SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending March 31, 1898.

REPORT.

On the 31st day of March, 1898, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 7,496. Number of Matrons, 38.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 19,773½ days; sick time paid, 9,886¼ days; sick time unpaid, 9,886¼ days; total, 19,773½ days. Total days' time of the force was 671,143 days; per cent. of sick to full time was 2.95; amount paid for sick time, \$34,848.61.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police force during the quarter was—Males, 28,741; females, 5,617; total, 34,358.

Number arrested for principal felonies was 2,071; number discharged without trial, 633; number acquitted, 307; number convicted, 415; number sent to other authorities, 50; number died, 7; number pending, 659; total, 2,071.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 489; females, 232; total, 721. Restored to parents or guardians, 430; brought to Central Office, 291; total, 721. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House January 1, 1898, 8; committed during January, 10; total, 18; discharged during January, 17. Remaining February 1, 1; committed during February, 8; total, 9; discharged during February, 9. Remaining March 1, none; committed during March, 17; total, 17; discharged during March, 14. Remaining April 1, 3. The aggregate number of days' detention was 330 days; number of meals, 990, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$247.50. For the names of persons detained and other details see schedule annexed marked "C."

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

JULY 19, 1898.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 11 o'clock A.M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

On motion of the Mayor, Frank J. Bell was made Temporary Secretary.

The minutes of the meeting held April 28, 1898, were read and a resolution approving them was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

A lien was presented to the Board, filed by Messrs. Werner & Haas, on the moneys payable to W. G. Triest on his contract for alterations to rifle range in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, in the sum of \$1,500. The Secretary was requested to notify the Comptroller.

A communication was received from Commander J. W. Miller, with a requisition for work on the U. S. S. "New Hampshire," for accommodation of the First Separate Naval Division. The report of the Assistant Clerk of the Works as to the cost of the work was also transmitted.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board authorize the expenditure and refer the matter to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, for his attention.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

The Secretary presented the bill of J. F. Buchanan & Co., for a bronze rail in connection with the work of wiring and furnishing fixtures for lighting by electricity the Seventh Regiment Armory, amounting to \$142, which was authorized by the Armory Board on April 6, and presented a report of the Assistant Clerk of the Works that the work had been completed satisfactorily, in accordance with the detailed drawings and specifications, whereupon Commissioner Kearny offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to J. F. Buchanan & Co. the sum of one hundred and forty-two dollars (\$142) authorized by the resolution of the Armory Board on April 6, 1898, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and Brigadier-General James McLeer.
