Board of Estimate and Apportionment—City of New York,
Office of the Secretary, No. 277 Broadway,
November 4, 1908.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the direction contained in the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 30, 1908, I have the honor to transmit herewith the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1909, and accompanying schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages:

“Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1909 for consideration and action thereon, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.”

BUDGET FOR 1909.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz.: One hundred and forty-eight million four hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred and four dollars and eighty-three cents (\$148,446,904.83); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1908, in the product of taxes theretofore levied deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Two million nine hundred and twenty-two thousand four hundred and forty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$2,922,447.08).

Be it further Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles "Salaries" or "Salaries and Wages," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" for monthly payrolls in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County governments.

Second—(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages," and (b) set forth on said payrolls the monthly, weekly or daily pro rata expenditures of said appropriations and the total amounts expended up to the time of and including said monthly and weekly payrolls, and (c) the unexpended balance of each appropriation against which said payrolls are chargeable.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payments for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rules of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amounts so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child of four years of age and over receiving such instruction during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judgments, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioners of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the

hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the

treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

That having examined the subject, it believes the proposed concession to the wishes of a large number of persons under the proper restrictions indicated to be desirable and therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York in relation to the discharge of firearms.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. Section 430 of chapter 11 of Part I. of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, in relation to the discharge of firearms, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the words "and all other grounds, public or private, are hereby exempted from the provisions hereof in favor of persons who have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of chapter 130 of the Laws of 1908."

"Resolution authorizing the Police Commissioner to purchase coal without public letting for use in Queens."

It appears from a communication received from the Police Commissioner that he can purchase coal in the Borough of Queens in the open market for 40 cents less per ton than he is able to secure by public letting. The results of public lettings in three instances were rejected by the Police Commissioner, as the minimum price was far above open market values.

Sir—This office is in receipt of a communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated October 24, in the matter of the action of The City of New York against Claus

Doscher. The communication transmits a stipulation that the City, in addition to paying the original sum, viz., \$36,100, was to pay \$924, which represents the carrying charges for the taxes for the years 1905, 1906 and 1907, pursuant to the amount of such bills for taxes to be established, either by the original receipted bills or by a certificate of the Deputy Collector of Taxes for the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommends that the stipulation be agreed to and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the same and authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock in the sum of \$924, in addition to the sum of \$36,100 already authorized.

For the knowledge of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment I give a little history of the circumstances which necessitate the payment of this additional fund:

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held July 14, 1905, said Board approved of the acquisition by the City of a parcel of land fronting on Dumont avenue, between Bradford and Miller avenues, in the East New York section of the Borough of Brooklyn, being 200 feet on Dumont avenue, 280 feet on Miller avenue and 280 feet on Bradford avenue, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of the premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof.

Under date of July 7, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting, authorized, in pursuance of the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$37,000, to provide means for the expense connected with the acquisition of the property. Contracts dated December 22, 1905, were entered into between Claus Doscher and The City for the acquisition of the property. The title was examined, and the title company certified that the title was good and marketable, and was vested in Claus Doscher. The Corporation Counsel approved of the certificate and issued his own certificate thereon, and a warrant was prepared in the Finance Department, dated March 14, 1906, for the sum of \$36,100 for the acquisition of this property. The difference between the purchase price, \$36,100, and the \$37,000 issue of Corporate Stock was for the purpose of a survey and the payment of the examination of title. Subsequently thereto, and for reasons probably known to the attorney for the owner of the property, he refused to give title to the City. The claim then set up was that the property had increased in value and that they could not be compelled to deliver title to the same after so long a lapse of time between the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the date of the warrant.

