#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending mary 6, 1886:

February 6, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,333.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 272.

During the past week 134 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 44 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 10 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 14 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 155 visits were made, and 50 disinfections and 13 lumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,316, of which 57 were primary, and 1,259 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,075 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 35, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 11, the number of arrests made was 6, and the amount of fines imposed was \$25.

The certificates of 640 births, 62 still-births, 200 marriages, and 612 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 6, 1886. This shows an increase of 36 births and 1 still-birth, and a decrease of 20 marriages and 40 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 78 births, 14 still-births, 34 marriages, and 163 deaths.
