. The updated vaccines protect against current variants and strengthen your protection, which can decrease over time. Side effects from the vaccine — including headache, fatigue and soreness at the injection site — are generally mild to moderate and go away within a few days.

Most New Yorkers can still get a COVID-19 vaccine for free. For people with insurance, most health plans — including Medicaid and Medicare — will cover vaccination at no cost. Scan the QR code or visit **vaccinefinder.nyc.gov** to find a vaccination site, including sites offering free vaccines for people without insurance.

Get your annual flu shot too. It is safe to get the COVID-19 and flu vaccines at the same time.

In addition, staying home when sick, testing, masking and washing your hands are important ways to reduce your risk of COVID-19 and other viruses. If you have questions about COVID-19 vaccination, call 212-COVID-19 (212-268-4319) or talk to your health care provider.

Under the direction of the Chief Human Capital Officer and the Deputy Chief Operations Officer, the HCM Process and Data Analyst (Analyst) is responsible for supporting HCM's strategic analytics, data process improvement, and reporting functions. This role will develop data-driven insights across all Human Capital areas including recruitment, retention, and turnover; performance; and workforce planning. The Analyst will develop infrastructure and systems for routine reporting and develop standard operating procedures for managing data requests and output.
