SANITARY BUREAU. Sept. 30, 1873.

SIR-I have the honor to submit the following report upon the condition of the streets and avereport upon the condition of the streets and avenues of the city, in regard to cleanliness, for the week ending Sept. 27, 1873, compiled from the usual weekly reports of the inspectors and assistant inspectors connected with this Bureau:

Inspector Judson (1st, 3d and 5th wards), reports that there has been no material change in the condition of the streets in his district since

the date of his last report. The streets, as a rule, are filthy for want of proper cleaning.

Assistant Inspector Lockwood (2d and 4th wards) reports that during the past week the streets have been kept in a generally cleanly condition.

condition.

Inspector Tracy (6th ward) reports that the streets in his district have been, during the past week, very clean, with the exception of Centre street, from Canal to White, and from Worth to Pearl; Park street, from Duane to Pearl, and the unpaved portion of the Five Points.

Assistant Inspector Hughes (8th ward) reports that the streets in his district are in a fair state of cleanliness, with the exception of Greenwich street, Spring street, between Renwick and West; Thompson and Sullivan streets.

Inspector Morris (9th and 15th wards) reports

I have the honor to submit the following report upon the unripe and unwholesome fruit seized by rhe Special Inspectors of fruit since my last report. From the 24th to the 30th instant, inclusive, Inspectors Whollahan and Frank assitsed by Officer Mooney of the Sanitary Police, seized and condemned unripe and unwholesome fruit and vegetables at 451 stores, from 54 licensed venders and 20 stands.

From the 24th instant to the 29th, inclusive, Inspectors Carney and Ashman, assisted by Officer Rhodes of the Sanitary Police, have condemned and seized, or caused to be removed at the expense of the owners, the following quantities of objectionable fruit and vegetables: 41 barrels of musk mellons, 3,525 water melons, 39 barrels of apples, 3 crates, 17 baskets and 8 barrels of pears, 15 crates of grapes, 4 barrels of turnips, 2 barrels of egg-plants, 150 heads of cabbage, 7 barrels of potatoes, 5 barrels and 50 ears of corn, 4 baskets crab-apples, 17 baskets, 7 crates of peaches, and 1 barrel of quinces.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending September 27th, 1873.

WEDNESDAY, September 24th, 1873. SPECIAL MEETING. The Board met in special session, pursuant to the call of the President, for the purpose of con-

sidering the proposed plans for laying out of Kingsbridge. A large deputation of the property owners attended, by request of the President, and Gen.

John Ewen presented a map which he had prepared of the plan suggested by him. When the deputation retired the following

business was transacted: The necessary work to ascertain the section of rock surface on the lines of the foundations for the proposed building for the Metropolitan Museum of Art, was directed to be proceeded with.

The resolution of 16th April, 1873, laying out the continuation of "F" street, was rescinded, and a resolution was adopted laying out said street in accordance with a map dated "New York, June 26, 1873," and signed "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer," which map was adopted.

The opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation was received, stating that in his judgment the contract entered into with the New York Mutual Gaslight Co., and dated 30th April, 1873, was legally entered into, and is now binding and valid; and said Company were thereupon given permission to lay their main and service pipes in the City Hall Park, Bowling Green and the Bat-

ery.

The specifications and plans for the wall of Central Park on 110th street, between 6th and 7th avenues, were directed to be prepared, and the necessary proceedings were also directed to be taken to have the wall completed as soon as

THURSDAY, September 25th, 1873. Shrubs and trees, the cost of which amount to \$54.50, were directed to be planted in Jackson Square.

The estimates for the year 1874, amounting to \$657,000, were presented to the Board and directed to be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The "Round System," for the regulation of the park keepers' force, was directed to be dis-continued, and the "Beat System" to be adopted, and the park keepers were directed to be furnished with suitable clubs.

The Landscape Architect was directed to proceed with the preparation of the plans for Riverside and Morningside Parks.

Abstract of operations for the week ending September 27, 1873:

Abstract of operations for the week ending September 27, 1873:

Official examination has been made during the week of eight theatres, to wit:—Booth's Theatre, Wallack's, the Metropolitan, Niblo's, the Union Square, the Lyceum, the Olympic, and the Stadt Theatre, and no violations of Section 29 of the Building Law found to exist in either. Important alterations, under the supervision of the Department, are in progress in the Metropolitan Theatre, whereby increased facilities for egress will be secured. The Lyceum (formerly the French Theatre) has undergone extensive alterations, and is now provided with every modern appliance for safety and facility for rapid and convenient egress therefrom in case of fire, conforming fully to all the requirements of the law. The Board of Inspection or Survey of the Stadt Theatre have ordered the defective columns supporting the balconies and roof thereof to be taken out and replaced by substantial iron columns, which, in the opinion of the Board of Survey, render the building safe, its general construction being considered good.
