DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1887.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,
49 AND 51 CHAMBERS STREET,
October 28, 1887.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor:

SIR—In pursuance of the provisions of section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending September 30, 1887:

The organization of the Board governing the Department has remained the same as during the previous quarter.

During the past quarter the consent of the Department has been given to the erection of several bay or oriel windows, as follows:

On two buildings proposed to be erected by W. A. Mathesius on Fifth avenue, between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets; on the building known as Durland's Riding Academy, on the Circle at the intersection of Eighth avenue and the Boulevard.

Permission was granted John Eichler to lay an iron pipe from his brewery on Third avenue to a well located in One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, near Webster avenue, in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

A permit has also been issued, under a similar resolution, to William O'Gorman to regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Willis and Brook avenues, under the direction of this Department.

O'Brien & Clark, contractors for the New Aqueduct, have been given permission to store brick on Broadway and Riverdale avenue, opposite the property of J. H. Godwin and T. & W. Thorn & Company, the consent of those gentlemen having been first obtained.

Permission was given to Captain C. A. Kennedy to pass over Riverside Drive with Company A, Seventy-first Regiment, for the purpose of drill and instruction, on two evenings during each of the months of September, October and November.

An application of Bernheimer & Schmid for permission to lay a pipe across Riverside drive, under the surface, at One Hundred and Eighth street, for the purpose of carrying water from the North river to their brewery in Ninth avenue, was denied, the Department having been advised that it had not the authority to grant such permit.

A site for the statue of Garibaldi proposed to be presented to the City for erection on the parks by the Garibaldi Monument Committee has been selected on Washington Square.

Plans for the arrangement of the following-named small parks for public use have been prepared and will be carried out as soon as a fund for defraying the expense is provided:

Canal Street Park.
Duane Street Park.
Christopher Street Park.
Abingdon Square.
Jackson Square.

The sidewalk on the southerly side of Jeannette Park has been changed in width from two to eight feet. A plan showing the change has been filed in the office of the Department of Public Works.

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, the subject of the improvement of Morningside Park has been considered. Arrangements have been made with Messrs. Fred. Law Olmsted and Calvert Vaux for the preparation of plans.

The Department has now under consideration plans submitted by the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art for the improvement of the Museum building, as authorized by the provisions of chapter 581 of the Laws of 1887.

Specifications for heating that portion of the Art Museum now under construction have been approved by the Board, and a contract has been made with Kutzler & Blake, amounting to \$12,852, for furnishing the heating apparatus.

The bill before the Legislature to permit the use of bicycles and tricycles in the Central Park having become a law, directions were given to the Park Police to extend to such vehicles, and all other vehicles propelled by manumotive or pedomotive power, all the privileges now extended to carriages under the Park ordinances, subject only to such restrictions as are applied to the use of carriages within the parks.

It appearing on a map filed in the Register's office, that the proposed route of the New York, Connecticut and Eastern Railroad provides for its passage through Morningside Park and the contemplated High Bridge Park, the Board, on August 24, passed resolutions expressing its unalterable opposition to the use of any portion of the parks under its control save for the purpose for which they were designed—to be the people's pleasure grounds—and declaring that, under no circumstances, would consent to the proposed, or any other encroachment thereon, be given.

A public place or plaza having been laid out at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street, by chapter 580 of the Laws of 1887, a map showing the same has been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

Assessment lists for the following-named improvements have been approved and, together with statements of the amounts and costs of the works therein mentioned, transmitted to the Board of Assessors:

Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Boston road and Trinity avenue.

Paving with trap-block pavement the roadway of Willis avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to North Third avenue.

Fencing vacant lots on west side of Willis avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets.

Constructing Mill Brook drains, between One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Westchester avenue.

In accordance with chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, the Board of Street Opening and Improvement have been requested to include in one proceeding an application for the opening of the following-named streets and avenues on sanitary and economic grounds, deeming that the public interest requires the same to be declared open according to law without delay:

One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from a point two hundred and seventy-five feet west of Third avenue to Brook avenue.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Third to Willis avenue, and from Brown place to Brook avenue.

One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Rider to St. Ann's avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-first street, from Rider to St. Ann's avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Mott to St. Ann's avenue.

One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Elton avenue, and from St. Ann's to Prospect avenue.

