DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, Aug. 2, 1873.

To the Supervisor of the City Record.

SIR--The following communication transmitted to the Finance Department by the Commissioner of Public Works, forms a portion of the operations of this Department for the week ending August 2, 1873. It is transmitted for publication in "THE CITY RECORD" for the information of the Heads of Departments of the City Government.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, Commissioners Office, Room 19, City Hall, New York, August 1st, 1873.

To the Department of Finance, City of New York:

I am still without any reply to my letters to you of July 14th and 28th, requesting information as to the appropriation for printing and stationery.

Am I to understand that you decline to furnish this Department with the information asked for?

You are aware of the law which requires the Comptroller to furnish to each of the Heads of Departments weekly a statement of unexpended balances of the appropriations of his Department, and of the further law which prohibits Heads of the Departments from authorizing expenditures in excess of appropriations.

Several of the Departments are in great need of the ordinary and necessary supplies of stationery and printing. It is my duty to furnish such supplies to all Departments except Finance and Law, but I am prevented from discharging this duty by your failure to inform the Department as to the appropriation made for the purpose and the present condition of the same.

If you still persist in refusing me the information, I shall with the greatest reluctance feel it to be my duty to determine what means are open to me to compel compliance with my most proper, reasonable and consistent requests.

Resolutions.

That the Department of Public Works, be requested to repair the sidewalks and street pavement in the streets around Washington Market.

That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health in the City of New York, be

adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

No. 180. That no offal, blood, scrap, guts, gut-fat or refuse of slaughter houses shall be transported through, brought in, or allowed to be between Second avenue and Tenth avenue in the City of New York, without a special written permit from this Board.

That section 155 of the Sanitary Code, be amended by adding thereto the following; "and provided that the same effect shall be given under this section to a burial or transit permit issued by the Board of Health, or Health officer, of Kingsbridge, as to a burial or transit permit issued by this Department, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in Kingsbridge.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department, of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, on the 29th day of July, 1873, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That Section 66, of the Sanitary Code, be, and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 66. That no person engaged in the selling or keeping for sale of any fish, meat, birds, fowl, fruit, or vegetables, shall, without a permit from this Department, occupy or encroach upon any portion of any street or sidewalk, or public place in the City of New York.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health in the City of New York, be, and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Sec. 179. No adulterated or deleterious coffees, teas, or other preparations from which drinks are made shall be bought, sold, held or offered for sale.
