Description

Emergencies affect every community differently, but you can help your community be prepared and resilient. Your Community Network can receive funding to work on a community emergency plan through NYC Emergency Management's Strengthening Communities program.

A community network is a group or a coalition consisting of nonprofit, community, and faith-based organizations that are organized around an issue important to their community such as climate change, gun violence, housing, disability rights, or other issues etc...

The training program focuses on five key areas/deliverables to build an emergency plan specific to your community:

- 1. Creating a needs assessment
- 2. Designing community maps of the area where you provide services
- 3. Building a resource directory
- 4. Preparing a communication strategy
- 5. Creating donations and volunteer management plans

NYC Emergency Management staff provides training, coaching sessions and tools that guide participating networks through the program.

By donating cash, you give those affected by the emergency a sense of control and ability to purchase items that will make them comfortable or are culturally appropriate for them.

NEW YORK – New York City Mayor Eric Adams tonight released the following statement on the buildout of the city's Humanitarian Emergency Response and Relief Center:

"New York City has, on its own, safely and efficiently provided shelter, health care, education, and a host of other services to more than 16,000 asylum seekers pursuing a better life over the last few months. As we now work to open the city's first Humanitarian Emergency Response and Relief Center, safety for those seeking asylum remains our top priority. Following this weekend's storms, New York City Emergency Management determined that, while we would be able to put in place the necessary ponding mitigation measures, relocating the Orchard Beach humanitarian relief center to Randall's Island is the most efficient and effective path forward, and work is underway to make this move. This new location is less prone to flooding, is closer to public transportation, and will provide temporary respite to 500 asylum seekers. We expect this site to open in approximately the same timeframe as the originally planned location, and we continue to build out our options and explore additional sites as we handle this humanitarian crisis created by human hands."

Where It Rains, It Floods. Cleaning After A Storm.

Cleaning after a flood can seem like a daunting task, especially if the water contains sewage or other contaminants. It is important to prepare and plan for how you are going to deal with the damage. Use the following resources to prepare you for a proper flood clean up.

Stay safe and remember these tips:

- Get the right safety gears
- Use teams to move heavy/bulky objects
- Pace yourself
- Prevent mold growth
- Wash up with soap and water