Mott avenue, from Railroad avenue, East, to Sedgwick avenue.

Willis avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-seventh street to Harlem river.

The subject of the proposed depression of the tracks and changing the grades of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and carrying certain streets, avenues, roads, boulevards and parkways in the

Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, over the said railroad, as provided by chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, has been and is still under consideration. A plan showing such proposed depression of tracks and changing of grades has been prepared and is now on exhibition at the office of the Department.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been requested to direct this Department to take from file and amend the maps of the following-named streets and avenues, in order to show the grades, angles, dimensions, etc.:

Bremer avenue, Twenty-third Ward.
Lines A, B, C, D and E, in the Spuyten Duyvil District.
Montgomery avenue and other streets.
Bailey avenue, in the Kingsbridge District.
Dyckman street, from Kingsbridge road to River street, Twelfth Ward.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of \$1,500 from the appropriation made for the Bronx river bridges for 1877, for which it will not be required, to the appropriation entitled "Harlem River Bridges" for 1887, which is insufficient.

Contracts for the following-named works, etc., have been awarded and executed during the past quarter:

1. For furnishing and delivering hay, straw, oats, corn and bran. T. P. Huffman & Company, Contractors; Abram Winters and James Turner, sureties. Amount, \$6,200.

2. Constructing sewer in Clifton street between the sewer in Third and Cauldwell avenues, with branch on east side of St. Ann's avenue, north of Clifton street. M. J. Leahy, contractor; Anthony McOwen and Richard Damm, sureties.

3. For constructing twenty-five cases for the Metropolitan Museum of Art. B. & W. B. Smith, contractors; George Starr and Jacob W. Smith, sureties. Amount, \$3,975.

4. For constructing sewer in Rider avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets, with branch in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Rider and Morris avenues. Verdine E. Horton, contractor; Wm. E. Dean and Abraham Steers, sureties. Estimated amount, \$31,031.

5. For improving and constructing the unfinished portion of Riverside avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-eighth streets. James Slattery, contractor; John G. Smith and Robert Boyd, sureties. Estimated amount, \$26,081.20.

6. For completing a sea-wall on the easterly side of East River Park. William E. Dean, contractor; L. J. Fitzpatrick and James J. Jones, sureties. Estimated amount, \$1,716.

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 419 of the Laws of 1887, an agreement has been made with Charles Jones modifying the contract for constructing a sewer in Webster avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets, in regard to the manner of payment.

In accordance with the recommendation of the engineer the construction of four additional receiving-basins and connections were authorized on the contract for the Webster avenue sewer at the following points, namely:

1. Northeast corner of the junction of Webster and Brook avenues.
2. West side Webster avenue, opposite the junction of Webster and Brook avenues.
3. West side Webster avenue, opposite Anna place.
4. West side Webster avenue, opposite One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street.

In accordance with the terms of their agreement with this Department the Suburban Rapid Transit Company have been required to open the footways of their bridge over Harlem river at Second avenue to public use, and provision has been made for lighting the approaches thereto.

Rules and regulations for the use of the footways have been made and posted thereon.

Bryant Park, which for many years has been in darkness, is now lighted by gas.

At the urgent request of this Department the Gas Commission has made provision for lighting Mount Morris Park by electricity.

The advisability of lighting the westerly side of Riverside drive by electricity has been discussed and is now under consideration.

The Departmental Estimate of the amount of money which will be required to conduct the affairs of this Department during the year 1888, has been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The total amount of the estimate is \$1,216,710.

During the period covered by this report the weekly concerts in the Central Park and Battery Park and Tompkins Square have been continued.

Occasionally, during the season, a concert has been given at Paradise Park.

CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

Gardening.

In the section south of Seventy-ninth street Transverse road, the drives, walks and bridle paths have been cleared of overhanging branches and shrubs. 320 dead, diseased or overcrowded trees were removed.

The branches of the trees around Manhattan Square were thinned out, and the shrubs and trees in the Square were carefully cultivated and overcrowded ones removed or pruned.

The trees along Riverside Drive, which have been protected by tree-guards, have been wired and stayed in such manner as to prevent their trunks from being injured by swaying against the guards during high winds.

A part of the gardening force were engaged in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards in thinning out the overcrowded trees along Washington avenue, from One Hundred and Seventieth to One Hundred and Seventy-second street, 51 trees in all, having been cut out.

