The Special Committee appointed by this Board in relation to the use or vault covers on the sidewalks throughout the city, beg leave to

REPORT: That they had an interview with the Commissioner of Public Works, who stated that he had no authority to discontinue the use of those ob-jectionable vault covers having prominent iron projections, which are painful to the tread of pe-destrians, and tend to accumulate snow and ice on their surface in the winter season, except in case of complaints being made to his department. The Committee would suggest that an amendment be made to the present ordinance so as to obviate the difficulty, and do away with the use of these obnoxious covers.

The Committee have taken pains to examine the different vault covers at present being put down on the sidewalks and find that the "Shart's

Patent Concrete Covers" on sale at 263 Broadway, appear to answer the requirements of the ordinance completely, without any of the objectionable features of the iron covers. We have examined some of them that have been in use on our principal thoroughfares during the last two years, showing little or no perceptible wear; and we would recommend them to our citizens in preference to any others we have yet seen.
