DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING JANUARY 3, 1914.

PERMANENT PUBLIC HEALTH EXHIBIT.

On Wednesday, December 17, a permanent exhibit, showing the various activities of the Department of Health, was opened in the Exhibition Hall on the fifth floor of the Department Building, 149 Centre st. On this occasion, Dr. Stephen Smith, one of the original organizers of the present Department of Health, delivered an interesting address describing sanitary conditions in New York City 50 years ago. At that time the death rate was over 36 per thousand, almost treble the present rate. The health authorities had no real power to remedy matters and the work was, moreover, largely dominated by politics. Dr. Stephen Smith was one of the prime movers in the formation of a citizens' committee, which made a very extensive and searching investigation into the sanitary condition of the City and prepared a bill which was finally enacted into law reorganizing the Department of Health in its present form.

Dr. Jacobi, another of the speakers, emphasized the enormous improvement which had taken place in the milk supply of the City and heartily endorsed the attitude of the Department of Health in the matter of the pasteurization of the milk supply.

Prof. Charles F. Chandler, who was one of the first "Pure Food" chemists in this country, gave an interesting account of the examination of foods for adulterations and emphasized the distinction between those which were dangerous to the public health and such as were merely commercial frauds but without effect on the public health.

The retiring General Medical Officer of the Department of Health, Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, sketched the remarkable changes which had taken place in public health matters following the bacteriological discoveries of Pasteur and Koch in the seventies and eighties.

It is planned to make the exhibit permanent and keep it up to date and make it available to students of public health and others desiring to acquaint themselves with the work of this Department.

MILK SEDIMENT TESTING.

It has long been known that the main source of contamination of milk is the dirt which gains access to the milk during the milking and other operations to which the milk is subjected. A measure of the amount of dirt in the milk is, therefore, a criterion of the methods of handling milk. In order to better control these methods and thus to improve the quality of the milk supply, the Board of Health, at its meeting held December 22, 1913, adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, The protection of the public health requires that the milk supplied and furnished in the City of New York be clean and wholesome, and for the accomplishment of this purpose it is advisable that a sediment tester be used in creameries from which milk is shipped to the City of New York, and that all milk delivered to said creameries should be tested by and through a sediment tester, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the following regulations for the protection of life and the care, promotion and preservation of health, be and the same are hereby adopted to take effect on and after the first day of February, 1914:

"(1) That a sediment tester approved by the Department of Health of the City of New York, be used in all creameries shipping milk to the City of New York.

"(2) That all milk received at any creamery so shipping milk as aforesaid be tested thereat by the person having the management and control of such creamery at least once a week, and that the results of such test be posted in a conspicuous place in the creamery and duplicates of such test be forwarded to the Department of Health at the end of each month.

"(3) That the photograph or gauge established by the Board of Health of the City of New York be used as a standard in the creameries herein referred to in determining whether milk contains excessive sediment.

"(4) That where the maximum of sediment is shown to habitually exist in milk tested as aforesaid at any creamery it will constitute sufficient cause to rate the milk as Grade C, with the right of said Board to exclude such milk from the City of New York when such conditions continue."

PUBLIC LECTURES AT OTISVILLE SANATORIUM.

Some time ago we mentioned the fact that school instruction for the children at the Otisville Sanatorium had been taken over by the Department of Education, the Otisville classes being organized as a branch of Public School 14 in this City. Through the co-operation of Dr. Henry M. Leipziger, Supervisor of Lectures, arrangements have now been made for extending the services of the public lecture system to the patients at Otisville. This will undoubtedly be welcome news to the patients at the sanatorium, for not only will the lectures be of great educational value but will do much to make their lives brighter and happier. The organization of these lectures emphasizes the need for a suitable recreation building with a lecture hall where such meetings can be held.

RESULTS OF SANATORIUM TREATMENT.

On the occasion of the International Congress on Tuberculosis, held in Washington in 1908, attention was called to the need of accurate statistics concerning sanatorium treatment. By that time, sufficient time had elapsed since the opening of our sanatoria for the tuberculous poor of New York City to warrant a careful study of the results as shown in the physical and the economic conditions of patients discharged during the previous five years. The fifth triennial convention of the Council of Jewish Women, held in 1908, was much impressed by the need for such study, and appropriated funds to carry on the work. The facts learned in this investigation have just been published as No. 8 of the Monograph Series of this Department.

While the study does not demonstrate just what is the value of sanatorium treatment in terms of lengthened life, it is full of encouragement to all who are interested in the campaign against tuberculosis. Thus it was found that a large majority of sanatorium patients permanently learn through their residence at the sanatorium the principles of health, that is, the necessity for air, light and proper food. As far as their means allow, they seek to carry these principles into their daily lives, at home and at work. The report calls attention to the need for providing for patients discharged from sanatoria suitable conditions of life, by which is meant sanitary housing, health-

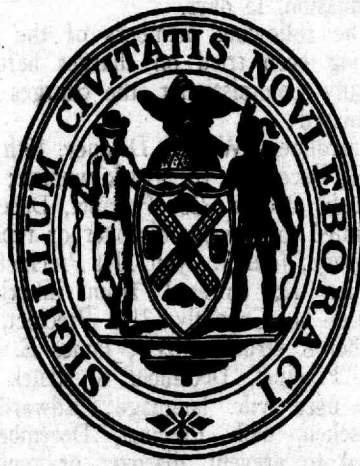

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale, thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