The matter was brought to your attention and you wrote to the Corporation Counsel, asking him to commence an action for specific performance of contract. This action was begun by the Corporation Counsel, and pending the action the question arose as to the validity of the title. The Corporation Counsel states in his communication that Mr. Doscher had a favorable determination in the matter and that he now proposes to carry out his contract with the City, provided the City refunds to him the amount which he paid in taxes during the time. This matter is only fair and equitable. Mr. Doscher delivered his title to the City in 1905. He would not have been obligated to pay the taxes accrued and due thereon, because being City property it would have been exempt from taxation, and therefore he should not be charged with the carrying charge of the taxes, and inasmuch as the City has had the use of the money for a period of three years and four months, which amounts to over \$3,000 on a 3 per cent. basis, I do not see any reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not approve of the request of the Corporation Counsel for this additional sum of money and the additional issue of Corporate Stock, and also the approval of the Mayor to the stipulation, in accordance with the provisions of section 255 of the Charter. I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, approve of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York in an amount not exceeding \$924, to provide means for the expense connected with the acquisition of the property located on Dumont avenue between Bradford and Miller avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for a hospital under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller be authorized to issue the Corporate Stock of The City of New York. That the Board further adopt a resolution authorizing the payment to Claus Doscher, or his heirs or assigns, in accordance with the stipulation hereto annexed, the said sum of \$924, or so much thereof as may be necessary, on his production of either the original bills or on furnishing a certificate of the Deputy Collector of Taxes in the Borough of Brooklyn showing the payment by the said Claus Doscher, his heirs or assigns, of the taxes on said property, which is mentioned and described in the contract dated December 22, 1905, between said Doscher and the Comptroller of The City of New York for the years 1905, 1906 and 1907.

And further, that, in accordance with the provisions of section 255 of the amended Greater New York Charter, his Honor the Mayor be requested to append his signature to the stipulation entered into between the Corporation Counsel, acting for and on behalf of The City of New York, and Claus Doscher.

To comply with the resolution would require that two men be taken from each company in the whole Department for a number of hours each school day and night. Under the present conditions it will be impracticable, if it were deemed necessary, to comply with the resolution. AN ORDINANCE amending the Code of Ordinances as to hydrants and use of water therefrom.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 288 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, part 1, chapter 6, article 3, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 288. No person other than an employee of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or the Fire Department, shall, without previous permission in writing from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, unscrew or open any hydrant, nor shall leave said hydrant open for a longer period than shall be limited in said permission, nor shall use water for other purposes than may be mentioned in said permission. Any one violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be imposed by any city magistrate, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, such city magistrate shall commit such offender to the city prison for a period not to exceed ten days."

Section 2. Section 291 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, part 1, chapter 6, article 4, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 291. No person or persons not connected with either the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or the Fire Department, shall open or use or tamper with any hydrant connected with the high pressure fire system. Any one violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be imposed by any city magistrate, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, such city magistrate shall commit such offender to the city prison for a period not to exceed ten days."

Dear Sir—I find it necessary to request an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), to replenish the Department appropriation, "Water Supply Collection and Storage—Pumping Stations, Repair and Renewals." There was appropriated to this account the sum of \$18,000. Bills have already been paid for material and work furnished chargeable to this appropriation, and there are outstanding liabilities against the fund approximating \$17,000.

The Engineer reports that the roofs of the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street and the High Bridge Pumping Stations are in need of immediate repairs, and it is quite important that this work be done before the winter weather sets in. The estimated cost of these repairs is \$625. The money appropriated to this account has been used principally for the repair of engines. The pumping machinery is in constant use, thereby requiring repairs frequently. Requisitions have just been issued for further repairs and replacement to damaged parts of engines, the cost of which is approximately \$1,050, so that with the orders now outstanding for repairs to engines and for the repair of the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street and the High Bridge Pumping Stations the appropriation will have become exhausted. For the coming two months it is estimated that the repairs to the engines in the four pumping stations will cost about \$3,000.

The roofs of the boiler and engine rooms, the coal bunker and the main building of the Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station are in need of repairs, and unless this work is done immediately it necessarily follows that the expense will be greater as the defects will increase with each storm. The buildings can be put in thorough repair at an expense of \$1,500.

I respectfully ask that you present this communication to the Honorable Board of Aldermen for their consideration.

I attach a form of resolution providing for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, in accordance with the provisions of section 188 of the Revised Charter.