The West Drive, from Seventy-ninth to One Hundredth street, has been cleared of overhanging branches. The region from the East Drive, west, along the north side of the Ninety-seventh Street Transverse Road, has been thoroughly grubbed out and prepared for planting with suitable shrubs and vines at another season. To do this required the removal of 569 trees and shrubs, together with an enormous quantity of poisonous vines, brambles, etc.

On the south side of the same transverse road and around the bridle path and reservoir, 315 trees and shrubs have been removed, thus clearing up a spot which has long been a disreputable resort, as well as annoyance to the eye.

The roadway leading from the Sixth avenue entrance at One Hundred and Tenth street, is now being cleared of overhanging branches, and the ground under the trees carefully cleared of weeds and vines.

The force at the greenhouses was employed during the summer in the watering, propagating and general care of the nursery.

A large number of seeds of pansies and daisies of our own saving have been sown ready for early spring planting, and some twenty thousand cuttings made and rooted for next season's supply of bedding plants. In addition to the above work it has required, on an average, one day's work for four men to look after the aquatic plants, ponds and fountains, and to remove the dead leaves and flowers and to prevent the plants from overcrowding.

The elm trees along Fifth avenue, from Ninetieth to One Hundred and Tenth street, have been cultivated and, where necessary, pruned.

In Tompkins Square the trees and shrubs have been cultivated and, where broken or misshapen, removed.

Park Maintenance.

This work is general in its character, and applies equally to all divisions of the Park. Aside from small pieces of work, it consists chiefly in the care of drives, bridle-paths, transverse roads, Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Tenth street, Fifth avenue, between the points just named, and Seventy-second street, from Eighth avenue to Riverside Drive. This work requires constant attention, in order to keep these places clean and in proper condition for use. During the dry weather of the past quarter, 32 monitors and watering-carts were daily engaged in watering the above-named thoroughfares.

The cleaning of the walks and lawns, and the removing and carting away of leaves, paper and other rubbish, necessitated considerable work.

The road and walk basins throughout the divisions were cleaned at least once a month, or oftener. They were also repaired from time to time, as were the gutters along the drives.

The ladies' and gentlemen's cottages throughout the park were kept open, in charge of attendants, from 8 A. M. to 7 P. M.

The iron and wooden fences were kept in proper condition, and repaired from time to time, or when necessary.

The Park lawns were mowed several times a month, both with scythe and machine. The short grass cut by the mowing machines was carted to the manure pits or dumps. A large part of the long grass cut with the scythe was carted to the Menagerie for the use of the animals. About 200 loads were thus disposed of, the balance, about 50 loads, were sold.

All brushwood and logs, resulting from the thinning out of trees and shrubs, was hauled to the Sinepfold Yard and to the yard at Seventy-ninth street and Eighth avenue. The large timber being stored and the brush burned.

The following items are in addition to the regular routine work mentioned above:

First Division.

Good order has been preserved on the Ball Ground. Parties having permits to play croquet have been attended to. There was an average attendance of sixty clubs on the four days when croquet playing was permitted. Whenever children's picnic parties were held on the Ball Ground, water was supplied to the children, and men detailed to preserve order and protect property.

About 1,500 loads of mould were spread on the lawns of this division.
About 203 loads of manure were hauled from outside stables to the Sheepfold Yard. This work was done by Department and outside carts. 400 loads were hauled from the Menagerie.

The small parks at the junction of Sixty-third and Sixty-fifth streets, Ninth avenue and the Boulevard, were regularly cleaned and otherwise attended to.

About 1,500 square feet of sods was laid on the borders and lawns of this division.
Material for tar and asphalt walks was prepared by the force of this division. These walks were prepared and laid at the following points on the Central and City Parks:

About six tons of syssel rock was used in asphaltting driveway at Washington Square.

Second Division.

The laborers of this division, in addition to the routine work mentioned above, dug and filled in again 728 feet of trench for repairs to stationary benches on Mall.

During the past quarter two concerts were given each week on the Mall, which is located in this division. There was considerable work in preparing for and cleaning up after each of these concerts.

Third Division.

3,000 cubic yards of garden mould were stored at East River Park. This mould was delivered free of all charges.

The surface of the large lake received special attention, and the shores were regularly cleaned. The Fourth Avenue Parks and East River Park, which form part of this division, received the necessary attention.

