

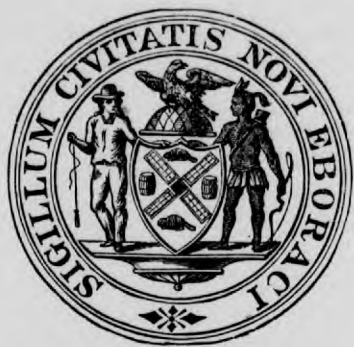

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, NO. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, June 25, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

Resolutions.

Whereas, It is reported to this Department that the midwife Mary Baur, 1497 Third avenue, attended Mrs. Blutz at 1407 Third avenue, on Monday, June 24, and did administer "labor drops" three or four times before birth, and that a child was born about two hours thereafter; therefore
Resolved, That the Coroner be requested to hold an inquest on the body of said child, now lying at 1492 Third avenue, and ascertain whether the death of said child was caused by the administration of "labor drops," and whether said midwife is authorized by law to administer medicine in such cases.
Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of June, 1878, when approved by the Finance Committee, shall duly be signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.
Resolved, That the time required for the fencing of premises at northwest corner of Fifty-sixth street and Sixth avenue be and is hereby extended to August 1, 1878, but the premises be cleaned and disinfected immediately.
Resolved, That the Register of Records be and he is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Death:
James McCormack, died May 25, 1875, make correction to correspond with corrected certificate of the Coroner.
James Mumenthaler, died June 13, 1878, in place of John Mumandaller.
Louis Anna Offermans, born June 26, 1876, in place of Louis Anna Offerman, the same being clerical errors.
Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, Section 64, of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
Sec. 64. That from and after the first day of July, 1878, the slaughtering of animals shall not be allowed or conducted at any place between First avenue and Eleventh avenue in the City of New York.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized and directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.
Resolved, That order on premises of Nos. 7, 9, and 11 Madison street be and are hereby extended to July 6, 1878.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 22, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,778, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 835 tenement houses, 173 private dwellings, 72 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 62 stables, 28 slaughter-houses, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 5 dumping grounds, 4 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 lard-rendering establishments, 2 soap factories, 1 lime kiln, 41 sunken and vacant lots, 51 yards, courts, and areas, 58 cellars and basements, 117 waste pipes and drains, 146 privies and water closets, 24 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, 1 public drain, 5 docks, 1 stock yard, 1 piggery, 14 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 635.

During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 105 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

136 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 52 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 51 houses, 51 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending June 22, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 469 burial permits for city deaths, 15 for bodies in transitu, and 37 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 469 deaths, 143 marriages, 400 births, 37 still-births, 56 returns from coroners. There were 17 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 13 of death were issued from this Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, June 25, 1878.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, June 22, 1878, 469 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; this is an increase of 7 as compared with the preceding week, and 47 more than the number of deaths during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending June 15, 1878, was 466, which is 27.4 above the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.38 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,718.

There were 8 diseases which caused 20 deaths and upward during the week, viz.: Scarletina, 21; diarrhoeal diseases, 48; cancers, 20; phthisis pulmonalis, 77; bronchitis, 20; pneumonia, 29; diseases of the nervous system, 38, and Bright's disease and nephritis.

Although the aggregate increase of the deaths during the past compared with the preceding week was 7, the increase of deaths of children under 5 was 36, and of diarrhoeal diseases 25; while scarlatina increased 4, whooping-cough, 2; malarial fever, 4; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 12; bronchitis, 5; marasmus and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; sun stroke, 1; premature and pretermatural birth, 2; while a decrease took place in measles of 4; diphtheria, 2; croup, 4; erysipelas, 5; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; pneumonia, 14; diseases of the heart, 1; aneurism, 1; diseases of the nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; and suicide, 3.

6 deaths from scarlatina, 2 from diphtheria, and 3 from whooping cough, were in houses containing 3 families and less; while 2 deaths from measles, 15 from scarlatina, 14 from diphtheria, and 5 from whooping cough were in tenement houses.

The highest number of deaths from scarlatina was in the Twenty-second Ward, 3 each of the deaths from diphtheria were in the Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards, and 3 deaths from whooping cough were in the Twentieth Ward; no deaths from contagious diseases were reported in the Second, Third, Fourth, Ninth, and Fifteenth Wards.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 76 were in institutions, 259 in tenement houses, 124 in houses containing 3 families or less, 1 in hotels and boarding houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 105 were on the first floor, 131 on the second, 96 on the third, 33 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth; 468 were stated to be resident of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 42 were stated to be single, 126 married, 44 widowed, and the condition of 257 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 452 deaths and still-births, or 89.33 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 189; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 58; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran (undenominational), 71; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 30; Woodlawn (undenominational), 10; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 3.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending June 15, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 8; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 7; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 13; Ninth, 24; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 24; Twelfth, 30; Thirteenth, 7; Fourteenth, 11; Fifteenth, 11; Sixteenth, 19; Seventeenth, 14; Eighteenth, 18; Nineteenth, 57; Twentieth, 32; Twenty-first, 38; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 22, was 69.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.769, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 833, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.74 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
