#### BILLS.

Bills for Police expenditures shall be presented to the Clerk in duplicate, on forms as provided by the Department, and shall show upon their face the particular fund to which the claim is chargeable. Such bills shall be certified as follows:

First—The Order Clerk shall certify that the items charged for in the bill were applied for by Requisition No. —, made by —, and dated —, and that the items charged for in the bill were called for by such requisition.

Second—The officer who receives the articles shall certify that all of the articles specified were actually received, with the date.

Third—Such bills shall be verified by the oath of the persons furnishing the articles or performing the work, in the form as prescribed.

Fourth—The bill being so certified shall be referred to the Auditor.

Fifth—The Auditor shall carefully audit and examine each bill, and require a certificate to be attached thereto, showing that there is sufficient funds to the credit of the account to meet the payment of the bill, and shall, when the articles have been purchased in open market, or where the work is done without contract, certify as to the fair market value of the articles or of the work done, and for this purpose every officer and employee in the Department shall render the Auditor every assistance for the purpose of properly auditing the claim.

When goods are purchased or work done by contract, awarded by resolution of the Police Board, the certificate of audit shall state such facts, and the date of such resolution and contract.

The Auditor shall at least each sixty days examine the stock on hand in the Department, and shall keep such books of account and require the making of such reports as will enable him to show the actual supplies of all kinds on hand.

The Auditor shall keep such books as may be necessary to assure the keeping of a perfect account of all the supplies purchased by the Department, and the distribution of the same, and shall report monthly to the Police Board thereon.

Claims presented to the Department shall be numbered according to the date of their receipt, and shall, with the least possible delay, be audited according to their order of presentation.

The Auditor shall be subject to the directions of the President of the Police Board.

No bill or claim shall be paid by the Treasurer until the same has been ordered paid by resolution adopted by the Police Board. The Clerk shall certify on each bill that the same has been ordered paid, with the date.

#### SUPPLIES AND REQUISITIONS.

Requisitions for supplies of all kinds or for repairs to be furnished or done in any precinct shall be made by the commanding officer of the precinct or head of bureau or district, and shall be made in duplicate only. They will clearly state the quantity and description of supplies required or of the nature of the repairs needed. Such requisitions shall be addressed to the Police Board and filed with the Chief Clerk.

The Chief Clerk shall at once, on the receipt of the requisition, cause the original to be delivered to the Sergeant assigned to the Committee on Repairs and Supplies. A duplicate to be filed with the Auditor.

The Sergeant shall certify upon said requisition whether the articles called for are in stock. If so, he shall present such requisition to the Chairman of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, and if the same is allowed by two members of such Committee, the clerk or officer having charge of the Bureau of Supplies shall forthwith, from the stock on hand, fill such requisition, taking receipts for all articles delivered in a book or books to be kept for such purpose. If the goods called for by the requisition are not in stock, the Sergeant shall so certify, and deliver such requisition to the Chairman of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies; and such committee, by the signature of at least two members, may authorize the purchase of the articles specified in the open market, provided the estimated cost thereof shall not exceed \$100. If it shall exceed such amount, then said committee shall direct estimates to be procured from at least two reputable dealers, and, upon the receipt of such estimates, may award the contract to the lowest bidder, provided the cost thereof shall not exceed \$250.

No purchase shall be made by the Committee on Repairs and Supplies exceeding in amount \$250 without the authorization of the Police Board by resolution adopted at its meeting.

When the Committee authorizes a purchase it shall designate the person or persons from whom the goods shall be bought. The requisition shall thereupon be delivered to the Order Clerk, who shall make and deliver the necessary order, which order shall be countersigned by at least one member of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies.

The Order Clerk shall keep a book to be known as the "Order Book," and shall be made in such form as may be prescribed, and it shall contain an original and duplicate order and numbered consecutively, the numbers being printed on each order and duplicate. The original order shall have printed thereon a notice requiring the person or persons furnishing the goods to return said order with an invoice for the articles ordered, and such invoice and order must be furnished at the time of the delivery of the goods, otherwise the goods must not be received. The said invoice and order shall be forthwith sent by the person receiving it to the Auditor at Headquarters.

The requisitions when received by the Order Clerk shall be consecutively numbered in the order received, and the number of the requisition shall be entered on the order issued. The requisition shall be by the Order Clerk attached to the bills when presented, and shall be filed with such bills when paid.

Where the requisition calls for repairs, or new work, the Committee on Repairs and Supplies shall, when the estimated cost of the same does not exceed \$100, cause estimates to be obtained from, at least, two reputable and responsible dealers, and shall award the doing of the work to the lowest bidder when the amount is not more than \$200. When it exceeds that sum the Committee shall report the estimates to the Police Board for such action as it may deem best.

No officer or employee of the Police Department shall incur any expenses, or agree to any obligation for the payment of money by the Department without first obtaining the authority of the Police Board except as provided by the foregoing rules, and provided further that in cases of emergency, such as breaks occurring in plumbing in the buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department, slight repairs may be made by the order of the officer in charge; provided also that the expenses for the execution of criminal process and expenses in the detection of crime when it is impossible to obtain in advance the necessary authority. Bills for all such claims must be submitted to the Board at the end of each month, and the reasonableness and necessity for the expenses must be certified and approved by the commanding officer ordering or authorizing the expenditure.

Officers or employees of this Department must in no case purchase any article or order any work done without first receiving authority so to do, as provided by these rules, and the order for supplies, or for work done, shall have printed thereon a notice to this effect, and a violation of this rule shall be sufficient cause for the dismissal from the force or Department of any officer or employee.

Resolved, That the Chief be directed to communicate such rules to every officer of the force and every head of a bureau or sub-bureau within the Department.

Resolved, That the contract for supplying the Police Department with stationery, in accordance with the specifications thereof, be and is hereby awarded to the Jordan Stationery Company, for the sum and price of two thousand four hundred and four dollars and twenty-five cents, they being the lowest bidders; and that the President be and is hereby authorized to execute such contract on behalf of the Board of Police on the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That permission be granted to the officers appointed and sworn in as Special Officers on the property of the Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company and the Manhattan Beach Improvement Company, at Manhattan Beach, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, to wear a light gray helmet, gray-colored leather band, leather-bound, the under brim of helmet green cloth lined, said helmet containing a silver-plated wreath bearing a number. The above-described helmet to be worn instead of the blue cap, as incorporated in a resolution passed by this Board on June 13, 1898.