Fourth Division.

95 loads of material were carted to Transverse Road No. 3 for the repair of culvert and sidewalks.

Manhattan Square, which forms a part of this division, received the necessary attention in the way of cleaning paths and trimming shrubs.

Stable Work.

The force at the Sheepfold stables were constantly employed in the care of the 15 police horses.

The forces at the Eighty-fifth street stables were employed in the care of 64 horses. The harness-makers at this stable were engaged in the repair of harness, etc., both for the police and park work and driving horses.

Fifth Division.

About 500 yards of broken stone was employed in repairing holes on Fifth avenue, between Ninetieth and Ninety-seventh streets; the park sidewalk in that region was shaped and repaired.

The Lower Lawn Tennis Ground is situated in this division. The house and grounds were open every day for the accommodation of players. The marking out of courts about once a week and the cleaning of the grounds caused considerable work.

Sixth Division.

The principal work of this division aside from the usual routine work mentioned at the outset was the care and maintenance in proper condition of the lawn tennis courts and house. These courts, as well as those on the lower grounds, had to be marked out on an average of once a week owing to rains and wear and tear of the large number of players who used the grounds each day. Ice-water was supplied on both grounds and the conveniences of those using them, provided for as well as possible.

Seventh Division.

The scum resulting from the decay of vegetable matter was removed twice a week from the shores of the Harlem Meer and The Loch, and streams connecting the same.

The teams of this division also removed rubbish, etc., from Third Avenue Bridge, Mt. Morris Park—The large crowds of people attending the Fourth of July celebration caused considerable extra work on this park. Aside from this the work was of the usual routine character.

Eighth Division.

This division is composed of the City Parks between Fourteenth and Fifty-ninth streets. The work on these parks was of the usual routine character.

Ninth Division.

This division consists of all City Parks below Fourteenth street.
The work consisted largely of the usual routine of cleaning, etc.
Considerable work was done at Jeannette Park in the way of grading and setting blue-stone curb.

During the past quarter concerts were given during each week at Tompkins Square and Battery Parks; and at Paradise Park, one every two weeks.

Riverside Park and Drive.—The work at these points has consisted of the usual routine work of cleaning and repairing the roads and drives, mowing lawns and cleaning basins.

Monitors were constantly engaged in watering the Drive.

Repairs were made to the property road between Ninety-seventh and One Hundred and First streets.

Filling in with stone and clean earth was done at Ninety-first street, near the railroad.
Over 2,600 cubic yards of garden mould were received, free of charge, and stored at Seventy-ninth and Ninety-first streets.

Gravel.

3,826 Cubic yards of gravel were received on Central Park and Riverside Drive. Part of this gravel has been spread on the drives and part stored for the repairing of the same next spring.

Mechanical Work.

A portion of this force, consisting of Engineers and Bridge Tenders were employed in operating the bridges over the Harlem river. This work went on uninterruptedly night and day, the bridge being opened whenever necessary. Considerable repairs were made to these bridges.

Repairs were made to the iron railing at Duane, Beach, Canal, Grand, Cooper, Stuyvesant, and Reservoir Park; the urinals on several of these parks were also repaired.

Repairing was done on the ironwork of the animal cages.

The horseshoeing force attended to all the necessary shoeing of work and police horses.

General repairs were made to the ironwork of settees and rolling stock, such as water trucks, light wagons, &c.

Carpenter Work.

Repaired twenty-seven cottages, buildings, urinals and gate boxes, as follows:

Repaired and filed saws and other tools for Foremen and Gardener's use.

Made the following repairs at the Animal Buildings:

Put new board roof over buffalo house, two new stoops in front of small animal building, besides other necessary repairs to cages and buildings; made repairs to doors and windows at Arsenal.

The following repairs were made at the stables:

At the Police stables at Sheepfold—Put up platform at west end, and steps leading to the same; put in new feed bins and shutes, also new woodwork on iron stall fittings.

At Eighty-fifth street Stables—Put in twenty pairs of new sash, repaired fifteen sash frames as well as stalls, etc.

Repaired the two rustic arbors near Seventy-second street and Eighth avenue; put in new seats on both sides of same.

Repaired the gates at One Hundredth street and Fifth avenue, and at One Hundred and Fourth street and Eighth avenue.

