MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Friday, Feb. 8, 1918, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—James E. MacBride, President; Morris Cukor and William Drennan
Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the following proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below":

(a) By striking from Part I the following: With maintenance—Employment Agent, \$900; Admitting Physician, \$1,020; Ambulance Engineman, \$1,200; Cook (Male), \$900; Resident Physician, \$900. Without maintenance—Employment Agent, \$900; and substituting therefor: With maintenance—Employment Agent, \$900; Admitting Physician (number of incumbents unlimited), \$1,200; Am-

bulance Engineman, \$1,200; Cook (Male), \$1,020; Resident Physician, \$900. Without maintenance—Employment Agent, \$1,140; Ambulance Engineman, \$1,440; Resident Physician, \$1,200.

(b) By striking from Part II the following: With maintenance—Senior Hospital Helper, Hospital Attendant, \$480. Without maintenance—Hospital Attendant, \$720; and substituting therefor: With maintenance—Senior Hospital Helper, \$720; Hospital Attendant, \$600. Without maintenance—Senior Hospital Helper, \$900.

John W. Brannan, President, Board of Trustees, and George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk, Department of Public Charities, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held Jan. 16 were approved.

The matter of the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class for the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Department of Public Charities was referred to the Acting Chief Examiner, to take up with the Advisory Board, and report to the Commission on the advisability of a revision of the entire Non-Competitive Class. In this connection the Commission considered the following communications:

From the Advisory Board, dated Jan. 30, recommending that the following changes in the Non-Competitive Class be made for the Department of Public Charities: By increasing the maximum compensation of Hospital Helper from \$360 per annum with maintenance to \$420 per annum with maintenance; and by including in Part I of the Non-Competitive Class the following positions: Laboratory Helper at a compensation not exceeding \$600 per annum with maintenance; Assistant Pathologist with compensation not exceeding \$600 per annum with maintenance. From the Department of Public Charities, dated Jan. 31, requesting the following amendment of the Non-Competitive classification of positions for that department: By increasing the maximum compensation of Deckhand (Part I) from \$720 per annum with maintenance to \$912 per annum with maintenance; by increasing the maximum compensation of Caretaker (Mortuary), Part I, from \$840 per annum without maintenance to \$912 per annum without maintenance; by increasing the maximum compensation of Watchman (Part II) from \$600 per annum without maintenance to \$864 per annum without maintenance; by including the position of Mortuary Helper at \$864 per annum without maintenance. Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Bureau of Public Works in each Borough," be and the same hereby is amended by including therein the following: Consulting Engineer, Brooklyn.

Peter J. Erady, Supervisor of the City Record, appeared and requested a postponement of the examination for promotion to Clerk, fourth grade, for his department, scheduled to be held on Feb. 13. The request was granted.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, because of insufficiency of work, Henry P. de Forest, 59 W. 54th st., be and he is hereby transferred, effective Feb. 8, from the position of Medical Examiner at \$2,400 per annum to that of Medical Examiner (per diem), in the office of the Commission, at \$10 per diem when employed.

Resolved, That Joseph A. Kene, 64 Greene ave., Brooklyn, Medical Examiner, at \$2,400 per annum, in the office of the Commission, be and he is hereby placed in charge of medical examinations, effective Feb. 8, and directed to devote all the time necessary to the work.

STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Inspection has submitted to this Commission appeals from orders issued by said Division of Inspection against the premises stated, the granting of which appeals would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Inspection has had a re-inspection made in each case, and in accordance with the reports submitted, gives the existing conditions and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Auburn, 34-36 Dill st.; appellant, Adams Publishing Co. 2—Construct all exit doors so that same will open outward. Four-story nonfireproof building, lots partly divided; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 37; above 1st floor, 25; above 2d floor, 15. Exits, one unenclosed interior stairway, doors to which open in; fire escape on southeast side, with fireproof openings to balconies. Exits remote; no egress from roof. Upper floors divided into offices and workrooms. Doors to stairway open outward; main exit door at street also open in; possibility of congestion at exit is minor; main door would have to swing out to end the street line.

Recommendation: Waive the order while not more than 2 a. m. employed above 1st floor.

2. Premises affected, Binghamton; 3 Belnap ave.; appellant, Brown-Kent-Jackson Lumber Co. Inc. 13—Additional exit. 13—Enclose stairway remote. Two-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no combustible; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 7 to 10; above 1st floor, 3 to 5. Exits, one interior stairway, the stairs run of which are open out; an imperfect fire escape in front, openings to balconies non-run of, granite 6 ft. 4 inches by 2 feet 4 inches wide. On July 31, 1916, inspection made of building then occupied, which building had been constructed since Oct. 1, 1913, and order to provide two legal means of exit issued; appeal from this order taken, and Oct. 11, 1916, it was decided that the one interior stairway in building would be accepted if enclosed with non-combustible partitions, all openings to be provided with iron ladders, and as second exit a Rule 4a staircase was to be erected. Before building was completely destroyed by fire, the present building was then constructed, and it does not comply with the requirements of Section 724, which does not conform to the terms of the original stair run of stairway enclosed with non-combustible partitions of fire-resisting material, no fire being provided at entrance to enclosure, which enclosure does not extend the full length of stairway. At northeast corner

of building a fire escape was erected, with non-fireproof openings on the course thereof. It is stated that a proper fire-resisting enclosure around the present stairs would interfere with the operations of the factory, in that it is necessary to carry long material up and down these stairs. Building measures 60 feet wide by 64 feet long.

Recommendation: That the present stairway enclosure be accepted if extended to underside of roof, with skylight three-fourths area of the shaft, all openings therein to be provided with self-closing fire doors opening outwardly so as not to obstruct the stairway. Fire escape to be accepted as constructed. Acceptance of these exits conditioned on the occupancy of the second floor not exceeding three.

