

The balance of moneys standing to the joint credit of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller in the Importers and Traders' National Bank on the first day of January, 1879, was the sum of one hundred and fourteen thousand one hundred and fifty-nine dollars and ninety-four cents

(\$114,159.94) which includes interest allowed by the bank on deposits.

The total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1878 was the sum of one hundred and forty-one thousand five hundred and forty-four dollars and forty-one cents (\$141,544.41), and the amount distributed by him for expenses, payments to creditors and to next of kin was the sum of one hundred and thirty-five thousand one hundred and creature in dollars and treature one cents (\$134.544.41).

seventy-six dollars and twenty-one cents (\$135,176.21).

The total amount paid into the city treasury during the year 1878 was the sum of twenty-one thousand one hundred and twenty-eight dollars and twenty-three cents (\$21,128.23), being for commissions and intestate estates.

When the undersigned took possession of his office he found that the account of the Public Administrator and Comptroller with the Guardian Savings Institution showed a balance due from that bank of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$14,233.60).

The undersigned has made diligent effort to collect the amount from the receivers of the said

institution, without success, and in consequence thereof a large number of estates cannot be finally closed. The above fact has been included in each of my previous annual statements.