Repaired 17 pieces of rolling stock and made 16 new pieces.

At Old Propagating Houses—Repaired the sashes, put new side on one building, put up six new tables, besides other necessary repairs.

Around the Hot-bed Frames—Put up 780 lineal feet of fence, and 9 new gates; made 12 new hot-bed frames and sash, and repaired 16 hot-bed frames and 20 sashes.

Laid 220 feet of board walk at East River Park, also built steps connecting Mr. Morgan's house with the avenue.

At Riverside Park, opposite Grant's tomb—Put up 650 lineal feet of new fence and seats combined.

Put up platform and steps leading from Park to sidewalk at One Hundred and Sixth street and Fifth avenue.

Made and put up 3 new sections of stationary benches on the Mall.

At Bridge, Eighty-seventh street and Riverside Drive—Laid new platform on first landing, and new steps on lower landing, besides repairing bracing, stairs, etc.

Repairs, Harlem River Bridges and Third Avenue Bridges—Put new platform around centre abutment, repaired sash in engine-room, made new closets, coal platform, new signs and frames, and casing for the end of the draw.

Madison Avenue Bridge—Eased both ends of draw and made necessary repairs at engine-room and round-house.

Central Bridge.—Put in 70 new road plank and 25 new draw plank, besides finishing work at north end of bridge.

Repaired 649 settees as follows:

Made 24 new signs for Central and City Parks.

Put bottoms on 250 settees for tar walks.

At Mt. Morris Park, for Fourth of July celebration, put up and took down stands and platforms, also repaired fence on south side of park; also removed fence around inclosure for fireworks at Morningside Park.

Painters' Work.

Painted and glazed propagating-houses, also 700 hot-beds, sashes and fences.

Painted repairs to fence at Mt. Morris Park.

Painted 813 settees as follows:

Also 200 battens for benches on new tar walks; also painted three new sections of stationary benches on the Mall.

Painted posts of new wire fences.

Done the necessary painting on all new carpenter and iron work at the Police Stables, Sheepfold, and at the Eighty-fifth Street Stables.

Painted and lettered signs for use at different points on the Central and City Parks, and Harlem River Bridges. Painted the guards for City Parks.

Painted new carpenter-work and iron-work of animal buildings and cages.

Painted and glazed nine cottages, buildings and gate-boxes on the Central and City Parks.

Painted iron-work of one bridge in Central Park.

Painted 25 pieces of rolling stock.

Stencilled programmes, once each week, for concerts on the Mall, Central Park, and at Tompkins, Battery and Paradise Parks.

Painted iron railing around Washington Statue, at Union Square, also urinals at City Hall Park, Battery Park, Cooper Park and Grand Street Park.

Mason Work.

Removed and relaid 18,000 square feet of composition flagging at Battery Park, near sea-wall. This work required seventy cubic yards of earth filling. In underpinning sea-wall coping, built 1,000 cubic feet of stone work, and reset 300 cubic feet of coping. Built 6 new receiving-basins and one large cesspool, laid 80 feet of 6 and 8-inch drain-pipe. Underpinned 90 feet of base course and reset 30 cubic feet of sea-wall.

Excavated for and built seven walk and field basins, and laid seventy feet of 6 and 8-inch drain-pipe at Jeannette Park.

Formed and laid 40 feet of cement curb, reset 100 feet of blue-stone curb, and reset 600 feet of blue-stone flagging at bird and monkey houses, Central Park.

Repaired 311 square yards of street pavement, reset 625 running feet of blue-stone curb, excavated 117 cubic yards of earth and laid 117 cubic yards of macadam pavement on south side of walk of Eighty-sixth street Transverse road; also on same road, removed old street basin and built new one near bridge at westerly end.

Reset 115 feet of slate roof and pointed up 120 running feet of joints and flashings on roof of house on hill, at One Hundred and Fourth street near Eighth avenue; also repaired 36 square feet of slate roof and pointed chimney top and window jambs of ladies' cottage, near Conservatory Lake.

Cut out and pointed up 2,700 running feet of cut-stone work on Densmouth arch.

Removed old and built new necks and set new frames and gratings of 30 walk basins on First Division; also built two new walk basins, rebuilt large road basin, and laid twenty feet of eight-inch drain pipe on East Drive of same division; also removed large rock and built new road basin on West Drive, Second Division; also laid 450 square feet of stone pavement in gutter at Mt. St. Vincent.

