Upper floors divided into offices and workrooms. Doors to stairway open outwardly; main exit door at street also opens in; possibility of congestion at exit is minor; main door would have to swing out beyond the street line.

Recommendation: Acceptance of ladder while no one is permanently on 3d floor.

Van Alst & Co. 3—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Make exit stairs 44 inches wide. 7—Provide stair landings for at least every 12 feet 6 inches in height. 8—Exit stairs incombustible. 9—Enclose stairs fireproof with skylight three-fourths area of shaft. (April 9, 1918.) Two-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no fire alarm; occupancy, 33; above 1st floor, 12; exits remote; no egress from roof. Hydraulic presses and machinery manufactured. Building measures about 50 feet by 100 feet with "L" extension at one end. The 2d floor is a mezzanine covering about two per cent of building area; second floor used for office and stockroom, also manufacturing, there being three lathes; building has two exits fairly remote; stairways constructed of wood and iron with iron stringers and wooden treads, stairs 36 inches wide, 10-inch treads, 6 1/4 inches rise; stairs unenclosed, but well lighted by exterior windows and shop lighting; safe egress to street from stairway; exit stairs are 16 feet 10 inches between landings; construction and location of stairs make it impracticable to provide landings 12 feet 6 inches in run of stairs.

The 2d floor is a mezzanine covering about two per cent of building area; second floor used for office and stockroom, also manufacturing, there being three lathes; building has two exits fairly remote; stairways constructed of wood and iron with iron stringers and wooden treads, stairs 36 inches wide, 10-inch treads, 6 1/4 inches rise; stairs unenclosed, but well lighted by exterior windows and shop lighting; safe egress to street from stairway; exit stairs are 16 feet 10 inches between landings; construction and location of stairs make it impracticable to provide landings 12 feet 6 inches in run of stairs.

Recommendation: The 2d floor consisting of a mezzanine balcony having two stairs, and there being but 12 employees, waive orders Nos. 3, 6, 7, 8 and 9 while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, accept the ladder as a

second means of exit if same be continued around the cornice onto roof and opening by door provided from 4th floor to connect with ladder, said approach to ladder to be railed; or, instead of being continued around cornice, to cut opening through cornice and extend ladder to at least 3 feet above roof; or, in lieu of above, provide second stairway from 3d to 4th floors remote from present stairs.

9. Premises affected, Rochester, 13 Minerva pl.; appellant, Geo. Schmink. 1—Prohibit occupancy until two legal means of exit have been provided. (Jan. 3, 1918.) Three-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 5; above 1st floor, 2; above 2d floor, 2. Exits, interior wooden stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; fire escape on east with fireproof doors only; windows on course not fireproof; exits remote, no safe egress from roof. Recommendation: Acceptance of fire escape without fireproofing the windows while not more than eight persons employed in the building.

10. Premises affected, Rochester, 88 Manhattan st.; appellant, E. M. Phillips. 2—Enclose stairways. 3—Additional exit. 4—Swing door outwardly. 5—Reconstruct stairway to be not less than 44 inches wide. These orders were waived on Aug. 15, 1917, on condition that occupancy of 2d floor be not increased, viz., 1 employee. Appellant desires to employ ten persons on 2d floor. Two-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; present occupancy, 4; stairway enclosed with wood, door to same opens in and is not self-closing; no egress from roof; occupant of 2d floor intends to occupy 1st floor also; maximum number to be employed, 10.

Recommendation: Accept as additional exit a 44-inch interior stairway remote from present stairway, preferably in southwest corner, said stairway to be enclosed as per 504-c, extending from 1st floor to underside of 2d floor, with fire doors at all openings; doors to be provided in exterior wall within enclosure; window to be provided to enter air within enclosure; doors to present stairway accepted as an exit; doors to new stairway to be self-closing and open outwardly so as not to obstruct the stairway. Waiver of No. 5 relative to present stairway.

11. Premises affected, Schenectady, Building 91; appellant, General Electric Co. 4—Additional exit. Two-story semi-fireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 131; above 1st floor, 3; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, building used as a room foundry; 2d floor, 30 by 40 feet, used for charging cupolas; not to exceed four men on this floor at any one time.

Recommendation: Accept a fire escape conforming to Rule 4-a at end of building opposite that in which stairway is not provided, stairway of said fire escape to be 22 inches wide.

12. Premises affected, Schenectady, Building 95; appellant, General Electric Co. 6—Make stairs 44 inches wide. 7—Extend stairway enclosure 3 feet above roof. 8—Enclose stairway with fireproof partitions. 9—Self-closing fire doors at elevator. (March 21, 1918.) Two-story semi-fireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 565; above 1st floor, 15. Exits, four interior stairways, three of which are properly enclosed with fireproof partitions and are unenclosed; doors open outwardly and are self-closing. There are two imperfect horizontal exits on 2d floor; building used as foundry; 2d floor is approximately 40 feet wide by 408 feet long; central section used as cupola charging floor, two end sections used for storage of patterns and cores. These four stairways are 39 1/2 inches, 41 inches, 41 inches and 42 inches wide, respectively.

The Superintendent of Construction of this company made an error, and hence the stairways were not less than 44 inches wide; building isolated and no safe egress from roof; present enclosure of two stairways extends to underside of fireproof roof, the other about 8 feet above the 2d story floor level and is covered by means of a concrete slab. This stairway so constructed to permit the passage over the stairway enclosure of a traveling crane. The unenclosed stairway is near the center of building and is used as a service stairway; if enclosed it would cut off the necessary passageway on ground floor; not required as an exit; elevator shaft alongside of unenclosed stairway; if order to enclose stairway not required, then fireproof doors not necessary.

Recommendation: Accept the stairways less than 44 inches wide, but allow only for one unit of 22 inches. Waive orders 7, 8 and 9, no occupancy to be allowed for unenclosed stairway.

13. Premises affected, Tonawanda, River Road (Nail Mill); appellant, Wickwire Steel Co. 12—Prohibit occupancy on 2nd floor. 14—Enclose stairs fireproof. 15—Construct stairs of incombustible material. 16—Additional exit. (March 3, 1918.)

2-story nonfireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 25; above 1st floor, 22. Exit: One interior stairway. Building is two stories high on the street, but only one at rear with shipping platform with loading doors running the entire length at floor level of car door when car is on switch.

Recommendation: Treat premises as one-story building, and waive orders.

14. Premises affected, Yonkers, Neperhan ave. and Westminster st.; appellant, Alex. Smith & Sons Carpet Co. Building No. 13. Provide two legal exits from all parts of building.

4-story building; nonfireproof; open lofts; no fire alarm; no combustibles; sprinkler installed with two sources of water supply. Occupancy, 88; above 1st floor, 20 to 50; above 2nd floor, 18 to 50. Exits: One exterior wooden stairway, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; imperfect horizontal exit on 4th floor; two imperfect horizontal exits on 3rd floor. These horizontal exits are wooden bridges with self-closing fire doors and incombustible sills at each end; the one bridge on the 3d floor leads to roof of two-story building, and from this bridge an exterior stairway leads to grade.

Recommendation: While occupancy remains unchanged, accept the exterior wooden stairway as a first means of exit and the horizontal exits in the form of wooden bridges as second means of exit.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variations the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code will be observed and public safety secured, and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been advised that he would have an opportunity to appear at this time and place and be heard, and in default of appearance the decision rendered would be confirmed, and such of the appellants who appeared having been given a hearing by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved, by the State Industrial Commission that the variations set forth above be and the same hereby are granted to the appellant in each case, with the understanding that said variations will be effective only in so long as the conditions remain as of this date.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may be at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.