In explanation of this request I desire to call your attention to the fact that no authorization has been requested since May, 1905, for the above supplies. In making out the budget one year ago for the current year of 1908 the above supplies were included, being a portion of a much larger list included in the budget for that year, to the total amount of \$365,661.10, at the request of the Budget Committee. They were not allowed, however, by the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On April 2, 1908, a communication was addressed by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting authorization to purchase said supplies.

No such authorization has been granted, for the reason, as I am now informed, that the Corporation Counsel has rendered an opinion addressed to the Honorable Comptroller, to the effect that articles and supplies intended for current use should be purchased not from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, but from appropriations made through the budget.

In the new budget which has recently been submitted by this Department items required for the coming year are included, but the Department is at present at a great disadvantage because of not having sufficient supplies with which to meet the present demands, and I deem it my duty to call attention to the fact that serious trouble may result unless they are speedily provided.

The number of horses in the Department has been greatly depleted by natural causes to a point far below a prudent and economical limit, as a result of which it is impossible to properly perform the work, and also, the average life of the horses is greatly reduced and the expense correspondingly increased.

The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway by the overhead electric system similar to that now used by the Company in the Borough of Queens, with the necessary switches, crossovers, wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, upon the following routes:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing track of the Company at the intersection of Broadway and Main street, in the former Village of Flushing, Borough of Queens; running thence easterly upon and along Broadway to Whitehouse avenue; thence northerly upon and along Whitehouse avenue to Chestnut street or avenue; thence easterly upon and along Chestnut street or avenue to and across Flushing avenue; thence still easterly through private property along the line of the continuation of Chestnut street or avenue to Murray lane; thence northerly upon and along Murray lane to Higgins lane; thence easterly upon and along Higgins lane to a point where Ninth avenue, if extended, would intersect said Higgins lane; thence northerly through private property along the line of Ninth avenue to Fourth street; thence westerly upon and along Fourth street to Eighth avenue; thence northerly upon and along Eighth avenue to Twenty-first street; thence easterly upon and along Twenty-first street to Eleventh avenue; thence northerly upon and along Eleventh avenue to a point about one hundred feet north of the north side line of the Boulevard, in the former Village of Whitehouse, Borough of Queens; also

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at the intersection of Francina avenue and Twenty-second street, in the former Village of Flushing, Borough of Queens; thence easterly upon and along Francina avenue to and across Twenty-fourth street; thence still easterly through private property along the line of the continuation of Francina avenue to Thirty-first street; thence northerly upon and along Thirty-first street to Broadway, said continuation of Francina avenue and Thirty-first street being shown on a map of the City entitled:

"Map or plan of Ingleide and vicinity, Third Ward (formerly Town of Flushing), Borough of Queens, City of New York, showing the street system and grades, dated New York, March 2, 1901; approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 1, 1902, and approved by the Mayor October 6, 1903."

—thence northerly through said private property upon the line of the property known and described upon the map of said private property as Thirty-first street to Broadway; thence easterly on and along Broadway to Bell avenue.

The said routes, the tracks of said routes, turnouts and crossovers hereby authorized are more particularly shown upon two maps, each entitled:

"Map showing the proposed street surface railway to accompany the application for a franchise of the New York and Queens County Railway Company to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated June 10, 1907."

—and signed by P. L. Fuller, President, and A. E. Kallack, Consulting Engineer, which maps are attached herewith and made a part of this contract.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time; or, in the event that such consents cannot be obtained, the Company shall, within two months thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner

provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, as herein described, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive and upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate thereafter prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

For the extension here described herein: The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first five years after the commencement of operation of the extension herein provided for, annually on November 1, three (3) per cent. of the gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding, and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City of New York, of its gross receipts. The Company shall pay such percentages only upon such portion of its gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of such extension shall bear to the entire length of its line.