At Union Square—Concreted and flagged floor of water-closet, laid 70 feet of eight-inch pipe, laid 80 feet of cement gutter pavement, and repointed stone work of cottage.

At Madison Square—Repaired and pointed base and pedestal of W. H. Seward statue.

At Tompkins Square—Reset blue-stone flagging of urinal.

At Grand Street Park—Repaired and painted granite flooring in urinal.

At Stuyvesant Square—Cut and set 48 cubic feet of granite and laid 96 cubic feet of stone foundation for gate sills.

At Riverside Park—Cut out and relaid 80 feet of ten-inch sewer pipe on west side of drive, between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets; also built sewer manhole 4 x 9 feet at Claremont Hotel.

At East River Park—Pulled down 2,120 cubic feet of old stone wall.

Plumbing Work.

During the past quarter the plumbers were engaged in the repairing of urinals and water-closets at the Arsenal, in arranging new water supply, and repairing pipes at the engine-room in the same building. In repairing closets and pipe connections at the following cottages: Casino Cottage, cottages near Seventy-second street and Fifth avenue, One Hundred and Tenth street and Sixth avenue, Washington and Union Squares, Claremont Hotel and Mt. St. Vincent Sub-Station.

Repairing hydrants and street washers at City Hall and Mount Morris Parks.

Repairing sprinklers for water trucks.

Repairing fountains at Tompkins and City Hall Parks.

Repairing iron urinals at different points on small City Parks.

Repairing Croton water bursts at different points on Central Park.

Attending to other matters, such as repairing stoves, stove-pipes, etc.

Furnishing water supply for urinals in Battery Park.

Jeannette Park.

The improvements upon this park have been the laying of the pavement upon the space between the granite base and the curb exterior to the park.

The furnishing and setting of the edging or curb around the wall within the park, and the completion of the drainage and shaping of the grounds.

East River Park.

No special repairs have been required to the bridges at Third and Madison avenues.

Central Bridge.

Special repairs to the draw span was commenced in July and continued until August 20, at which time the work was suspended by reason of the insufficiency of the appropriation.

Bridge at Second Avenue.

This bridge was constructed by the suburban Rapid Transit Company, who, by their agreement, were required to construct and maintain ways and approaches for foot passengers. One of these foot-ways and the approaches was opened for the use of the public on August 22 last.

SIR—I have received your letter of the 9th instant, transmitting copy of order of the Special and General Term, and the order of the Supreme Court entered upon the remittitur of the Court of Appeals in the above-entitled matter; also transcript of judgment for \$214.47 costs, and inquiring whether such orders and judgment have been properly entered, and what action should be taken by the Finance Department in the premises.

The proceeding in question has been litigated to the Court of Appeals, and finally decided, confirming the report of the Commissioners herein.

The orders and judgment have been properly entered, and are herewith returned with my approval endorsed thereon.

The act (chapter 444, Laws of 1877) under which the proceedings in question have been carried on provides as follows:

"Whenever any such reports shall be confirmed in sum or amount they are to be awarded for loss and damage as aforesaid, and the amount of costs and expenses of such proceeding in the discretion of the court, not to exceed the sum of \$3,000, to be taxed by the court, shall be and become a debt and a charge against the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and shall be paid by the Comptroller of said city to the several persons entitled thereto, under the provisions of the order of confirmation. The Comptroller and Board of Estimate and Apportionment are hereby authorized and directed to issue the bonds of said city for the purpose of providing funds with which to pay such awards and such costs and expenses, in the same form and manner as bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and the amount required to pay said bonds shall be raised by tax in the annual taxation in the City and County of New York in the succeeding years."

It is therefore your duty now to procure the issue of bonds in such form and manner as bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes to an amount sufficient to realize the sum required to pay the awards of damages made in said report, and the costs and expenses of the proceedings as taxed; also, to report the item to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in order that provision may be made in the estimate for the next succeeding year to meet the bonds so issued.

On June 15, 1877, the Legislature passed an act (chapter 444) entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out thereon a parade ground, and to authorize the taking of the same,' passed April twentieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and to provide for the payment of compensation for loss and damage to certain owners of land affected by said act."

