Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 6, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,333.
The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 272.
During the past week 134 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 44 permits.
There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 10 permits.
There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 1 miscellaneous permit.
There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 14 permits.
At premises where contagious diseases were reported 155 visits were made, and 50 disinfections and 13 fumigations were performed.
The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4.
The number of vaccinations performed was 1,316, of which 57 were primary, and 1,259 re-vaccinations.
There were seized and condemned 6,075 pounds of meat.
The number of specimens of milk examined was 35, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 11, the number of arrests made was 6, and the amount of fines imposed was \$25.

The certificates of 640 births, 62 still-births, 200 marriages, and 612 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 6, 1886. This shows an increase of 36 births and 1 still-birth, and a decrease of 20 marriages and 40 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 78 births, 14 still-births, 34 marriages, and 163 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 5; croup, 4; whooping-cough, 6; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 2; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 20; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; suicide, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 5; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 2; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis enteritis and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and prenaternal births, 4; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from small-pox, measles, erysipelas, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 118 were in institutions, 341 in tenement-houses, 143 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 169 on the second, 89 on the third, 78 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 600 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 95 were stated to be single, 162 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 288 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 612; still-births, 62; bodies in transit, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 56 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 640 burials, 200 marriages, 62 still-births, 612 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 80 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 57 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 6, 1886, was 13.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.05; the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,670, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.30 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