For the extension last described herein: The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first five years after the commencement of operation of the extension herein provided for, annually on November 1, three (3) per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding, and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City of New York, of its gross receipts. The Company shall pay such percentages only upon such portion of its gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of such extension shall bear to the entire length of its line.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewed term, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any Company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the same streets and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract hereby granted, whether original or renewed, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewed, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute, or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be released either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation

of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The railway to be constructed under this contract may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric traction now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission of the First District of the State of New York.

Eighth—The Company shall begin construction of the extensions herein authorized within the time prescribed by the Railroad Law of the State of New York, and such extensions shall be completed and shall be in operation on or before December 31, 1909; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Ninth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City; and the Company agrees to make application to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for permission to string and maintain its electrical conductors in the streets covered by this grant.

Tenth—The said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of the Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

Eleventh—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five years of its franchise shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which the railway shall be constructed under this contract, shall cause to be excavated the entire roadway of such streets and avenues at least three times in every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, and shall provide for such purpose at least one tankcar, to be propelled by electric power, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Fifteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Sixteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks in any street or highway covered by this grant, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such street or highway between its tracks and the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of neglect by the Company to make pavements or repairs after the expiration of thirty days' notice to do so, the local authorities may make the same at the expense of such corporation, and such authorities may make such reasonable regulations and ordinances as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow as the interest or convenience of the public may require.

Seventeenth—Any alteration which may be required in the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, conduits, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eighteenth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street, the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts from operation of the railway, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to pay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any act or default of the Company, giving the Company notice and the right to intervene in any action or proceeding wherein such damage may be sought.

Twenty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall file with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, the payment of the annual percentages for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at reasonable rates, the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the full term of the grant,

the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, and such duties and obligations as may hereafter be imposed by the local authorities under this grant, or under the powers delegated by the Railroad Law, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund, without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, or wheel guards and watering of street pavements, or in case of failure to render efficient public service at reasonable rates, or to maintain the property in good condition, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, within thirty (30) days after written notice from the Comptroller, so to do pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

Twenty-second—No action or proceeding or right under the provision of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Twenty-third—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided, shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

The Company agrees that notice printed in the City Record shall constitute sufficient notice within the meaning of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, right and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-fifth—This contract is also upon the further and express conditions that the provisions of Article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the streets and highways and the surface railroads operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinafter fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereto duly authorized, have caused their corporate names to be hereunto signed and their corporate seals to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

Proposed Form of Contract for Alteration of Route and Modification of Ordinance.

This contract, made the day of 190 , by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, a domestic railroad corporation (hereinafter called the Westchester Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The City of New York, by ordinance approved by the Mayor on August 2, 1904, granted to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways, and the privilege to construct and operate a four-track railroad upon certain routes particularly set forth in section 1 of said ordinance, and as shown on certain maps and profiles therein referred to and filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, The Board did, on July 14, 1905, adopt a resolution, which was approved by the Mayor on July 21, 1905, consenting to a change in the route of the Westchester Company; and

Whereas, In and by said ordinance and resolution as amended, the consent of the City was granted to the Westchester Company for the construction, maintenance and operation of the said railroad across certain enumerated streets, avenues or highways, either above or below the grade thereof, within said City, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

Whereas, The said Westchester Company has applied to the Board, as the local authority of the City of New York, by a verified petition, dated June 17, 1908, for the consent of such local authority for such change, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and for the right to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on said amended route, and for the modification of the said ordinance and resolution in accordance therewith;

Whereas, The said Westchester Company has applied to the Board, as the local authority of the City of New York, by a second verified petition, dated June 17, 1908, for the consent of such local authority to certain other modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, to wit:

1. By striking out in section 1, the following words, "except the overhead trolley system."

2. By striking out in section 2, paragraph 15, the following words, "except the overhead trolley system."

3. By striking out the whole of section 2, paragraph 16, and substituting therefor the following: "In any conduits laid by the company, or on any poles erected by the company for the transmission of power for its own use, provision shall be made to carry three cables for the use of the police, fire and ambulance service of the City without charges therefor."

7. That the time named in said section 3, paragraph 1, for the completion of a four-track railroad upon the main line, from the northernly line of the City as far south as One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, be extended to August 2, 1911.