In pursuance of the provisions of said act Commissioners were appointed to estimate and appraise the loss and damage to persons claiming to be entitled as owners of real estate within the boundaries of the plot of land laid out for a Military Parade Ground on map filed pursuant to chapter 628, Laws of 1871. The report of said Commissioners was confirmed by the Supreme Court, at Special Term, by an order dated July 9, 1886.

By the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation in a communication to the Comptroller bearing date September 21, 1886, a portion of the awards were paid, under a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted November 9, 1886.

An appeal was taken by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty to the General Term from said order of July 9, 1886, with reference to the awards made to certain claimants, for reasons stated by the Counsel to the Corporation in said communication, dated September 21, 1886.

The order of the Special Term was affirmed by the General Term, and an appeal was then taken to the Court of Appeals, and finally decided, affirming the order of confirmation of the report of the Commissioners therein.

I submit a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation dated November 11, 1887, referring to the proceedings in this case, and approving of the orders and judgment of the courts, and citing the law authorizing and directing the issue of bonds to pay the awards of damages in the report of the Commissioners, and the taxed costs and expenses of the proceedings.

The amount of the awards of damages and costs and expenses to be paid by the issue of bonds as prescribed by the act authorizing them for this purpose, including interest from July 13, 1886, to December 1, 1887, is \$207,945.25, as shown by the following summary statement:

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication from your secretary, under date of October 27, 1887, referring to me for my opinion, as to the reasonableness of the counsel fees, etc., therein contained, the following claims against the city presented to your Board for audit and allowance, to wit: John R. Voorhis, Mary E. Morrison, administratrix, and Charles F. McLean, for payments of judgments in the matter of contesting the office of Police Commissioners.

Accompanying this letter were the claims filed with your Board, from which it appeared that Mr. Charles F. McLean claimed as the amount of his reasonable counsel fees and expenses in the action against him by Sidney P. Nichols the sum of \$3,451.68; that Mary E. Morrison, administratrix of James E. Morrison, deceased, claimed as the amount of her reasonable counsel fees and disbursements in the action against her by William F. Smith, the sum of \$1,000; that John R. Voorhis claims as the amount of his reasonable counsel fees and disbursements in the action against him by William F. Smith, the sum of \$1,000.

Upon the receipt of the communication above referred to, I addressed a letter to each of the attorneys for the above-named claimants, requesting them to furnish me with statements of the services rendered in each of the above-mentioned actions, and I have received from Mr. Charles F. McLean, in his own behalf and as attorney for John R. Voorhis, statements showing the services rendered in each of those cases, and also a like statement from Mr. James Knox, the attorney for Mrs. Morrison, showing the amount of services rendered in her case. These statements I enclose herewith.

It appears from the statement of Mr. McLean, in reference to the action of Sidney P. Nichols against him, that the action was vigorously contested, involving a large number of motions and appeals, and was not ultimately determined until it had been passed upon by the Court of Appeals. From the statement made by him I am of the opinion that the charge of \$3,451.68 for counsel fees and disbursements, incurred in that action, is a reasonable charge.

It appears from the statement of Mr. McLean in reference to the action of Smith vs. Voorhis, and from the statement of Mr. Knox in reference to the action of Smith vs. Morrison, that each of those actions involved a considerable amount of labor and preparation for trial upon the part of the attorneys and counsel for the several defendants, and from the statements made in reference to those actions, I am of the opinion that the charge of \$1,000, in each case, is a reasonable charge.

Except as to the amount estimated for alterations, we find that the amounts specifically appropriated are sufficient for our purposes. Of the amount appropriated for salaries we have, up to November 1, made a saving of \$7,499.39.

The estimate for alterations was for the purpose of paying the cost attendant upon the extension of our offices by adding to them a portion of the adjoining building. The work proved to be more expensive than was anticipated. It involved the taking down and rebuilding of the walls and ceilings of the new offices, the introduction of new water and gas pipes, water-closets, etc., including a water-tank in the roof and a force-pump in the cellar of the building, and involved providing the appliances for heating the rooms. The work has been well and substantially done and, in the opinion of the Commissioners, the cost is not excessive. The additional offices involving these alterations were absolutely necessary to the proper and efficient conduct of the business of the office.

The transfer asked for being made, we shall still have to our credit a saving, up to November 1, of \$5,541.66 on the amount of our appropriation for the current year.