3. Premises affected, Buffalo, 6-12 Goodell st.; appellant, C. Weyand Brewing Co. 3—Enclose stairs, Mill No. 1. 4—Additional exit, Mill Building. 5—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Additional exit, Buildings 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8. 7—Prohibit occupancy Buildings 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8. Three-four and six-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; divided lots; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 18; factory, 14; above 1st floor, 2; above 2d floor, none permanently. At time of inspection occupancy of 2d floor was not increased, viz., 1 employee. Appellant desires to employ ten persons on 2d floor. Two-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lots; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; present occupancy, 4; above 1st floor, 4. Exit, one interior stairway; stairway enclosed with wood, door to same opens in and is not self-closing; no egress from roof; occupant of 2d floor intends to occupy 1st floor also.

4. Premises affected, Rochester, 13 Minerva st.; appellant, Geo. Schimke, 1—Prohibit occupancy until two legal means of exit have been provided. (Jan. 3, 1918.) Three-story nonfireproof building; divided lots; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 5; above 1st floor, 2, above 2d floor, 2. Exits, interior wooden stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; fire escape on east with fireproof doors only; windows, on course not fireproof; exits remote, no safe egress from roof. Occupancy previous to date of appeal was 8.

Recommendation: Acceptance of fire escape without fireproofing the windows while not more than eight persons employed in the building.

5. Premises affected, Rochester, 88 Manhattan st.; appellant, E. M. Phillips. 2—Enclose stairways. 3—Additional exit. 4—Swing door outwardly. 5—Reconstruct stairway to be not less than 44 inches wide. These orders were waived on Aug. 15, 1917, on condition that occupancy of 2d floor be not increased, viz., 1 employee. Appellant desires to employ ten persons on 2d floor. Two-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lots; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; present occupancy, 4; above 1st floor, 4. Exit, one interior stairway; stairway enclosed with wood, door to same opens in and is not self-closing; no egress from roof; occupant of 2d floor intends to occupy 1st floor also; maximum number to be employed, 10.

Recommendation: Accept as additional exit a 44-inch interior stairway remote from present stairway, preferably in southwest corner, said stairway to be enclosed as per 504-c; extending from 1st floor to underside of 2d floor, with fire doors at all openings; doors to be provided in exterior wall within enclosure; window to be provided to outer air within enclosure; doors to present stairway accepted as an exit; doors to new stairway to be self-closing and open outwardly so as not to obstruct the stairway.

6. Premises affected, Schenectady, Building 91; appellant, General Electric Co. 4—Additional exit. Two-story semi-fireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 13; above 1st floor, 3; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; building used as iron foundry; 2d floor, 30 to 40 feet, used for charging cupolas; not to exceed four men on this floor at any one time.

7. Premises affected, Schenectady, Building 91; appellant, General Electric Co. 4—Additional exit. Two-story semi-fireproof building from 1st to 3d floor to Building No. 5, either northwest corner into Building No. 5 or southwest corner into Building No. 5, with conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

8. Premises affected, Canajoharie, Mill St. (Mill No. 1); appellant, Beechnut Packing Co. 2—Additional exit. Building No. 1. 2—Prohibit occupancy. (June 23, 1917.) Building No. 4, 4-story nonfireproof; open lots; sprinkler; no combustibles; fire alarm system; occupancy, 17, 14 of whom are factory employees; above 1st floor, 4; above 2d floor, 1; occasionally; 4th floor is attic. Exits, one interior stairway extending from 1st to 2d floors along the southerly wall, from 2d to 3d floors along the northerly wall and from 3d to 4th floors along the western wall. At foot of stairway from 2d to 3d floors is a doorway to adjoining building. Building to be torn down and new building erected.

9. Premises affected, Schenectady, Building 95; appellant, General Electric Co. 6—Make stairs 44 inches wide. 7—Extend stairway enclosure 3 feet above roof. 8—Enclose stairway with fireproof partitions. 9—Self-closing fire doors at elevator. (March 21, 1918.) Two-story semi-fireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 563; above 1st floor, 15. Exits, four interior stairways, three of which are properly enclosed with fireproof partitions and one unenclosed; doors open outwardly and are self-closing. There are two imperfect horizontal exits on 2d floor; building used as foundry; 2d floor is approximately 40 feet wide by 408 feet long; central section used as cupola charging floor, two end sections used for storage of patterns and cores. Recommendation: Acceptance of ladder while no one is permanently on 3d floor.

15. Premises affected, Olean, 104-114 Penn ave.; appellant, E. B. (April 9, 1918.) Two-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lots; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 33; above 1st floor, 12; exits remote; no egress from roof. Exits, two stories high on the street, but only one at rear, with shipping platform with loading doors running the entire length at floor level of car door when car is on switch.

Recommendation: Treat premises as one-story building and waive orders.

16. Premises affected, Yonkers, Neperhan ave. and Aspinwall st.; appellant, Alex. Smith & Sons Carpet Co. Building No. 13. Provide two legal exits from all parts of building.

4-story building; nonfireproof; open lots; no fire alarm; no combustibles; sprinkler installed with two sources of water supply. Occupancy, 88; above 1st floor, 20 to 30; above 2d floor, 18 to 30. Exits: One exterior wooden stairway, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; imperfect horizontal exit on 4th floor. These horizontal exits are wooden bridges with self-closing fire doors and incombustible sills at each end; the one bridge on the 3d floor leads to roof of two-story building, and from this bridge an exterior stairway leads to grade.

Recommendation: While occupancy remains unchanged, accept the exterior wooden stairway as a first means of exit and the horizontal exits in the form of wooden bridges as second means of exit.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause, or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause, or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.