8. By striking out the whole of section 5, paragraph 4, and substituting therefor the following:

"Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation prior to the 30 day of August, 1913, shall be deemed to have been abandoned and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railway shall cease and determine, except that south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, if the railway company shall have constructed less than four tracks within said period, it shall only be deemed to have abandoned its right to construct any additional tracks south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street. And in the event that the said railway company shall not, prior to the 30 day of August, 1913, construct its main line south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and to the Harlem River, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure."

Whereas, On the 18th day of September, 1908, the Board held a public hearing upon the proposed modifications, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, such hearing being held after due publication; and

Whereas, Said public hearing was continued to the 25th day of September, 1908, and was concluded on said day; and

Whereas, The said Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modifications and amendments of said ordinance and has adopted a resolution that the said modifications and amendments are desirable and in the public interest, and that the causes stated by said Westchester Company why the conditions contained in said ordinance in regard to the completion of said road cannot be performed prior to the time therein stipulated, are, in its opinion, for causes over which the grantee had no control and is in no wise responsible; and

Whereas, On the day of 1908, the Board, as the local authority of the City of New York, adopted a resolution granting to the Westchester Company the right to make such changes, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and the right to cross certain streets, avenues, highways and public places, and to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on said amended route of said railroad, and gave its consent to the other modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and authorized the Mayor to execute and deliver a contract granting such rights in the name and on behalf of the City, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on the day of 1908;

Main Line.

Beginning at a point on the Harlem River, near the point where Lincoln Avenue intersects the north bank of the Harlem River in the Borough of The Bronx, and crossing Lincoln Avenue, between the Harlem River and One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence running easterly substantially parallel to One Hundred and Thirty-second street, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem River; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-second street at or near its intersection with Willow Avenue; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-third street, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Willow Avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence

northerly parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad and crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, One Hundred and Fortieth street and One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Southern Boulevard and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence northerly parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad to Westchester Avenue, and crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Leggett Street, One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Longwood Avenue, Lafayette Avenue, Tiffany Street, Barretto Street, Hunts Point Road, Faile Street, Bryant Street, Longfellow Street, proposed Ludlow Avenue and Whittier Street, between Whitlock Avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence crossing Westchester Avenue at or near its intersection with Edgewater Road; thence running northerly substantially parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad to One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between the Bronx River and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and Van Nest Avenue, between Devoe Avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence running northerly substantially parallel to Devoe Avenue and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, Wyatt Street and Walker Avenue (West Farms Road), between Devoe Avenue and Berrian Street; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Lebanon Street, between Devoe Avenue and Berrian Street; thence crossing One Hundred and Eightieth Street and Berrian Street, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Adams Street, between Morris Park Avenue and the easterly line of Bronx Park; thence crossing Berrian Street, between Morris Park Avenue and Bronx Park; thence to and crossing Unionport Road, between Miami Street and Birchall Avenue; thence crossing Oakley Street, between Miami Street and Sagamore Street; thence crossing White Plains Road, at or near the intersection of Sagamore Street; thence crossing Brown Avenue and Sagamore Street, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Hunt Avenue and Bear Swamp Road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Bronx and Pelham Parkway and Williamsbridge Road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Saw Mill Lane, between Williamsbridge Road and Eastchester Road; thence crossing Eastchester Road near its intersection with Syracuse Avenue; thence crossing Birch Street at or near its intersection with Syracuse Avenue; thence crossing Cedar Street, Oak Street and Walnut Street, between Kingston Avenue and Syracuse Avenue; thence crossing Chestnut Street and Kingston Avenue at or near their intersection; thence crossing Ash Street, between Kingston Avenue and Cornell Avenue; thence crossing Boston Road at or near its intersection with Scheffels Lane; thence crossing Fifth Avenue or Dyre Avenue, between Boston Road and Kingsbridge Road; thence continuing to a point in the northerly line of The City of New York, between Fifth Avenue and the road to White Plains (Columbus Avenue).

Sec. 4. The Westchester Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National Banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
